I am pleased to submit on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Maine Community College System (MCCS) the attached report on certain procurements, contributions, and policy changes for the period July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017 as required by 5 M.R.S.A.§ 12023.

To report the information required by §12023. MCCS developed a customized reporting feature in the business management module of our information systems for each of the seven colleges and the System Office, and then fed that module with data from the purchase order, cash disbursement, and credit card systems. Combined, the seven colleges and the MCCS System Office make tens of thousands of purchases and expenditures each year. While the task of reporting on these transactions is complex, our review

indicates that the colleges' compliance with existing policies is extremely high, and expenditures are consistently mission related. In those few areas where we have identified need for improvement, refinements have been made or are under way.

MCCS will continue to use its internal controls and annual outside audit to adapt its systems to changing needs, and our Board of Trustees will continue its own ongoing attention to these matters at its regular meetings.

SCEC is a private, nonprofit, federally recognized economic development organization which works to create jobs and wealth in Washington County. We provide staff support for the WCDA and are partnering with the Authority in its effort to redevelop the former U.S. Navy base in Cutler.

As indicated in the enclosed report, the WCDA did not make any significant procurements, contributions or changes to policies and procedures in the past year. In March 2015, the Authority was given the commercial side of the former base by Cutler North, LLC, a private developer that had failed in its redevelopment effort. The WCDA now owns roughly 20 acres and five commercial buildings comprising 75,000 square feet. The

Authority is working to bring these facilities back into productive use.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 7, 2018 AS NATIONAL GIRLS AND WOMEN IN SPORTS DAY

WHEREAS, the National Girls and Women in Sports Day Coalition celebrates National Girls and Women in Sports Day in Washington, D.C. and encourages its celebration in communities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, this day exists to recognize the past and current sports achievements of girls and women, the positive influence of sports participation and the continuing struggle for equality and access for girls and women in sports: and

WHEREAS, National Girls and Women in Sports Day began in 1987 as a day to remember Olympic volleyball player Flo Hyman for her athletic achievements and her commitment to ensure equality for women's sports; and

WHEREAS, the history of girls and women in sports is rich and long, yet there has been little national recognition of the significance of girls' and women's athletic achievements; and WHEREAS, at all levels of athletics, girls and women develop self-discipline, initiative, confidence and leadership skills regardless of background; and

WHEREAS, the bonds girls and women build through athletics help to break down the social barriers of racism and prejudice, and the communication and cooperation skills learned through sports play a key role in the athletes' contributions at home, at work and to society; and

WHEREAS, a need for increased opportunities exists for girls to participate in and pursue physical activity in the community and at the scholastic level so that they may, beginning at an early age, increase their health and well-being on a daily basis and develop lifelong fitness habits; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize February 7, 2018 as National Girls and Women in Sports Day.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Volk.

Senator VOLK: Thank you, Mr. President. I was honored to present this Joint Resolution today in the Senate honoring National Girls and Women in Sports Day. Tomorrow will actually mark the 32nd annual National Girls and Women in Sports Day and this is the first time that the Maine Legislature has taken action to recognize the day and our female athletes in Maine. National Girls and Women in Sports is a time to celebrate the extraordinary achievements in girls and women sports and the positive influence athletic participation brings to their lives. Now I was actually not an athlete until later in life, and I'm not sure I would call myself an athlete now. I do like to run on occasion with my dog, but that's about the extent of it. However, I have raised three athletes and one of whom is now playing softball at the University of Maine, as many of you know, and we're very much looking forward to that season starting up very soon, and as I've watched my girls participate in sports I've realized that I really missed out on something in childhood not being an active participant in sports myself, and what I've seen that they've gained is lifelong friends. They've made amazing connections playing on travel teams with kids they otherwise would never have known. In the case of my middle daughter, from all over New England actually and they have a confidence about them that I know I didn't develop until probably I was elected to office. So they're just very bold and very confident. They are particularly confident when it comes to competing, not just on the field or on the track or on the rink but I think in the boardroom as well, and so to me that's one of the things that girls gain from sports. Of course there's other ways that girls can gain those - that level of confidence, but I think sports is an especially accessible way and it also encourages them to become lifelong athletes. Fitness, as we know, is extremely important to good health and so I would hope that, you know, that commitment to being physically fit for their sport will also continue throughout their lifetime. So I'm happy that you're all joining me today in commemorating National Girls and Women in Sports Day.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Breen.

Senator BREEN: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I want to thank the good Senator from Cumberland, Senator Volk, for putting forward this Resolution today recognizing the many and various accomplishments of women and girls in sports. As the Resolution points out very eloquently, the benefits of participating in team sports and individual sports gives everyone great skills and habits that help in personal and professional endeavors for the rest of their lives. I want to elaborate a little bit about some of the history underlying this movement. As a high school and college varsity athlete myself, I have often called myself a Title 9 Kid. Title 9 is the landmark federal legislation that passed in 1972, when I was 7 years old and had lots of older brothers who were playing sports and I fully intended to join them on the field. It arose out of decades of struggle against discrimination, against women like me and so many women who came before me who simply wanted, quite literally, to level the playing field, the actual playing field. I point out Title 9 today because it provided a legal framework that defined equal access and equal rights for all athletes, no matter their gender. It furthermore enshrined in law recourse for those whose rights had been violated. All of these great gains that are so beautifully articulated in the Resolution started with years of unequal access and struggle, came to resolution with legislation, and has been implemented by a legal framework. For that, I and so many of my peers are eternally grateful. Thank you, Mr. President.
