THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hill.

Senator **HILL**: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President and colleagues, I think this bill has a good sounding title and it's something we should be talking about, but my concern is this, the way it was worded this present legislation would eliminate technology oriented energy goals for the state of Maine and it would establish object oriented goals. Again, that sounds good too, but we need to look a little bit behind that language and remember what the people of the state of Maine want. When we were in committee we realized this needs a conversation, but it just can't be handled under the time constraints that we had there, so that resulted in an Ought Not to Pass report by many of us. What we found in the testimony we thought was compelling. One, this does need more time because it does little to provide clarity to Maine's energy goals. We also learned that it undermines the State's long-standing objective of utilizing renewable energy resources. Furthermore, the law already states, "It is the policy of the State to reduce electric prices for the State's electricity consumers and to reduce greenhouse gas emissions for the electricity generation sector." Perhaps even more compelling was the impact this would have by the testimony under "neither for or against." We heard, "The bill has enormous implications and should be studied before acting upon." "The removal of wind energy goals would negatively impact the construction industry, which is one of the strongest industries within the energy sector in Maine right now. In fact, it supports 1,560 jobs per year and is trending towards 4,000 jobs in 2015." "The language could cause confusion in applying Title 35 and reducing costs long-term for energy efficiency purposes could result in short-term increases in rates." It was interesting, as I said. I think this should be an on-going plan that is reviewed, but I think it should be given adequate time. What I found particularly of interest was the reference in the letter by the Director of Energy which said that the Executive Branch, in technology, is agnostic and focused on whatever technology provides results for the Maine ratepayer and the Maine environment. There are no parameters to that so we have no idea what direction it will take. One thing I am sure of is that the people of Maine are not agnostic about energy policy. They clearly want to see development of renewables. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Woodsome.

Senator **WOODSOME**: Thank you, Mr. President. I wish to speak on L.D. 1314. This legislation will eliminate technology oriented energy goals for the state and establish objective oriented goals. Specifically, the language in this bill would establish the following as a primary energy goal for the state. "The Legislature declares that the primary energy policy of the State is to reduce electric rates and costs for the state's businesses and households as well as to reduce air pollution." Who would be against these goals? Our constituents do not care

about technology or what technology gets less results. They simply want lower energy bills and lower pollution. We should have policies that promote any technology that can lower costs and lower the pollution. Instead, we currently have a policy promoting indigenous renewable resources, such as wind energy goal of 2,000 megawatts installed capacity by January 1, 2015. We have about 450 megawatts installed today. That is basically a goal that simply says build more wind. We should be realistic with our goals rather than these ridiculous wind specific goals. Our energy goals should be inclusive of all technologies that result in progress for the Maine people. Improving the efficiency of natural gas power plants, installing wind, installing solar, installing biomass, or any new technology that innovators are pursuing today we should be promoting. Instead of managing specific technology choices, we should have a flexible policy that promotes all options to get the results that we are looking for to achieve lower costs and lower pollution. We should use everything that is available: biomass, wind, geothermal, solar, and, yes, natural gas; anything that can lower pollution and lower the cost for the Maine people. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is the motion by the Senator from York, Senator Woodsome to Accept the Minority Ought to Pass Report, in Non-concurrence. A Roll Call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Brakey.

Senator **BRAKEY:** Thank you, Mr. President. I appreciate the opportunity to stand and oppose this motion. I have no illusions, considering the report that's in front of us, that this might be a lost cause. That being said, I think the sponsor of this bill, whoever that person may have been, was really onto something, because I happen to be the sponsor of this bill. I just want to highlight what this bill is attempting to accomplish. Currently, we have in Maine many local variety stores. I'll keep my comments brief. We have many local variety stores. Many of us may have these local variety stores in our own districts. Currently many of these stores have to make a choice. They can choose to apply for and receive a liquor license to sell liquor for carry-out, where someone buys a six-pack and takes it home with them, or they can choose to get a liquor license for on premise consumption. For many of these variety stores, they happen to be both a grocery store and a restaurant. Maybe you go there to get some of your groceries. Maybe you go there and buy a sandwich and have a meal. We ask them to choose. We say that they can have one liquor license or they can have the other but they can't have both unless they jump through huge bureaucratic hoops, including erecting walls and going through a lot of trouble in order to do both things. They can do either one or the other. If they can get both licenses individually, why can't they get them both together? Some people raised the concern of taxes. Some people say that alcohol that is purchased for taking home is taxed at a different rate from alcohol that is purchased for on-site consumption. We already allow our micro-breweries to do this and they found easy ways to do that. They just have a distinction and they tax them for whichever consumption you're doing. This would require that if alcohol is served on premises for on-premises consumption it would have to be served by an employee so you could easily make that distinction. Anyways, as I said, I have no illusions, considering the report that we're facing, that we're going to overturn this Ought Not to Pass Report, but I think this is a very important issue to some of my constituents. I imagine many of us have constituents who own these local variety stores, or work at these local variety stores, and I think it's an issue worth raising for this Body. I thank you, Mr. President, for the opportunity to speak.
