Senator **POULIOT**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, the opposition of this bill is really quite simple. We have a budget proposal that spends 99.95% of the revenues in one-time money that the State has projected to have. We simply do not have the \$25 million to fund this initiative. I ask that you follow my light. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Millett.

Senator MILLETT: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen, I respectfully disagree with my colleague. This bill is absolutely essential to get our schools back on track. Originally, in 1998 the goal of this fund was to supply \$200 million to meet state-wide needs for our infrastructure for schools and over that time only roughly \$100 million was appropriated. Most recently the most recent appropriation to this fund was a whopping \$1.5 million. This fund now stands depleted to the point where the Department is no longer accepting applications. The list of schools needing renovation and assistance is long and disturbing. Our schools are exhibiting serious structural issues and I'm afraid to say that there are even some that do not have basic fire safety infrastructure. I propose to you that we support this legislation, send it down to the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee, and allow them to make the decision as to whether or not there's room to support this very important fund for our schools. Thank you, Mr. President.

The Chair noted the absence of the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator **LIBBY**, and the Senator from York, Senator **LAWRENCE**, and further excused the same Senators from today's Roll Call votes.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Timberlake.

Senator **TIMBERLAKE**: Senate President and members of the Senate, I ask you to consider for a second there's a lot of bills that are coming before us this year that have to do with businesses. Businesses are paying their bills. This is for people that, if you're a business owner, you've issued them their vacation pay, and for some reason or another, that either you ran out of work or whatever, but you have given them their vacation pay. Now remember, business owners have to pay a penalty for anybody that goes on unemployment. What this bill does now is punishing a business. If you have three or four weeks of vacation at the

end, the business is going to pay you, you're not going to go for three weeks without being paid. You're going to get your paycheck and then after you've received your last paycheck you will now qualify for unemployment. So at no time is this taking away from the employee, but it's protecting some of the employers who are doing, in good faith, paying their vacation pay and now you're double charging them because now this is going to go on their record and it will raise the rates that they have to pay in unemployment insurance. So I hope you support me in voting against this bill and supporting the Ought Not to Pass Report, and I thank you very much.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Bellows.

Senator BELLOWS: Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of the pending motion and I ask you to imagine for a minute that you are laid-off from your place of employment outside of the Legislature and that perhaps you have banked your vacation time. You have worked through vacation during the summer hours, during the holidays, because of your extraordinary commitment to your employer and you have not used your vacation time. In meantime a colleague who works right next to you, perhaps at the same rate of pay and the same job, has exhausted their entire vacation time and has never saved that vacation time. You're both laid-off. Under current law you're colleague, who's exhausted all of their vacation time, would immediately start to collect unemployment benefits. The current law would punish you for having accrued and saved your earned vacation time. Your unemployment benefits would be delayed. That is simply unfair and we should not be punishing workers for saving their vacation time and working hard for their employer. This bill does not cause double-dipping because it is wages that the person has earned prior to being paid off. The fiscal note, as you will note, attached to this bill is marginal because the cost to the Unemployment Trust Fund for this bill is low. This is simply a matter of rectifying an existing unfairness in the law. Thank you and I urge you to vote Ought to Pass.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Herbig.

Senator HERBIG: Thank you, Mr. President. Women and men of the Senate, I agree with my good colleague, the Senator from Androscoggin. A lay-off is something that is both very difficult for an employer and an employee. Lay-offs cause such an incredible amount of instability to the person that they happen to and over the years in our state that's happened to a lot of really good women and men across our state. It causes instability for the most stable, responsible, hardworking employees and their families. Imagine not having a weekly paycheck or health insurance for your family that you've relied on for years perhaps. So imagine vou're loval to your employer and you don't take any vacations, right. Most Maine parents teach us that, don't they? My parents certainly did. Meanwhile your co-worker takes every vacation day available to him. Then you both get laid-off. Your co-worker gets to receive his unemployment check immediately. You, however, are told that the vacation time you've earned and rolled-over for years is being taken away from you in exchange for an unemployment check. This problem is far more common than you think. A constituent once told me he saved over 400 additional hours of vacation time to prepare for a potential lay-off,

should that happen to he and his family, to provide for a little bit more stability. This is directly from him, and I really want to share this story with you because I think it's important that we remember all of the women across the state that are impacted by these decisions we make in this Chamber. My constituent told me: 'Several years ago my employer, due to unstable levels of State and federal funding, gave me my two-week notice three times over a two year period. I would get no fancy severance package. Ultimately, my employment was continued but I remained cautious ever since that day. As a responsible person, I took a step at what I could do to protect my financial status for both me and my family. My employer allowed me to save my vacation time. I already had over 100 hours saved. Over the next several years I accumulated over 400 additional hours. I called this my own personal earned severance package for when I would inevitably get laid-off. Imagine to my surprise to learn that a law was changed in 2011 so now that if I get laid-off the rules have changed. Now I will not be able to collect unemployment until my earned vacation time is moved up. The money that would have been given to me now may very well be going to one of my co-workers who didn't save his vacation time while I was saving mine. He was vacationing while I was working.' It is not vacation time, it is earned time. It puts people who have been most loyal to their employers at a disadvantage in an already very difficult time. It kicks people while they are down. L.D. 75 is a smart fix to make sure Maine's workers earned pay is protected. What's fair is fair, Mr. President. Thank you.
