Dear Honorable Members of the 128th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 324, "An Act To Allow Corrections Officers To Administer Naloxone."

This bill would allow corrections officers to carry and administer Naloxone, which is also known as Narcan. Frankly, this bill is unnecessary as it relates to the Department of Corrections. Narcan is kept in the Department of Corrections system in case there is an overdose. However, most importantly, the Narcan is administered by medically trained professionals in medical units of corrections facilities.

This bill proposes for line corrections officers to administer the drug. Some might say that some county facilities do not have full-time medical units; therefore, this bill is necessary. However, rather than invest in special training for corrections officers to administer Narcan, counties should instead invest in medical services. Also, this bill does not address the issue of

immunity from suit if something should go wrong with the administration.

For these reasons, I return LD 324 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

Dear Honorable Members of the 128th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 1306, "An Act to Create the Small Communities Tourism Fund."

This legislation puts Maine at risk of potentially losing future revenue. The Maine Office of Tourism does an excellent job using our precious tax dollars to market Maine to new, out-ofstate visitors. One of the reasons they are successful is because marketing decisions are not specifically prescribed by statute. Instead, those decisions are directed by quality research and hard data. LD 1306 sets the dangerous precedent of mandating a "carve out" for how future funds are dispersed in the Tourism Enterprise Marketing Grant Program. This program exists to help market smaller or more focused tourism projects in communities all across Maine.

If and when the market changes and the Tourism Office needs to adjust how to best help communities and groups market events, they will first need to convince the legislature to change state law. This is micromanaging at its worst, and it puts tourism marketing decisions more in the hands of politicians than the experts who know the industry and whose decisions are based on actual data.

There are more than two dozen tourism-related sectors in Maine. Imagine if every sector started asking for what they feel is their piece of the marketing pie. Our ability to effectively market Maine as a four-season tourist destination would be severely hampered, and revenues would plummet. Visitation to Maine has increased annually since the Office of Tourism introduced its new marketing plan in 2012. Let's leave marketing to the experts and keep politics out of an industry that supports nearly 106,000 jobs and has an \$8.9 billion economic impact in Maine.

For these reasons, I return LD 1306 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.

Dear Honorable Members of the 128<sup>th</sup> Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 96 "An Act to Improve Attendance at Public Elementary Schools."

While this bill may be well-intentioned, it is not the solution for chronic absenteeism at public schools, and it may even make the problem worse. Data shows this approach does not work. Instead of welcoming or inspiring students to attend school, this bill places blame and shame on students and their families for absenteeism by permitting the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to enter the home of our state's youngest students and force them to attend school. This not only interferes with the rights of parents, but also reinforces the worst fears of parents who themselves may have had negative experiences at school. To be successful, our schools must foster positive relationships of trust with these students and their parents; this bill does the opposite.

There are more appropriate and effective approaches available to encourage and inspire students to attend to school, such as those found on the Count ME In website (http://countmeinmaine.org), including initiatives such as the walking school bus. I recently had an opportunity to visit the East End Elementary School in Portland to observe their "Rise and Shine" program. That program is a great example of how a can motivate students, facilitate mentorship school relationships and inspire students to truly love coming to school. Identified for a school improvement grant, the leaders at East End designed a program to put the best part of the day at the beginning, offering students a stimulating 30-minute first period to start the day. Along with other initiatives at the school, this has led to improved attendance and greater student engagement. The students at the school come from a wide variety of backgrounds, but share a great enthusiasm for coming to school every morning for "Rise and Shine." Other school districts would do well to study their example.

I am all in for efforts that inspire students to come to school every day, excited to learn. This bill doesn't do that. Instead, it promotes punitive action that risks stigmatizing students and their families, all through an approach that has no proven results. I cannot support it.

For this reason, I return LD 96 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the Legislature to sustain it.
