I think it should be Ought Not to Pass only because I believe the unions really use pieces of bartering and working things out amongst themselves and we shouldn't, as the State, be making all these union decisions. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Milford, Representative Drinkwater.

Representative **DRINKWATER**: Thank you. Madam Speaker, I rise to support LD 70, An Act to Eliminate the Cap on Retirement Benefits for State Employees and Teachers to Which a Cost-of-living Adjustment Is Made. Sidney Hook once said everyone who remembers his own education remembers teachers. Not methods, not techniques. Teachers are the heart of the educational system. Teachers deserve our respect and gratitude. They've dedicated their lives to instructing our children. Everyone here can remember the name of teachers who inspired them. In my life, it was Mr. Wheeler, Mr. Duff and Ms. Bragdon. Many of them were promised a good retirement when the pay was low, but the benefits were good. I heard from many retired teachers who are struggling to make ends meet. With inflation hurting all families, the senior citizens are the ones feeling it the worst. One retired teacher in her 80s spoke about if it wasn't for her son, she wouldn't be able to continue to live in her house. Serving in the 129th, we heard a bill to fix the COLA and it passed the Committee with a funding request of \$600 million but failed in Appropriations. In the 130th, the same bill passed with a price tag of \$900 million but once again failed in Appropriations. Now, in the 131st, the bill was proposed again with price tag of \$1.2 billion. Madam Speaker, the MEA had the opportunity to meet with the Chief Executive before she finalized the budget. The MEA asked the Chief Executive to fund the COLA and fix the problem. The Chief Executive failed to fund the COLA. I do not understand why the majority party has not made this a priority. After all, they've had majorities on all the committees, control of the House, the Senate and the Blaine House now for five years.

Madam Speaker, I regret that the Chief Executive failed to include some funding to stop the snowball from picking up speed as it's rolling downhill. This is not a Republican versus Democrat debate; this is trying to correct what they had to sacrifice for the State to have a balanced budget as the Constitution requires. We, the members of the Labor Committee, came together in a bipartisan way and requested that the COLA be raised to \$40,000. It is not enough to make them whole, but it's a small attempt to slow the out-of-control cost. Because of the budget being passed by the majority party, we could not include a fix. What I'm asking for is that we agree to include money in the anticipated supplemental budget if the revenue forecast is as bright as we think. And by this vote, we attempt to restore our promise. Perhaps we could stop funding the thousands of unfilled positions and put that money towards our promise. We promised our retired teachers good benefits when they retired and, frankly, Madam Speaker, I think it's time we stop the talk and walk the talk. When my time here ends and I'm nothing but a memory, I hope I will be remembered as someone who stood up for our retired teachers and tried to right a wrong. Madam Speaker, I'm reading this because of a teacher, and I thank them. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winter Harbor, Representative Faulkingham.

Representative **FAULKINGHAM**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, I rise in support of the pending motion. Madam Speaker, this amendment is the unanimous report of the Committee. This amendment changes the cost of living increase for retired employees and teachers, to increase the COLA to apply to the first \$40,000 of the benefit. That COLA is currently capped at \$24,000 and a little bit extra. That cap was put in at a time when the State was in bad financial shape. It is time now to lift that. Sending this bill to the Appropriations Committee sends a strong message to our retired teachers that we support them and their years of service to the State. I urge the Members to vote yes on the pending motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Roeder.

Representative **ROEDER**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, I just wanted to underline and underscore and highlight what my colleagues from Winter Harbor and Milford said. It was a deeply bipartisan vote in Committee, with a lot of support. And as my colleague from Milford said, that number, to make retirees whole, just keeps growing, which is why I urge everyone to support this bill because we're at least taking a step in the right direction with this and we're saying to our retirees that we value you and we want to make you whole. Thank you.

This being an emergency measure, a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to the House being necessary, a total was taken. 115 voted in favor of the same and 6 against, and accordingly the Bill was **PASSED TO BE ENACTED**, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.

This being an emergency measure, a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to the House being necessary, a total was taken. 106 voted in favor of the same and 13 against, and accordingly the Bill was **PASSED TO BE ENACTED**, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.
