ORDERED, that the House Rules be amended by amending House Rule 525 to read:

Rule 525. Penobscot Nation, Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and Passamaquoddy Tribe. The member of the Penobscot Nation, the member of the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and the member of the Passamaquoddy Tribe elected <del>or appointed</del> to represent their people at the biennial session of the Legislature must be granted seats on the floor of the House of Representatives; be granted, by consent of the Speaker, the privilege of speaking on pending legislation; must be appointed to sit with joint standing committees as nonvoting members during the committees' deliberations; and be granted such other rights and privileges as may from time to time be voted by the House of Representatives. In reports from committees on which a tribal member serves, the position of the member must be noted and included. The names of the member of the Penobscot Nation, the member of the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and the member of the Passamaquoddy Tribe elected or appointed to represent their people at the biennial session of the Legislature must be included on the roll call board for purposes of electronically recording their attendance only.

Committee on **HOUSE RULES** suggested.

On motion of Representative PIERCE of Dresden, the following House Order: (H.O. 10)

ORDERED, that the House Rules be amended by amending House Rule 511 to read:

Rule 511. Motion to reconsider. When a motion has been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it is in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side, or in the negative on a tie vote, to move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A vote of 2/3 of the members present is necessary to reconsider a motion. A motion to reconsider may not be tabled unassigned. A motion to reconsider is not in order more than once on the same question. When a member moves or gives notice of the member's intention to move a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates must remain in possession of the Clerk until the question of reconsideration has been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost. Notwithstanding the provisions of this rule, any member may move for reconsideration of a committee reference on the floor. A, and a majority vote is necessary to overturn the original committee of reference.

ORDERED, that the House Rules be amended by amending House Rule 109 to read:

Rule 109. Use of personal electronic communication devices. During all sessions of the House, a member shall restrict that member's use of all personal electronic communication devices to personal business and business of the House and shall in such use exercise high standards of discretion, conduct and decorum. A member may take a photograph or record or transmit video with a personal electronic communication device during a session of the House if such taking, recording or transmitting does not cause a distraction or impede the business of the House. A member may not take a photograph or record or transmit video with a personal electronic communication device during a joint convention.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from East Machias, Representative Tuell.

Representative TUELL: Thank you Madam Speaker, I rise today to say a few brief words about my father who retired from the University of Maine Machias in October, after 27 years and as the Senator from Washington said the other day in the Senate, often times the folks that work in custodial services are on the front lines of service and they're the ones that our students, particularly in colleges all across the system, they are the ones that people interact with every day. And often times they are the folks that kids, students of all ages, learn from the most and learn life's lessons from. In fact, I might even go so far as to say that there are members in this body who attended the University of Maine at Machias when my father first started out in custodial service, back in the late 80's. So, I say that because folks like my father, and others have done so much for our students, they have become advisors, coaches, whatever word you want to use and they fulfill a role that doesn't often get acknowledged in the operations of our universities and our public service. So, to everyone, and especially my father, who for many years, kept the campus plowed, kept the place clean, kept it looking nice, kept it something that folks could be proud of. I will say, thank you and on a personal note. I can honestly tell you the reason why I have 14 bills this session, is because of my father's incredible work ethic. And I will tell you that he has been a role model and I'm very proud of him. Just like to thank him for his service to the State of Maine. Thank you.

Subsequently, this Expression of Legislative Sentiment was **PASSED** in concurrence.

#### In Memory of:

Clinton B. "Bill" Townsend, of Canaan, a tireless advocate for Maine's environment for over 50 years. Townsend began work with the Natural Resources Council of Maine in 1960. A skilled attorney, he helped lead the campaign to create the Allagash Wilderness Waterway and also helped to stop a dam at Big Amberjackmockamus Falls as well as the proposed Basin Mills Dam in the lower Penobscot watershed. He led many negotiations over the years to stop destructive practices and protect places at risk. Mr. Townsend was a member of the council's Board of Directors for nearly 30 years and served as president from 1965 to 1970. He also served the State in numerous posts, including as a member of the Land Use Regulation Commission, the Land for Maine's Future Board, the Whitewater Rafting Advisory Committee and the Task Force on Water Pollution Control. President George H.W. Bush appointed him as one of three American commissioners of the North Atlantic Salmon Conservation Organization. Mr. Townsend will be long remembered for his dedication to environmental issues and will be sadly missed by his loving family and many friends:

Representative **STETKIS**: Thank you Madam Speaker. As a young boy growing up in the Town of Canaan, you know, Bill Townsend and his wife Louise Townsend, icons of our community. Always there with a helping hand. Always there to contribute to local causes, but myself and many of my friends, what we are going to miss most about Bill is our extended conversations of his fly fishing adventures and our great love of the outdoors.
