JOINT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY

WHEREAS, January 15, 2024 marks the national and state holiday in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., commemorating his birth on January 15, 1929; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a Baptist minister who advocated the furtherance of civil and human rights for all Americans through nonviolence; and

WHEREAS, this man of great spirit showed this country a dream of "an oasis of freedom and justice"; and

WHEREAS, Dr. King, a model of an American patriot, provided the nation with one of the most prophetic and influential voices in our history; and WHEREAS, for his tireless work to ensure equality and justice, Dr. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, a high and honorable distinction, in 1964; and

WHEREAS, his eloquence, his perseverance and his faith moved mountains and brought about landmark legal and social changes by appealing to the better instincts and consciences of his fellow human beings; and

WHEREAS, the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., which ended so tragically on April 4, 1968, is a shining example to Americans and citizens of the world at large of uncompromising dedication to the highest ideals; and

WHEREAS, the Honorable Gerald Talbot of Portland submitted legislation in 1975 to create a day commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. prior to the federal legislation creating the holiday; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to acknowledge the extraordinary life and works of this teacher, reformer and humanitarian, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and pause in our deliberations to recognize and commemorate the occasion of his birth.

READ.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winter Harbor, Representative Faulkingham.

Representative **FAULKINGHAM**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I rise this morning to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who is someone that I admire, that I consider a hero, a hero of this country. I rise because his dream, that all people should be judged by the content of their character, not the color of their skin, is something that all Americans should strive for. And I think that the Good Doctor is looking down on us from Heaven right now and, sadly, I would say that he's looking down on this country with disappointment in the direction that we have gone, specifically in the last 10 years.

I think we've come a long way since the Civil Rights Movement. I think he would've been proud of the improvements that were made in the decades that followed his death. I was a child of the 80s and 90s. Specifically, in my teen years, in the 90s, I felt like racism was, you know, essentially a thing of the past. I felt like there are always going to be racist people, there are always, you know, going to be those people that exist, but I felt that we had moved to a point where everybody could live out the American Dream. That if you worked hard enough, if you had the motivation, that you could achieve anything you wanted to. And I think we live in a country today where anyone can achieve the American Dream, they can attain any level that they want to and there are no barriers in place. But I think that after the 90s, in this century, and specifically the last decade, this country is sadly moving back, away from those ideals. I think that we need to step up and be more mindful of separating people into groups, of intentionally judging people by the color of their skin rather than the content of their character. I think those are not the ideals that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. sought to achieve, and I see a prevalence of it coming that is very dangerous for our society. I think it's something that we all need to work harder to improve, to begin to ignore skin color as, you know, Morgan Freeman said, how do we end racism, we don't acknowledge it. He said I'm not a black man, I'm just a man. And I agree with that. I think that most people are good. I think that the bad are a small group. I think they're marginalized by their own words and I think we need to pay more attention to judging people on their merits.

And that's what I wanted to say on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Camden, Representative Doudera.

Representative **DOUDERA**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I just want to share a quick memory with you. My dad's birthday is tomorrow, he'll be 86 years old, and I did visit him over the weekend. And he and I talked, as we do every year, about the day in the 1960s; I was probably five or six years old; and we were picking him up at Newark Airport. And I ran up to him and hugged him and he kind of looked around and he said come with me, I think there's someone that you should meet. And we walked over to a group of men clustered together, skinny ties; black men; and they parted and there was Martin Luther King, Jr. And my father said something to him and nice to meet you and he reached down and touched me, and I will never forget that. There emanated from him a power that even at my young age, I could feel.

And as I've aged, especially on the weekend that we honor him, I've tried to learn more about the man and not just the myth that kind of, you know, not just the monuments and the stories that have kind of sprung up around him, but really learn about the man. And it's so incredible to me, someone who was such a revolutionary and so brave and had the strength of his convictions and knew that he was in grave danger as he practiced his nonviolence. And I hope that we all can kind of, on this day and when we think of him, sort of look beyond the holiday, look beyond the statues and really look to the teachings of this very important American figure. Thank you.
