WHEREAS, James Madison, generally regarded as the father of our federal Constitution, wrote that "a people who mean to be their own Governors, must arm themselves with the power which knowledge gives"; and

WHEREAS, every citizen in our participatory democracy has an inherent right of access to government meetings and public records; and

WHEREAS, an open and accessible government is vital to establishing and maintaining the people's trust and confidence in their government and in the government's ability to effectively serve its citizens; and

WHEREAS, we celebrate open government and recognize its importance in developing how people who believe in democracy think about transparency and its role in government, leading to the adoption of our own Freedom of Access Act; and

WHEREAS, the protection of every person's right of access to public records and government meetings is a high priority for the State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, Sunshine Week was established to spark a discussion about the importance of open government and public access to government documents and meetings; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize Sunshine Week during the week of March 12-18, 2017 and confirm the basic principles of an open and accessible government in a free society and urge all citizens to join in this observance.

READ.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Glenburn, Representative Guerin.

Representative **GUERIN**: During Sunshine Week, I ask you to think about your personal role in government and transparency. We must all be vigilant in holding ourselves and our committees accountable. As a leader on the Judiciary Committee, that is the committee of oversight for freedom of access, I take this responsibility very seriously. I read in the Bangor Daily News that the Joint Committee on Marijuana Legalization Implementation had gone on an informal, informational tour of several marijuana facilities and that the media, and thus the public, were not allowed to go along. I intend to ask Attorney General Mills to look into this and I'd ask you when you see problems with freedom of access to do the same thing, to speak out and be a voice for transparency and sunshine for the citizens of Maine.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Amherst, Representative Lockman.

Representative **LOCKMAN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, just want everyone to know I really like this House Order. I especially like the part where it says we have an inherent right of access to government meetings and public records. And I really like the part where it says, we're celebrating the adoption of the state's Freedom of Access Act. I really like that, Madam Speaker, how about you? Thanks.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians, Representative Bear.

Representative **BEAR**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. In the spirit of this Joint Resolution, Sunshine Week, which is most appropriate, one that reminds us of how to keep ourselves safe from, well, things that governments may do wrong because they conceal or aren't as transparent as we expect them to be, as we need them to be. I remind the body that I will soon be proposing to you a bill that will revisit an amendment to the Maine Constitution that will do and ask you to vote exactly that, in making public hidden portions of Maine's Constitution as regards to Maine's Treaty obligations. Article X, Section 5, subsection 5 is currently not published. It's illegal to publish it.

It deals with Maine's founding document in separating from the State of Massachusetts Bay at the time. And so with this Resolution in mind, I do rise and I speak to more transparency in this state. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from York, Representative Hymanson, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **HYMANSON**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Happy 197th Birthday tomorrow to our State of Maine, on March 15th, as it broke away from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The Massachusetts General Court had convened a year before, in 1819. In unprecedented numbers, petitions from towns in Maine poured in. The final count was 130, with 125 of them in support of separation. The following is the petition submitted by the Town of York in May of 1819. I want to thank Mary-Anne Szeniawski, the longtime York Town Clerk and James Kences, the York Historian, for gathering these documents from the Town of York archives. "To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts

and General Court assembled on the fourth Wednesday of May, 1819. The inhabitants of the Town of York respectfully represent that they view the separation of Maine from Massachusetts proper as one of the events which, in the course of things, will ere long take place. Massachusetts is an anomaly in the Union-a state whose territory is disjoined and disconnected by the intervening territory of another state. In a state constituted of territory thus situated, the interests of the different sections will often become different, and in some cases, actually at variance with each other. Such we believe has often been the case with Massachusetts and Maine. But Maine is now so far advanced in wealth and population that she is well able to support a separate government for herself. The present quiet state of the public mind on such subjects of a party nature is particularly favorable to the formation and establishment of a constitution and government founded on those principles, which have been sanctioned by the wisdom and experience of our most enlightened statesmen." On and on and on. "The said inhabitants, therefore, respectfully pray that the Legislature should take the subject in their consideration, and give their assent to the separation, of such terms and conditions, as shall be honorable to Massachusetts, and just and equitable to Maine." On March 4, 1820, the Maine Constitution was ratified by Congress with statehood gained on 3/15/1820. Happy 197th Birthday to the State of Maine. Thank you, Madam Speaker.
