Dear Honorable Members of the 127th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 516 "An Act Regarding Gaming."

The Maine State Lottery was enacted in 1973 by the people of Maine in a statewide referendum. It is the responsibility of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations and the State Liquor and Lottery Commission to administer the Lottery. The statutory role of the Lottery Commission is to set policy for state Lotteries and to promulgate and amend rules for their administration. The intent of this bill was to prevent a specific lottery game from being introduced into the State of Maine. I find this disconcerting for several reasons.

While it is true the State was considering the introduction of a new lottery draw game, known as Keno, that effort was abandoned months ago. Legislation is not needed to prevent the launch of Keno in Maine. All it required was a phone call or a letter expressing concerns to the Executive branch to reconsider introduction of this game. Too often, members of the Legislature assume the answer to every problem is to introduce a bill and a new law.

This bill attempts to restrict the Lottery's ability to develop new game styles and prize structure offerings. If we are going to operate a Lottery in the State of Maine, then it needs the flexibility necessary to innovate and refresh its offerings. This bill limits that flexibility.

Rather than advancing well-developed, thoughtful public policy that further defines and supports the Lottery, the Legislature has taken a short-cut that makes our laws worse, not better. I return LD 516 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

Dear Honorable Members of the 127th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 420 "An Act To Amend the Law Regarding Filing Fees for Proposed Transmission Line Projects."

The bill increases electric transmission filing fees to pay for additional studies. While this may be good for energy consultants, it is not good policy for the Maine ratepayer. Clearly, we want to pursue cost-effective alternatives to expensive transmission lines, but the studies for alternatives should be funded ultimately by the company that is selected to address the reliability challenge – not always the transmission and distribution utilities.

I recognize that the Public Utilities Commission has indicated that without legislation the mandate created by the last Legislature will ultimately be funded through their budget regardless. However, I do believe that the companies proposing alternatives to transmission should also be required to pay for the initial studies exploring non-transmission alternatives.

For these reasons, I return LD 420 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

1. Work Group To Plan the Transition to Funding 55 Percent of Education Costs and 100 Percent of Special Education Costs established. The Work Group To Plan the Transition to Funding 55 Percent of Education Costs and 100 Percent of Special Education Costs, referred to in this order as "the work group," is established.

2. Membership. The work group consists of the following members:

A. The President of the Senate shall appoint 3 members of the Senate, including members from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature, who are members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation or the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs; and

B. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint 4 members of the House of Representatives, including members from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature, who are members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation or the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs.

3. Chairs. The first-named Senate member is the Senate chair and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the work group.

4. Appointments; convening of work group. All

appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the passage of this order. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the work group. If 30 days or more after the passage of this order a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the work group to meet and conduct its business.

5. Duties. The work group shall plan the transition over a 4-year period to state funding of 55% of education costs and 100% of special education costs as required by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, sections 15752 and 15753 and mandated by the voters at referendum.

6. **Staff assistance**. The Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the work group.

7. Report. No later than December 2, 2015, the work group shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee

on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation and the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs.

Nancie Atwell, of Edgecomb, a teacher at the Center for Teaching and Learning in Edgecomb, who won the Global Teacher Prize with a \$1,000,000 award. Senator **JOHNSON**: Thank you, Mr. President. They are learning really well and that's what good teaching is all about. We have a lot of good schools in this state, but it's wonderful that we have one of our teachers recognized on a global scale as being the best teacher in the world. I'd ask that we read this sentiment and all be proud of Nancie Atwell. Thank you.
