This bill seeks to amend a narrow component within what's become known as L.D. 1711 from last session that made changes to the energy billing and distributed generation program within our state. The PUC, at the hearing on the bill, testified in a neither for nor against position, which is fairly difficult for that organization although they did say within their testimony that they do support the provisions within this bill specifically dealing with the ability for them to go through a more typical procurement process with regard to distributive generation projects. What they have seen,

particularly with solar projects over the last year or so, has been an increase of cost substantially beyond what they would have seen at a more grid scale in a typical R fee or procurement process, if they had undergone for larger grid scale level projects in the hundreds of megawatts range. When you zero in on these smaller projects that are under five megawatts the costs have ballooned from what you could have seen in the four or five cents a kilowatt hour to up to seventeen cents per kilowatt hour and, as I mentioned yesterday when we had a similar floor debate on this similar issue, that cost gets shifted to the ratepayer. So, this is a narrow bill that deals with one component of the changes that were made last year that have been proven to be incredibly harmful to the ratepayers and has, essentially, tied the hands of the PUC. They can delay but they can't essentially reject these proposals that are coming in and so this bill would seek to amend that process so that we can get a better handle on how much, and at what price, we're going to be procuring energy from distributive generation projects and, ultimately, how much will eventually get passed on to the ratepayer as well. So, with that, I would encourage you to reject the pending motion and, Mr. President, I would ask for a roll call. Thank you. On motion by Senator **STEWART** of Aroostook, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lawrence.

Senator **LAWRENCE:** Thank you, Mr. President. With all due respect to my good colleague from Aroostook, one of the great aspects of the distributive generation in solar energy market, a bill we passed last year, allows these distributive generation projects to pass cost savings onto ratepayers who sign up with the distributive generation projects and that's because the DG projects directly bill the customer rather than having CMP or Versant bill the customer and split out the cost. So, if the distributive generator can find ways to cut costs and find ways to do things under market, they can pass it along to the consumer, to the ratepayer, and that is one of the great aspects of this solar bill we passed. So, I'm asking you to go with the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report to keep in place what we passed with 17 - 11 last Legislature and keep these savings going on to customers and to allow them to get low cost renewable energy. Thank you.

Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, as we start to get a handle on our current pandemic after just about 18 months through the miracle of our DNA sequencing that we had today and the rapid development of vaccines, I find myself thinking back on the epidemic that has vexed our community and communities around the world for most of my entire life. In 1981, an unusual cluster of Pneumocystis pneumonia was identified in a group of otherwise healthy young gay men in Los Angeles. It took 18 months more for public health officials to figure out that this wasn't just happening among gay men but instead also happening among hemophilia, IV drug users, immigrants who were heterosexual from other countries as they were all falling ill to these opportunistic infectious diseases. It wasn't until two years later that there was a determination that it was the HIV virus that was even causing these infections and it was six years before the first treatment, AZT, was identified in 1987. Imagine if our current pandemic had gone on for so long. The leap forward didn't happen until 2012, 31 years after that cluster in Los Angeles and that was the approval of preexposure prophylaxis, a regime that can help folks at risk for HIV from ever getting sick. But make no mistake, this isn't a vaccine. You have to take this medicine every day. Today, 40 years later, eradicating HIV may be possible but only if we ensure that there are no barriers to accessing the medicine and so what this bill does is to tear down every barrier we know how to tear down as a state to ensure that pharmacists can be your first point of entry to be beginning to take this preexposure prophylaxis medicine, that pharmacists can be your point of entry to taking postexposure prophylaxis so that you do not get sick with HIV, and to ensuring that your insurance company will cover your preexposure prophylaxis medicine and the bloodwork that is associated with the need of that medication. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I find it terrifying that this epidemic has gone on for 40 years and I hope that in the near future we can eradicate it entirely. Like all public health measures, the way that we do that is together, by ensuring that everyone has access to the healthcare that they need. I'm really proud to present this bill to the Senate today and I urge you to support the report. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Stewart.

Senator **STEWART:** Thank you very much, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, you'll note that there are two Ought to Pass reports on this bill and that the opposition to the pending motion doesn't come from any of the points that the good Senator from Cumberland raised in her remarks. Certainly, our side feels just as passionately about the significance of HIV as a disease, the impact it has had on Americans and the world. You know, that said, President Trump, during his tenure, made substantial moves to increase access to these sort of drugs, these PrEP drugs, at the federal level and so, in large part, the mandate that is the difference here between these two reports, and is the only difference, are largely not needed. If you need access to any of these PrEP drugs your insurance company will have to provide you with that access and we have no issue with approaching a pharmacist as a point of entry, as the good Senator from Cumberland mentioned. That's all fine. The difference is that this bill proposes a mandate onto the insurance companies that will have the effect of, once again, increasing the rates for everybody else. It's not necessary in order to accomplish the goals that we want to accomplish going forward, particularly with eradication of HIV, and that is the basis for the opposition between the Majority and the Minority Report. With that, I would request that we vote down this motion and move on to a different report that does not include a mandate that will increase the cost of drugs for everybody else. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Hickman.

Senator **HICKMAN:** Thank you, Mr. President. As a former public health professional, I have spent my entire adult life, yes, I'm older than I look, working to eradicate HIV from our communities. Back when I lived in Boston, I laid down in the street to block traffic as a member of the organization Act Up after burying 34 friends in the first six months of 1994. We have come a long way. So, today I guess it's serendipitous that I could proudly vote for this bill on the floor of the Maine Senate in the hopes that we will eradicate HIV from the planet in my lifetime. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Sanborn.

Senator **SANBORN:** Thank you, Mr. President. I just wanted to rise briefly to explain why I think that the mandate that is included in the Majority Report is so critical for us to pass. I mentioned that there's no vaccine yet for HIV and, sadly, that's true. But what we do know is in the pipeline is an injectable long-acting preexposure prophylaxis medicine. So, rather than requiring a daily compliance with a pill, we know that the FDA is on track to approve a long-acting injectable. That is the key to eradicating HIV and that is the mandate included in this bill. Insurance companies will have to include coverage for an injectable when an injectable exists and that's the key, that's the thing that's going to get us over the hump to truly eradicating HIV. It is a necessary mandate. It will reduce barriers and it will save lives. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Majority Ought to Pass as Amended by Committee Amendment "A" (S-239) Report. Is the Senate ready for the question?

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Bennett.

Senator **BENNETT:** Thank you, Mr. President. I rise to speak on item 7-15 if that is appropriate at this time.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator may proceed.

Senator **BENNETT:** Thank you, Mr. President. The other day we debated this bill and the item that's listed as 7-22, both divestment bills directing Maine PERS to act in a certain way with respect to certain investments held there. I believe that some of the debate that was offered, frankly, stretched the truth a bit and so I wanted to speak on this again. I've heard, like many of you, from a large number of constituents and stakeholders who've been led to believe that these bills actually do something that they don't do. The titles of these bills are simply false. I sympathize with the goals of these bills but I think it's very unfortunate that we would pass the political responsibility for dealing with the veracity of these measures onto the Maine PERS Board and simply walk away from our responsibilities to enact faithful, honest legislation. I took the time yesterday to correspond with the Executive Director of Maine PERS, Sandy Matheson, who has served faithfully in the office for many years. In my private sector work I've had a chance to work with Sandy in my work in corporate governance and social responsibility. I actually volunteered my time when I was not a Senator to help set up the ESG Task Force which has brought together a lot of the information that Maine PERS is now using to invigorate its social responsibility program there, and they're doing great work and they're very well intentioned. Sandy is going to be retiring soon and I just want to take this opportunity in passing to say thank you, Sandy, for your service and thank you for doing such great work, always faithful to the public purpose for the people of Maine. I asked her three questions in writing and she gave me three answers, and I want it to be abundantly clear to those of us in the Senate what we are actually voting for and what we're not voting for so that we take the responsibility for the lack of honesty imbedded in these two bills. The first question I asked is: what is the assessment of Maine PERS on the statutory authority that L.D.s 99 and 319 will assert with respect to Article 9, Section 18 of the Maine Constitution, which I quoted yesterday?

THE PRESIDENT: Senator Bennett, would you address your comments to the Chair and try not to impugn anyone's integrity on what was actually in a bill or not.

Senator **BENNETT**: Mr. President, I will do that. I've always tried to be faithful to that and I am just simply recognizing the title of the bill and I'll present information that the title of the bill does not do what is promised.

THE PRESIDENT: Just, for the record, when you bring up someone lying that certainly seems to impugn the character of someone in the Chamber.

Senator **BENNETT**: I apologize to anybody that may have taken it that way. That was not my intent. I am talking about the bill, not the motivations or intentions of any member of the Chamber.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator may proceed.

Senator **BENNETT**: Thank you. I asked again the question: what is the assessment of Maine PERS on the statutory authority that L.D.s 99 and 319 will assert with respect to Article 9, Section 18 of the Maine Constitution. Can the Legislature assert investment mandates on Maine PERS? Her answer: and I quote, 'The Legislature cannot assert investment mandates on Maine PERS under the Constitution. That is why L.D. 99 and 319 included fiduciary exceptions.' Second question: do L.D.s 99 and 319, if enacted in their current form as engrossed, require Maine PERS to divest of any assets? The answer: 'Under the Maine Constitution,' she writes, 'Maine PERS cannot be required to divest. Maine PERS may divest when it is in the best financial interest of its members.' Final question: I said, if not, to the previous question, what other prospects for divestment of assets relating to fossil fuels and for-profits prisons under the exercise of the fiduciary duties of Maine PERS as they currently exist? The answer: 'Wholesale divestment will not occur because the Constitution requires acting in the best financial interest of members. Divesting categorically, such as contained in L.D.s 99 and 319, that is fossil fuels or prisons, does not allow for financial analysis.' She continues: 'What many people do not appreciate is that most Maine PERS investments that have a fossil fuel component are primarily composed of non-fossil fuel investments. Divesting, therefore, would create a situation where Maine PERS would be selling unrelated profitable investment components, including renewable energy, at a loss. This would not make sense and would not be consistent with fiduciary duty nor would it meet the spirit of L.D. 99. Our investments in private prison,' she continues, 'fall far below diminutive at less than \$250,000 or .000014 of our \$17.7 billion portfolio.' This bill represents a sadly political response to a need being expressed by stakeholders that says that Legislators can pass a bill which says Maine PERS shall divest while also trying to have it both ways in saying that subject to their fiduciary duties. We, of course, have in our power to pass any statute we want. We can say that this bill is a divestment bill, but it is not a divestment bill and I want to alleviate the burden on the Board of Directors of Maine PERS to have to answer the question from stakeholders about why they did not divest when they were told to. Thank you, Mr. President. I ask for the yeas and nays.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland can pose her question.

Senator **BREEN**: Mr. President, can you tell me how many times a bill title has remained the same as when the bill was submitted but the bill language changed in the committee process before it landed in the Chamber for a final vote?

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Breen, has posed a question I believe to the Chair and maybe anyone else, but in this Senator's experience that has changed an awful lot. I would say very frequently. I think to some people's chagrin, bills that they've actually brought into committee actually ended up doing the exact opposite of what the bill was intended for and what the title said. The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Vitelli.

Senator **VITELLI**: Thank you, Mr. President. I rise not to discuss the title of these bills but rather to just report on what I heard Sandy Matheson say when she addressed us in our caucus the other day which is that, in fact, the Maine PERS is already going in the direction of divesting, if you will, from fossil fuel companies in their investment portfolio and she felt comfortable that as long as the fiduciary language which is in the bill, both bills, remains there that she can fulfill her duties and preserve the assets of all the people of Maine who rely on that fund for their retirement. THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Stewart.

Senator **STEWART:** Thank you, Mr. President. I apologize. I had my button pressed. I'm standing in opposition to the pending motion today. This bill is my bill. I sponsored L.D. 1650 which is An Act to Create a Small Business Capital Savings Account Program. So, a little bit about what this bill does. The idea here is that in the staple industries of farming, fishing, and forestry there are what we commonly refer to as good years and bad years, like there are with any business, but in those good years of these small businesses were able to retain the earnings that they had, roll them into the following subsequent years, without paying taxes on them then. They would then be able to utilize those funds to later purchase capital equipment in order to strengthen the likelihood of the business surviving through those tougher

times. In talking with a number of stakeholders on this bill, I've actually worked on this issue for about three years at this point and have had many, many, many stakeholder conversations with folks in those key industries as well as within different positions in state government. We narrowed the scope of the bill substantially. The bill now would only apply to 30 businesses throughout Maine, ten within each of those staple industries of farming, fishing, forestry. In everybody's district here you've got at least one of those key industries, I would bet dollars to donuts on. So, if the narrowness of the bill isn't enough for you, there's also a sunset provision baked in and this program will sunset a couple years after it has begun. Really the point here is to be able to gather data on what small businesses in Maine, particularly in our staple industries that are the backbone of our economy and our GDP, what sort of tax system is most beneficial to those businesses so they continue to make jobs, employ our constituents, and put food on the table of the folks that we represent. With that, I would request that there be a roll call and I would request that pending motion be rejected. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator **STEWART** of Aroostook requested a Roll Call.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Libby.

Senator **LIBBY:** Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I rise in support of the pending motion and the Ought Not to Pass Report for this bill. I certainly appreciate the interest of the sponsor in trying to address concerns of some of our heritage industries that do struggle to stay afloat in low times in our economy. However, I just note three areas where the Senate might consider this solution as divided as problematic. One is a policy concern. One is a practical concern. One is a fairness concern. The policy concern is that Maine has spent quite a bit of time and effort in the last several years to develop tax incentives to help businesses invest in capital equipment. A few years ago, to match changes at the federal level, Maine devised the Maine Capital Investment Credit, a fairly easy credit for any business in Maine to use, to be able to realize some tax benefit for making investments in their capital equipment that flows from the federal bonus depreciation system so it's very seamless. It's easy for businesses to use. It's easy for accountants to track. So, in that sense, from a policy perspective, I don't really know what else this program is bringing to the table. From a practical concern, we heard that Maine Revenue Services, that has weighed in on this bill in the past and has done so presently, in creating a program like this there would be a mismatch with the federal tax code. These set-asides would be State tax free but they would still be taxable at the federal level and, basically, the MRS and DAFS implied to us what good accountant would recommend a business use this new program with that mismatch. It creates quite an administrative nightmare for them. Then the final concern I'd note is that of fairness. As the Senator from Aroostook noted, this program would be offered to 30 businesses in a state of, I think, well over 20,000 businesses, so you can imagine the folks that might get entered into this program are the most well-connected, those with ties to this building, because they're likely the only businesses that are going to be aware we're even taking this action to establish such a program. So, I do think there's a fairness issue there as well. For those reasons, I'd ask that we

oppose the pending motion - support the pending motion and oppose the bill. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Sanborn.

Senator **SANBORN:** Thank you, Mr. President. I rise only briefly to note that the program's goal of the Maine Capital Investment Credit is to encourage businesses to expedite purchases of qualifying business property in Maine. This bill incentivizes businesses to postpone purchases of qualified business property in Maine and so we would be enacting a tax program for 30 businesses that is directly at odds with another program that's meant to incentivize capital expenditures. To just respond to my good friend from Aroostook's comment about good years and bad years, the Maine Capital Investment Credit allows you to carry forward your credits and so you're able to take them against your good years in the future after you've bought that good equipment to make sure you have a good year in the future. Thank you, Mr. President.

While I'm up, I will address just a couple of points that have been made. At the public hearing there was no opposition to this bill. Subsequently, DAFS did come forward with some concerns which we feel, as did the stakeholders in support of this bill, namely those representing those key industries, that they have been addressed. In the end, I'd like to remind this Body that some of those points which the good Senator from Androscoggin brought up, particularly in the latter, that it's a small program. Specifically, it's a small program because it's a pilot in order to determine some of those other questions he had raised previously and this was the only way that we felt as though we could actually move it forward, that we limited the scope and the duration of the program purely to get some more information and so, in trying to make everybody happy on this one, you know, we've ended up where we are now, with the limited nature of it. Certainly not intended to be favoring any one business or put claim on any sort of political nepotistic games in that regards. So, I want to make sure that that is on the record, as certainly not a goal of this program if it were to be enacted. Thank you.

Senator **CLAXTON:** Thank you, Mr. President. All of us have had challenging bills to address in committee and also in the Chamber and I want to start by recognizing that this bill originated from the concerns of parents who felt that they were, that their children with intellectual and developmental disabilities or autism were not getting access to the kind of support they needed. So, this came from a place of a big heart and in many ways is hard not to support. The issue that influenced most of us to vote against this were several, but before that I want to review how complicated the course was in the committee. We voted on the first consideration of this bill to pass the bill 7 - 6. At some point

over the next week or two several people approached me about whether reconsideration might be possible or whether they should just change their vote on the Floor. I told them both were actions and they asked if we would reconsider. That same day we reconsidered two bills, one from a Democrat and one from a Republican. This was one of the bills that we reconsidered. On reconsideration the Ought Not to Pass vote was nine and the Ought to Pass as Amended was four, flipping the bill on the vote. The reason most of us on the Majority side landed on Ought Not to Pass was that this bill puts into law a pretty inflexible standard for accessing people in nursing homes, group homes, and in the hospital that may not be applicable to the next public health emergency or the one after that or the particular circumstances of the community in which these folks were living at the time with their disabilities. That lack of flexibility was what led to hospitals systems oppose this bill because it took away some of their flexibility to assure safe visitation and removed their clinical and administrative options for protecting their other patients. It also created the very awkward circumstance that our laws might not match federal laws and that these facilities would need to be choosing between compliance with federal regulations or state regulations and that was another reason. The final piece was that there was some concerns about how access was defined and was it spontaneous, was it scheduled, was it in-person, or was it video. So, again, there were technical issues that made this bill hard to support. The underlying humanity of it, though, made it easier to support and the outcome was that this is not good law. It's good intent and for that reason we voted Ought Not to Pass.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Bennett.

Senator **BENNETT:** Thank you, Madame President. This bill before us creates the Maine Forest Advisory Board to advise the Department of Agriculture, Conservation, and Forestry and the Bureau of Forestry. The board will consist of 18 individuals, each having a unique interest in how Maine maintains our forests. The board will be tasked with advising the Bureau on conditions and trends in the forest, facilitating dialogue among diverse interests, and promoting cooperation among state agencies, among other duties. On another bill relating to our forest more than 50 years ago Senator Horace Hildreth of Cumberland on June 13, 1967 spoke this here in this Chamber. He said, 'You must realize that within four hours drive from here live nearly 40 million people who each year have more and more spare time, who each year are earning more and more money, and who each year are looking for places to go, and where are they going to go? If they're interested in the outdoors, they're going to be interested in coming to Maine. Don't you think it would make some sense for the state of Maine for once to look ahead to what our problem is going to be and try and do something about it.' I have to say that engaging in ongoing dialogue about one of Maine's most critical and important assets is proactive, it's prudent, and it's practical. I believe the formation of this board will allow for a better means of mediating issues relating to the Maine forests, which I hope results in fewer issues coming here before the Legislature. In my career as a businessman and in my service as a legislator, I've always found that promoting dialogue and finding common ground is the best way to solve problems. Too often, when the issues reach the level of the Legislature, differences become battle lines and resolution becomes difficult. Forestry advisory boards like this one proposed work well in 15 other states. I believe the creation of this board in Maine will help foster conversation and compromise where possible. I encourage you to vote for the pending motion.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Jackson.

Senator **JACKSON:** Thank you, Madame President. I've got to say, Senator Bennett keeps me guessing but I am very, very pleased to stand up behind him in what he so eloquently put my thoughts in much better words. You know, this is an interesting issue right here for me. You know, the Representative O'Neil from the House actually has this bill and brought it forward and after all the time that I spent here in the Legislature I never really considered this and I was actually really pleased that she brought it forward and, the truth be told, I, you know, did make some suggestions of people that I thought would be good on it. But the idea really means a lot to me. You know, I think what Senator Bennett just said is exactly the point. You know, we have Inland, Fisheries, and Wildlife Advisory Council, you have Marine Resources Advisory Council, you have an HIV Advisory Council. We have all these councils that are, I believe, I mean I've watched many of these councils bring forward issues that are important for the people that was affected and to not have a Forestry Advisory Council is really dumbfounding to me that we don't do that. I mean, it's just shocking to me that I missed it, you know, for all the things that I've had to deal with in the Legislature on this issue and I think back, you know, Senator Bennett talked about, you know, 50 years ago. I think back to former-Representative Senator Doug Smith in Piscataquis County, who was down here during the enactment of the major fight for what we commonly refer to as the 14 day rule. The 14 day rule, loggers

are paid on a pre-weight basis and consistently, you know, wood sits for months, sometimes years, and dries out and, because of that, loggers fought down in these halls, before my time, to have the State enact a program that said that within 14 days you could ask for a scale from the State scaler and get paid. You know, when I served on the Ag Committee we asked the ACF Committee, you know, how often is that used? It hasn't been used for at least the last 4 years and you know why, because people are afraid to put a target on their back. Another bill that we heard from the committee, many of the members are in here that serve with me on the ACF Committee, brought forward was a bill and it was so insane that it even had to be asked for, but if you were a logging contractor and you asked what you were being paid to cut or haul lumber in the state of Maine that the landowner had to tell you what you were going to get paid. Now what kind of foolishness is that? Seriously, that you couldn't find out what you were actually getting paid to work for. I know many of the committee members at that time, ACF Committee, were floored by even the suggestion that something like that happens and, by gosh, landowners came down, all kinds of them. I remember being out in the hall with seven or eight of them around me, telling me how this was the end of the world and all that. In that committee, Republicans and Democrats actually voted unanimously to support that bill because how could you not and, as great as my relationship was with the former Governor, he actually let that bill go into effect without signing it. You know how many people used that law since we enacted it, even though it was asked for by many people, asked for by some of the logging community that frequently tell us today? Zero, because no one will put a target on their back. This session, right here, this Legislature passed Cabotage bill, and I had to go so far as to chase contractors, Canadian contractors, into the woods and videotape them and then I was made to feel like I shouldn't bring those videos to committee, but I had to show the Department and the committee what was actually happening in the North Maine woods and still the Department does not want to look at that issue. Another favorite of mine and the committees that I represent, H-2A logging. They say they've got to have them. Got to have them but, you know, that we have got confirmation from immigration, Homeland Security, that there's only two states in the entire nation that uses H-2A workers in the logging industry: Maine and Mississippi. Mississippi has two H-2A workers cutting wood with filibusters. That's the only two states but in Maine, for some reason, not only do we have to have H-2A workers but we have to allow them to break the law, the federal law, the Cabotage, going back and forth across the border and so on this issue right here, this week, coming down is an issue, to me, that seems so simple, just an advisory council, that doesn't really have any authority but can go forward and make issues come out in the light and people that don't actually log for a living, that maybe could be representing those people, could come forward and bring those issues out so that they put the target on their back for the loggers. You know, that is what we're talking about here, just having an open dialogue about issues that are happening, not times when people come down here and fight for a law and then go back home and are afraid to use it. Having just an open dialogue about what's happening, things like the 14 day rule, things like not being able to find out what you're getting paid, things like having Canadian trucks take their jobs even though it's a violation of federal law, and the state government not being able to do anything about it. And, I got to tell you, the thing that really gets me going about this is that organizations that came forward

in this hearing and spoke in opposition to this bill because they didn't want anyone to actually talk about these issues because they feel that they're the gatekeepers in this issue and only they can actually talk about these issues. Anyone else coming forward with these issues is not part of their club. That really bothers me, you know, because when I got, and I know that all of you got these emails, they sent them out to all their members this week. I got a great big list, huge list. I'll bet you I'm the one in here that has the most of these members out here telling me not to support this simply advisory council bill because it's not what they want. It's an attempt for other people to bring forward issues that they're not bringing forward. None of these issues that they ever fight for but they don't want anyone else to bring them forward. This list of contractors on it is all kinds of people that are out of Canada. So, I'm actually supposed to not support a bill for Maine loggers, to let Maine loggers have a voice, because Canadian loggers and some of these organizations don't want anyone else to have an opportunity to speak about what's going on in their state government. That, right there, sickens me about government altogether. We can't even have a place where just an opinion is brought forward because it's not somebody else's opinion. That, to me, ladies and gentlemen, is just insane. I mean it's just an advisory council. We have all kinds of them. But I think it's important that other people that aren't on the inside get a chance to express their views too and that's why a bill that's not mine, but I think is a great idea, I'm so passionate about because I always think, I mean I say it in here, I encourage debate in here. Even though I don't agree with some of the issues, I still encourage people to talk about it. But we're not willing to do that because a couple organizations feel that they're on the inside right and nobody else should join it.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Hickman.

Senator **HICKMAN:** Thank you, Madame President. Madame President, men and women of the Senate, I rise in support of the pending motion. This bill strikes me as commonsense. Imagine that, a commonsense approach to solving sometimes contentious issues. In my six years serving on the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation, and Forestry, four of them as House Chair, we found ourselves faced with numerous issues ranging from sustainable harvest levels on public lands, to harvesting in the shoreland zone, to forestry practices, including the application of herbicides in commercial forestry. Most of these issues saw opponents squaring off over very different points of view, sometimes with civility and sometimes not. This organic farmer received a great education on matters of forestry but I believe there is a better way to address these complicated, important, and controversial issues. Establishing a Maine Forest Advisory Board would create a forum for those many perspectives to be heard in the open, to look at the forest as whole, and to find solutions that serve the common good. Maine is the most forested state in the nation. Our vast forests support not only a \$8.5 billion forest products industry but also more than half of the largest globally important bird area in the United States. It's cold waters support the last stronghold of wild native brook trout in the nation and if we expect to leave these great assets to future generations we must take steps now to ensure their long-term health. Today, as we live with the impact of climate change, we understand more fully than ever before the importance of our forests to our own survival. Maine's forests absorb 60% of our

annual greenhouse gas emissions. They absorb carbon pollution and return it to us, giving lifegiving oxygen. We must ensure their sustainability for it is inexorably linked to ours. I think we might all be wise to heed the advice from the great Wendell Berry who wrote: 'The care of our earth is our most ancient and most worthy and, after all, our most pleasing responsibility. To cherish what remains of it and to foster its renewal is our only hope.' We can do that by bringing together ecologists and loggers, land conservationists and commercial foresters, wildlife biologists and indigenous people with traditional knowledge. We can charge them with assessing the full picture of all the conditions and trends in the forest and with contributing their expertise and perspective to the development of policy that works for all Mainers, for the forest, and for the wildlife that depends upon it. So, as we go away this evening, Madame President, let us go away with the knowledge that we came together tonight to value Maine's forest for all they do. Let us draw on common knowledge of Mainers from all walks of life in ensuring that our forests remain healthy, vibrant, whole ecosystems long into the future. I humbly ask you to join me in supporting the pending motion. Thank you, Madame President.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Minority Ought to Pass as Amended Report. Is the Senate ready for the question?

On motion by Senator **POULIOT** of Kennebec, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Baldacci.

Senator **BALDACCI:** Thank you, Madame President. I rise in support. This was through the State and Local Government Committee. I just want to offer a few remarks on this bill. L.D. 1411 is about both economic commonsense and economic patriotism, which are two important ideas that are at play here. We look out for our own, like any family or community or neighborhood would, and second, and more importantly, any economically successful nation in today's world has to have a strong manufacturing base and skilled manufacturing workers, not only for economic reasons but, even more importantly, for reasons for national security and defense. The importance of passing this bill will put us in line with many other states and with the federal government, which has had this type of law on the books since 1932. It would give preference to Maine contractors in the awarding of bids and, even more importantly, in some cases it would require contractors - contracts to purchase American manufactured goods, and there are specific definitions in the statute regarding the percentage of domestic content. But if we're serious about saving and protecting American jobs and about standing up for Maine workers then I ask you to join me in supporting this bill. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Farrin.

Senator **FARRIN:** Thank you, Madame Chair. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I rise this evening in opposition to L.D. 1411. While the intention of this bill is admirable, the ability to comply with the conditions of both Buy America and Build Maine are complicated and unclear. This is why Maine DOT, the Bureau of General Services, and the Maine Turnpike Authority opposed this legislation and have consistently done so every session it has been submitted. The Buy America provision of this bill requires that any manufactured goods valued over \$500 purchased by a public agency must be American made. Without exempting

agencies such as Maine DOT, this provision would apply to almost any purchase they make. It is also believed that the bill, as drafted, could be interpreted to encompass all goods bought by a contractor working for Maine DOT, MTA, or DEFAS. While Maine DOT and the MTA is somewhat exempted from the Build Maine component, this provision would still apply to both agencies throughout their procurement of equipment, materials, and supplies. The Federal Highway Administration, FHWA, strictly prohibits the use of in-state preferences in the selection of contractors, labor, and materials. This guidance can be found within FHWA's contract administration core curriculum manual and states the State transportation agency shall not impose any requirement or force any procedure which requires the use of or provides a price differential in favor of contractors, labor, articles, or materials produced within the state. Because of these federal requirements, federal funding used to purchase materials that would be subject to in-state preference would be in jeopardy. Should Maine DOT lose the ability to use federal funding on equipment, materials, and supplies this would significantly exacerbate the already critical funding situation. Additionally, nearly all construction projects in Maine are completed by Maine firms. Maine contractors are not landlocked within our borders. A good deal of our construction firms work outside of Maine, throughout New England, and passage of this bill will hinder their ability to compete fairly outside of the state. Maine contractors win bids in Maine. At the Maine Turnpike Authority, between the years of 2016 and 2019, 54 projects were let and 161 bidders responded. Ninety percent of the bidders came from Maine. During the public hearing on this bill it was stated that many other states have in-state preferences. That statement is correct but these laws also vary in language and, in some instances, they have been struck down. For example, Arizona created a preference for Arizona contractors who have satisfactorily performed prior public contracts and have paid at least \$200 per year of real or personal property taxes for the two consecutive years prior to bidding. However, the statute was held unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of Arizona. In 1992, the New Hampshire Attorney General issued opinion stating that any legislative attempt to mandate an in-state preference policy would conflict with existing legislation that requires the award of capital budget contracts to the lowest responsible bidder following a competitive bidding process. In fact, during the public testimony a constituent of mine, who happens to be the Chief Executive's brother and Director of the Maine Turnpike Authority, informed everybody that 25 years ago Maine adopted the following law that prohibits states from competing unfairly on price in the awarding of public contracts when out-of-state contractors are bidding. The State shall add a percent increase on the bid of a non-resident bidder equal to the percent, if any, of the preference given to the bidder in the state in which the bidder resides. Almost there. Thirty-seven states have identical laws. This means that if any other state discriminates against the Maine contractor on price, we will do the same to theirs. As a result, we have a Mexican stand off. No one on the list discriminates against anyone else. This is important to Maine contractors who frequently win contracts in other states, much to the benefit of Maine people who work for them. I, like all of you, want to see Maine businesses succeed and it's kind of ironic we had the discussion about bill titles earlier today, Madame President. This bill has a terrific title but the context will create confusion in the bid process. It will have serious financial complications. I urge you to follow my light and vote against L.D. 1411. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Jackson.

Senator **JACKSON:** Thank you, Madame President. Make America great. That's what we've been hearing for a couple of years now but when it actually comes down to it I don't think that's what many people want to actually do that. You know that we all represent people in this state, Mainers, and they work hard. They make some of the highest quality products in the world. As a state, I believe that we should be doing everything in our power to support the workers and businesses contributing to our communities and driving our economy, especially after a year like no other. Law makers can start by passing L.D. 1411, An Act to Establish the Maine Buy American and Build Maine Act. I have had a couple of people talk about the title is unbelievably great. I don't know. It seems to me that the title like that is something that we probably all are, you know, trying to strive for, so I'm not sure what the issues are. But this proposal is simple. Maine people deserve the benefit whenever their state spends taxpayer dollars on goods and services. If the State is going to spend taxpayer dollars on goods and services then they should look to Maine goods always and workers and businesses here first. You know, all too often our government spends taxpayer dollars supporting jobs and businesses based out-of-state or, unfortunately, overseas, and that's bad for workers, it's bad for businesses, and it's bad for the state of Maine. First, it denies Maine workers and businesses economic opportunities generated by their own tax dollars and, second, it's a missed opportunity to keep local tax dollars local where these dollars can go further and benefit the entire community and, third, it's a missed opportunity to raise the profile of Maine and Maine products, things like lumber, things like apples, things like potatoes, the products that skilled Maine workers and the quality of Maine based businesses. The Buy American, Build Maine Act is a win for the entire state and puts taxpayer dollars back into the community and keeps our economy humming and grows our made in Maine brand. It does all of this by supporting the workers and businesses here in our state that we represent. Maine small businesses and the hard-working people that keep them running don't just drive our economy, they really are a part of our communities. Small business owners sponsor our Little League teams. They help out with band fundraisers and they donate to our community food banks. They are our family members, our neighbors, and our friends and I say now, more than ever, Maine based businesses deserve our support as they build in the wake of this deadly pandemic. In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic Maine businesses were forced to shift gears and overhaul their business models overnight to adapt to the new health and safety measures and, despite the continued hardships they experienced during this crisis, American workers, businesses, and manufacturers have stepped up to serve our communities, our state, and our country. This is true whether it's American Roots in Westbrook that many of us have worn in here for masks, Flow Fold down in Gorham, New Balance up in Norridgewock, and so many more. Now, more than ever, we owe it to these workers and small business owners to have their backs. There are too many stories of Maine workers and companies losing out on State contracts to lower bids from out-of-state companies and the difference between these two bids is often pennies. Don't take my word for it. If you were at the public hearing, you heard from Chris Lausier from Glenburn, who has experienced it firsthand, losing a State contract by as little as

\$1,300 to an out-of-state company, a company in a state that he can't even bid into. That's just not right, in my opinion. Over the years, these types of policies have gotten push-back from Democrats and Republicans alike and it doesn't make sense. I remember vividly here in this Body us taking this up before when it was a 31 - 4 vote and then the former-Governor vetoed it, magically people jumped off. That doesn't make sense. It just doesn't make sense to me at all why we wouldn't want to do everything we could in our power for 1.3 million people. I don't understand for the life of me how you don't put them first. The goal is not to be exclusionary. Rather it is to support and lift up the people, the business owners, the jobs, and products that we make right here in our own state. Other states and countries are already doing this with their own workers. Go across the border, they have very exclusionary policy there. Go to 38 other states and that is absolutely not true. Those states are doing it. It was even said in testimony that those states will retaliate against us. Well, if they are not doing it then, obviously, they're not going to retaliate against us. Thirty-eight other states have adopted something similar to this but this one is even more different because we didn't give a 5% or 10% preference. What we did was make sure that the taxpayer was held harmless and said that in the event that an in-state contractor lost a bid that they could go ahead and accept the lowest bid. Now, I think that's a pretty good deal. If we can make sure the taxpayer is always going to be put in the driver's seat, at the same time Maine businesses get an opportunity to take those contracts. The stories that we heard, and any of you that have bid on State contracts know, this is not the type of thing where people are going to be able to know exactly. These bids sometimes they come in very close. You might miss it by a little bit but you're trying to do the best you can. I think giving in-state contractors that ability to make their bid and if they want to accept something that is lower then at least they have that opportunity and that's good for the taxpayer. I believe that that levels the playing field here for people in the state of Maine. Buy American and Build Maine is about lifting up workers, businesses, and quality manufactured products here in our own backyard. Throughout this pandemic Maine workers, businesses, and manufacturers have stepped up to support our communities and I think we owe it to have their backs. I disagree with some of the things that were said. I know for a fact we've heard at the public hearing. We're had companies like Dragon down in Rockland that lost eight contracts on DOT projects to out-of-country contracts. I don't believe that's right. If you talk to people in this state, the frustration of not being able to get these contracts at times when they are quality businesses, that have just a right, just as good an ability, losing those and the idea that this is going to be so hard for these agencies, which brings me back to the former bill, but when it's so hard for these agencies we wrote into the bill that they have every opportunity to do what they want through rule making and, in the event that they don't like a contract, they still can reject it. So, don't tell me that it's hard for them. They can make their own rules on this issue and, in the end, they still have an escape clause. So why we still would not want to at least give an opportunity for a contractor to go in and say 'you know, I missed that bid by a couple hundred dollar. I'll accept it.' I think that's a good deal for the people of the state of Maine.
