**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland. Senator Millett.

Senator MILLETT: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen, we are graced this morning by the presence of Betsy Parsons. There are those remarkable individuals whose love for others knows no boundaries and touches countless people day in and day out, no matter whether they're family, friend, or stranger; whose impact on lives ripples through generations and across the state. Betsy Parsons is such a remarkable individual. She's a Maine treasure and beloved by so many. She's retired after a distinguished career as an English teacher but, just as importantly, as a shining light of acceptance, love, and courage for her students, their families, and all of those in our communities. But for Betsy retirement is a name only. Every day she works to make our world better, more loving, more accepting, and she does this with such grace and humility. But if you've been blessed to be in her presence and speak with her, you can't help but feel that you've been touched by the wings of an angel. So it's with great privilege that I welcome her here this morning to the Chamber of the Maine Senate. Thank you, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Bellows.

Senator **BELLOWS**: Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of this Joint Order and to share that I first met Betsv in 2005. I had just moved back home to Maine and Maine was involved in Maine Won't Discriminate, our successful campaign to pass nondiscrimination for our gay and lesbian colleagues and neighbors and friends and family members. Betsy was a leader in that campaign and I came to know her and I came to hear of her story, and it's remarkable to think how far we've come, how far that arch of justice has bent forward, and Betsy has been a key force in that arch of justice. Founding GLSEN in 1996 was a bold and courageous and important act for LGBTQ students who were being bullied and harassed in schools and were afraid to be themselves. In 1998 Betsy came out in her school, another bold and courageous act, signaling to all of her students that they were not alone, that they were loved. After Maine Won't Discriminate passed in 2005. Betsy was part of a core group who began to work on marriage equality for all and I was Executive Director of the Maine Civil Liberties Union and had the good fortune of working directly with Betsy, whom we hired to do educational outreach. She spoke in churches. She spoke to community groups. She gathered signatures. One of Betsy's remarkable qualities is that quality of being able to connect with anyone. She was collecting signatures in a town not her own and she approached a WWII veteran, asking him to sign the petition. She had a lovely conversation with him that culminated in him saying. 'What do you think our boys died for on Omaha Beach? I will sign.' Then she convinced him to come to the Civic Center and share his story with the rest of Maine. Her powers of persuasion, her powers of conversation, are remarkable. Of course, we know the end of that story. Marriage equality was defeated but then passed and Maine was the first state in the country to pass it in the Legislature and have it signed by the Governor and then one

of the first states in the country to pass it on the ballot. In 2014, my current organization, the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of Maine, gave our first Gerda Haas Award for Excellence and Human Rights Education and Leadership to Betsy Parsons for her lifelong leadership on human rights and in education for young people in our schools and then we recruited her to our Board of Directors, and I'm here to tell you as a Board Member Betsy is mentor, colleague, hero. She truly embodies a life well lived in the service of others, a livelong educator, and, for me, I will be deeply grateful forever for the influence she has had in forming who I am as a human rights leader in our state. Thank you.

Senator DILL: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I rise to recognize the University of Maine Black Bears Women's Basketball Team who are here today because for the second year in a row they won the America East title and advanced to the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Unlike last year, the team were frontrunners from the get go and, as the Bangor Daily put it, they, 'Thrived on high expectations.' In addition to beating Hartford 68-48 to claim the America East title, the Black Bears went 25-7 and had a stretch of 14 wins in a row. They were known for their offensive teamwork, averaging more than four players scoring nine plus point a game in the America East Tournament. Tanesha Sutton, who is here today, was a powerhouse who averaged 19 points, 9.3 rebounds, and 7 assists in the tournament. Junior Guard Blanca Millan was named the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player for the second straight year after scoring 54 points in the tournament, including 19 in the title game against Hartford. Mr. President, Parise Rossignol of Van Buren is here today. Parise put up back-to-back three pointers at the start of the championship game to kick the Black

Bears off with a 10-0 lead. Finally, of course, Coach Amy Vachon did yeoman's work, making sure this team was prepared for the season's high expectations and challenges, and pushed them through the setback of the season. One other thing that I would add was that for the past six semesters these young ladies have averaged a 3.2 grade point average and this semester it's 3.4. So not only are they good on the court but they're good in the classroom. Ladies and gentlemen, I am delighted that these outstanding athletes could join us today. I hope you'll join me in welcoming them. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Moore.

Senator MOORE: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I rise in opposition to the pending motion. L.D. 981 would require the Department of Health and Human Services to submit a request for a Section 1115 waiver, similar to the waiver that was approved in 2018 and withdrawn in January 2019. The waiver actually would require certain adult beneficiaries, 19 to 64 years of age, to participate in 20 hours per week of community engagement activities such as employment, education, job skills training, job search activities, and community service. Adult beneficiaries would also be required to pay monthly premiums based on their income. Excuse me, let me back up a second. As far as the work requirement, adult beneficiaries exempt from this subsection are women who are pregnant or 60 days postpartum; individuals receiving temporary or permanent disability benefits; individuals who are physically or mentally unable to participate in community education or work requirements for 20 hours a week as determined by a medical provider; individuals who reside in a residential facility where the individual is participating in a residential substance use disorder treatment and rehabilitation program: designated caretakers of a child under 6 years of age: caregivers who are responsible for the care of an incapacitated individual; and individuals who have a disability as defined by federal disabilities rights laws. It would also require monthly premiums to be paid by MaineCare members earning above 50% but not more than 100% of the federal poverty level. The premium would be \$10 per month. For MaineCare members earning above 100% but not more than 150% of the federal poverty level the premium would be \$20 per month. For MaineCare members earning above 150% but not more than 200% of the federal poverty level the premium would be \$30 per month. Finally, for MaineCare members earning above 200% of the federal poverty level the premium would be \$40 per month. Mr. President, let me quote the bill sponsor's testimony. 'Having a job, getting an education, volunteering for a merit of good reasons are great ways to stay busy and keep an active mind. There's also a certain feeling of pride that goes with keeping yourself successfully busy and contributing to society. Sitting down at the end of the day and knowing that you have accomplished something, been productive, and contributed is always a good feeling.' Many states are in the process of implementing these waivers or have pending applications. I encourage everyone to oppose this motion so that Maine can join those states. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Gratwick.

Senator **GRATWICK**: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I rise in support of the current motion. It was discussed in detail in our Committee. This is, to my way of thinking, this bill, if it would pass, would be a step backwards in caring for those least fortunate, those people who have very low incomes. Remember, 100% of poverty, roughly \$12,000. Asking those people to come up with more money is very difficult indeed. These initiatives have been struck down in

two states, Arkansas and Kentucky. The court battle in ongoing in New Hampshire at this time. I think it would be a step backwards in caring for this very vulnerable group of people. We need to be working on more healthcare, more healthcare for our citizens here in Maine, making it more easily accessible and not making it harder. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator CYRWAY: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I stand before you as a member of the Senate to ask, as a retired patrol officer, you to help your fellow men and women in uniform, to keep them out of harm's way. Due to the drug crisis and the gang activity, we've seen a growing problem with targeting law enforcement and corrections officers. So what this bill does is just holds the actions accountable for someone that plans to do harm and by raising the class of one level for aggravated assault. This would help protect our men and women in uniform from getting into a serious harmful situation and from having a permanent injury. There again, this is planned not reactionary and would have to be proven as so. So it would be a rare situation but once in a while it does happen. It's sad when I have heard that police officers have chosen this profession so they are just doing their job. It's not so when it's planned. I've seen where, and I'm sure you've seen it on television, where officers have been shot right in their cruiser, just sitting there. We had, not too long ago, a corrections officer in State prison here in Maine that got stabbed. I, myself, have experienced a few situations where someone trapped me in by bringing their truck behind me and surrounding me with 25 guys at my cruiser. I could have got seriously injured. We have to go home as law enforcement officers and we want to see our families again. This is just taking a moment and think seriously of what we're doing and can we help these men and women that are trying to keep us safe, to help them a little bit. So, if you could, I just appreciate you'd follow my light and help them. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Deschambault.

Senator DESCHAMBAULT: Thank you, Mr. President. Before I get into that, I also am a retired correctional staff member of 43 years and have served 12 years as a police commissioner. This bill, as written and as amended, has a lot of problems. The first thing I'd like to bring to your attention is CLAC report. For some of you, and probably the listening audience, who doesn't know what CLAC it's the Criminal Law Advisory Commission made up of judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys. They point out that we don't need this, that we already have crimes set forth in our statute and that this one mirrors exactly what that is. We have assault, aggravated assault, elevated aggravated assault, and so on. They do not favor enacting specific statutes that prohibit conduct already criminalized in our statutes. Also, passage of the amendment would diminish the ability of the court to factor in aggravated circumstances in the sentencing. The worst part of this bill is the mandatory minimum sentence of 4 years, not leaving much room. It cannot be suspended. The other part of this is the prosecuting attorneys have to prove that the officer or the staff member was targeted and. I'm trying to think of the other word, that it was planned and targeted because of their position. Let me tell you, it did say that there was no fiscal note, that it would be minimal. I'd like to bring to your attention, if we're going to increase the criminality and the sentencing, especially mandatory, I'll give you some facts. From the years 2016 - 2018, three years of tabulations, in the law enforcement community 216 officers were assaulted. There were 216 people charged, 73 were convicted in that three year period. In the correctional officer's field, 178 people were charged and 95 were

convicted, for 168 people's convictions in the last three years. Yes, it's a tough job but not necessarily a Class A, Class B mandatory. I want to remind everybody, we're having trouble with overcrowding and paying our bills. It's \$45,000 a year to incarcerate someone and, in my tabulation, those 168 people would have cost the State of Maine over \$8 million to incarcerate because of the mere fact their victim was an officer or a correctional officer. I trust the court system to take that into consideration. I have been in there. I have seen assaults. I have been part of the evaluation. Some of them are handled in the correctional field, in house, or, if it rises to the occasion where the Department of Corrections charges them, that is done also. Thank you very much. Please follow my light.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Carson.

Senator CARSON: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I rise to urge you to support the Maiority Report on L.D. 640, a bill that directs the Maine DEP to commission an independent study on whether CMP's proposed electric transmission corridor, known as the NECEC, would actually provide benefit to the climate by reducing overall greenhouse gas emissions. As we all know, CMP and its parent company, AVANGRID, are working with Hydro-Quebec on a project to deliver hydropower from Quebec to Massachusetts. The full transmission line would be 145 miles long, of which 53 miles would be a brand new corridor and a permanent swath through forestland in Western Maine. The impacts of this project would be substantial. As stated in a letter from the U.S. EPA to the Army Corps of Engineers last week, and I quote, 'As proposed, the project would cause direct and secondary impacts for many wetlands, streams, and vernal pools. The transmission line would clear 1,800 acres of land and cross more than 200 rivers, streams, and brooks, removing over 11 linear miles of riparian vegetation adjacent to these aquatic resources. The project would impact hundreds of acres of wetlands, including 242 vernal pools, mostly through secondary impacts.' As my colleagues know, this project has stirred up strong opposition from citizens in communities statewide, but especially in Somerset and Franklin Counties, nearest to the project. Many

believe that the project must be questioned. They are concerned about the impacts on the ground and many want to know if the claims about the project being good for the climate are real because that can help them and us all, as policy makers, balance the overall costs and benefits to Maine.

During the hearings on this bill before the Environment and Natural Resources Committee, we received extensive testimony on why the study called for by this bill is critical and we amended the bill to address concerns that were raised. Let me address four key points, please. First, no State funding will be required because the study, as called for, can only be done with funding raised from outside sources. So there is no fiscal note. Second, there is no way that the bill can delay the permitting process. The DEP says that it will not issue a permit decision on this project until late October or November and the study called for by the bill must be done and delivered by August 15<sup>th</sup>. L.D. 640 also states that DEP would not be allowed to issue a permit until 45 days after the report is delivered, which would be September 29 or 30, still well before the DEP permit decision. If the August 15 deadline is missed then the 45 delay no longer applies and DEP can issue a permit at any time. Third, the study will be independent and unbiased with no preconceived outcome. It will be a transparent process, allowing stakeholders and the public to provide comments on the scope of work, key modeling assumptions, and the final document before issue. The results must, and will, speak for themselves. Fourth, and most importantly, no study like this has been done. Study of greenhouse gas emissions on the entire system connected to Hydro-Quebec has not been done. The consulting firm called London Economics did a study for the Maine PUC mostly on economic issues of the proposed project. Less than two pages of an 85 page report focused on possible greenhouse gas emission reductions, but they explicitly stated that these reductions had only been achieved by looking at New England, not by the broader area. We need to understand the full picture, not just the limited view of New England. As policy makers, we owe it to our constituents, the people of Maine, to provide this level of due diligence because we are being ask by Massachusetts and the developers of this project to accept a lot of impact on Maine in areas that are special to Maine people. At no cost to the public and with no change of delaying the project, this bill will help generate critical information on the central issue of climate impacts. I urge you to vote in support of this bill. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Libby.

Senator **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I agree with my colleague and friend from Cumberland, Senator Carson, that we need to get to the truth. We need to understand the real impacts of this project on greenhouse gas emissions. I think there are some issues with how the study is drafted and how it will be conducted. I'm afraid that the process that's to be undertaken here is far outside of the norm for how we procure studies like this. I'd remind members of the last time we did a sole-source contract for a study. It was the Alexander Report under the previous Administration. It cost the State about \$1 million. It was undertaken by someone who had been found to commit fraud and, ultimately, some of that money had to be returned and a penalty assessed. I'm not saying it's going to happen here. I'm simply calling attention to the fact that procurement is important.

Our process is important and under the bill, as proposed, the DEP would be hiring, in a sole-source contract, a project manager to do the study. That project manager would then be free to hire subcontractors to do the modeling and analysis. I think that's concerning, that the agency that we're tasking with managing this process has no oversight or control over that process. The assumptions in that modeling, the requirements of the scope of work, that's important. I very much want to get to the bottom of this question of whether or not the project will reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the Northeast. I want the report results to be valid. I want us to be able to trust them. I'm simply concerned that what we're asking DEP to do is not practical. DEP doesn't have policy experience in evaluating fuel costs, in evaluating load growth, in evaluating electricity markets, in evaluating electricity transmission constraints, in evaluating new and future electric generation facilities and technology development. I think that DEP, in partnership with the PUC, might be able to answer some of those questions more succinctly. So those are my concerns about procurement.

I also have a very, I think, valid concern that relates to my district. I've been very open about this fact, that if this project is approved, and it is built, my community is very unique in the state, being able to collect some significant property tax revenue from the project. Very significant, \$3 to \$5 million over the period of the project, every year, for my district, for my municipality, and for my school district, where three of the poorest census tracks in the state are located in the downtown. Like all of us, we've campaigned throughout our districts. We've walked our districts. We know the people that we're representing. I've walked the downtown districts. I've walked up the five flights of stairs to apartment buildings to meet with people who are struggling. We've got high poverty rates. We've got high jobless rates. We've got high rates of ESL. High rates of opiate addiction. We've got major struggles. High rates of food insecurity as well. Three to five million dollars a year is a big deal for a place like Lewiston.

A lot is riding on this study. The study has to be done right. I don't want us to get to a place in the fall where we question some of the assumptions that were baked into the model; that we question where the money came from, whether that produced some undue influence or conflict of interest. I'm concerned that DEP is being asked to manage this project when they don't work in this field of energy and utility law. I think there are legitimate questions around the project. I also know that there's a lot of inertia against the project, a lot of political inertia, public opinion is very low. The project is not popular. It's very complicated and it's being pushed by a company that is not popular either. I think there was some polling done that suggests CMP is less popular than Congress. That's really bad. Clearly, they've had a lot of mismanagement in the last several years. Some would argue negligence in how they've handled billing. I'm not standing here as a defender of the company but I am suggesting that this is a major project that has the potential to really, significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the state. We have to make sure the study is done right. I have concerns that it will be done right and so I appreciate members of the Senate considering these remarks. I'm just going to conclude by saying that I considered offering a floor amendment. It's on your desks. I do not plan to be offering the floor amendment today, or ever, just to be clear. Just to be clear, I'm not going to be offering the floor amendment. Thank you, Mr. President.
