More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Orrington, Representative Campbell.

Representative **CAMPBELL**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. For those of you don't serve on the Environment and Natural Resources Committee, we're in crisis mode to process the municipal solid waste in this State. Tonight, there's a hearing on the operator of Juniper Ridge Landfill and then, hopefully, behind that, comes an application to expand Juniper Ridge Landfill. Juniper Ridge, if expanded through an application process, it could take up to five years. Only, then, will have a life of 10 years, maybe 14.

As we all know, the law states that alternative energy is to be 80% by 2030, 100% by 2050. A large portion of that; well, a small portion of that energy at this point, six percent, is generated by alternative energy. Fifty-eight percent of that six percent is waste-to-energy. PERC right now is down. They aren't burning trash, they aren't creating energy. This bill would take away a good portion of the recycling and it would then add to the volume of landfills. So, we're here trying to do everything we can to get the life of our facilities that process municipal solid waste to take care of the waste, that the crisis isn't too far away. Almost in months, if not in a few years. So, to pass this bill, we're only adding; because it can't be counted as recyclable; we're only adding to landfills. So, I would recommend that we oppose the motion and go on to Ought Not to Pass. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Orchard Beach, Representative Gramlich.

Representative **GRAMLICH**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker and Esteemed Colleagues of the House, I rise today in support of the pending motion. This bill, Madam Speaker, is really quite simple. It does two things. First, the bill ensures that facilities processing plastic waste into fuel or toxic waste are regulated under Maine's solid waste laws. And second, it ensures that these facilities provide financial assurance for cleanup costs when they no longer operate.

Currently, and fortunately, there is no advanced recycling facility here in Maine. In the last few years, though, companies claiming, without any significant evidence, that advanced recycling will help address our plastic waste crisis. They have succeeded in passing laws in 24 states that reclassify advanced recycling facilities as manufacturing, rather than waste facilities. In one example, a company called Brightmark operates a facility in Indiana which they claim recycles plastic waste. But 70% of the output from this facility is plastic dry syngas, which Brightmark burns out onsite. Another 20% of the output is liquid fuel, which Brightmark ships to be burned offsite. The remaining 10% is a powdery residue which Brightmark landfills. It's important to note, Madam Speaker, that in other states, these facilities have received federal and state subsidies but end up being both environmentally and economically failures.

The bottom line is that burning plastics, either directly or indirectly through conversion into a fuel, does not constitute recycling according to Maine, national and international law. The end result of the laws passed in other states, including our neighbor in New Hampshire, is to exempt these facilities from state solid waste management laws and regulations. It allows facilities to evade the public permitting process, siting restrictions, reporting requirements and operating conditions that apply to all other solid waste facilities. LD 1660 will protect Maine from this type of harmful legislation by reinforcing Maine's solid waste hierarchy and accurately reflecting that this process and these facilities are not recycling. If passed, this bill would not prohibit a company from proposing advanced recycling facility in our State. However, it makes clear that if a facility is proposed, that the facility will be regulated like all other waste facilities and therefore, be subject to the requirements we have created to protect Maine residents and our environment from harm due to improper waste management.

Like other solid waste facilities, Madam Speaker, an advanced recycling facility would also have to protect taxpayers from shouldering short- and long-term cleanup costs by proving its financial ability to clean up releases from the facility and pay for the cost of closure and post-closure care and maintenance.

Colleagues in the House, I urge you to continue Maine's tradition of responsible waste management. Our laws and regulations ensure that the wastes we produce and the facilities that management are designed, sited, developed and operated in a way that limits any harm to our communities and our environment. Please vote in favor of the pending motion. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Albion, Representative Cyrway.

Representative CYRWAY: Thank you, Madam Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just wanted to speak about what happened this last fall. I had a call come in from Kennebec Water District stating that they couldn't haul the waste up to Canada and cross the country line because of our PFAS issue. And it was actually the next day, we found out there were 17 other sites that were going to have the same problem as Kennebec Water District, that they only have a certain amount of holding tanks to hold up to four to five days. And then if it overflows, it goes into the rivers. So, it was a serious issue. And then the Chief Executive had actually written a letter as an emergency-type letter, allowing the PFAS level to be changed just temporarily, and that didn't work because then we had 32 other sites; 32 in all from Bangor to Kittery that had the same problem that week. And so, on a Monday; this happened on a Friday; on a Monday, we had 32 sites was going to overflow into our rivers.

And so, we had a very big crisis and that's when we changed to LD 812, I believe, that gave us two years to come up with a solution. This here is just going to interfere with that and it's going to cause more of a crisis. If we can come up with a plan on how we can; I mean, I've come across several different plans, but one would be like a microwave plasma setup which could actually do zero emissions and zero waste, if we got one of those plants set up and be less transport and everything. So, I think there are some answers out there, but we need to look at how we can come up with a solution rather than adding to the problem. And I think that's what Representative Campbell is mentioning, that we are in crisis mode. So, I could not vote for this amendment, I think that we should be Ought Not to Pass and look at some solutions that take care of these people. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winter Harbor, Representative Faulkingham.

Representative **FAULKINGHAM**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, we can do better. We can do better with the way we handle plastics. Right now, plastics are handled in a linear fashion, which is to use them; make them, use them and then dispose them. And burying plastic in the ground isn't really a good solution.

There are emerging technologies, advanced recycling, and right now, we should just leave our laws alone rather than trying to look into the future and stop methods which will give us a better way to deal with our plastic problem. This is; I don't see plastic going away, you know, we have plastic all over the place, we're swimming in plastic, and if we continue this process of just putting the plastic in the ground, well, we're going to have to start turning them into ski slopes or something because there's going to be hills of plastic everywhere. There is a new process emerging where we can recycle this and get rid of it in a more environmentally-friendly way. So, I would encourage people to vote for the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report and let's do better with our plastics, Madam Speaker. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Camden, Representative Doudera.

Representative **DOUDERA**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I absolutely agree that we have a plastic problem and that we have to do better about plastics. However, the answer is not burning them. That is not the answer. The answer is in stopping plastics upstream. Things like what we're doing with our extended producer responsibility law and true recycling and starting to limit the amount of plastics that we need and that we use. It's not to burn them into our environment. Please support this motion. Thank you.

Representative **GREENWOOD**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. First and foremost, I want to thank the Good Representative from Boothbay for bringing this forward, this Department bill. I want to say that we support all of the changes that were proposed in the summary, which it increased the limit for using informal bidding processes, procurement goods and services from \$10,000 to \$25,000. It replaces the oral proposal with informal written quotes in the provisions. It also replaces the term Bureau of Purchases with Office of Procurement Services and the term State Purchasing Agent with Chief Procurement Officer. All of those things, we support.

However, what we noticed in this bill was a section that was changing the word from "shall" to "must". Basically, we at the State are requiring that our paper products be recycled for purchase. We are excluding all of our Maine forest products industries from even supplying paper; the paper that I'm reading from, the toilet paper that we used in the restroom this morning; because it's not recycled from our Maine forest products, our

Maine folks can't even bid on those contracts. So, the Minority Report is in support of everything that the Good Representative from Boothbay has brought forward, but it does require the recycling content requirement for paper products. I would ask that you vote down the pending motion, review the amendment. It is merely expanding so that we can purchase products from our Maine folks. Maine is known for its forest products and our Maine people should have the opportunity to bid on those contracts. Thank you.
