**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Libby.

Senator LIBBY: Mr. President, men and women of the Senate, thank you. Recent events across the country have highlighted the need for workplaces of all kinds to do better in the way of harassment prevention training. As you know, State Houses are very public places and unique among workplaces. Here legislators, partisan staff, non-partisan staff, the lobby, staff from the Executive Branch, staff from the Constitutional Offices, and the public at-large all interact in what is intended and expected to be a professional setting. But, as we better understand now, harassment takes many forms and happens more often than is acceptable. During the most recent legislative preconference at the beginning of our 2-year session I was absent from the harassment prevention training session that was conducted down in the other chamber. In lieu of participating in that session, I signed a piece of paper that included the legislature's sexual harassment policy. While this action likely meets the requirements of State law, I find it insufficient given what we can expect happens in our workplace. So, working with the presiding officers, the Executive Director's Office, I set about proposing a change to our Joint Rules. In my view, increased and enhanced sexual harassment prevention training is a personnel policy and rightly belongs in the Joint Rules where the presiding officers are responsible for enforcement. Working with the Executive Director's Office, we proposed language that I feel will greatly enhance member's understanding of norms that are expected in today's workplace. This Joint Rule proposal received a unanimous endorsement from the Personnel Committee, as well as a unanimous endorsement from the Joint Rules Committee. I ask for your support today. I thank you for your consideration. Mr. President, I request a roll call.

Today we are highlighting a very important resource for our constituents. 2-1-1 Maine is a free, confidential service that connects people all over Maine to needed services in their area. 2-1-1 employs specialists that assist people in finding local services that help them stav healthy, safe, and independent. This includes everything from heating assistance, mental health resources, food pantries, housing, and veteran's assistance. Mainers can connect to 2-1-1 Maine and receive information and referrals by calling 211, texting their zip code to 898211, or visiting 211 maine.org. 2-1-1 is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year here in Maine. In addition to helping Mainers connect to the spectrum of health and human services, 2-1-1 is involved in very specific initiatives. One in particular I think is very relevant to today's conversation. It's called the Maine Opiate Help Line. 2-1-1 works in partnership with the Maine Department of Health and Human Services to provide a toll-free, statewide help line for individuals seeking services for opiate use. If you contact 2-1-1 you can connect to the Opiate Help Line and receive referrals to treatment options in your particular area. All contacts and referrals are free and confidential. People can contact the Opiate Help Line for themselves or for someone they know. Anyone connecting to the Opiate Help Line for themselves, they can speak directly with a 2-1-1 specialist to identify treatment options or other resources. 2-1-1 provides additional assistance to pregnant women in particular. For pregnant women, 2-1-1 specialists offer resources for health and offer an immediate transfer, known as a Warm Handoff, to a service provider. Anyone connecting with the Opiate Help Line will be offered a follow-up phone call. With permission, 2-1-1 specialists will check in with the caller or texter to make sure they can start services. Just so everyone knows, in 2017 2-1-1 specialists received nearly 40,000 phone calls, including 1,500 calls in particular for individuals looking for substance related resources for themselves or someone they know. 2-1-1 is an initiative of the United Ways of Maine in collaboration with the State of Maine and the Opportunity Alliance, and we appreciate the work they do on a daily basis.
