Named Gulf of Maine Visionary in 2007, she was credited as the first scientist to reveal widespread contamination of fish and marine mammals in the northwest Atlantic from flame retardant chemicals leaching from

furniture. An outspoken voice on ocean pollution, she was the first scientist to dive into the Gulf of Mexico in 2010 to assess the BP oil spill, influencing the national debate on the dangers of dispersant chemicals. In 2012, she launched the first studies of microplastics in the Gulf of Maine, which led to state and national bans of microbeads.
