DIRIGO, the Association of the state consumer and member owned utilities, formed the Maine Municipal and Rural Electrification Cooperative Agency (MMRECA) as a vehicle for promoting joint action among the state's seven consumer owned utilities. The officers of DIRIGO serve as the officers of

MMRECA. The members of DIRIGO participating in MMRECA activities fund all costs of those activities. MMRECA receives no State funding. DIRIGO sees an inherent value in maintaining MMRECA even though it has not been active in the past years. The electric utility "business" was historically stagnant, but with the ever continuing changes that have taken place and that are likely to occur in the future, DIRIGO believes it needs all of the mechanisms available to it to meet any new challenges and be able to provide the best possible service to our consumer owners and members.

In compliance with 5 M.R.S.A. §12023 MMRECA provides the following response. The MMRECA did not adopt policies regarding vendor selection, contributions, and travel, meals & entertainment. MMRECA commits that it will put in place such policies prior to engaging in associated activities. MMRECA has not retained a lobbyist. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Bellows.

Senator BELLOWS: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, my amendment is simple. It extends to the towns of Bar Harbor, Tremont, Southwest Harbor, Cranberry Isles, Mount Desert, Lamoine, Hancock, Sorrento, Gouldsboro, Trenton, Sullivan and Winter Harbor the right to vote on the creation of the Bar Harbor Port Authority, and under this amendment in order for the authority to be created it must be approved by the voters in the town of Bar Harbor and at least six of the eleven other towns. You might ask why. Let me tell you for a minute about Frenchman Bay where the Bar Harbor Port Authority would have its domain. Frenchman Bay is about fifteen miles long, about seven miles wide at its widest point. It's the bay of my childhood. I grew up in the town of Hancock. I could look over or sail over in a friend's boat, not our own, to Bar Harbor, to the location of this Port Authority, and Frenchman Bay has a long history of towns working collaboratively for economic and marine activity. One example is the Frenchman Bay Shellfish Joint Municipal Board, where the towns of Frenchman Bay jointly make decisions about closures and environmental operations to preserve the shellfish operations within the bay, and to promote and protect and sustain the harvest and opportunity for all those who make a living within the bay. So we have a long tradition in this region of making those decisions collaboratively and because of the geography of the bay, because of the proliferation of the islands within the bay, decisions made by one town bordering the bay affect decisions for every town. Additionally there is precedent with the Portland Harbor Commission, which has equal representatives from South Portland and Portland, so the decisions about what come into Portland's Harbor are made with stakeholders from the municipalities that border that bay, Casco Bay. So for this reason, I urge that we expand this authority to have more inclusive decision making about economic activity that takes place and affects all of the traditional industries from lobstering, to fishing, to shellfish, to tourism in the bay of my childhood, Frenchman Bay. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock, Senator Langley.

Senator **LANGLEY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, thank you for giving me this opportunity to rise and

speak in opposition to this amendment. The town of Lamoine recently was asked to weigh in on this. It was brought to their board. I talked to the Town Manager just this last week. The town voted to take no action on the Port Authority because it belonged in another municipality. This was in their jurisdiction. The town of Bar Harbor has the mortgage on this property. They are the ones that have gone to the bank, it's going to cost them \$3.5 million to buy this, and it's really up to the town to decide the best way to manage this property. Putting this out to a vote with other communities that have absolutely no skin in the game, have no responsibility to pay back the mortgage on this, and indeed weigh in on managing this with no skin in the game, I see is not a position I think that the other towns even want to be in because of the precedent that it would open up. So with that I would ask you to vote against this after I ask for a roll call, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Gratwick.

Senator **GRATWICK**: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Chamber, this amendment is still narrower and what it will do in essence is allow one of the five members of the Port Authority Board to be appointed by the Superintendent of Parks. The purpose of this is that the Port Authority is indeed a manifestation of local control and the park, the national park there, is most assuredly a member of that community of Bar Harbor. When you look at a map, the park basically surrounds the whole of Bar Harbor. Also they own the three islands right off shore there, and this would be sure that that

very integral, important part of this social and economic part of Bar Harbor is represented well on this board. As we all know local boards can sometimes go off one way or another, and this makes sure that the local board for a port authority is not killing a goose that laid the golden egg. That is that the Superintendent of the Park through that nominated member of the Port Authority Board will have an impact on the decisions that are made that are in the best interest of the whole area. I would strongly encourage you to follow my light. Thank you very much, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Hancock, Senator Langley.

Senator **LANGLEY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, thank you again for your indulgence as I rise to speak on this amendment. This amendment is really a classic example of why these decisions should be made locally. The Superintendent of Acadia National Park has no idea that this amendment was going to be in front of us and when I saw the park planner in the store Hannaford's on Saturday, they unequivocally said, "We want nothing to do with this amendment. It puts us in a legal bind, and we can't be meddling in local, municipal decisions and be on a board that has fiduciary responsibility for running an enterprise." While the intent may be good to do this, passage of this would create quite a bit of problems for the Superintendent of Acadia National Park. I would ask that we vote this down, and, Mr. President, I would ask for a roll call.

Senator **MAKER** of Washington was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator MAKER: Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I prepared something for the events that we have been facing. In the Gospel of Matthew, an alternative for an eye for an eye is given by Jesus. "You have heard that it was said an 'eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, do not resist the one who is evil. For if anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to the other side." We all need to remember this statement. Unfortunately, anger and hatred has become a part of the political scene and it is one of the reasons that caused me to decide not to run. Listening to others is very important. Representing your constituents should be top priority. After all, they elected you to represent them. As I have been reminded by a few, you should also be respectful. Is everyone going to agree with your stance? Probably not, and that is okay. Have people sometimes crossed the line in what they say? Yes, we all have. I was born and raised in Aroostook County, but lived a majority of my life in Washington County. We have turned our cheek many times down here. We have lost many to other counties and states, including our own children. We have lost many to the opioid crisis. We keep the faith and continue to move ahead and turn our cheek. What happened on Friday morning at 4:30 am was more than all of us could handle. I gave this analysis before, but when we criticize a member of our family we can handle it. But when someone from outside does, it causes us to be defensive. The staff, family and businesses are hurting, and we hurt for them. Will we overcome this? Yes we will, but it will take a long time. We as elected officials of the people have to fight for them, and we will and we should. For those who doesn't care about how this happened I

have no words. It still does not give us or others the right to cross the line. It is my belief that although we felt last year that we had time to work this out because the addition at Warren was going to take five years, and that some kind of pre-release center would be built and DCF would close. We didn't stay with that plan. We have employees that have worked there twenty-four, thirty, thirtytwo years. They have suffered greatly over the past two years. Again, that being true, we need to fight for them because like our children in our family, if we don't who will. I still don't agree with the Executive Order that was given to the men and women that participated in the early morning event on Friday, but I do not, nor should anyone else, blame them. They were doing what they were told. All our men and women in uniform need our support. In the end I will do my best to not cross the line and I hope you will join me out of respect for those we serve. I will continue to fight for all in Washington County and the part of Hancock County that I represent, and not lower myself to the level that is unbecoming to our citizens that we represent, if they agree or not with the decision that was made on Friday morning, and keep my eyes on the target and not a person. Pray for all of us and know we live in the most beautiful part of Maine, and no one can take that away from us. Thank you.

Off Record Remarks

Senator **LANGLEY** of Hancock was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator **LANGLEY**: Mr. President, men and women of the Senate, many of you may be aware or not aware of the loss of Susan Mitchell last week, who was a lobbyist for Maine Maritime Academy. She spent an awful lot of time in the Education Committee over the years representing Maine Maritime Academy at the highest level. She passed away, and I know there is probably other recognition coming along the way, but when we close today Mr. President, if we could do so in memoriam of Susan Mitchell that would be greatly appreciated.

Senator **CARSON** of Cumberland was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator **CARSON**: I rise ladies and gentlemen of the Senate to thank Senator Maker for her calm and compassionate and thoughtful comments, and to pledge my help and the support of all those whom I know in the Senate. We had a conversation about this issue in the caucus this morning. We want to move forward. We want to support the men and women of Washington County in creation of a modern, effective work release program, and at the same time we want to support the men and women who worked at the Downeast Correctional Facility and whose businesses have been harmed by the actions taken. I simply

want you to know that we are with you Senator Maker. Thank you, Mr. President.
