**JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 7, 2018
AS NATIONAL GIRLS AND WOMEN IN SPORTS DAY**

WHEREAS, the National Girls and Women in Sports Day Coalition celebrates National Girls and Women in Sports Day in Washington, D.C. and encourages its celebration in communities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, this day exists to recognize the past and current sports achievements of girls and women, the positive influence of sports participation and the continuing struggle for equality and access for girls and women in sports; and

WHEREAS, National Girls and Women in Sports Day began in 1987 as a day to remember Olympic volleyball player Flo Hyman for her athletic achievements and her commitment to ensure equality for women's sports; and

WHEREAS, the history of girls and women in sports is rich and long, yet there has been little national recognition of the significance of girls' and women's athletic achievements; and

WHEREAS, at all levels of athletics, girls and women develop self-discipline, initiative, confidence and leadership skills regardless of background; and

WHEREAS, the bonds girls and women build through athletics help to break down the social barriers of racism and prejudice, and the communication and cooperation skills learned through sports play a key role in the athletes' contributions at home, at work and to society; and

WHEREAS, a need for increased opportunities exists for girls to participate in and pursue physical activity in the community and at the scholastic level so that they may, beginning at an early age, increase their health and well-being on a daily basis and develop lifelong fitness habits; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize February 7, 2018 as National Girls and Women in Sports Day.

Bill "An Act To Further Delay the Implementation of Certain Provisions of the Marijuana Legalization Act" (EMERGENCY)

(S.P. 660) (L.D. 1775)

Unanimous **OUGHT TO PASS AS AMENDED** Report of the Committee on **MARIJUANA LEGALIZATION**

IMPLEMENTATION READ and **REJECTED** in the House on February 1, 2018.

Came from the Senate with that Body having **INSISTED** on its former action whereby the Unanimous **OUGHT TO PASS AS AMENDED** Report of the Committee on **MARIJUANA LEGALIZATION IMPLEMENTATION** was **READ** and **ACCEPTED** and the Bill **PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED AS AMENDED BY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-346)** in **NON-CONCURRENCE**.

Speaker GIDEON of Freeport moved that the House **RECEDE AND CONCUR**.

Representative FREDETTE of Newport **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **RECEDE AND CONCUR**.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Belfast, Representative Herbig.

Representative **HERBIG**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Could the Chair please clarify the motion that is before us for the body?

The SPEAKER: Yes. The Chair will answer in the affirmative. The motion before the body is Recede and Concur, and Recede and Concur means that we will be -- if -- we would be, by accepting this motion, taking a step back from our previous position, to agree with the Senate position as the bill is sent to us. The Senate position is Ought to Pass as Amended, plus engrossment of the bill. So, that's where -- that's what's in front of us right now.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winthrop, Representative Hickman.

Representative **HICKMAN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Good morning. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, on Thursday, when this body chose not to extend the moratorium, a section of law that the people gave themselves at the ballot box last November went into effect. That section of law says: Relation to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act. This chapter may not be construed to limit any privileges or rights of a qualifying patient, primary caregiver, registered or otherwise, or registered dispensary under the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act. Two, this chapter may not be construed to require an employer to permit or accommodate the use, consumption, possession, trade, display, transport, sale or growing of cannabis in the workplace. This chapter does not affect the ability of employers to enact and enforce workplace policies restricting the use of marijuana by employees or to discipline employees who are under the influence of marijuana in the workplace. Three, a school, employer or landlord may not refuse to enroll or employ or lease to, or otherwise penalize, a person 21 years of age or older solely for that person's consuming marijuana outside of the school's, employer's, or landlord's property. And four, a person may not be denied parental rights and responsibilities with respect to, or contact with, a minor child as a result of acting in accordance with this chapter, unless the person's conduct is contrary to the best interests of the minor child as set out in Title 19-A, section 1653, subsection 3. The effective date of this part of statute was February 1, 2018. So, when this body declined to expand the moratorium this section of law went into effect, which protects the rights of employees, parents, and students, as well as medical marijuana patients. The people gave themselves these rights, and if we were to vote on this motion in the affirmative, the Legislature would be taking these rights away. I stand in strong opposition to this motion, and I ask this body to do what it did last week, and allow these rights to remain in effect for the people of the State of Maine, that the people of

the State of Maine gave themselves. Thank you, Madam Speaker, Women and Men of the House.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is to Recede and Concur. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

DIRIGO, the Association of the state consumer and member owned utilities, formed the Maine Municipal and Rural Electrification Cooperative Agency (MMRECA) as a vehicle for promoting joint action among the state's seven consumer owned utilities. The officers of DIRIGO serve as the officers of

MMRECA. The members of DIRIGO participating in MMRECA activities fund all costs of those activities. MMRECA receives no State funding. DIRIGO sees an inherent value in maintaining MMRECA even though it has not been active in the past years. The electric utility "business" was historically stagnant, but with the ever continuing changes that have taken place and that are likely to occur in the future, DIRIGO believes it needs all of the mechanisms available to it to meet any new challenges and be able to provide the best possible service to our consumer owners and members.

In compliance with 5 M.R.S.A. §12023 MMRECA provides the following response. The MMRECA did not adopt policies regarding vendor selection, contributions, and travel, meals & entertainment. MMRECA commits that it will put in place such policies prior to engaging in associated activities. MMRECA has not retained a lobbyist. MMRECA did not have any procurements and did not make any contributions.
