SENATE PAPERS

The following Joint Resolution: (S.P. 929)

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING JANUARY 2024 AS CERVICAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, cervical cancer is the 4th most common cancer in women globally, with an estimated 604,000 new cases and 342,000 deaths in 2020; and

WHEREAS, most cervical cancer is caused by persistent infection with the human papillomavirus, or HPV; and

WHEREAS, the highest rates of cervical cancer incidence and mortality are in low-income and middle-income countries, which reflects major inequities driven by lack of access to the voluntary national HPV vaccination, cervical screening and treatment services and by social and economic determinants:

WHEREAS, women living with human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, are 6 times more likely to develop cervical cancer than women without HIV; and

WHEREAS, being voluntarily vaccinated at 9 to 14 years of age is a very effective way to prevent HPV infection, cervical cancer and other HPV-related cancers; and

WHEREAS, screening from 30 years of age, or from 25 years of age for women living with HIV, can detect cervical disease, the treatment of which prevents cervical cancer; and

WHEREAS, for women of any age with symptoms or concerns, early detection followed by prompt high-quality treatment can cure cervical cancer; and

WHEREAS, countries around the world are working to accelerate the elimination of cervical cancer in the coming decades, with an agreed set of 3 targets to be met by 2030: voluntary vaccination of 90% of girls by 15 years of age with the HPV vaccine; screening of 70% of women by 35 years of age and by 45 years of age with a high-quality test; and treatment of 90% of women with cervical disease; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate January 2024 as Cervical Cancer Awareness Month in order to express our support for public awareness and access to information and services.

Representative SALISBURY of Westbrook moved that the House **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rumford, Representative Henderson.

Representative **HENDERSON**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I stand today just to give some insight onto why this bill was brought forward. This was in response to something that had happened in my community, I believe it was late 2021 into 2022. I have a constituent who, out of the kindness of her heart, allowed a woman who was currently experiencing homelessness to come and reside with her for a short period of time while she got her feet; or got, you know, back on her feet. On day 15, the homeowner came home to find drug paraphernalia on her kitchen table. A verbal altercation ensued, law enforcement was called by the guest of my constituent. Law enforcement was effectively lied to and told that these two women were in a domestic partnership, which they weren't. They were lied to by the guest of this house. The homeowner was subsequently arrested and displaced from her home for 55 days. She was forced to find shelter in a women's homeless shelter in my area, she had to pay for her five cats to be housed as well. She lost her job due to a DV assault arrest, a job that she'd been at for over a decade. Really, this woman's life was turned completely upside down. She was allowed to return after 55 days. The judge had granted the resident of the home 30 days to evacuate, according to Maine Statute. The resident; or the guest that was that resident at the time proceeded to rent a U-Haul truck and empty her home.

What we have here in front of us, the bill that I proposed, the language isn't ready for primetime, I'm willing to accept that and I'm willing to accept the Ought Not to Pass to move forward. It was really close. Any time that you begin to delve into the world of domestic violence, domestic assault issues, being on the Judiciary Committee has really been an eye-opener on how fragile that ecosystem is and I really have just scratched the surface, in my knowledge. So, I understand that it's a difficult law to bring forward, but this law was intended to just clarify language on who a resident is, who a resident isn't, so that we don't have a repeat of this. My concern if this issue is not addressed is that as we, as the State of Maine, continue to see homelessness rise, we have a State filled with good quality people who many would be willing to open their homes on a temporary basis to allow people temporary asylum. My concern is that this will disenfranchise Maine's homeowners and property owners to not want to do that for fear of our own laws working against them.

So, although, again, this bill is not ready for primetime, it will be brought back next session. My hope had been that the Committee had been willing to give it some more time and just work through the language and tighten up on a couple spots, but today, as written, it is something I can't support, but did want to bring to light that we do have a gap in this portion of the law that needs to be addressed. Thank you.

Representative **THORNE**: Thank you Madam Speaker, permission to speak on the record.

Representative **THORNE**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Today is many things national day, it's National Opposites Day, it's National Irish Coffee Day, it's National Clashing Clothes day; and I'd like to thank the Representative from Milford for accommodating us on that. But it is also NASA's Day of Remembrance. NASA's Day of Remembrance is observed annually on the last Thursday of January, and this year it is today, January 25th. This day is organized by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, NASA, a body responsible for managing U.S. space research and other activities. Space exploration is perilous, yet scientists and astronauts accept this challenge bravely. This day commemorates the members of the NASA

family who gave up their lives to advance the cause of space discovery. These include, but are not limited to, the crew members of space missions Apollo 1, which occurred 57 years ago on January 27, 1967, when a fire broke out in the capsule and all three crew members perished. It also includes commemorating Space Shuttle *Challenger* which blew up on throttle-up 38 years ago, on January 28, 1986, and Space Shuttle *Columbia*, which broke up upon reentry 20 years ago, on February 1, 2003.

NASA administrator Bill Nelson said it best when he said our National Day of Remembrance honors the sacrifice of the NASA family who lost their lives in the pursuit of space discovery. While it is a solemn day, we are forever thankful that our fallen heroes shared their spirit of exploration with NASA, our country and the world. Today and every day we embrace NASA's core value of safety as we expand our reach into the cosmos for the benefit of all humanity.

Madam Speaker, with your permission, I would like to read a short poem by John Gillespie Magee, Jr. entitled "High Flight." Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth and danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings; Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling mirth of sun-split clouds, -and done a hundred things You have not dreamed of-wheeled and soared and swung High in the sunlit silence. Hov'ring there, I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung My eager craft through footless halls of air ... Up, up the long, delirious, burning blue I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace Where never lark nor ever eagle flew. And while with silent lifting mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space, Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.

Thank you. Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Wiscasset, Representative Polewarczyk, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **POLEWARCZYK**: Madam Speaker, each of us has days in our lives that we can never forget; we remember in great detail what happened those days. There were two such days, the loss of the *Challenger* crew and the loss of the *Columbia* crew. Incredible individuals that you work with day in and day out and they are very much a part of everything you do on the program. You do the very best that you can and you wonder, was there a decision that I made that caused this? Or, worse than that, was there a comment I could've made that would've prevented it? And that never goes away. We do the best we can, we try to make the best decisions we can and, at times, we fail. And we get through that and we go on. In this case, I have to thank God for having blessed me with being able to spend time with these incredible individuals. Thank you, Madam Speaker.
