The SPEAKER: Announcement from the Chair. It is really nice to be back at the State House. It's been a long year, a long year-plus, and being back in this building and seeing all of you in this chamber for the first time in this 130th Legislature is a real true honor. The feeling of being in this building, you just can't put into words and being here with all of you and having this opportunity to conclude our First Special Session with the work that we have ahead of us in this building is really quite exciting.

With that being said, the House will be in order. The Chair would advise that we will follow all of the Rules of the House and we will follow the policy that was adopted by Legislative Council regarding the COVID-19 prevention policy including the wearing of face coverings and/or face shields.

The Chair would advise the Member from Paris, Representative Andrews that the Member is not in compliance with the COVID-19 prevention policy. The Chair would ask the Member to comply with the policy.

The Chair recognizes the Representative from Paris, Representative Andrews.

Representative **ANDREWS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and welcome back, it is good to be here. It's been a long 14 months and I'm following the CDC guidance and I am in compliance with that. I will be civilly disobeying today. That's what my constituents would like me to do, so, I fully accept whatever consequences may arise from that, and thank you.

The following Joint Resolution: (S.P. 556)

JOINT RESOLUTION URGING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO REPEAL AND REPLACE OUTDATED AUTHORIZATIONS OF MILITARY FORCE

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Special Session, most respectfully present and petition the Congress of the United States, as follows:

WHEREAS, nearly 2 decades after the attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, United States troops continue to wage war in Iraq, Afghanistan and other parts of the world; and

WHEREAS, our service members accomplished their original objectives in Afghanistan long ago, at great psychological, physical and spiritual cost; and

WHEREAS, the war on terrorism, the "forever war" or "endless war" as many call it, has been used as the basis for an ever-expanding range of military actions; and

WHEREAS, James Madison wrote to Thomas Jefferson in 1798, "The constitution supposes, what the History of all Governments demonstrates that the Executive is the branch of power most interested in war. It has accordingly with studied care, vested the question of war in the Legislature"; and

WHEREAS, Congress has mostly abdicated its Article I responsibilities to authorize and oversee military actions by extensive, potentially permanent delegations of congressional war powers; and

WHEREAS, the Authorization for Use of Military Force passed after the September 11 attacks has now been in effect for more than twice as long as the 1964-1971 Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, which gave President Lyndon B. Johnson authorization, without a formal declaration of war by Congress, for the use of conventional military force in Southeast Asia; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Defense's 2018 National Defense Strategy outlines a scenario where great power competition, rather than counterterrorism, drives the department's decision making and use of force; and

WHEREAS, a growing number of foreign policy officials have begun to advocate for a drawdown in the Middle East and Central Asia because of the opportunity costs to America's mission of balancing its strength against the so-called revisionist powers of China and Russia; and

WHEREAS, the emphasis on bolstering a deterrent posture in Asia and Europe should have an attendant impact that reduces the United States military's activities in the Middle East. Africa and the Western Hemisphere; and

WHEREAS, from global pandemics to the support of weak and fragile states, the United States faces an unprecedented number of complex global threats that cannot be solved by military power alone; and

WHEREAS, a disproportionate amount of resources is going to military and intelligence solutions along with a more general sidelining of diplomacy amid a continuing militarization of foreign policy; and

WHEREAS, addressing the root causes of violent conflicts overseas through development and diplomacy helps protect Americans and helps reduce the need to send our service members into harm's way; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the Congress of the United States work to renew a proper constitutional balance in American foreign policy decision making by repealing and replacing outdated authorizations for the use of military force; and be it further

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, advocate for the importance of a civilian-led approach to elevating development and diplomacy along with a strong defense in order to build a better, safer world; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable Joseph R. Biden, Jr., President of the United States; the President of the United States Senate; the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States; and each Member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

JOINT RESOLUTION TO REAFFIRM THE FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN MAINE AND TAIWAN AND SUPPORT BILATERAL TRADE RELATIONS AND TAIWAN'S INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPATION

WHEREAS, the United States and the Republic of China (Taiwan) share a vibrant bilateral relationship marked by a mutually beneficial partnership, supported by our common values of freedom, democracy, rule of law and a free market economy, and our countries now enjoy the strongest relations ever; and

WHEREAS, President Tsai Ing-wen has worked tirelessly to ensure the prosperity of Taiwan's 23.5 million people and promote international standing and has expressed commitment to peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific region; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of State, Department of Commerce and Department of Agriculture clarified United States policy regarding Taiwan in a formal letter sent to governors of all 50 states dated November 21, 2019 stating that "expanding relations with Taiwan in areas such as trade, education, investment, and tourism is fully compatible with and supports U.S. policy and can be beneficial to your state or municipality"; and

WHEREAS, President Tsai has expressed Taiwan's desire to reach a bilateral trade agreement with the United States, and the 116th United States Congress's Public Law 116-135, "Taiwan Allies International Protection and Enhancement Initiative (TAIPEI) Act of 2019," affirms that the United States should engage in strengthening bilateral trade and economic relations with Taiwan; and

WHEREAS, New England exported more than \$1 billion in goods to Taiwan in 2020, of which Maine exported \$52 million in goods, mostly in computer and electronic products, fish and other marine products, machinery and chemicals, making Taiwan Maine's 12th largest export market in the world and the 7th largest export market in Asia in 2019, and Taiwan and the United States seek to increase trade and investment through a bilateral trade agreement, resulting in even greater Maine exports to Taiwan, educational and cultural exchange, scientific and technological interests and tourism; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is a key transport hub in the Asia-Pacific region, making its inclusion in international organizations such as the World Health Organization, the International Criminal Police Organization and the International Civil Aviation Organization imperative for the best interests and safety of the international community. In addition, Taiwan's inclusion in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change is important to the global effort to combat climate change; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirtieth Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, reaffirm the friendship between Maine and the Republic of China (Taiwan), and we continue to support efforts to further strengthen United States-Taiwan and Maine-Taiwan trade and investment relations and support Taiwan's participation in international organizations and agreements, including the World Health Organization, the International Criminal Police Organization, the International Civil Aviation Organization and the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, and encourage the further exploration of ways to strengthen and promote bilateral exchange between Maine and Taiwan, including the possibility of signing a driver's license reciprocity agreement with Taiwan, which would lead to a further increase in trade and people-to-people exchanges; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable Joseph R. Biden, President of the United States, the members of the Maine Congressional Delegation, the Honorable Janet Mills, Governor of Maine, the Honorable Tsai Ing-wen, President of the Republic of China (Taiwan) and Jonathan Sun, Director-General of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Boston. Representative **DILLINGHAM**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to the Ought Not to Pass motion.

The proposal before you is not about our current Chief Executive or the current legislative Body. It is about the balance that I stridently believe needs to exist between the Executive and the Legislative branches and is based upon the experiences over the past year.

It is also not specifically about what this Executive has done or not done, but whether it was done in collaboration with members of a legislature. The changes to the emergency powers in this bill does not allow for any members of the legislative Body to be obstructionists, but rather to allow the citizens' representatives to be participants in decisions that impact their lives.

I sincerely and adamantly believe that individuals that choose to run for office do so to try and better the lives of the individuals they represent in all of Maine through legislative action. I believe it is with that desire, that they would put aside any partisan differences and act quickly to ensure the health and safety of Mainers, just as the members of the 129th Legislature did in March of 2020.

This Statute, 37B, should not be used to allow one branch singular decision-making for an indefinite period of time, especially to the exclusion of this law-making Body. Just as I see the value in the multifaceted experience of the members of our citizen legislature when it comes to the vast areas that we legislate, I see that same value and believe it can be applied when dealing with the breadth of areas impacted over this past year by the pandemic. We should be all-hands-on-deck and all voices contributing in service to the Maine people during times of uncertainty, struggle, and pain, as well as recovery. Let us vote now to ensure during the next emergency this Legislature and following Legislatures would have the ability to have a voice. Thank you.

Representative **TUELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would echo many of the things the Representative from Oxford said. As one who has served through multiple administrations, I think this bill reaches across and addresses longstanding issues that we as a Legislature, as a Body, need to come to

grips with. And the pandemic has brought those to light in a way that people had never really thought of before. So, I would encourage as we move forward, I would encourage that we reject the pending motion and move on to another so, that we can going forward pick up the pieces and learn from what has happened over the past year. Things are evolving, I know we hear all the time, we're still learning as we go, but we are also on the backside of the pandemic and it's time that we take a bill like this and advance it so that the next time we have a state of emergency, we'll be in a better position to respond to it sooner, quicker, in a more egalitarian, if you will, way. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative **BRADSTREET**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to the pending motion. LD 1019 requires that an order issued with the Chief Executive, by the Chief Executive, following a declaration of emergency to expire in 30 days following the issuance of the order. Termination of the state of emergency by the Chief Executive or the Legislature or declaration of a different state of emergency for the Chief Executive, whichever occurs first.

The amendment retains the language in current law that termination of residential electricity and water services may be suspended for up to 60 days after a state of emergency is terminated. The bill simply requires that the Legislature be

involved in continuation of states of emergency, which is its reasonable duty. By doing this, it will create transparency for the public, invite any public discussions that will take place.

Mr. Speaker, we see many instances, in my opinion, in this Body, where the Legislature imposes its will on matters where it really shouldn't but then ignores matters where it really needs to be involved, and this is one of those times. This bill is consistent with requiring that the Legislature do its duty, so, I urge that the people vote no on the pending motion. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

So, I just really want everyone to notice that this one does have a little bit of a different flavor and it just says that our businesses are essential; all of them. Thank you.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and esteemed colleagues. I read the words of a Maine resident sent to me that illustrate the need for the Legislature to have oversight over the emergency powers of our Chief Executive, no matter who the Chief Executive is.

"The decisions of our state government this past year have made my family realize that we don't belong in Maine anymore. We are lifelong multi-generation Mainers who have strong ties to our local community. We have two high school students who have been forced to sacrifice so many potential memories, experiences and friendships during these important formative years. Their education and future potential has been affected by a forced virtual and hybrid learning model that was unnecessary. Constant changing standards and expectations have shaken their self-confidence and my former A students are struggling. Not to mention the social isolation and depression they are constantly battling. Our Chief Executive has kept us in a state of emergency to receive federal dollars, leaving our State --"

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Berwick, Representative Roberts.

Representative **ROBERTS**: Point of Order. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask that the Chief Executive be referred to as the Chief Executive.

On **POINT OF ORDER**, Representative ROBERTS of South Berwick asked the Chair to remind Representative LIBBY of Auburn to refer to the Chief Executive as the Chief Executive.

The SPEAKER: The Chair reminded all Members to refer to the Chief Executive as the Chief Executive. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I will edit the writing.

"Our Chief Executive has kept us in an unnecessary state of emergency in order to receive federal dollars, leaving our State in a financial crisis. Where does that leave my kids' generation? Left to clean up the mess. We are leaving Maine

for freer pastures and many of our friends and family are doing the same. Maine is losing good people and we won't be the last to go." I read that to illustrate that we should not have one person speaking for our entire State and that our Legislature should be overseeing, we should be re-voting on a state of emergency, whether it's every two weeks, every month or whatever the Legislature should decide.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Connor.

Representative **CONNOR**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Central to this legislation is the separation of powers between the Legislative Branch and the Executive Branch that's set up in our Constitution.

Mr. Speaker, I'll be the first to agree that in an imminent emergency, our Chief Executive, no matter which party, needs enhanced authority to act to protect Maine citizens temporarily. Temporarily, Mr. Speaker; not indefinitely, not as long as the one individual prefers to keep the enhanced authority, but temporarily.

Mr. Speaker, emergency grants of enhanced authority should not be as limitless in time and scope as it currently exists in law and it shouldn't be up to the Chief Executive to decide when she or he chooses to give them back. Our government thrives because we have democratically-elected bodies with checks and balances; not a sovereign who can change the laws or spend billions of dollars based on their own whims and wishes.

Mr. Speaker, Maine is not alone in grappling with this question. Other states, whether controlled by all one party or mixed control, have taken steps to ensure a more equitable balance of power between the Legislative Branch, in my opinion the most important branch, and the most represented branch, the Executive Branch.

Mr. Speaker, I'll be voting today to stand up for the Legislative Branch and our constitutional authority. I believe it's irresponsible and shortsighted for us to allow a single individual to exercise virtually unlimited power for an indefinite amount of time.

Representative MATLACK of St. George moved that the House **ACCEPT** the Minority **Ought to Pass as Amended** Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from East Machias, Representative Tuell.

Representative **TUELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The motion before us brings up some very problematic issues. Many communities around the State count their ballots, the federal and state and local election all together. By passing this legislation, we would be creating confusion in municipalities or setting up a scenario whereby they could. Beyond that, I've heard from many folks who have grave

concern about letting children, people under the age of 18, children vote in municipal affairs. That would be a very dangerous, very risky path to be going down. With that, I would request that you follow my light and actually, I guess I want to ring that loop one more time and request a Roll Call.

Representative TUELL of East Machias **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Minority **Ought to Pass as Amended** Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Portland, Representative Morales.

Representative **MORALES**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Friends and Colleagues in the House, I rise to talk to you today about why I sponsored LD 1051, "An Act To Promote Civic Engagement and Voter Participation for Young People".

Young people make up 20% of Maine's population and they are undoubtedly 100% of our future, yet they have very little opportunity to have their voices heard in our communities. This bill allows municipalities the ability, if they choose, to allow 16- and 17-year-olds to vote at the local level for school board and Town Council, where democracy has the most potential to impact everyday lives.

Just think about the most important stakeholders for every school board member. Undoubtedly, they are our students. We invest in their education, making sure they have the most opportunity to learn and grow so they can achieve their personal and professional dreams. By allowing students 16 and over to vote, the age at which one can work and drive, we are providing young people with the opportunity to use their voices to guide the policies that will directly serve them and prepare them for success in the future.

Think also about who spends the most time in our communities, playing in our parks, walking on our sidewalks, riding bikes through our neighborhoods, participating in sports and other community activities, and volunteering to help their neighbors. These are our students and their opinions on all things local, like policies that impact our climate, our built environment, our local transportation system, our businesses, our afterschool activities and employment opportunities, homelessness, equity, racial justice, and public health are all very important. These are the issues young people are thinking deeply about and it would serve our communities to allow their voices to be heard.

Additionally, we all know that purely local elections have poor voter turnout compared to elections for the President. We can change that by creating a local voting habit, which we all know is needed for folks to make voting a priority. When someone understands the importance of voting early on and they know that their voice matters, they are more likely to continue to vote and continue to participate in their local democracy. Giving municipalities the ability to allow young people 16 and older to vote in local elections will help students learn the importance of local governance and how each individual can make important changes in their communities. Please join me in supporting the Minority Report and our young people here in Maine. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Presque Isle, Representative Underwood.

Representative **UNDERWOOD**: Good afternoon. One question for this Body, just one question. Why isn't it 10 years old? Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Knox, Representative Kinney.

Representative **KINNEY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We had a similar bill in my committee which I think we'll be taking up shortly, but my children's response, ages 17 and 14 at the time, to the idea of 16-year-olds being able to vote was at that age, they do not have an independent thought. This was my child's response to that

I found it interesting because I have two very independent children. This Body votes to not allow anyone under 17 to go to a tanning booth, 18-year-olds can no longer buy cigarettes in the State because we changed that law a couple sessions ago, they must now be 21. We regulate what these children can do and even once they become adults, we regulate what they can do. The idea of having children voting for; it boggles my mind, and I urge you to please follow my light and oppose the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Milford, Representative Drinkwater.

Representative **DRINKWATER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's hard to see the light come on and, apparently, I'm not used to this building.

Mr. Speaker, a question through the Speaker, if I may? The SPEAKER: The Member may proceed.

Representative **DRINKWATER**: How many other states have this similar law where 16-year-olds can vote?

The SPEAKER: The Member has posed a question through the Chair to any Member who may wish to answer. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Milford, Representative Drinkwater.

Representative **DRINKWATER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, let's follow the science.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Hutchins.

Representative **HUTCHINS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. To answer my good friend's question about how many states allow 16-year-olds to vote, I don't know but it would be too many if there's one.

I have a good friend that passed away a while ago but one of the things that she always used to say about her children, my children, everybody's children, that they're almost always all braindead till their late-20s. And I knew what she meant, she wasn't being unkind, she was just thinking that, you know, the things that interest young people are much different than what interests people that are serious members of the society because they are still young and that's a good thing. But 16 year olds shouldn't have the right to vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Libby.

Representative **LIBBY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We had a bill come before the Judiciary Committee this session and it had to do with 16 and 17 year olds being permitted to marry and that bill will come before this Body at some point during the rest of this session. That bill was voted ought to pass to ban marriage of --

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. The Chair would advise Members that the discussion before the House is the pending question, so, the Member may proceed but try to make the point relevant to the pending question.

The Chair reminded Representative LIBBY of Auburn to stay as close as possible to the pending question.

Representative **LIBBY**: Certainly. The majority thought that 16- and 17 year olds lacked maturity to make life-long decisions that would affect them greatly and I would argue that voting should be taken with just as strong of a measure of gravity as our votes do actually change lives. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dixfield, Representative Pickett.

Representative **PICKETT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I pose a question to the Speaker, please?

The SPEAKER: The Member may proceed.

Representative **PICKETT**: Would you please have the Clerk read the committee report?

The Clerk read the Committee Report in its entirety.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Woolwich, Representative Hepler.

Representative **HEPLER**: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I was initially an opponent of this bill but as I've learned about it, I like it for two reasons. One is as a municipal officer I like the fact that it can be an opt-in for towns. The other thing is I'm a teacher and every chance I get, I try to encourage students to pay attention to local issues because they in many ways matter more than some of the national issues. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rumford, Representative Dolloff.

Representative **DOLLOFF**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm just going to give my commonsense here. I raised two girls, I was 16 once, my girls are older, thank God they're past that age. I'm not saying there isn't a group of 16 year olds that are interested in politics, but I think in this scenario, and I know a town can opt in or opt out, and I don't like kind of that see-sawy deal in anything, but I do not feel the majority of 16 year olds cares what's going on in their town or in their local government, unless it affects them. Like I said, small group, there are some 16 year olds that that's where they want to steer in that direction, but the majority; I won't say what they would like to do. So, thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Knox, Representative Kinney.

Representative **KINNEY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to answer the previous question. I was just looking up on the NCSO website. Nineteen states allow 17 year olds to vote in primaries if they will be 18 by the general election and there are quite a few states that allow preregistration of either 16 or 17 year olds but they must be 18 to vote in the general election.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Oxford, Representative Dillingham.

Representative **DILLINGHAM**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A couple things and then I have a couple questions I'd like to pose through the Chair.

So, granted that 17-year-olds can vote in a general election, but we're not talking about a municipal election, this one speaks specifically to municipal elections and I guess I would want to ask are 16-year-olds allowed to be elected to the school board, which is dealt with at the municipal level, especially when you're talking about a budget? Are 16-year-olds allowed to serve on the budget committee? Are they allowed to serve on the Appeals Board? On the Planning Board? Or any other board that is at the municipal level?

So, I would agree, I'm probably a little different than some of my members here. I want younger participation. Having just been present at a meeting of candidates for our select

board, the youngest member there was 24 years old and by far the next one, by far the youngest, the next one there was probably close to myself, maybe in their 40s. I'd love to see younger participation but I think allowing them to vote in a municipal election, if they're not actually going to be able to participate in the levels at the municipal level of government, is not the right way to go. We have different avenues that can allow for participation, I know on many school boards that a member from the local school can sit as a person on the board, a nonvoting member of the board, or to represent the students' voice.

I don't think that this is the right way to go to provide participation unless we're going to make sure that there's a fuller participation and understanding of what they're voting on and what their votes will impact, especially when we're often here negotiating and talking about pieces of legislation that impact property taxes, nothing is more true than when you are working at the municipal level. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Oakland, Representative Perkins.

Representative **PERKINS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Last year at this time we were asking ourselves if we should allow young people to buy cigarettes at the age of 18. If we look around, our age is up to 21. Why? Because their brains don't fully develop until the age of 25. We've heard it, we've seen it again and again. Just something for all of us to think about. Also, if a young person comes in to drive and get their driver's license, they have to be at least 18 years of age to sign for themselves, not 16, but mom and dad have to come in and sign an MVE-64 from the great State of Maine to say that they are allowed to take driver's ed. Thank you, sir.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Pittsfield, Representative Collamore.

Representative **COLLAMORE**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a 16 year old. He turned 16 in March. I asked him whether or not he felt 16 year olds should vote and he said, I quote, it's too early for us to make an informed decision. I don't think we should vote. I'm with some friends and asked and they agree with me. A lot of kids follow what their parents say at age 16. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dexter, Representative Foster.

Representative **FOSTER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, we in the United States of America hold the right to vote as a very sacred opportunity that we have that many others do not around the world. There's one of the sacred freedoms that we as Americans appreciate and celebrate every year. For me, this vote is a matter of maturity.

Now, we can argue that our children today are much more well-informed than we were in our generation, but that's not the maturity I'm talking about. On Monday, I stood in the rain with residents in Garland, Maine, as we celebrated the death of those who went off to war and fought for that sacred right for Americans to be free to vote in elections. I think back two or three generations ago, when young men were not honest about their age and entered the service to fight in World War II. An uncle of mine was one of them who joined the Navy. They were a very mature group of people, group of young people, 16-17-year-old men and women. I think back to my generation when at 17 the Legislature, Congress, passed laws that said that if you're old enough to carry a gun in 'Nam, you're old enough to drink, and they lowered the drinking age to 18. It was a great thing for my generation. When I turned

21, wisdom and the science showed that that was a mistake and the drinking age was raised back up to 21. If I had been asked at 16-17 if I thought they had made a good decision, the first decision, I probably would've said yes, along with a lot of my friends. Looking back as a father, with the next generation, I was very glad that that had been rethought.

Most of us started working at a young age. When I was 16, I had been out earning my own way, mowing lawns, digging graves, mowing cemeteries, for a few years. I would dare say, as I look at the kids around me now, there are few that are that mature and I dare say that although there are many who are well-informed about what's going on around them in this world, the maturity is still not there and I think that this bill is ill-advised and I would ask you to follow my light.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Harrison, Representative Riseman.

Representative **RISEMAN**: Thank you, sir. I'd like to pose a question to the Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Member may proceed.

Representative **RISEMAN**: Thank you. My question is, I had not received any fiscal information, fiscal note information on this. I'm sure that there probably is at this point and being that there is and in fact is this not a mandate, that's my question.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would advise to the Member from Harrison, Representative Riseman, that there is no fiscal note associated with this the fiscal note is minor cost increase, general fund. That's what it says. The Member may proceed.

Representative **RISEMAN**: Thank you. This isn't so much a cost to the State but it's a cost to the municipalities to have to prepare additional ballots and provide additional staff to process, so, it is a hardship to them. So, again, I think in the form that it's in this bill, it appears to me to be a mandate, so, thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Arundal, Representative Parry

Representative **PARRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I ask a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Member may proceed.

Representative **PARRY**: As I understand it, anybody under 18 is required to have a parent signature for signing any legal documents. Will there be anything in this bill, because I've been looking through the bill, where that law will be changed that somebody under 18 will be allowed to sign legal documents?

The SPEAKER: The Member has posed a question to anyone who wishes to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from St. George, Representative Matlack.

Representative **MATLACK**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, in answer to the Representative from Harrison's question, this is not a mandate. This is an opportunity for municipalities to opt in. They are not required, so, it isn't a mandate on the part of the municipalities.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Roeder.

Representative **ROEDER**: Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker. I believe that the Representative from Oxford raised a very interesting point in regards to participation in municipal government and whether or not people that would be affected by this bill would be able to participate in municipal government. And I know that in my town there are opportunities for people of all ages to participate in committees, on boards, such as the Firearms Discharge Board

in Bangor. So, there are opportunities for participation, as far as I'm aware, for young people. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Arundal, Representative Parry.

Representative **PARRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I ask another question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Member may proceed.

Representative **PARRY**: Will towns that opt in to this be required to have a separate voting list for these minors that will be voting in the municipal election or will they be put on the regular voting list?

The SPEAKER: The Member has posed a question to anyone who wishes to respond. Seeing none, a roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Saco, Representative O'Neil.

Representative **O'NEIL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise against the current motion.

This here is a youth-led bill. This year, I've been fortunate to work with a group of local high school students on creating policy and I probably learned even more from them than they did from me. They bring so much thoughtfulness, clarity, and experience to all of our conversations.

They've partnered with young people across the State and conducted public conversations about this amendment. Fellow youth leaders include Maine Youth for Climate Justice and the Youth Council at the League of Women Voters.

I'm going to talk about a few reasons why it's important to oppose the current motion. The first is that young people are already leading. Our country has a long history of young people leading political and social change. Today's young people are as invested in that as ever, with young leaders at the forefront of climate change and racial and social justice. Across the country, young people are organizing, mobilizing community members, and even founding advocacv organizations to call us to action. In between class and homework, they are researching policy, leading conversation with peers, and organizing us to make better decisions that will shape their world now and the world they will inherit. They are pushing our leaders to make better future-thinking policies because they are invested in their communities and they understand that they will inherit the world that policymakers like us create.

Most importantly, young people are stakeholders. That's the number one reason that we brought this bill forward. Enfranchisement acknowledges that a person is a stakeholder. Young Mainers have an important stake in the decisions we make today to shape the future of our State. They are our future. However active and engaged in civic life they may be, Mainers under age 18 are not currently able to vote in elections that set the course for their future. You may wonder whether 16 and 17 year olds are ready to make these decisions or whether they have enough life experience. Reaching the age of 18 is a big milestone in all of our lives, but the truth is it does not signify some kind of seismic shift in an individual's ability to participate in society or civic life. At the age of 16, young people are attending our schools, they are working under our employment laws, they are paying taxes and driving on roads. They bring the experiences of their families not being able to access health care, making ends meet with a family business, and figuring out how to pay for college. They worry for the environmental future that we will hand to them. That's why so many young people are already deeply engaged in politics and advocacy and they are just as able to research and reason as adult voters.

Youth are stakeholders, plain and simple. As lawmakers, we all make excuses for why we can't fully fund education or why we pollute the air and why we don't take care of community members who need our help. Youth bring clarity, lived experience, and a present interest to these issues. No one has a bigger stake in the decisions that we make today than our youth.

Young people are also prepared to make important decisions about the future. A study by Rutgers University that analyzed national survey data found that by 16 years of age, American adolescents manifest levels of development in each quality of citizenship that are nearly the same as those apparent in young American adults of voting age. The study determined that the lack of relevant differences in capacities for citizenship between 16- and 17 year olds and those legally enfranchised makes current laws arbitrary. To quote a piece written by Dr. Lawrence Steinberg, studies of cold cognition have shown that the skills necessary to make informed decisions are firmly in place by age 16. By that age, adolescents can gather and process information, weigh pros and cons, reason logically with facts, and take time before making a decision.

I also want to share that there's a national movement around youth voting. Extending the franchise to 16- and 17 year olds may seem new and different to some of us, but there's a great deal of precedent. Internationally, countries including Austria, Argentina, Brazil, Germany, and the United Kingdom allow those as young as 16 to participate in national or local elections. Closer to home, in many U.S. states, including Maine, 17 year olds who will be 18 by Election Day are allowed to participate in primary elections. A number of U.S. municipalities have also extended the right to vote to young adults, including cities in Maryland and California.

Research shows these young voters are engaged and informed. For example, when the City of Tacoma Park, Maryland extended the vote to young people, they experienced the highest voter participation rate among that age group. A Danish study found evidence that the opportunity to vote at an earlier age means a citizen is more likely to be a regular voter throughout their life. Studies in Austria where the minimum voting age is 16 have shown that 16 and 17 year olds vote just as responsibly as any other constituent. Young Mainers are just as capable as young people in any of these places.

Finally, Maine has a history of leadership in election law. I'm very proud of our strong culture of civic engagement in Maine. We're a long-time leader in election law and we consistently demonstrate some of the highest voter turnout rates in the country. We can continue this important tradition by amending the State Constitution to lower the voting age to 16 for state elections. This measure would provide young people with the ability to address their concerns and solutions more successfully and encourage people in positions of power to engage with them. Allowing students to vote can be a valuable educational experience, enabling students to engage with the civic process that they are learning about in the classroom. And lowering the voting age for elections could improve voter turnout among both young people and their families.

Young Mainers are able to vote in an informed and a responsible way right now. They have the largest stake in the future we create with our votes here and they have brought this measure to us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Currently, the Finance Authority of Maine offers a \$300+ grant to families that contribute to 529 programs. The deduction in this bill for that same contribution would only max out at around \$70 for families that contribute to the program. In 2015, this itemized deduction, and others, were removed and a much larger standard deduction of over \$25,000 per family for filers filing jointly was put in place, making tax filing much more simple and economical for taxpayers. There's been no evidence in the time between 2015 and now that contributions to 529 accounts have subsided. There is little incentive that a deduction of around \$71 is more attractive than that of the FAME grant of \$300.

I understand that we need to encourage folks to invest in education beyond our public schools, but adding this benefit only adds to the amount of time a person needs to file their taxes, it's not enough to incentivize families to make additional contributions. I ask that you please follow my light.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Turner, Representative Morris.

Representative **MORRIS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the pending motion. Last session, the Legislature passed a bill eliminating the subminimum wage for people with disabilities. While there was some debate and discussion about what that would mean for people with disabilities, the decision was ultimately a bipartisan one to eliminate the subminimum wage.

This bill is before us as a compromise to help and encourage employers to employ people with disabilities by encouraging through tax incentives, which we felt was a better way going forward and we hope that in future legislatures we'd be able to accomplish this.

At that time, I shared a personal story of a cousin of mine who had Down syndrome that at one point in his life he was able to get a job at a local supermarket helping stocking shelves and so forth and what that meant to him and meant to his family to have that opportunity available to him. And I worry if we don't offer something, that some employers may not see the benefit or the ability or take the opportunity to hire some of these people with disabilities. And so, I would hope that we could turn down this pending motion and pass this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Pittston, Representative Hanley.

Representative **HANLEY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to the pending motion. And, again, I also have a story. There's a family-owned market down in Wiscasset in my district and I spoke with the owner and he told me when he employs a mentally retarded man, a man with learning disabilities. He said the gentleman can count just enough bottles per hour to pay his wage. That was at \$11 an hour. And the wage increase that was pending, he told me, he said, when that comes, he said, I have a decision to make; I keep this man on and lose \$40 a week or I send him home.

This type of legislation that's before us would assist that family-owned market and that mentally-challenged man. They would both benefit, as would our society in general. This is a very tiny price for us to pay. I ask you to defeat the pending motion and support the Minority Report. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gorham, Representative Terry.

Representative **TERRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to remind the Body that we approved a minimum wage for everyone and we are not here to task the State with subsidizing those that care not to pay the minimum wage.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Berwick, Representative O'Connor.

Representative **O'CONNOR**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I worked for years as a baker. One of the jobs that I did was to train intellectually challenged their job. They were paid at that time a subminimum wage. This tax credit would help.

Those people are no longer working and it's sad because it was pride. They worked and they had pride. The small amount of pay that they did bring home, it was pride. And when it becomes unaffordable to employ these people, then they lose their jobs and they sit home and they do nothing and doing nothing breeds misery. I am in opposition, direct opposition to this motion. I hope you follow my light. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Berwick, Representative Roberts.

Representative **ROBERTS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of the pending motion. As the Good Representative from Berwick may know, there was a café in South Berwick called Madison's Café. It employed solely intellectually disabled individuals. This café thrived for years. It was a local establishment. She did not need to pay them less, nor could they perform less, and was never asking for subsidy from the government. She felt it her mission to provide employment to people like her daughter and we should all strive to do the same. That's why I support the pending motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Sylvester.

Representative **SYLVESTER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the good Representative from North Turner pointed out in the 129th, we did do away with the subminimum wage for folks with disabilities and we did so on a near-unanimous basis. And the reason for that was that at that time there were no employers, not a single employer, who wished to take advantage of that wage. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Acton, Representative Kryzak.

Representative **KRYZAK**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a very interesting bill that I tried to work with the sponsor on originally in the Taxation Committee. It had effects on the tax, it had effect on the tree growth tax, and that's why it came before our committee. With this amendment to it now, it is a completely different bill. It has no tax involved in it at all, so, it really hasn't been heard in a public hearing or brought before a committee to make a decision on what we have left now.

My concerns are twofold. There's a change in immigration as far as the workers from Canada being able to work even if they have an H-2A. Federal Law takes care of all immigration and handling of the people working in the State of Maine that are actually in the country. So, this amendment takes that right away and only allows American citizens to be in the logging industry.

The other part is there's a double penalty. If a landowner hires a contractor and the contractor hires illegal immigrants, then there is a fine for the contractor and a fine for the landowner. So, and it starts out at a thousand and goes up to 10,000 at the third try.

It's against the Federal Law and this double penalty were two things that I couldn't agree with, so, that's why I didn't present this amendment. I am pleased, though, that the sponsor did take the tree growth out. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Bickford.

Representative **BICKFORD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this bill and similar bills have come before us for the last 12 years and this is nothing but an attack on people that have tree growth. If I own a parcel of land in Northern Maine and I hire a company to transport my product, how am I going to know whether every one of that contractor's employees is an American or a Maine citizen? I don't. Don't hold me responsible for someone else's actions and that is exactly what this bill does. This has been an attack on tree growth parcels up north and it's been an attack for 12 years. We don't need it.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gorham, Representative Terry.

Representative **TERRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this bill was amended in the other Body from what we had done in committee and took out the penalty for tree growth. It now is a penalty for folks that drive within the State that are not supposed to be driving within the State at certain times during their delivery process, a penalty of \$500 for the first violation, \$1,000 for the second, and \$1,500 for the third. It does take out the tax penalty.

I can tell you that the original intent of using a tax penalty for the issue that they are having with drivers coming into the State, into the country, is that the enforcement arm of this particular law lies within the Department of Labor in Washington D.C. and our Forestry Service are the ones that are distributing the violation tickets. So, there's a disconnect between the State of Maine and Washington D.C.

The Senate President brought this to our attention a couple of years ago and has worked on it quite a bit with it and this is a financial penalty now that we in the State can impose on drivers that violate the terms of the agreement with their contracts.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would remind Members in references to the other Body refer to it as the 'other Body', in addition, Members are asked not to refer to the actions of the other Body, invoking members of the other Body in terms of what they have or haven't done.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eagle Lake, Representative Martin.

Representative **MARTIN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. First of all, let me indicate that the penalty that was in there for tree growth has been removed, in part because of me, I guess, and even though I am the sponsor of the original tree growth law. And, secondly, the issue deals specifically with people who live and are impacted west of Route 11 and, in particular, going all the way to Piscataguis County. And so, what we're trying to do is to level the playing field. And so, what we're trying to do, basically, is to enforce what the Federal Government Law now provides for, that is someone from another country comes into this; our territory; Maine, that is, that they cannot pick up the produce and haul it into Canada without getting authorization. It is the same thing that's going on between Texas and Mexico, which is being enforced by federal government that we're basically trying to achieve the same goal and I would hope that you support the Majority Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Bickford.

Representative **BICKFORD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, if you read the committee amendment A, which is what we are voting on, it says the signature of the truck driver and an affirmation by the owner of the land from which the wood was harvested that the load of wood is being transported in a legal manner consistent with Federal Law or regulation or any international trade agreement. How in the world does the landowner know where the truck driver is from? It's not their business. They hire a firm, it's the firm's problem. And if the State of Maine is going to start enforcing Federal Law because the federal authorities are not, then perhaps other states should be doing the same thing with immigration, sir. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from St. George, Representative Matlack.

Representative **MATLACK**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this is a cabotage bill. Cabotage means that people who reside outside of this country and have vessels, whether cars or ships, that come into this country may deliver cargo to this country, they may pick up cargo but they must leave. This bill is to protect those drivers who are Maine residents from illegal operations by people who should not be operating within our State. This bill penalizes owners because owners should know better. Owners are hiring contractors; they should require their contractors to know better. This bill protects Maine workers from unfair competition from folks who should not be providing services here in the State of Maine.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Pittston, Representative Hanley.

Representative **HANLEY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the saying goes, the devil is in the details. As a small woodlot owner myself, I have a 50-acre woodlot, I hired Sappi Fine Paper some years ago through their forester to come down and harvest that woodlot. I never met a single person that walked on it. How would I as a small landowner have any idea who's driving the rigs on that property or hauling the material from it? This bill would put me right in the gun sites of some type of crime.

I think you have to look at the details. You might be after one set of people doing one thing but when you throw a blanket out, you get everybody. I ask you to follow my vote and reject this motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from East Machias, Representative Tuell.

Representative **TUELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise today in opposition to the motion. I rise today because earlier in the day, I received a letter from Scott Beal from Woodland Pulp, who has some grave concerns about this legislation.

Now, for those who aren't from Down East, are not aware just how important Woodland Pulp is to our local economy, I would encourage those who support loggers and support truckers and support the pulp industry in Washington County and in rural Maine, to be treading very lightly where this bill is concerned and I will be honoring Mr. Beal's request and I hope others will do the same. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eagle Lake, Representative Martin.

Representative **MARTIN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There seems to be some confusion because first of all as far as the mill and woodland is concerned, that lumber is coming in from Canada to the mill, it's not being picked up at the mill and being taken into Canada. So, that is unrelated to the issue here

And speaking for myself as a landowner, I'd be shocked if I was not aware of who the truckers are who are on my land. And so, that's the issue and that's not a problem at all because the issue here is whether or not they're picking up and bringing stuff into Maine and then taking a product in Maine and hauling it into Canada without authorization.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Hutchins.

Representative **HUTCHINS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. My sons both had a couple of woodlots cut off this past winter and they got very friendly with the owner of the equipment that did the cutting and the trucking and they had, you know, quite a few loads taken away, but they never knew for sure who was coming in a truckload or

when. Sometimes the truckload gets hauled away in the middle of the night because it's when the load was ready to go. So, to be able to know who the truck driver particular was is impossible in many cases. Thank you.

Representative **STEARNS**: Mr. Speaker, the intent of this bill is excellent. However, there are some unintended consequences that are far-reaching and could affect both the taxpayer and the students and the faculty and the support staff at every school in every town.

I would ask the Members of the Body to look at the testimony that was submitted, over 80 pieces of testimony on this bill, many from special ed directors with years and years of service, many with special education teachers with years and years of service, and each one to a tee asking that this bill not pass and the reasons why.

Currently, when you go into the IEP process, you work toward consensus with the IEP team. If the IEP team cannot come to consensus, even though they might be close, a decision is made. Oftentimes, it's by the special ed director, the administrator at the meeting. But what happens in that case for the student as they move forward? They move forward with what a majority of that, the consensus of that IEP team thinks is in the best interest of the student. If there's a dissenting member to that committee; it might be a parent, it might be somebody else, doesn't like that idea and they feel so strongly about it they can go into the due process, and due process is just what it says. And by Federal Law, the student would go back to the last agreed-upon program.

What 552 intends to do is it says that every member of the IEP team has to agree and until it's rectified, the student stays where they are. So, let's think of a couple scenarios. Let's think if we have an IEP team and you might have a mom and dad with shared custody and they don't get along well at all. They fight over everything. And the dad at the meeting and the rest of the team say little Johnny is not having a good placement here, he should try this experience. And the mom, just because the dad says that, says no way. So, we've got eight people maybe saying Johnny really ought to move to this new program because he's not doing well but that one person can hold that up. And with the new proposed 552, it would then go to mediation, it would then go to due process, it would then go through appeals, and it might even go on to court after that, possibly taking up to a year and a half while the student stays in that same placement even though eight out of the nine

folks in the IEP meeting know darn well that Johnny should be in a different program.

Let's take another scenario. Every single person on the IEP team says Johnny is having a terrible experience in the current placement but they can't agree on what the new placement should be. You know what? Johnny stays right in that placement that every single person in the IEP team has said is no good, but you're going to stay there, Johnny, for maybe a few weeks, maybe a few months, maybe over a year while the adults fight it out. I don't see that as being good for Johnny.

The special educators that I have come across in 37 years in working in public education are excellent at what they do. They work on progress for students and they're driven by compassion. They also seek to make the best choices for students. The number of due process hearings in Maine is extremely low. Quite often, the dissenting member of the IEP team will not go to due process. It's a big step, it's there if they need it, and quite often those decisions made by the team work out well. If we move to 55% school funding, which seems to be a popular item right now, I would hate to see the money that's going to be in that pool of money go to attorneys and litigation and not to staff and faculty and the classrooms of the schools.

Lastly in this bill, ed techs, or any staff member, for that matter, that one person would like to call to the IEP meeting will be required to be there. Now, what if an ed tech, the meeting's at 12:30, right after lunch, and the ed tech is working with another class? One of two things is going to happen; there's going to be an expense where you hire someone to cover the class while the ed tech comes in or you're going to hold the meeting after school and we'll be back in the days of having IEP meetings at 4:30-5:00 and most of the faculty that I know are not interested in having an IEP at 5-5:30 on a Friday afternoon. So, for those items, I really hope that each member will take a look at the testimony, if you have the time, and vote Ought Not to Pass on this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Livermore Falls, Representative Lyman.

Representative **LYMAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to the pending motion.

As a teacher of 36 years, I've shared the IEP process for many students every year in the classroom and I've always been part of a team for the student that we're working with. I've even been as an extended family member as an advocate for children very near and dear to me, besides those in my classroom.

Please listen to what the professional educators have shared with the numerous testimonies we received. I've talked with special educators around the State, special ed directors, teachers, all saying to me that what's going to happen with this bill, we don't want to see this happen. Folks trained to look at extensive data and triangulated assessments that guide the best practices to be implemented for meeting the individual needs, I often wished as a classroom teacher that every student I worked with went through the IEP process in order to look at every child as closely as we do with the children in an IEP meeting.

An effective IEP process already exists. Parents can call a meeting any time. There is a team approach, with very caring, collaborative approaches used to develop an individualized plan for the learners. The learner is our priority. I have been contacted and feel a huge responsibility to speak

up for our students as well as those teachers that are working for them and doing an amazing job. But, mostly, my 36 years of experience has shown time and again the effectiveness that the present IEP process has for serving learners. Please let us vote in a manner that supports the amazing work our teachers and of our teachers and meets the needs of our learners. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Cape Elizabeth, Representative Millett.

Representative **MILLETT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Under current law, Maine school districts may make material changes to a student's IEP without the parents' consent as long as they provide parents with prior written notice of the changes. If the parents disagree with the school district's proposal, they have to initiate a due process hearing or other dispute resolution proceeding within seven days of a written notice of a proposed change in order to stop that change. At the due process hearing or through the complaint process, parents must then prove the change was not appropriate. The law as it stands puts a great burden on our parents, who typically do not have the financial resources or legal knowhow to make this happen.

LD 552 as amended - and that is important - is designed to provide parents of students with disabilities with an equal voice during the development and revision of their individualized education programs. The changes proposed in this bill are not without precedent. In fact, 12 other states in our nation currently require parental consent for some or all changes to an initial IEP and/or placement and at least seven states, including our neighbors in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, can be described as full consent states.

LD 552 as amended requires the Department of Education to amend its Rule Chapter 101, Maine Unified Special Education Regulation, through major substantive rulemaking to require parental consent before a previously agreed upon IEP could be materially changed, including a placement in a different school, a move to a more restrictive setting, an abbreviated school day, or use of tutorial services in replacement of regular instruction.

So, this is important; this bill is about rulemaking, education stakeholders will provide input into the rules, and the rules will come back to the Education Committee and this Body for final passage. This bill is not about providing every member on an IEP team with the ability to block progress. This is about parents and parents only. And, again, only when material changes are being made.

There was an example given earlier around divorced parents and that certainly is a most unfortunate situation, but it is a situation that our schools face at the beginning of the process when people are brought together to decide on the IEP team and our schools have procedures and policies in place to deal with those situations and I would imagine they would be utilized in a similar situation should this bill pass. And I would ask everyone in this chamber to please also listen to the families that testified in support of this bill, who feel powerless in a process that tilts heavily against them. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Chelsea, Representative Lemelin.

Representative **LEMELIN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this bill and I'm one of those parents, the family. I went through 20 years of IEPs and the system works and it works very well. Did I have to fight? Sure, I fought for the rights of my son, but every member on the team listened.

Yeah, there might've been one member that disagreed with something but in the end we went with the team. And I suggest that we oppose this bill because there is no issue now. I know it because I lived it for 20 years. Were they long? Was it a lot of hard work? Yes. But the team supported the families and the Representatives that spoke already, the teachers, have said that the special needs directors were in our support, they were, and their heart and soul is in it. I have seen it. In my district, RSU 12, the director, Deedee, is one of the most amazing human beings I've ever met and she fights for these kids or young adults and they were there to help us. This bill would only cause obstacles for parents and we don't need these obstacles. I did it for 20 years, it works, please leave it alone. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fort Fairfield, Representative McCrea.

Representative **McCREA**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'm on the Education Committee and we worked this bill and we worked this bill and we worked this bill. We've had numerous iterations of amendments, it's had a lot of consideration, pros and cons.

I'm an educator myself, I taught school forever, and I was on a lot of IEP teams, a lot of IEP meetings, and I would never suggest that the special education directors or the providers were anything but very well-meaning, compassionate people. That's not what this bill is about. It is not about those educators. This is about families. This is about parents and parents' rights. The bill simply provides that ed techs and other, some of the things that it provides; education technicians and other educators who work directly with the student may not be unreasonably denied participation in the IEP program if the parent requests them to be there.

Please understand that these changes are major substantive and, as such, will come back to the Education Committee no later than January 2 of 2022. I'm certain that the Joint Education and the Cultural Affairs Committee will look at it some more, perhaps make some adjustments to what the DOE staff brings to us, and we will move forward and it will come back to this Body for enactment.

So, I thank you for your time, Mr. Speaker, and I encourage support.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from East Machias, Representative Tuell.

Representative **TUELL**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to the bill before us. I do so reflecting back a couple of months to when our county delegation jumped on Zoom on a Wednesday night with one of our local special ed directors, Mary Maker, who has been in special education in the Machias area for some 30, almost 40 years, and expressed a lot of severe concerns about the bill itself but more so the rationale behind it. And I would like to share with you briefly some things that she had sent to me in an email earlier this session and also explained to our delegation received almost an hour's worth of questions and back and forth on.

Ms. Maker writes; in most cases, the school and parents agree to change the IEP. Most IEP meetings end in consensus. If the parents don't agree, they can request a mediation or they can file a complaint or request a due process hearing. If the parents request any of these options, the child stays in the previous program, which already exceeds the federal requirements which requires stay-put only for due process hearings. So, we have due process. It is the responsibility of the SAU to provide free appropriate public education, or FAPE, to a child with a disability. If this law

passes, the parent will be able to say no to the changes on an IEP that would provide FAPE to the child and the only resources the SAU would have is to request a mediation. If a parent refused the mediation or didn't agree to the results, the SAU would need to initiate a due process hearing or leave the child in a program that does not provide FAPE. The cost of one due process hearing averages \$75,000. If the school initiates a due process hearing, the current insurance that an SAU has will not cover the cost because the school is on the offense and not defending the IEP that is in place.

This bill will create more work for special education personnel, having to send documents for signatures, having to pursue parents to get signatures, and sending information certified mail. In the 14-day timeframe that the bill originally proposed, the student's program will have to stay the same as it was, which could be very inappropriate and cause a loss of skills for some students. If this change is being proposed due to behavioral issues, this could also cause a safety issue for the child, other children, and staff. The additional work for personnel will most probably cause more special education teachers and special education administrators to leave the The feeling that, as educators, special education personnel are not meeting a child's needs with inappropriate IEP in place is going to be very difficult for an educator to accept. This is going to create a greater shortage of special education personnel, and I will add here at a time when positions are going unfilled and people are struggling to find positions.

This bill states correspondence shall be sent certified mail, return receipt requested, or the original version did. This is an additional cost to the district. The U.S. postage for a regular first-class size envelope is \$6.04. Most paperwork in special education, especially an IEP, does not fit in a regular first-class size envelope. In most cases, the cost will be higher. And Ms. Maker asked me to share this, I realize there have been some changes proposed, but the entire premise behind this bill is wrong thinking, I believe, and will be voting against it, accordingly. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Haggan.

Representative **HAGGAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am completing next Thursday, mercifully, my 31st year as a teacher and the kids are really ready to be done, I'll tell you that.

I'm in a district in Hampden that has 2,250 people in it. Special Services is located or headquartered in my building about four doors down from me. Every single person - director of special services, assistant director, the building principal, superintendent, assistant superintendent, special ed teachers - are very concerned with this bill.

We do work in IEPs as a team and the team works pretty well. And the first person that everybody cares about is the student and taking good care of the student. The overwhelming message that I've been receiving from all of these leaders is please do not pass this bill. This would be a large setback for special services, so, I would also urge all of you to vote Ought Not to Pass on this motion. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Brennan.

Representative **BRENNAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. In the best of circumstances, the best of circumstances, the IEP and special education process can be daunting for everybody involved. All this bill

does is look to ways to give a greater voice to parents who are involved in the process and to those people that know the student the best so they can make the best-informed decision. But, more importantly, I want to stress the point that was made by the Representative from Cape Elizabeth. This amended version of the bill simply allows for us to go through major substantive rulemaking and this will all come back to the Legislature for review and approval next session.

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Canaan, Representative Stetkis.

Representative **STETKIS**: Mr. Speaker, Point of Order. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I believe the speaker is supposed to be directing his comments to the Chair.

On **POINT OF ORDER**, Representative STETKIS of Canaan asked the Chair to remind Representative BRENNAN of Portland to address the Speaker and not turn to the rest of the House.

The SPEAKER: The Chair reminded Representative BRENNAN of Portland to address her comments toward the Speaker. The Member may proceed.

Representative **BRENNAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, just to reiterate; what this bill will do is simply allow the substantive rulemaking process to be undertaken by the Department of Education. All the stakeholders and interested parties will be involved, there will be a public hearing process, and then the proposed rules will come back to the education and legislature for approval next year.

We've heard a number of different scenarios about how this bill might play out, but nothing will change in the next year and nothing will change until the Legislature approves major and substantive rules next session. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Acceptance of the Majority Ought to Pass as Amended Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Guilford, Representative Stearns.

Representative **STEARNS**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, once again LD 1172 has good intent. There's absolutely no doubt that our teachers, our school families, administrators, parents, students, support staff, everybody has been through an unprecedented experience in the past year. Here we are in the month of June and we're going to be winding down a unique school year in the history of public education in the State of Maine, absolutely no doubt about it.

I have very little doubt that local administrators and school boards during this past year have not adapted their evaluation systems to the circumstances before them. I haven't heard anything from the field to the contrary. This bill doesn't relieve the evaluations for the present year, that I call the COVID year, because I believe these schools are going to open up in the fall. We're going to be back to school in Maine. What this bill does is make it so the next school year, 21/22, there will be no teacher and no principal mandated evaluations as mandated by the State except for one group; second-year teachers.

So, put yourself in the place of a first-year teacher teaching right now. You've gone through COVID your very first year of teaching school. It might've been a great experience; might not have been. Next year, with this bill, you'd be the only group of people that would be required to have an evaluation to see if you were worthy of a continuing contract for your third year or not. That seems to single out a very small group of school teachers to me at a very pivotal point in their career.

I think that the decisions on how to evaluate and how to adjust that for the circumstances are best made at the local level. Some schools have gone to school every single day this year, been school pretty much; fairly much as normal. Other schools haven't seen the inside of a building. Huge differences. How can the State of Maine in Augusta start to dictate how we're going to evaluate or adjust our evaluation system for those wide variety of circumstances? If a person is not being evaluated fairly, they have a process. They can grieve that; they can file a grievance and go through that process and people will determine whether or not they've been treated fairly or not. So, I would urge you Ought Not to Pass and urge you to be optimistic that we all go back to school in the fall.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Fecteau.

Representative **FECTEAU**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I agree with the comments of the previous speaker. If this bill was going to exempt it for this school year, I'm in. But, like the speaker before me, this bill has great intent but it's for the next school year, not the COVID school year. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fort Fairfield, Representative McCrea.

Representative **McCREA**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, having retired in 2016 after a career as a teacher in Fort Fairfield school system, SAD 20, I had been evaluated under the State's new mandated teacher evaluation system. For the first time in my

48-year career, I felt that my evaluation actually helped me get better at my craft. I must say that the system relies heavily on self-evaluation and that it is very time-consuming, and time is the very motivation behind this bill.

Let me start out by saying right away that I'm a supporter of the teacher and principal evaluation systems in place in our schools at this time. As a teacher in my local school, I helped implement the teacher evaluation system itself. My friends are teachers and I often hear from them about their local systems. In fact, my daughter is a teacher and I hear about it from her all the time.

I'm a supporter of the direction our State has taken in terms of building a teacher and principal evaluation system and I think the adjustments we have made to amplify teachers' voices and to make the evaluation system less of a punishment and more about improvement have made the systems even better. That said, I also know a lot of work goes in to maintaining local teacher evaluation systems. Not just adding paperwork for teachers, but additional work for observations, steering committee members, meetings, and much, much more. That is why I sponsored this bill.

All this bill does is allow districts to apply for a temporary waiver - districts to apply for a temporary waiver of their local teacher evaluation system. And whether to apply for such a waiver will be left completely up to the local school districts. Many inside the field of education as well as members of the general population realize how difficult it has been to deliver the best education possible over this past 14 or 15 months and many have asked what they can do to remove things from the plates of educators and give them a little more time to be good teachers for their students in their classrooms.

This bill is one way we can give teachers a little more time with their students. Right now, we are asking educators to juggle a lot, more than I can even imagine, and we want and need our teachers focused on, guess what, their students. A lot of attention has been paid to the impact of this pandemic and what it will have on our students, their learning, and their mental health. Next year, schools will still be dealing with not only the safety issues that still linger because of COVID, but teachers and principals will continue to dedicate themselves to helping students to recover socially, emotionally and, more importantly, academically. If a school district wants to use the time it dedicates to their local evaluation systems instead of focus on needs of students, that's fine, especially right now. Our educators face a lot right now and I think we can all agree that we would want any and all of their efforts focused squarely on the students, their needs, and their overall wellbeing. This bill is an attempt to remove something from the plates of districts for those that want to focus on the things I've just LD 1172 simply delays the state-mandated mentioned. evaluation of teachers and principals for the next year.

In closing, I would like to make three final comments. One, evaluations of teachers in the second year of their probationary period shall continue simply because that's part of the law and that's the second year that districts need to find out if a teacher is somebody that they want to keep on staff.

My second point; if a district chooses to continue their current full evaluation system, they can. If a district chooses to put their evaluations on hold for one year, they can. I ask that you vote to support LD 1172 and please follow my light. Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Brennan.

Representative **BRENNAN**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. There's no doubt that we owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to teachers across the State of Maine. During the middle of the pandemic, over 90% of schools in the State of Maine were open in some way. And that was because teachers made tremendous personal sacrifice and they stepped up professionally to make sure that our young people across the State of Maine had the opportunity to learn.

So, for one year what this bill does is say that the evaluation process that you would go through can be suspended. But I want to reiterate again another point of the bill is that it's permissive in allowing school districts to decide whether or not to conduct evaluation or not conduct evaluation. It's the ultimate in local control. So, if the next year a school district chooses to have an evaluation process for teachers, they can. But if they also sit down with their teachers and say there's a lot of work that we need to accomplish in our district and we need you to step up in ways that you haven't before, we can put the evaluation process aside for one year. So, that's all this bill does. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Guilford, Representative Stearns.

Representative **STEARNS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to pose a question through the Chair to anybody that can answer it, and that would be that if this bill passes --

Representative **JAVNER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This bill came before our committee as a substantive major rule change from the CDC for lead levels in our schools. This includes private schools and public schools.

It came to our committee as 15 parts per billion, having gone through the whole process of a major substantive rule, which is very thorough, as I hope we all know. It is coming out of our committee with this motion 4 parts per billion.

I represent a district that is super-rural. I have nine of these schools in my district; nine that have successfully educated generations of students. If this is to pass, to mitigate to 4 parts per billion could be extremely devastating to these schools. There was a school that we heard of that's not super-rural even, when they had even mitigated for their lead levels, when they tested again, they were 5 parts per billion after spending thousands of dollars for mitigation.

If this goes into effect at 4 parts per billion, they will have to spend thousands more dollars to reach that level. Our minority committee amendment is a great compromise at 10 parts per billion. I please ask you to reject this motion and save at least my super-rural schools. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eliot, Representative Meyer.

Representative **MEYER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Women and Men of the House. LD 206 is a major substantive rule implementing a program of testing for lead in school drinking water. As proposed, the rule was inadequate to protect children's health and ensure safe drinking water in our schools. Lead is a potent neurotoxin, robbing children of their potential by irreversibly damaging their developing brains. A benchmark of 15 parts per billion as proposed in the original rule or 10 parts per billion proposed in the Minority Report is not health protective and are standards that have been abandoned by many other states because these levels have no relation to human health.

This bill does not impact water utilities, it does not require water utilities set a standard of 4 parts per billion. Lead is not entering schools via the water from public water systems. It's getting into the water our kids are drinking via pipes and fixtures in the schools. If high lead levels are found in one or two drinking water sources in a school, chances are fixing the problem is relatively simple. Schools have control over the actual fixtures and lowering the level to the new standard can be as simple as changing out a faucet or screen, disconnecting a single fountain, or ensuring that classroom sinks aren't used for drinking. Rarely do all taps in a school show high levels. These easy, inexpensive fixes go a long way to helping protect our kids from lead exposure.

Lead in drinking water is well-studied and the data is clear; 10 parts per billion, 15 parts per billion is too high to ensure healthy kids and this rule was amended to 4 parts per billion to reflect the toxicity of lead and a commitment to the health of Maine children.

The Member may proceed.

Representative **ORDWAY**: Thank you, sir. Okay, the time has come, the title of this bill, like many titles that we do here, may be misleading. It's time for us to take action. Only two states in the country do not have some sort of Sunday hunting; Maine and Massachusetts. I think we do a disservice to the northern section of this State when we don't recognize the economic impact that we are causing to the businesses in Northern Maine.

The bill came around to hunting only in the unorganized territories, in the White Mountain National Forest also. That puts the opposition that landowners will close off their land if we have Sunday hunting. The large landowners in the unorganized territories, the big paper companies, own land in states that have Sunday hunting. They own land in New Brunswick where they have Sunday hunting. They don't shut their land off. This is the time to do some economic impact for our friends up north.

By putting in just Northern Maine, I was accused of creating two Maines. That happened a long time ago. It's time that we all act and give some support to the restaurants, the stores, the gas stations, the sporting camps. It's time. It's been too long.

I'll check my notes. That's it, I guess, I let it at that, but the economic impact, the hunters and the sportsmen that don't come to Maine, the number is growing tremendously. They go to other states where they have the opportunity to get in a full week of hunting. So, I don't know, I'm pretty passionate about it, I guess, Mr. Speaker. I'll let it go at that. Please defeat this motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Buxton, Representative Blier.

Representative **BLIER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I grew up in the northern part of Maine and every year I spend a week in the Allagash hunting.

So, I live in Buxton, right, it's a city, I wouldn't want

hunting in Southern Maine. This is Northern Maine. You go up there, it's land as far as you can see, there's nobody. This is an industry where people work up there six days a week, can't hunt on Sundays. Give them the opportunity to do that. Give the opportunity of sport camps to have people come.

Hunting is a dying thing. People don't hunt like they used to in the olden days. Give the people the opportunity to hunt on Sundays, to spend time with their children, rather than watching TV. This is a good opportunity for us to create an industry in Northern Maine that's very well-needed, to give an opportunity for the younger generation to recreate on the outdoors instead of watching TV and playing video games. This is a good thing. Why defeat this purpose; for this is not Southern Maine, this is not housing everywhere, this is the wilderness. Give this opportunity to the Northern Maine people. I think this is a good thing. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would remind members to address comments through the Chair.

Representative **DILLINGHAM**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am so happy to once again be in our beautiful and historic chamber. I rise today to voice disappointment on behalf of my caucus that by a Majority vote of Legislative Council we've decided to not follow CDC and Dr. Shah's guidelines on masking of the Executive order.

For 15 months, we have been absent from this chamber and the people of the State have been kept away from the work that we do here. It is clear to everyone that since shutting this building down, my caucus has pushed to return to the Legislature, pushed to allow public access to the building, pushed to make the Legislature a relevant part of the pandemic policymaking. It is also true that each inflection point and with each argument, the response from the Majority was that we must follow the science.

The science was defined by the Chief Executive's Orders and CDC guidance. We've pushed on that guidance. We asked for data and for decision metrics to understand what data was being used and how. At best, we were told to just trust the science and, at worst, that we were science deniers.

Now here we are, abandoning the Executive's Executive Order and ignoring the science of the CDC. I will refrain from the pejoratives hurled at my colleagues and simply encourage us to move forward and recognize that the organizations we have allowed to set policies throughout this pandemic have shifted away from masks, and that is a testament to the people of Maine.

It is time for us to follow the science and end the mask mandate here at the State House. I understand the feelings folks have towards masks, particularly if you believe it is responsible for your health. It offers security, but normalcy requires that we follow the science and, for those who are comfortable, it is time to allow masks to be removed and, if you aren't ready yet, then continue to wear it until you are. I am pleased to be back in this House, but we should be here without a mask mandate, following the science rather than our fear. I ask that you support this order.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winter Harbor, Representative Faulkingham.

Representative **FAULKINGHAM**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I did not expect the opportunity to speak on this today and if I had, I probably wouldn't've planned on speaking, but in being here in the chamber today, I'm glad that I have the opportunity to address my colleagues on this issue.

You know, I'm not in the greatest health, I have a few problems and one of them is that I'm 200 pounds overweight, you know? I should probably take better care of my health and try to lose some of that weight, but it's very difficult for me to wear this mask all day, I'm not sure it makes my oxygen level do but I know that it makes me very hot, it makes my blood pressure rise, and makes me very uncomfortable. That's just me personally but I would like to say that to my colleagues here today. And also another problem that I have is I can't hear very good. I've spent my life on a boat next to an exhaust that's damaged my hearing and a lot of shooting without the right ear protection has caused me to not hear very well. So, I don't know if anybody else has had this trouble today, but I certainly have, that I cannot hear people speak very well with muffled masks over their faces and I don't care what anybody says, some debates are won on the House Floor and some minds are changed and if we can't hear each other debate, that impacts the work that we're doing here. I've noticed that just today since being in here. It's not something I probably would've brought up before today, but it definitely makes an impact.

Another thing is in our communication. Communication is not just a verbal thing, it's not just what we hear the words coming out of our mouth; it's the expressions and the mannerisms on peoples' faces. We cannot see those things with the masks covering peoples' faces. And I know there are a lot of other people besides myself on both sides of the aisle that are very uncomfortable, that have trouble breathing because of the masks, and have communication issues because of the masks, and maybe not today, maybe not tomorrow, but it would be really great if we could reconsider this before we go through the next three weeks wearing these masks. The temperature predictions for the beginning of next week is going to be in the 90s - 90 degrees. At some point, it has to cross over that you have to worry about the safety of people wearing the masks in these conditions. So, I want that to be a consideration and this shouldn't be a party line thing or anything like that, you know, it has become that, it's too late to turn that around, but I hope moving forward that we can do as the rest of the State has done and remove these masks so we can finish our work. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative **BRADSTREET**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This particular bill would allow for private rights of action on workplace violations. It will result in big attorneys' fees; it would be very costly.

The State of Maine already has 110 different labor laws that businesses have to comply with. I think we already have enough of them. The Maine Jobs Council and Manufacturers Association, the Chamber of Commerce, Professional Loggers, Maine Grocers, NFIB, all kinds of people testified against this bill because they realize how expensive it can be and we already have enough laws on the books. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Cape Elizabeth, Representative Millett.

Representative **MILLETT**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Working Mainers have come before us many times and have testified about the untenable choices they face between earning a paycheck or staying home to tend to a family member or themselves when ill. We have heard about their own experiences or the experiences of their coworkers of having hours cut after having taken an unpaid day due to illness, or worse, being fired. Quote; there is nothing more heartbreaking than staying home

from work at the doctor's orders, only to return to work to find that I didn't have a job anymore. Another quote; there's also a lot of fear around if I'm being taken seriously when I am sick or when my kids are sick. It definitely hurts when you have to take off two or more days in a row. You have that fear of great, am I even going to have a job. Or this quote; I once saw one of my coworkers throw up while working, wash their hands, and continue to work. He needed to stay at the job and couldn't afford to go home because the paycheck would be cut or they feared they'd lose hours on the schedule.

This bill as amended would make sure that an employer would be prohibited from any form of discrimination or retaliation against an employee who exercises their rights to earned paid time off. Currently, Maine Law protects an individual who reports his/her employer for refusing to provide such rights, but there is no protection if the employer provides the right and then reduces the employee's hours, or worse, fires the individual.

We hear a lot about how Maine has a workforce issue and one way to address this is by putting in place policies that safeguard workers financially and physically and create a greater sense of security. Our employees need to know that we value their hard work and stand by the rights we have created in law. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Turner, Representative Morris.

Representative **MORRIS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the pending motion.

This law is just took effect this past January. I think it is too early to start adding new regulations into the law before we know exactly any consequences of the law. I think we need to give the law an opportunity to work before we pass new regulations or new restrictions on businesses. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Presque Isle, Representative Underwood.

Representative **UNDERWOOD**: I rise in opposition also to this motion that's on the floor. If you don't like the place where you're working, get out and go find something else. Leave everybody else alone and let them handle it. The employer is paying the bills, they should be able to dictate or have a great say in who's there, while you're there. So, if you don't like the place that you're working, leave. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Sylvester.

Representative **SYLVESTER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to just point out a couple of pieces of this bill as it was amended that I think is very important.

One of the pieces of the bill is that it only affects the earned paid time law, which was supposed to have in rulemaking enforcement positions, which did not happen in rulemaking and so, this bill is a correction on the rulemaking as it was discussed in the 129th.

Secondly, the very important part of this bill is the examination of the enforcement of other labor laws and that will be returned to the committee with a full study, which hasn't been done in a very long time. And I think it's important for the Labor Committee to have that information, it's a very important part of this bill, and I would appreciate following the motion Ought to Pass. Thank you.

This bill is really just about bringing the State of Maine into compliance with the Supreme Court decision of Janice v AFSCME. This bill is about ensuring that public employees do not have to pay union dues if they do not wish to join the union. This is in accordance with the Supreme Court decision and I think it's a very straightforward bill and I hope that you will follow my light and vote this motion down.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Canaan, Representative Stetkis.

Representative **STETKIS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the previous speaker has said, it's a pretty straightforward bill. It simply brings Maine into constitutional compliance based on the U.S. Supreme Court's decision on Janice v the AFSCME in 2018. Their finding was requiring the payment of dues violates an individual's First Amendment rights by forcing a person to subsidize speech that was contrary to their personal beliefs. The Court determined that even the bargaining activities conducted by public sector unions constitutes political speech. As a result, the Court ruled that public sector workers could not be compelled to financially support a union.

In January, we all solemnly swore an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Maine. I believe it's incumbent upon us to pass this legislation and fulfill our oath by realigning Maine's labor laws to constitutionally supporting the First Amendment rights of Maine citizens when it comes to being forced to pay union dues in order to earn a living to provide for their families. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Sylvester.

Representative **SYLVESTER**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There are different kinds of Supreme Court cases and some cases, like the ones which declared that marriage is the law of the land for all peoples, is sweeping and includes all 50 states. In some cases, rule on specific cases on the matter of those cases. The Janice decision is one of those cases. And so, if a public employer wished to re-bargain the positions in their contracts regarding fair share, they may do so, as the State of Maine did with the Maine State Employees Association. Representative **GREENWOOD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to the pending motion.

To me, this bill is a simple bill. No one person, no one entity, should be able to pick and choose which laws they obey. We are a nation of laws, we are a nation of law and order. Whether it a political belief or even a political pressure, a municipality that knowingly and willingly breaks a federal law must be held accountable, just as any one of us in this chamber would be.

At what point did it become acceptable to not cooperate with our federal agencies, who are tasked with, most of all, public safety? We can all agree or disagree with our immigration laws as it is our right as a citizen. However, to disregard those laws purposefully to circumvent a lawful action of immigration authority or any other federal, state or local entity, is simply a crime by definition. Those municipalities who choose this path have to, again, like the rest of us, face the consequences for not abiding the law.

This bill would deem any local government ineligible to receive general purpose aid for local schools, municipal general assistance, and state municipal revenue sharing if that local government prohibits or restricts the exchange of information with federal immigration authorities or any other federal, state, or local entity regarding the immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of any individual or the maintenance of such information.

Our country has determined that knowing the legal status of an individual is the law. It need not be more complicated than this. This is not an anti-immigration bill. I hope you've all noticed that I'm speaking on a bill on its lawful merits about the rule of law and those who choose to ignore it. Let there not be two standards of what is legal and what is not. No one is above the law. I ask you to vote against the pending motion so, we can hear the bill on its merits. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Parry.

Representative **PARRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is my bill. The title doesn't tell you a whole lot about what it does so, I want to give you a brief explanation to help you make your judgement if you want to support it or not.

Growers of marijuana here in the State of Maine; and this has nothing to do with your feelings on marijuana, it has to do with what your feelings are on businesses. Back about, I don't know, whenever the recreational marijuana stores were allowed to open, I started getting calls from stores that could not get product because the growers have to collect the excise tax on their product before it can be shipped to the retailers. And there was a backlog getting these licenses processed through Maine Revenue. So, stores didn't have product to sell, customers didn't have product to buy, and the State wasn't collecting any tax on it. And that's largely cleared up, but the issue is half or so of the State's revenue that comes from marijuana is collected in an excise tax, the other half is collected in a sales tax.

This bill simply seeks to eliminate that excise tax. Take it out of the grower's hands, they can grow the marijuana, they can sell it to the stores, it will be collected at retail, at the time of the purchase. And what that does is it frees up these big marijuana companies got tons of money to do whatever they want. I'm familiar with one that leased a building two years in advance or so in Bangor because they wanted the spot and they had the money to do it, but the small operators don't. The excise tax ends up being an enormous cost in the inventory that they put up up front. So, by switching to sales tax, it's revenue neutral, it puts all the tax collected on the sales tax end of things, it takes that money or the inventory cost, makes it easier for everyone to do it this way. So, I think it helps the small growers. So, that's a brief explanation of what this bill does and I hope it's helpful. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Bickford.

Representative **BICKFORD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there were several of us legislators that were on the Marijuana Implementation Committee. That lasted for two full years. One of the major topics that we had was how to properly tax the marijuana product. We wanted an end result to equal about 20%. In order to do that, we'd put a 10% sales tax on the end of the product at the retail level and we put an excise tax on it based on the weight of the product. We did that much like we do currently with tobacco, with cigarettes, we do it with liquor, we even do it with wine. Why we don't want to do that

with marijuana just blows my mind. This has only started a few months ago. We've got to give this a chance to work, Mr. Speaker. We need to give this at least one year and then let's do a lookback. Form a new committee for it, if you need to, but we need to have a lookback to see what we did right and what we did wrong. But to just arbitrarily changing the rules in the middle — not even in the middle, it's in its infancy stage right now. It's just not something that I believe we should do and I urge you to follow my light and not support the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Windham, Representative Corey.

Representative **COREY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I didn't prepare to speak on this today. I also sat on the Marijuana Legalization Implementation Committee back in the 128th Legislature. I'm actually going to speak in favor of this bill and contradict my good friend from Auburn.

The problem with our current excise tax and the way it works is that it's based on, like we were talking about, weight, and there's a specific price for different parts of the marijuana plant. So, whether that's the flower, the trim, the seeds everything gets a different price. When we calculated the excise tax in that committee based on these weights, what we did is we looked at Colorado as a model and what Colorado does is they use something called an average market rate, right? So, in Maine Law, the way Maine Law works is that we can't, you know, continually, you know, re-average this because I think that we're the only people that have the ability to tax, we can't go and, you know, farm that out to some department to change that rate. So, what we did is we looked at a snapshot at the time of Colorado's average market rate for these parts and what Colorado does is they actually look at this once every, I think, three months, so, four times a year, they go and they create a new average market rate based on what's happening in the market itself. A straight sales tax is going to be way easier for the producers. We're guaranteed that it's going to be 20% because, you know, we don't know how the price of marijuana is going to fluctuate as we go through the market.

Again, to probably contradict my good friend from Auburn, when we talk about excise taxes on things like, you know, malt liquor or wine, alcohol, that all happens at the federal level. Marijuana is illegal at the federal level, so, it's not comparative to how we do things in the State with regard to excise taxes. My understanding is that the State doesn't actually have excise taxes on alcohol. So, you know, I'll encourage my colleagues to vote along with me and support the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Bickford.

Representative **BICKFORD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I oppose the pending motion for the very similar reason that I opposed the prior motion. The reason I'm opposing this one also is the municipalities already have a mechanism to make it costneutral to them. By making it cost-neutral, they are able to charge a license fee to the folks in the marijuana industry and by doing that they are able to not profit off it but they are able to charge enough to recoup their money, which is very much a reason why a city like Portland may be charging \$10,000 for a license but you might have a city in Auburn that could be charging \$1500 for a license. It depends on what it's going to cost the city, the municipality, to enforce and have the people in place to protect others. I urge you to vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Berwick, Representative Roberts.

Representative **ROBERTS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Fellow Members of the House, I rise today to speak in support of LD 1195, "An Act To Increase Funding to Qualifying Municipalities by Sharing Adult Use Marijuana Sales and Excise Tax Revenue".

This measure allows municipalities to offset costs associated with Maine growing adult use marijuana industry by allocating 5% of gross sales and excise tax revenue generated by adult use marijuana to the municipalities where the revenue is generated.

In the development of Maine's adult use marijuana industry, the State asked to work with municipalities to balance the costs associated with this new endeavor. However, municipalities are not yet seeing a return on their investment. With revenue sharing at its current rate, we are not receiving the amount of revenue that was originally anticipated in the adult use program. Additionally, municipalities are becoming increasingly upset by the costs associated with opting in to the program without seeing the returns they thought they would in coordination with the State.

This measure does not create a new tax but instead proposed a share of tax proceeds that will help generate increased state revenue. Overall, this bill removes the budgeting uncertainty for municipalities and encourages partnerships with local businesses. There will always be amendments to our adult use marijuana laws as we collectively learn more about the industry. This is the second session in a row now that I have heard let's give it another year. Municipalities should not have to wait any longer to see the benefits of this program or be left in the dark.

Mr. Speaker, I know that everyone in this chamber cares deeply about their respective municipalities and their ability to best serve their residents. This measure proposes a small percentage of revenue which affords incentives to municipalities without breaking the bank. While revenue is low, this is our chance to make things right and give communities incentives to opt in. We should maximize our potential now and give communities the incentive to opt in.

I ask you, Mr. Speaker, and our Fellow Members of the House, to join me in supporting this measure. Thank you for your consideration.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Pittston, Representative Hanley.

Representative **HANLEY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to the pending motion.

As my good colleague from Auburn mentioned a moment ago, under the Marijuana Legalization program, any town or city that opts in can collect any fees necessary for the implementation of that program in their town or city. It also should be remembered that this is an opt-in situation. Only towns or cities that made an actual point of opting in to recreational marijuana had that so-called burden. So, they have selected to have the burden in their district. But they also have a mechanism to protect themselves from any financial liability.

I ask you to follow my vote and defeat the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative PErry.

Representative **PERRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is also a bill of mine, so, I thought I'd tell you just a little bit about it.

When I originally put this bill in, I had served on the Bangor City Council and we spent tens of thousands of dollars preparing for the implementation of recreational marijuana within the City of Bangor and I looked at this bill as a way to recoup some of those costs that the city invested in, potential ongoing costs for housing these businesses. And my view on the subject has changed since I sponsored this bill because what I found is in the City of Bangor, as we had hoped, having recreational adult use marijuana in the stores cleaned up so many of the problems that we have had with marijuana in the city. There is no additional cost to us in the City of Bangor. It has really made things so much better having these stores and I think a lot of municipalities are hesitant to move forward in allowing these stores in their town and I think if we give them some encouragement to consider allowing these stores in their municipalities and get a little bit extra out of it, they may take that next step, and I think it will go a long ways towards helping the situations in other towns throughout the State and maximize the revenue that's coming to the State of Maine rather than staying on the streets.

So, that's the rationale behind this bill. I think it will really go a long ways to helping all of our communities and I hope it gets your support. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Oxford, Representative Dillingham.

Representative **DILLINGHAM**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I guess I have a question to pose to the Chair. I think I'm slightly confused. I know that I've heard Members already reference that the individual municipalities have the ability to account for any costs that they feel they are going to incur through their licensing fee but, also, I believe that this Body has debated and passed the 5% on revenue sharing. So, I am looking to somebody to answer wouldn't these municipalities receive additional monies from the sale of the marijuana within their municipalities that goes into state revenue through revenue sharing?

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Oxford, Representative Dillingham has posed a question to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Perry.

Representative **PERRY**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you for asking that question because I forgot to address that when I spoke a moment ago.

In the City of Bangor, we collect I think it's a \$400 license fee for anyone who wants to have a recreational adult use marijuana store in Bangor and that is designed to offset the cost to the city through the licensing and what the city has to do to get you up and running. I believe it's Portland collects \$10,000, okay? So, they're going beyond their cost and they're grabbing some revenue there, which has made it harder on small independent Mainers who want to be in the business.

So, I'd like to take away that incentive for high licensing fees because right now that's the only way a municipality gets any cut of it. Yes, there will be additional sales tax revenue to the State of Maine, that will go out through the regular revenue sharing at we'll get to 5% soon enough and everyone will benefit from this, but this gives a little extra share of the marijuana revenue to the communities that house these stores, which I think will help us achieve maximum revenue for this industry to the State versus on the streets. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Bickford.

Representative **BICKFORD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I agree with my good friend, the Representative from Oxford, that we do have revenue sharing and this Body has voted to put revenue sharing back to its original 5%, which I think is outstanding. We don't need an additional 5% for municipalities to sell recreational marijuana. If they choose to do that, that's what they choose to do. It's not our role as legislators to encourage municipalities to have liquor stores or tobacco shops or marijuana stores. It's not up to us. It's not up to the Legislature to decide that we want to reward municipalities for having an adult club. That is not our role.

Mr. Speaker, my good friend from Pittston made a comment that all municipalities have the ability to opt in. When prohibition ended, all municipalities had the opportunity to opt in. They all chose to opt in. They did not get rewarded for that. There's not a municipality in this State that gets rewarded for having a liquor store. And, with that, I just want to say, oh, I lost it. I'm good. I'm sorry. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Freeport, Representative Sachs.

Representative **SACHS**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to said motion this evening on three reasons. Number one is on purpose of the policy, that this policy, unfortunately, takes away revenue sharing from all of us and I feel like revenue sharing is one of those policies that lifts all boats for all municipalities.

Number two, this was brought forward for the purpose of assisting those municipalities who have opted in. Many of our communities decide to engage in economic development opportunities that do not get said return from the State in the form of municipal revenue sharing despite the many years and multiples of thousands of dollars that it costs our municipalities. However, it's something that we have chosen to do.

And, finally, the third reason I oppose this bill, unfortunately, is due to perpetuity. There is no sunset on this bill. So, those that brought it forward for the purpose of recouping sunk costs have now 20 years, even, to continue to realize said gain.

So, for policy purpose and perpetuity reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge you to follow my light and reject this bill. Thank you so much.

Representative **RUDNICKI**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, sorry. I'm sure, like myself, you either have family or friends that are seasonal campers. That's what this is about, and it's about campers that are workers. Many use these as seasonal second homes.

Seasonal campers seem to be taxed and taxed. Seasonal campers must pay the sales tax when they buy their campers, they also pay excise tax and registration fees every year. When someone then takes the camper and puts it on a seasonal lot at a campground, they now are required to pay lodging tax at the same camper as they paid sales tax on and excise tax for.

We must also not forget that the landowner is paying property tax on this very land. That means that the land is actually being taxed twice; the landowner and the seasonal camper. The campgrounds pay a higher property tax because they are taxed on the amenities that they provide; shore frontage, pools, buildings, playgrounds, and sites available. Seasonal sites allow many who are not in the financial position to buy land and erect a camp that costs hundreds of thousands of dollars. Seasonal sites allow many to get out and enjoy the wildlife firsthand, from hiking, fishing, birdwatching, and many other outdoor recreations. We don't charge people that rent an apartment lodging tax, we don't charge camp owners lodging tax: why should we charge seasonal campers that technically use these campers as a second home? We should treat our long-term lodging just like we do a camp. I know it doesn't sound like a lot of money to individuals for the seasonal camp, but it does support local businesses. It can mean the difference between camping or staying home or even getting a job in another area than staying home.

During this time of uncertainty with a worldwide pandemic, this would bring true tax relief to the very people that can really use it. Camping is truly a great way to get outdoors, allowing social distancing, keeping the family safe. Follow the science.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would advise Members that it is very difficult to hear members with a lot of side conversations happening amongst the Members. If you would like to have a conversation, please take it behind the glass or take it in the hallway, but we are trying to hear the debate that is occurring on the floor. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Weld, Representative Skolfield.

Representative **SKOLFIELD**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise once again to oppose this motion.

As I've said before, when you check in to a hotel or a motel, you're renting the roof, the walls, the floor, the restroom, the bed, the sheets on the bed, the pillow, the pillowcase, the carpet. When you go to a campground, you are bringing your equipment, you are bringing your roof, your walls, your floor. You have a carpet, it's your carpet. The same material that you purchased, that you paid a sales tax on, as Representative Rudnicki just made the statement. You also have registered that vehicle if it's a motorhome or if it's a popup camper or anything in between. If it's a slide-in that's slid into the back of your pickup truck, that is yours. You have registered it, you have paid for it, you've paid the sales tax. It is yours.

And if you're a Maine person, you may have sacrificed quite a bit to have been able to acquire that equipment, that mobile campsite that you now have. For the State of Maine to say that we want 9% sales tax for you to stay in your equipment, to stay under your roof, to sleep in your own bed; to me, is a little bit over the top. I understand it if it's a motel. I understand it because we get a lot of folks who come here from elsewhere and we need that revenue and it's really kind of nice that we have them bring it to us. But camping is something that's traditional to Maine, it really hurts the Mainer more than it does the nonresident and so, I oppose this measure. Thank you.

I am pleased to submit this report in accordance with the Petroleum Market Share Act ("PMSA"), 10 M.R.S. § 1677. The PMSA requires the Attorney General to make a report to the Legislature describing the concentration of retail outlets in the State, including a recommendation as to whether additional legislation is needed to further limit or curtail the activity of refiners operating retail outlets.

Enclosed is a report describing concentration of retail outlets in the State. The report, which is based on data collected from wholesalers of both motor fuel oil and home heating oil, includes maps depicting relative concentration in designated markets throughout the State. This report is also available on the Attorney General's website at: https://www.maine.gov/ag/docs/Bi-annual%20PMSA%20Report%202019-20.pdf

Since no refiners of petroleum products operate retail outlets in this State, we recommend no legislation to limit or curtail such operations.
