Dear Honorable Members of the 127th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 298, "An Act To Require Political Action Committees To Report the Receipt of Paid Services Received from State Agencies."

This bill is clearly a reactionary move resulting from the fact that the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (IF&W) took a stand against the bear-baiting referendum last year. In the face of that referendum, the biologists and the game wardens at IF&W, by far the most knowledgeable people on the subject, made their position public and worked through television ads to educate the public about their position.

While I have no objection to the current political action committees' (PAC's) reporting requirements, this bill simply goes too far. Right now, when nonprofit corporations or commercial entities compensate their employees to provide services to a PAC, the PAC must report the services as a contribution. This bill suggests that state employees being paid to do their jobs may be considered a "contribution." State employees, by definition, work for the People of Maine and not for PACs. When they provide information to the public in various forms, whether it is responding to a Freedom of Access Act Request, speaking at forums or appearing in television ads to provide public education, they are serving the public.

State employees are professionals and are often sought out for their subject matter expertise by both sides of a political issue. This bill crosses a line by assuming these employees are "providing services" to PACs. I am not prepared to cross that line. For this reason, I return LD 298 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

Dear Honorable Members of the 127th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 435, "An Act To Extend the Protection of Municipal Shellfish Conservation Programs."

This bill would extend a pilot project that authorized municipal predator control so that municipalities could study ways of controlling the effects of green crabs on soft shell clams. On April 5, 2014, the original legislation authorizing this pilot project became law without my signature. Since that time, municipalities have had the authority to conduct this pilot program. Now proponents of this bill want to extend the pilot until November 1, 2016. The pilot project has been conducted and the data has been gathered. Let's react to the data, not simply continue to extend this pilot ad infinitum.

Moreover, I have heard from proponents of this bill that municipalities have invested in seeding efforts in anticipation of this pilot project being extended. That is unfortunate that these decisions were made before the legislation was enacted. More concerning, however, are seeding efforts taking place under the guise of this pilot project. This was a project to study predator control – not to provide protection for municipal seeding. What was contemplated was an inquiry into predator control and not simply making flats inaccessible to some members of the marine economy to the benefit of others.

Again, we have conducted the pilot. Now is the time to react to the information we have learned, not simply dither. For this reason, I return LD 435 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

Senator LIBBY: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I rise to speak in opposition to the pending motion. The bill before us extends the provision of law regarding the award of public works contracts without regard to project's labor agreements. This prohibition on this activity would extend for another ten years. This actually would cover State, county, and local governments from using PLAs, Project Labor Agreements, as a condition of working on public works construction projects. The original bill set out a four year moratorium on this practice. It was a party line vote during the 125<sup>th</sup> Legislature. Project Labor Agreements have their value in large scale projects. They are used mostly on projects of long duration and when the design has significant complexity. Project Labor Agreements are a business model that addresses the needs of the community, in our view, and include provisions such as local hiring, at-risk targeted training programs, support to small businesses, and apprenticeship ratios. Project Labor Agreements are used in the private sector. We see in the news that they are used by Toyota Motor Corporation, Wal-Mart Corporation. They are employed by the U.S. Department of Energy. I think they represent commonsense tools that public entities can and should employ in public works projects, particularly larger ones. With that, Mr. President, I thank you for the time and I would ask you to vote against the pending motion.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Cushing.

Senator CUSHING: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, thank you for the courtesy of being able to speak to this issue. I brought this bill forward as it had not effectively been implemented due to the shortages of projects in the public sector. I think that it's clear, as we look at the tight budgetary constraints that many government agencies are facing, that we provide an opportunity for them to be as competitive as possible. The other more significant factor, Mr. President, is this precludes many local Maine companies that hire Maine employees that provide good paying jobs the opportunity to participate in some of these projects. I think it's really unfair when the taxpayers of Maine are footing a large percentage of this bill. that we deny Maine businesses, who provide good paying jobs to local people, the opportunities that are incumbent upon their being able to bid and participate in municipal projects in their communities. Thank you, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Knox, Senator Miramant.

Senator MIRAMANT: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, these bills, on the first look, can show the divide between our philosophical differences about business and labor. It doesn't need to be this. When I look at this and the labor agreements, it gives us a chance to control many aspects of a project and fix costs. By doing this ahead we can often avoid costly overruns that end up billing the State, local, or county governments on the backside. There is no guarantee that it will prevent that, but every piece of the project is laid out. As Senator Libby mentioned, some of the hiring practices keep things local, but another piece is, by controlling those costs, we know that. While it may look like without this agreement some company is going to come in lower on a bid, we've seen over and over where they come in slightly lower they take most of that money, they don't create a good labor force or a good working environment for their employees, and that creates shoddy workmanship and other non-gender work. The point is that while they hire people and don't pay them well and things don't go well, they often end up overrunning with those projects. So these are addressed ahead, have great value, and, I think, saves money in the long run. I'd urge you not to vote for this. Thank you.

I think we all know that our state is one of the oldest states, if not the oldest state, in the country. Charlie Colgan sums up our state's challenge like this, "Maine's age distribution is out of balance. It's not that we are disproportionately old," he said, "it's that we are disproportionately not young." Let's take a look at this bill in front of us. What this bill is doing is it's amending the State's income tax credit for childcare expenses by increasing the credit from 25% to the federal tax credit allowable for child and dependent care expenses to 100% of the federal tax credit beginning January 1, 2015. Why did I put this bill in? Look folks, Charlie Colgan can't say it better than I. We are a state that's upside-down with our age and this bill is to incentivize young families to work, so that both parents can work. This bill is to incentivize young families from outside of the state of Maine to look at the state of Maine as a possible destination where they want to raise their kids. We all know that Maine is one of the best places in the country to raise children. If we could offer up to \$2,000 of a tax credit that matches the federal tax credit I think there'll be some young families that say, "You know what, Maine is sending the right signal. Maine is sending the signal that they care about work and they care about children going to great early childhood programs." I know that this bill is not going to see the light of day this time, but I hope those who follow in my footsteps and others that don't come back in the next Legislature think about this because we have to do something very quickly. Very quickly. If we can encourage more young families to send their children to

childcare and more young families to come to the state of Maine because of our childcare tax credit, I think it would be a bonus to the state of Maine. Thank you, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Burns.

Senator BURNS: Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, with all due respect to the author of this Joint Resolution, I cannot support it and I just, very briefly, say why that is. Since the 1960s up through the 1970s and 1980s, we've spent untold dollars, both State and federal money, in trying to restock the Atlantic Salmon after the dissipation from our rivers and waterways. It's produced less than 1% of return from that effort. Thousands and thousands of stock fish with a very high cost. I'm very supportive of those individual and private groups. In fact, there is one in Washington County that are engaged in this effort. I'm not in favor of the Resolution. I'm very, very concerned, as many of you know, about our own landlocked stocking programs that we're engaged in, 75% of that which populate our landlocked salmon fishing throughout the state comes from Washington County, Grand Lake Stream. That hatchery, I believe, currently is in danger because of federal initiatives. That's a \$600 million industry for the state of Maine, as well as a lot of sports enthusiasts. As I read the Resolution, this would call for the President to have the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and National Marine Resource Fisheries expand their efforts and money into our state fish hatcheries and I think that would be a bad move on the part of the state of Maine. I think when something like this happens something else has got to give, and that will be our landlocked salmon efforts. So I very much oppose this Resolution. Thank you, Mr. President.

At the request of Senator **BURNS** of Washington a Division was had. 21 Senators having voted in the affirmative and 13 Senators having voted in the negative, the Joint Resolution was **ADOPTED**, in concurrence.
