It brings me great joy to rise and congratulate my home team, the Winthrop Ramblers, for their accomplishment. This is how Larry Mahoney described the end of the game. Maine Central Institute had the momentum but Winthrop had penalty corners. Trinity Leavitt's goal with three minutes left in Saturday's State Class C field hockey game pulled MCI into a tie with Winthrop 2-2 but Winthrop's penalty corners were lethal and senior Madeline Perkins scored the team's third goal off a penalty corner 1:54 seconds later to give the Ramblers a thrilling 3-2 victory at Fuller Field in Augusta. It the Rambler's fourth straight Championship game appearance and its second win. We also won in 2018. MCI wound up 15-2 and was looking for its first State title since it won the Class B title in 2017. 'We work on corners every day in practice,' said Perkins, whose goal was her second of the game. She said the game winner came off of a penalty corner play called the 'zipper.' 'When we moved the ball back and forth to get their defense moving and then I pushed it in over the post, it went in.' JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE UNIVERSITY OF MAINE ON ITS BEING DESIGNATED A NATIONAL R1 RESEARCH UNIVERSITY

WHEREAS, in 1970, the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education developed a classification of colleges and universities to support its program of research and policy analysis, and the Carnegie Classification is the leading framework for recognizing and describing institutional diversity in United States higher education; and

WHEREAS, the R1 designation signifies very high research activity in recent years and is the highest possible tier that a doctoral research university can achieve in the Carnegie Classification: and

WHEREAS, the Joint Select Committee on Research and Development was created by a Joint Order of the Maine Legislature on May 29, 1997 and was directed to develop and recommend a plan for the support of applied research and development in 5 technologies identified as having growth potential in the State's Science and Technology Action Plan; and WHEREAS, the committee was directed to review current policies and programs in the State supporting research and development and to develop a plan to further support research and development in the 5 target technologies of aquaculture and marine sciences and technology; biotechnology; composite materials engineering; environmental sciences and technology; and information sciences and technology; and

WHEREAS, the recommendations of the committee included extensive support for research and development within the University of Maine System and between the university and other research sectors, including the funding of capital expenses such as the purchase of equipment and the renovation of laboratories; and

WHEREAS, since that time the University of Maine, already a vital state economic and educational asset, has greatly increased its research and innovation reputation, becoming a premier location for research and development that attracts highly talented experts, creates new research opportunities and drives further innovations; and

WHEREAS, over the last 5 years, research and development expenditures at the University of Maine have grown 80.2% to an all-time high of \$179,300,000 for 2021 and external funding in support of research and development has increased to \$133,600,000; and

WHEREAS, only 146 of the 3,982 degree-granting postsecondary institutions in the United States are classified as top-tier doctoral research universities; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirtieth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the University of Maine on its designation as a national R1 research university and commend the university on its well-deserved designation and the groundbreaking achievements and commitment to excellence by the faculty, scientists, students and staff.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Bennett.

Senator BENNETT: Thank you, Mr. President. Fellow members of the Senate, it's really hard to believe that it was 25 years ago, a quarter century, in January 1997, when our colleague, then Senate President, Mark Lawrence made an audacious Research and Development initiative a high priority for his term in that office. He was spurred on by a group that was called the Faculty Five that included George Markowsky, Stephen Norton, Malcolm Hunter, Davis Smith, and incomparable George Jacobson, a professor who was spearheading that group and worked tirelessly and relentlessly to stimulate the funding and a new approach to research and development. One of the keys to the success of President Lawrence's initiative was his decision from the very beginning to involve Legislators from both sides of the aisle. The first concrete step was the creation of the Joint Select Committee on Research and Development and he appointed Senator Mary Cathcart and me, a first term Minority member, as the co-chairs of the committee. The committee included many thoughtful Legislators, including then-Representative and Republican House Leader Jim Donnelley, who is now Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Maine System. The recommendations of that committee led to a direct goal of increasing the capacity of the University of Maine to compete for research funds, that were just described a moment ago, that are distributed nationally through a highly rigorous process. Success in that competition has allowed a growing number of researchers to pursue their ideas and insights at the highest levels, often in collaboration with private sector partners right here in the state of Maine. Perhaps the greatest beneficiaries have been the students who have had the opportunity to share experiences in the classrooms and often the laboratories with some of our nation's top scientists and engineers.

The achievement of Carnegie R1 status is an immense accomplishment for the University of Maine and for the State of Maine, which is already benefiting from innovative ideas and technologies that will be the basis of a productive and creative economy. We should view the R1 designation with pride, but it's also just the beginning of a new and exciting chapter, I believe, in Maine history. One of the attractions, I think, of our commitment to research and development was the attraction of the now President of the University of Maine, Joan Ferrini-Mundy, who came to the position having previously served as the Chief Operating Officer of the National Science Foundation. We are developing a reputation nationally after 25 years of bi-partisan, cross-partisan, really non-partisan, work and leadership among the leading University of Maine, among the Legislature, among

the Executive Branch, and particularly among the business community. This initiative is paying dividends now. It's paid dividends for the last generation and it will pay dividends for generations later to come. Again, I want to emphasize the inspired leadership of the Senator from York, former President of the Senate, Mark Lawrence, for his extraordinary insight and inspirational leadership in doing that. I wish he were with us today but he is not and I am personally grateful, as all Maine people should be, for that leadership. Thank you very much, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Dill.

Senator **DILL**: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, the road to R1 began over 20 years ago when the Legislature established the Maine Economic Improvement Fund, MEIF, to support University based research and development. The annual appropriation now has a more than 5-1 return on our investment here in the state of Maine. Since then, Maine has increasingly realized the value of having a strong research University in the state and that was especially true during the pandemic when the University's researchers and labs stepped up to support the state's pandemic response, including producing thousands of gallons of hand sanitizer for Maine hospitals, conducting waste water testing for Maine municipalities, and helping our state's manufacturing businesses pivot to produce new products in response to changing markets and supply chain challenges. The prestigious R1 designation is a recognition of what those of us in Maine have known for a long time, our flagship University is world class and a vital economic and educational asset to the state. As an R1, UMaine joins MIT, John Hopkins, Cornell, Purdue University, and less than 4% of the degree granting post-secondary institutions in the country who have achieved this top-tier status. R1 would not have been possible without the ongoing investment of the Legislature and University research through MEIF and is a testament to the incredible faculty, staff, and students in my district and the UMaine campus community. Despite the pandemic, UMaine has experienced record research productivity and record enrollment, including drawing more than 4,500 students from out-of-state to Orono. It is the most affordable flagship university, an R1 institution in New England, and if we pass the supplemental budget as proposed by the Governor, we will be able to hold tuition flat for the seventh time in ten years. Now having achieved this status as one of the nation's top research universities, UMaine will be even more competitive, not just in recruiting and retaining talented students and faculty in Maine, but also in federal funding and businesses who depend on access to research innovation. This will, in turn, allow the University to do even more to increase access to high-impact research learning experiences for all Maine students, strengthen our economy and communities, and provide Maine-made solutions to the great challenges of our time. like climate change. From developing renewable packaging that sustains and grows our forest economy to helping our wild blueberry growers improve the shelf life of fresh packed berries to engaging Maine youth in hands-on stem research that helps prepare them for the workforce, UMaine's research enterprise has never mattered more to Maine's future. I am proud to be an alumnus of this incredible institution, to work there, and to represent so many of the students, faculty, and staff here in Augusta and to celebrate this well-deserved honor. I want to congratulate President Joan Ferrini-Mundy, who is here today, and the entire UMaine campus community. Go Black Bears.

JOINT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH AND INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

WHEREAS, Maine women of every race, class and ethnic background have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of our State in countless recorded and unrecorded ways; and

WHEREAS, Maine women have played and continue to play critical economic, cultural and social roles in every sphere of the life of our State, whether in the workforce or as unpaid labor within homes and community settings, and as the majority of the State's volunteer workforce; and

WHEREAS, Maine women have protected and defended our collective rights, responsibilities and freedoms in myriad spheres, including serving our country courageously in the military; and WHEREAS, Maine women have been leaders, not only in securing their own rights of suffrage and increased opportunity, but also in expanding the rights of all who experience oppression as leaders in the abolitionist movement, the emancipation movement, the industrial labor movement, the civil rights movement and other movements, especially the peace movement, that create a more fair and just society for all; and WHEREAS, despite these contributions, the role of Maine women in history has been consistently overlooked and undervalued in the literature, teaching and study of American history; and

WHEREAS, despite progress, women and girls—especially women and girls of color—still experience higher rates of poverty, violence and discrimination and face systemic barriers to full participation in the workforce and society and wider gaps in opportunity and equality; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirtieth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate March as "Women's History Month" and recognize March 8th as "International Women's Day."

Senator **DAUGHTRY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I do rise to answer said question. If you would pull up the fiscal note, you're able to see there is an allocation in fiscal year 2022 to 2023. What's cool about this

fiscal note is that it actually creates within the Department of Education a system of grants to our local schools. I think we can all agree making sure that if you have some sort of curriculum portion one of the hardest parts for a school district is making sure that they have the resources necessary to implement that curriculum. So, this is one of these great examples that would enable these pilot projects and this bill would help fund schools to be able to take on this curriculum and be able to have additional resources. So, unlike some curriculum bills that we've all looked at over the years, this does not leave our schools high and dry, having to try to do this. It's a partnership and it really helps our local teachers.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Timberlake.

Senator **TIMBERLAKE**: Thank you, Mr. President. After hearing, and I thank the Senator for her response, after hearing that response it poses a great concern to me that we're passing on a \$3 million outlay into our ongoing budget and, with everything that's happening in world right now, I'd be very concerned about passing this on. So.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Rafferty.

Senator RAFFERTY: Thank you, Mr. President. Again, I understand that we all want to be fiscally responsible. I just want to remind some of you, perhaps, that may or may not be aware of how funding works for, you know, these types of education programs, basically professional development. There's little funding set aside any more as far as professional development within schools. So, this grant program would allow, in this case, science teachers, and this was their number one request across the state in terms of identifying need. This was the need they felt the most and this particular topic was their number one topic. So, this is a grant program that would set those funds aside for science teachers to partner with possible folks in their county or areas, and we know that there is a minimum of 13 groups in every county that may offer this potential in terms of grant programs. It is not a mandate by any stretch, but it is an opportunity for our science teachers to gain further professional development in an area that is changing every day. Thank you very much, sir.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Daughtry.

Senator **DAUGHTRY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I do rise to add some additional clarification to the fiscal note on this bill. First off, I want to highlight that it is a one-time transfer of existing surplus money and if you look a little bit further into the projections the ongoing cost of this bill is pretty minimal. The one-time surplus is what funds the grant and so this isn't a massive ongoing cost. I also wanted to add, I feel like I've been focusing on the financial projections of this measure but I want to share with the Chamber that I heard about this bill overwhelmingly from an amazing amount of young students. This was, I was surprised by the amount of correspondence I received from students, not only in my own district but from across our state, and literally I think I received a piece of correspondence or a call or a Facebook message or any sort of different medium from a student in literally

every county. They spoke loud and clear that they want to be seeing increased amounts of this education. This is their future. They want to know how to make Maine better and how to save their state, their quality of life, and make our planet a better place. So, I really urge you to support this. It's a great bill. I'm not typically one to stand and speak in such high support of curriculum bills because it's something that is a very complicated process in our schools but this was one of those few times where I was hearing from teachers, from students, from parents, from the Department of Education that this is a great partnership and a great opportunity to make sure that the education for our students in our schools is what's happening now and that it's staying current. So, I urge you to please strongly support this motion.

Pope Francis says that there can be no sincere and enduring resolution to the challenge of the ecological crisis and climate change unless the response is concerted and collective and unless the responsibility is shared and accountable,

unless we give priority to solidarity and service. Climate change is a global problem with grave implications that demands global. national, and local solutions. Thousands of them. But they must be linked to a goal and that's what this bill sets, a goal of carbon neutrality by 2045. Setting a goal in statute is a statement of solidarity. Maine's statutes list a number of goals, one of which I'm deeply familiar with on my committee, the solid waste hierarchy, and I see this as no different. Absolute tonnage reductions by sector, transportation, building, heating, industry generation are in the works. The measure of net carbon reduction compliments these goals by taking into account carbon encrustation by Maine's forests, agricultural, and wood industries. The reason for putting the carbon neutrality goal in statute is to coordinate planning between departments and between the State and private and quasi-public entities who are working together, gaining in the same direction along the same track. Mr. President, we probably won't agree on all the solutions for how to achieve this goal but I hope we can be of service together to Maine's people and set this goal in statute. Pope Francis also ties our most vulnerable to the story of climate change. Our most vulnerable industries in the state include agriculture, forestry, and fishing. Our heritage industries that define our grit and capacity, they rely on us to do our part to mitigate climate change. I urge you to vote to support embedding carbon neutrality into statute as a goal we're capable of achieving. Let's show Maine we can be united to protect the way life should be and, Mr. President, I request a division.

Senator **KEIM**: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I ask your indulgence for speaking a bit longer than usual, for myself anyway, on this bill. Because the impact has been so significant on people in the state of Maine, I felt that it was important to give this bill due diligence here on the floor. L.D. 867, An Act To Prohibit Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccinations for 5 Years To Allow for Safety Testing and Investigations into Reproductive Harm, is needed to preserve the right to informed consent, a bedrock principle of medical treatment, and to allow

time to determine efficacy and long-term impact. The Health and Human Services Committee heard from hundreds of Maine people on this bill, sharing the heartbreaking, real life impact both from the loss of education opportunity and life-long careers for refusing the vaccine to adverse reactions experienced from taking the COVID vaccine. This bill is our opportunity to put the breaks on policy and take a closer look, and a closer look is needed since the data being fed to Maine people from both the state and federal administrations and the press has been cherrypicked to align with their policy goals and with the audacious and defensive goal of keeping us in the dark so that we don't misinterpret it. In addition to being kept in the dark with data, legitimate inquiry and debate that should be the hallmark of our medical and scientific community has been stifled, completely shut out with a label of misinformation. As the New York Times recently exposed, the CDC has been hiding data on vaccine booster efficacy for the last many months. In short, when they published rates of hospitalizations among fully vaccinated and not fully vaccinated the CDC refused to split these numbers out by age group but left each in the aggregate. Apparently, however, instead of those values actually encompassing all age groups, CDC chose to exclude data from middle age groups, which artificially inflated the disparity between vaccinated and unvaccinated. The deception was performed not in the interest of public health but out of concern that the data would be misinterpreted. This decision shows decision making not based on real science but on political science with concern that transparency would true numbers would weaken public support for CDC policy. In contrast, data taken from places with disciplined collection and reporting, like Iceland, Israel, and the United Kingdom, shows that there is no benefit of vaccination in preventing infection or transmission. This is why nearly every nation in Europe has ended their vaccine passports. If vaccination does not stop outbreaks there is zero justification for mandating it. Is there any reason to believe that vaccine works differently here in Maine than it does in other parts of the world? Every action we have taken to combat COVID has been rushed, based on limited knowledge, for reasons that we all understand, but that doesn't mean we should ignore the implications that come of hasty decision making. The Food and Drug Administration granted licensure to the Pfizer vaccine in just 108 days, after processing hundreds of thousands of pages submitted by the company. When citizens filed suit for release of the Pfizer data, FDA argued in court for the delay of its full release for 75 years, well beyond the expected lifetime of any adult alive today. Thankfully a federal judge ordered the FDA to release the entire Pfizer data file and we have recently started to see some of the listed vaccine side effects, but not because of government transparency but only through court order. Wondering why our government is working so hard to hide vaccine data from the public only increases distrust of the general public that we are forcing here in our state to take the vaccine in order to participate in essential life activities. The small amounts of data that we are able to glean, even from Maine's own CDC, should give scientific and policy making authorities a bright signal that the COVID-19 vaccine has limited public health benefit and it does carry real risks of at least some quantity. Any mandate of the COVID-19 vaccine at this time is not only wrong but reckless to the credibility of government and public health policy. While our limited view of U.S. data has shown that vaccination can reduce the risk of hospitalization and death attributed to COVID-19, especially for the elderly and those with comorbidity, the overall positive impact is much less than CDC had claimed. This

has much to do with how the data is counted, as well as how it is reported. We can all agree that scientific understanding around how the COVID-19 vaccines work and interact with the virus has changed immensely in just a year. This is the exact reason why we need an explicit ban on mandates.

When state and federal mandates were first considered and implemented, which some corporations and universities followed, the reason was to stop or slow the spread and to put COVID-19 behind us. This belief backed up the brutal ends justify the mean mentality which led to hundreds of dedicated Maine healthcare workers to lose their careers and for some unaccounted number of students who have lost their educational opportunities, their ability to pursue their dreams here in their home state of Maine. Can any of us look at the data today and say that this reasoning still stands? There is information put on your desks with recent Maine CDC data.

Pro-mandate advocates say being fired from one's job for refusing to take the COVID-19 vaccine is a fair consequence when it is, in fact, coercion. Does a healthcare hero really have a choice when they must choose between feeding their family or taking the vaccine? Does a student really have a choice when the only options are to take the vaccine or forego your dreams and your career path, such as Julie Anderson of Limington who testified that she lost her job of nine years as a registered nurse because of her strongly held religious beliefs. Somerset Living Center in Bingham closed due to staffing shortages with quote saying that at this facility there simply aren't enough employees willing to be vaccinated. Sara Alexander of Etna testified before the committee that the mandates have caused her severely disabled daughter to miss out on necessary services and early on, when there was a mandate on dentists, the community dental in Rumford, a practice that focuses on MaineCare recipients, lost their only dentist and has not yet been able to replace him. Rural Maine struggles to get dental care and now many of my constituents have been months without needed services.

As data provided by Maine CDC shows, the mandates, and even our vaccination rate, have not slowed the spread of the virus but the mandates have detrimentally effected Maine's healthcare workforce and strained the standard of care. The policy caused the Governor to bring in National Guard personnel and caused Maine's healthcare facilities to hire travel nurses at multiple times the normal rate of pay, raising costs across the healthcare system. Obviously, we had a healthcare shortage prior to the mandate and this has exasperated it.

Pushing back against mandates is not a fringe issue of just a few vaccine hesitant folks. Just last week the United States Senate passed a resolution to block the federal centers for Medicare and Medicaid services by a vote of 49-44, with Senator Collins in support saying the Biden Administrations' mandate would exasperate staffing shortages, particularly for rural healthcare providers and impose burdensome costs at healthcare facilities, exactly what we're seeing here in Maine. Half of the U.S. states fought the mandate in court while just 16 states, including our own, have a mandate on healthcare workers. While we can debate the public health policy of when it is appropriate for the state to save people from themselves, these questions ignore the potential risk of vaccination which, of course, does exist. Adverse reactions have been documented, not only from this vaccine but from other mandated vaccines, those which have undergone full-scale, long term safety and efficacy studies spanning usually 5 to 7 years. People deserve these studies if they want them in order to make an informed vaccine decision.

People like Michael Blackmore of Brunswick who away from his 20-year career with United Ambulance in Lewiston, or Ronanna Bowman of Hope who lost her job as a social worker at a nursing and skilled rehab facility, or my constituent, Beverly Shaw, who's going to be forced into a nursing home because her long-term helper was not willing to get vaccinated. Beverly found that she could not find anyone else to provide in-home services for her and now has to look for a nursing home. These are a few examples of Maine people who are being impacted, either through employment or through loss of services, at a time when they're desperately needed.

The mentality of public health mandates flies in the face of long-standing tradition of medical ethics. Some who are pressured to take these vaccines for fear of losing their livelihood may not be fully informed of the fact that should they experience an adverse reaction they cannot recoup damages from the vaccine makers. It's not a popular topic but it must be said, COVIC-19 vaccine producers hold near zero liability for their products. Even a reasonable alternative to the vaccines, such as recognizing immunity gained from previous infection, is still refused acknowledgement by Maine DHHS, despite a veritable mountain of evidence to support it.

The recent story of Emil Westerlund, a UMaine hockey player, is a perfect example of the absurd philosophy of COVID-19 vaccine mandates. Westerlund, a Division 1 athlete who was fully vaccinated and also had recently recovered from COVID, was pushed off the hockey team because he refused to take the booster. This loss of opportunity that was his because of 20 years of pouring his energy into playing his chosen sport was completely wrong and unnecessary. Westerlund poses no threat to his peers or the general public. In fact, the NCAA does not require the booster and considers athletes who have had COVID within the past 90 days to be fully vaccinated. We don't even know how many academic careers this unscientific policy has derailed. While the University of Maine allows for unvaccinated students to take in-person classes if they test weekly, the Community College students may not take any in-person classes without a vaccine and a booster. How does this serve public health? Private schools can do what they want and nearly all in Maine are requiring a booster for enrollment but state funded institutions, like community colleges, should be given the broadest accommodations possible. Public higher education should be a safe haven from discrimination and segregation of all

Dr. Marty Makary of Johns Hopkins recently reported that children are ten times as likely to die of suicide than coronavirus. That's because the risk of COVID to children is statistically zero. Yet, in press conferences, Dr. Shah and the Mills Administration have consistently left the door open to a public school COVID-19 vaccine mandate, and this is another reason why L.D. 867 is needed right now. Every other mandated vaccine for children produces lifetime sterilizing immunity, meaning that it prevents nearly all transmission and infection. Every other mandated vaccine for children and healthcare workers went through 5 to 7 years of safety trials to determine the highest level of confidence that its benefits outweigh its risks.

Thankfully, politicians are relaxing restrictions, I do appreciate being unmasked today, as the truth and political pressure cannot be denied but far too many people are still living under draconian mandates, dismantling their lives and negatively impacting the overall wellbeing of Maine's economy, future, and healthcare system. Mainers deserve to be released from COVID-

19 mandates until full, long-term safety and efficacy data can be ascertained. Of course, we have an interest in promoting public health but the state must first protect basic constitutional rights, chief among them the right to be safe and secure in one's own body. Without the principle of medical freedom and bodily autonomy, our other dearly held constitutional rights are surely lost. How can we defend our free expression of ideas if we so readily give up our own freedom to choose medical treatment? Data simply does not support a broad workforce mandate for COVID-19 vaccines, whether it be in healthcare, education, or otherwise. I urge the Senate to put the fundamental rights of Maine people first and vote to pass L.D. 867 today. Thank you, Mr. President.

Off Record Remarks

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Moore.

Senator MOORE: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I stand before you in opposition of the motion on the floor and will be brief. While I chose to take the vaccine, I strongly feel this should be an independent decision between a person and their doctor, not a mandate, to keep their jobs. Serving on the Health and Human Services Committee, we listened or read hundreds of testimonies, as Senator Keim mentioned, with the vast majority in favor of passing this bill. We heard hundreds of stories from citizens sharing what happened to them as a result of taking the vaccine. Many are left with major health issues. One particular alarming testimony was that of Michael Rioux, a resident of Old Orchard Beach and a registered nurse for over 4-1/2 years. He testified having witnessed numerous vaccine adverse events while working as a float nurse before he was terminated for not receiving the vaccination due to the mandate imposed on the healthcare workers. He described a healthy 50-year old patient with no comorbidities, an avid golfer, who was hospitalized and nearly died from a severe pulmonary embolism, a blood clot of the lungs, after he received his second shot. He can no longer play 18 holes and is now on several lifelong medications. Another patient he mentioned in his testimony was in his early 60's and was hospitalized with COVID-19, pneumonia, heart failure, and partial lower extremity paralysis after receiving the shot. Other reactions he observed were bell's palsy, strokes, bronchitis, myocarditis, and, ironically, many COVID diagnosis' days after the shot, and many breakthroughs weeks, and even months, later.

The CDC and drug manufacturers state you can still get and spread COVID-19, along with the adverse risks. This is not a settled science, so why not investigate and perform additional safety studies and double-blind placebos, which has not been done, before we mandate this experimental drug? Everyone should have the right to receive fully informed information concerning any medical procedures from their physicians not the media or the CDC or the drug manufacturers who look to benefit financially from any mandates such as the one associated with the COVID-19 vaccine. Thank you for allowing me to speak, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland. Senator Sanborn.

Senator **SANBORN**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I don't expect to change very many minds on the bill before us but I felt the need to rise because I think it's important to correct the record with regard to misinformation about safety and efficacy data. So, I turn your attention to the handout on your desks that was referenced by my good friend earlier and I will just note that the handout asks why weren't the vast majority of hospitalizations in the last wave made up of unvaccinated patients. Men and women of the Senate, let me explain this to you. Over 80% of Mainers over 12 years old are fully vaccinated. That means that only 20% of the state, a little less than that, accounts for more than half of the hospitalizations. That means that this vaccine is keeping people out of the hospital. Only 20% of the state, more half of the hospitalizations. The math is clear. The chart is misleading and the question in figure 3 can be answered quite easily by explaining what's called a base rate fallacy in statistics. Figure 3 does not advance the argument that these vaccines are ineffective. In fact, it does exactly the opposite. Figure 4 is the same way. Figure 4, if you look at the dark black line on your sheet, the dark black line shows that adults in Iceland, who were fully vaccinated and had a booster, had nearly half the risk of contracting the virus over a 14 day period as folks who had been vaccinated without a booster or not vaccinated at all. My good friend from Oxford also made reference to the 'audacious goal of keeping people in the dark.' She assigns that as the goal of our CDC in hiding medical information about the vaccine but, in fact, figure 5 shows us that the United States is incredibly transparent when it comes to vaccine adverse reaction reporting. In fact, we have a database that shows you everything. Completely unverified, completely anecdotal, and completely a matter of correlation and not causation. But we show it all and we allow that vaccine information about what happens and the correlation at time of death, we allow all of that to be out there and for researchers to try to find actual causation. Instead of this misinformation or misuse of the data, mis-presentation of the data that's provided on this particular handout, what, in fact, the evidence shows us is that the COVID-19 vaccine is incredibly effective at reducing the risk of death and so the U.S. CDC and the Maine CDC have the audacious goal not of hiding information but of saving lives and our public health and vaccine scientists and epidemiologist have been incredibly successful at this over the last two years. The risk of long COVID symptoms for those folks who had two shots of vaccine is equal to that of uninfected people, people who have never experienced COVID before. So, there's a study here that shows that if you got the vaccine you have zero risk of long COVID, undetectable risk of long COVID. That's a win. If you have had the vaccine you're risk of dying from COVID goes from 7.4 per 100,000 to .1 per 100,000. That is an exceptional, exceptional life saving measure. While I may not convince anvone with this information here today on the floor of the Senate. I felt that it was incredibly important for me to rise and say please get your information from trusted scientific sources that are presenting the data around safety and efficacy and not anecdotes, mispresented, and misunderstood graphs and charts or fear because we need to trust the science and the scientists in the United States, which are the best in the world and have created this incredible set of vaccines for us to use to get out of this mess so that we can stand here today, unmasked, and that is

because of vaccines. I urge everyone who can hear me today to go out and get their vaccines and get their booster and I hope that we will vote Ought Not to Pass on this bill. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Claxton.

Senator CLAXTON: Thank you, Mr. President. I share a lot of the frustration with Senator Keim in terms of how well insulated pharma is from any liability. I think the system we have set up now was made in order to get people vaccines because the drug companies were going to stop making them based on the number of times they were sued. So, I share that. I share the pain of watching colleagues, friends, lose jobs because of they wouldn't get vaccinated. That was hard and it's effected my decision every day in terms of respecting the loss that they went through. I also agree that the data is not complete. We'll learn a lot in the years to come, as we look back and try to sort out what we were doing, but in the terms of process improvement we were on a burning platform and people have made decisions based on the best information they had. I've never questioned anybody's decisions about how they make those decisions or why. Well, that's not true. I have questioned but just not on the record. So, we had the difficult circumstance of finding ourselves in a crisis that this point has cost almost 900,000 lives and, to reinforce the data that Senator Sanborn was referring to, at the time the committee voted on the bill the 77% of the people in the state who were vaccinated were accounting for 20% of those on respirators. The 23% who were not vaccinated were accounting for 80% of those on ventilators. So, there was a clear protection from death and being on ventilators and being hospitalized from the vaccine. So, the other thing, point I'd like to make, is that this has not been a pandemic, this has been several pandemics, and the initial COVID was different from the Delta COVID which is very different from the Omicron Delta, Omicron COVID, and that has made decision making harder and I'm frustrated too that the vaccine isn't more efficient than it is but it's still really good at what ultimately it was supposed to do, which was to try to keep our hospitals from getting crushed. So, based on that, based on that information, and based on the information we had to operate with, the committee voted in support of an Ought Not to Pass and that is where I stand, although recognizing that it's a difficult decision and as evidenced that we are responsive to the data that's out there. Pfizer has withdrawn an application for an early childhood vaccine because they could not prove that it would make a difference. That's the transparency. Less than ideal but it was enough for the committee to vote Ought Not to Pass and I will be voting to support that vote. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Knox, Senator Miramant.

Senator **MIRAMANT**: Thank you, Mr. President. Colleagues of the Senate, some of that information is true to the extent that we have information. Part of the VAERS, the vaccine adverse effect reporting system, is that it was established when immunity was given to drug companies from anything they do, anything they do, with a vaccine. They're immune from the results. That's how they can rush something out so quickly because they can say it looks okay. They don't know. That's just five years at minimum, but it's a good start. The other part of the VAERS is that because it made it voluntary, not required, voluntary, then it's only when

people really get frustrated that they try to report and then they put another barrier into those people. They made a board that has to review a claim before it will be put on theirs and that board is not like 'Oh, really, you felt this way. You think this happened?' No, no. You've got to document it. You've got to prepare a case, just like going to court, and if they accept it then it can go on theirs. So, there's an estimate, I've been saying 10%, a lot of people think it's much less, that anything on theirs is about 10% of the cases because of how hard it is to get on and that it takes some effort to try to even get it on. So, it's so underreports what's going on and if it was supposed to be the compensation for unlimited exemption from liability then it should have been mandatory. That's just starting there.

The other thing that we've noticed in many government agencies of oversight is that people work in the industry, and get to the top of that industry, they become the people who get picked to be in the FDA or the Environmental Protection Agency. They are people who generally support ideas that the administration supports and that's why they are appointed to them. So, that starts to filter in and, depending on what their views are, is how we start to see things. So, in this case, and we can show a revolving door between the FDA, the CDC, and the industry, the pharmaceutical industry and chemical industries, that show that they start to infiltrate with an idea. I'm not saying that they are evil people because of this. I'm saying they pick up this idea. They're surrounded by people who agree with them and so when something happens, like when COVID came along, the WHO already had some policies for what would happen in a pandemic and these weren't them. They just ignored them. The first most repressive place to shut things down, everybody followed suit. The next thing to happen was that, because the general agreement in government was that whatever they said is the way, that white coat syndrome. If somebody in a white coat tells you something then you believe it. You don't even try to get information and that's the next step. People just went 'Oh, yah, yah.' Vaccinations have been doing this and they've saved from all these diseases. Nobody looks more closely, which I hadn't, until we started talking about vaccinations eight years ago here and started to find that a lot of what is reported as solutions to problems, the vaccines came out later because it used to be that they were required to test them for their immunity from liability. They were required to do something and that testing took time and by the time it came you'll see that there's a curve and it falls because people get infected and healthier people get through it and build immunity because there's no better immunity, Fauci used to say that. Again, I don't want to assign motive but at some point it became 'Oh, no, natural immunity from getting the disease doesn't mean anything.' Even other countries and systems recognize that immunity from having had COVID. So, that comes down to where does this bill fit? Having a five-year period to test and prove the lack of harm to pregnant women and others? Having something that says that you have to prove that your substance is not going to do harm? Having a profession that didn't say 'Wait a minute, we can't do anything until there's a vaccine and that it will do everything. It'll stop the spread. It will stop you from getting it, giving it. What will get us out of this pandemic.' That's never been the case. Getting and getting over whatever particular disease, virus, it was - has been what's gotten us out of all previous infections. So, that's following the science, going back and looking at data.

What a minute. Let's add another piece. Let's pretend that if you say something that isn't in line with the general message

being put out, that there's nothing that whole allopathic profession can do, although there were things, that there's only the vaccine when it comes, so we can't do anything. Oh, wait a minute. The vaccine doesn't do what we said it would do but, still, if you say 'Well, I don't think this is quite right,' antivaxxer. Shut off their Facebook. Shut off their Twitter. Shut off the world. You know, shut off their job, their profession, that masks and gowns and work without clean masks forever. That was on the front lines of this profession. What? You're not going to follow a rule? You're so horrible. You can't have a job. You can't get unemployment for not having a job. You can rot in a hole and die. You can lose your house. We'll kick you as we walk by. Did anybody get bullied today for wearing a mask? I didn't see that but, boy, I was in the halls of the State House and someone came up and tried to bully me, even when the policy in the Senate wasn't that you had to wear a cloth mask, that you could wear a plastic one, and I was going to wear a plastic one. I got bullied over it in the halls here but I don't think anybody got bullied today about wearing one and I hope not. I apologize if someone did. So, the problems with this are that we don't have information to make good choices. We have enough to know that the dental profession was exempt from having vaccines required and they liked that fine because they had already gone through AIDS and figured out how to do their profession without spreading disease. So, that was certainly something that the regular health profession could do but they chose not to. They chose to take a stance and then bully-fi anyone who didn't agree with them and, because most people don't ask a lot of questions and can't get any other information because of this whole process, they're just like 'Well, yah. I grew up. It worked. I got vaccinated. I know it solved all these problems. You must be crazy not to get it.' So, that's just - I'm just tired of that. My daughter was pregnant and she moved to a new state, picked up a new practice. Didn't know anybody, didn't have any recommendations. The doctor said, 'Don't get the vaccine while you're pregnant.' So, she didn't and she's not against getting vaccinated and she's had the baby and she hasn't talked to me about whether she is going to or not. That's her business but there's a bunch of good MDs who did the same thing they've done their whole profession. They saw something happen. They're multi-qualified, board certified in their profession. They went out and did the same thing. They put out an article. Wait a minute. We're seeing this response interferes to what's going on. We're seeing this. We should take a little closer look. Antivaxxer. Shut them up, quick them up. Researchers in virology, who have been doing it for 20 or 30 years, did the same thing. Published papers on their research about it, like they had every time, like they won awards for. The minute it said 'We're not sure about modifying RNA without testing, antivaxxer. Oh my gosh. Put them in that hole, bury them. So, that's where they are. Well, it's starting to turn the corner and it will take a while because of how successfully the information was repressed and I see it coming out in little bits and I can see my colleague having such feeling about this because we only get one side of the information. As it comes out, we'll have a real debate. We'll make real decisions. I'll probably have my eyes open to some things that I thought were the other way and I think many of my colleagues and family members and community members will say 'Oh, okay' because they didn't need to look at this closely but my wife did in her practice and I did because of dealing with bills here. I needed to look closely and I couldn't have the luxury of just saying 'Oh, the CDC said this, seems different than what a lot of good, smart people are saying

but I'll just ignore them because the CDC said it.' I guess I've made my point, especially since, as someone else pointed out, we're not going to change votes today but, boy, are we going to reflect back on this one and, hopefully, make up policies to be followed that can't have just one side or the other just taken off and destroying livelihoods and shutting down counties and doing a lot of things that were no help to anything, just a lot of harm was caused. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brenner.

Senator BRENNER: Thank you, Mr. President. Colleagues of the Senate. I rise in opposition to L.D. 867 and I do recognize that I'm probably standing in the way of lunch but I want to speak specifically with regard to what I see as the value and importance of vaccine requirements for healthcare providers. Mr. President, as you know, I'm a nurse midwife and in my practice in any hospital I've always been required to have mandatory vaccines and I see the inclusion of the COVID-19 vaccine as no different. When I dropped my mother off at Maine Medical Center for surgery this past summer I trusted that she would be kept safe, safe from nosocomial infections, which are infections acquired while in admittance to a hospital. In my years of practice, we worried about hospital acquired infections, including MRSA and C. Dif and now the list includes COVID-19. Mainers deserve to know that when their loved ones are admitted to the hospital every precaution is made to minimize the chances of nosocomial infections being transmitted to them. In public testimony. Northern Lights shared that there was only a 3% loss of staff across their system as a result of the mandate being realized in the state for healthcare providers. A 3% loss in the largest employment sector in our state is a small loss for patient and worker safety. Vaccine mandates are not what's causing staffing challenges in hospitals. It's the moral injury of being undercompensated and overworked during a pandemic that's filled halls with COVID positive patients and the ensuing behavioral health challenges with which our state struggles. Banning the ability to mandate vaccines is not the answer to public health in congregate settings like schools, institutions, and healthcare facilities. Maine people, whether they work or receive services within a congregate care setting, deserve to know every effort is being made to keep them safe. Banning the ability to add vaccines to the list of mandated vaccines when the overwhelming science supports their efficacy and their use is nothing I can support. Mr. President, I stand for public health and safety with an Ought Not to Pass vote. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Keim.

Senator **KEIM**: Thank you. Forgive me for rising a second time but, in brief, I would say in some of the information on your desk, one of the most easily understood is probably the facility outbreaks. Just the timeline of when we mandated and then how the outbreaks happened. It was the New York Times that reported that the CDC held back and excluded that data and it was their word to say they did that to protect from misinformation or misinterpretation of the information, not mine. But we can't really argue statistics totally on the floor and be effective in doing so but it is very easy to see, I think, even in these discussions why we should allow people the freedom to choose. This is not

settled. We're still in the midst of learning more. There is definitely efficacy that is shown for people, as I stated in my speech, that are older and comorbidities, but for the rest of the population there's still a lot of concern and there's a lot that's unknown and, being that that is the case, we should give them their freedom to choose and to make an informed choice, which they cannot do at this point because the information is not fully known. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is Acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. Is the Senate ready for the question?
