And do we need to be funding special interest groups, or should we be funding sources like our ed techs or even how about putting funding into rigorous, demanding and very relevant issues with regards to, like, professional training? We need to be supporting our teachers in the field and funding special interest groups does not fall into that category. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Brennan.

Representative **BRENNAN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I appreciate the comments from the Good Representative from Alfred. Every day, we engage in priority setting and that's why we have the Appropriations Table, we have the Appropriations Committee, because individual Committees decide that there's something that's worth financial consideration and we send it to the table for that consideration.

This bill is very straightforward. It's a half-million-dollar appropriation to continue to provide sexuality education in our schools. The Maine Family Planning has been doing this work for 10 years and that contract has been flat for the last 10 years. All this does is provide them the resource to continue to do the work, voluntarily. There's no school that has to adopt a curriculum, there's no school that has to utilize this information, it's totally voluntary. It allows them to continue to do that work that's vital for students and families across the State of Maine. So, again, I recognize there are a lot --

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. It's very difficult to hear a Member speaking on a microphone right now. The Chair reminds us to be respectful when each other is speaking and addressing the entire Body. The Member may proceed.

Representative **BRENNAN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I'd be more than happy to speak louder if that would be helpful.

Representative **BRENNAN**: So, anyway, I hope that people understand that this is simply an extension of what we're currently doing and providing the necessary resources for our schools, for students and for families. Thank you very much.

Representative **FOSTER**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This bill is basically an unnecessary bill that changes a few things in recently passed legislation that is now in Statute.

First of all, let me begin by saying we don't need to further subsidize, by using funds from taxpayers or Maine ratepayers, battery storage in the State of Maine. There is a lot of business happening in that area, we already have some large storage facilities in place and some on their way that have been placed there commercially without Maine ratepayer subsidies. Part of that is due to the high cost of electricity in the State of Maine and the ability for these companies to see a profit by storing energy and releasing it when peak rates are being used.

With that in mind, this bill seeks to combine language that would have storage be linked with solar, which is not necessary, as I've stated. It would also allow the Governor's Energy Office to petition the PUC to procure energy and storage capacity. Currently, the Legislature has had the ability in Statute to require the PUC to do so. And, finally, of concern is a change in a rule by allowing the Department of Labor routine technical rule capacity to work to have offshore wind contracts have labor standards within that language.

I would say that number one, Madam Speaker, I don't think we need to go out and look for federal tax dollars, which we all know comes from our folks as well as, and most especially, Maine ratepayer funds to subsidize battery storage in the State of Maine. That's already successfully being done and I hope you will follow my light. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Vassalboro, Representative Bradstreet.

Representative **BRADSTREET**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'd just like a little reminder here that the current Workers' Comp laws are the result of a major review this Legislature undertook in 2019. I remember it well because I was a Member of that Committee that reviewed and voted for the ensuing legislation. The current status of the cost-of-living adjustments is part of a compromise reached to ensure the continued viability of the entire Workers' Comp system. Workers' Comp is a very complicated entity, with multiple layers of consideration, and changing one portion of the agreed-upon compromise could certainly cause the entire system to unravel. We certainly don't want that.

This particular part of the agreement that we reached back then was part of an agreement that we came to to ensure the Workers' Comp system would be there for future years, and if we pull this out, it really does risk the entire system. And this particular bill is directed towards the adequacy of benefits and we certainly understand the challenge that people face when they stay on Workers' Comp for an extended period of time. However, the bill mentions nothing about examining the benefit adequacy and the changes to the bill's proponents have stated they wish to obtain. The aim of the bill is to increase the cost-of-living adjustment and that will affect the health of the overall Workers' Comp system and I think that is a glaring omission; any bill doing this should also look at the adequacy, the effect that this change will have on the entire system.

I'd like to remind the people that Workers' Compensation benefits are funded entirely by the employers. At the time the last overhaul of Workers' Comp was enacted just a few short years ago, Maine ranked around 17th highest in the nation for Workers' Comp costs. Today, even without any legislative changes, we rank about 6th in the nation. We're already headed in the wrong way. If we're serious about being competitive in a global marketplace, looking for employers who will open up shop here and offer attractive wages and benefits, we should not pass this bill. It is a proposal the end result of which will drive up costs and encourage investors to look elsewhere other than Maine to start and continue their businesses. They say it's only a study, but in reality, it's a backdoor effort to drive up Workers' Comp costs and hurt hardworking Mainers. I urge you to join me in voting against this bill. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Roeder.

Representative **ROEDER**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, I would venture to say that the majority, if not all, of our Committee has a lot of the same concerns as the Good Representative from Vassalboro. We know the system is precarious, we know that there was a big overhaul in 2019.

Personally, I am supporting this study because it will tell us where the holes are. It is a study to determine if the benefits we have are adequate. If, from that, we find out that the benefits are adequate, we put this issue to bed. I am always an advocate for more data. We make better decisions when we have more data, better data, the right data. I like that this got turned into a study, specifically because I don't want to make a decision in a vacuum without that data. I hope everyone will follow me in this because I think we do make better decisions when we have more information. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Orrington, Representative Campbell.

Representative **CAMPBELL**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. This bill, though well-intended, creates some burden on both the private sector and the public sector. For those who are really trying hard to manage their food waste program at this point, both public and private sectors are being adversely impacted.

What it does is over a period of time, July 2026, two or more tons per week located within 20 miles of an organic recycling facility; compost, or in Exeter, the anaerobic digester; would have to be taken to those facilities. July 2028, one ton or more within 25 miles; 2031, it is 100 pounds to one ton per week within 25 miles. And the whole purpose of this progression is to get it to a point where you won't be able to put food waste in your big green bag.

The purpose of the original bill was to eliminate all food waste going into the municipal solid waste system or landfills. The concerns are that there are only five of these facilities in the State, the most major being Exeter, the anaerobic digester. So, the cost to the environment just to truck this stuff, not only the separation of it but to truck this stuff to these facilities, is much more of a burden on the environment than the food waste, which is diminishing as it is more privately and publicly managed without this mandate. The concerns are that the infrastructure isn't there, there are only five facilities. Number two, Maine DEP opposes this bill because you're going to have to then create a storage system which then creates a public health concern before it gets to these facilities. Therefore, the DEP is opposed, for sure.

There are many diverse groups or stakeholders that oppose this bill. The DEP, for which I've talked, the Good Shepherd Food Bank, the University of Maine Public University System, Maine School Board Association, Maine School Superintendents Association, Maine Hospital Association, Maine County Commissioners Association, Maine Tourism Association, Maine Grocers and Food Producers Association and Hospitality of Maine. This is basically an unfunded mandate that's going to create a big burden on both the public and private sector, for which they're already doing a good job at managing it. So, therefore, I would oppose the motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Orchard Beach, Representative Gramlich.

Representative **GRAMLICH**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker and Colleagues of the House, I rise in support of the pending Ought to Pass as Amended motion. As identified by my colleague from Orrington, this bill sets up goals for the reduction of disposable food scraps and for food rescue, which is collecting edible food that would otherwise become solid waste. This bill was amended to provide definition of what is considered designated food waste generators based on the average amount of food waste generated weekly. A designated food waste generator is a person generating two or more tons per week of food waste located within 20 miles of an organics recycler within available capacity.

This bill, Madam Speaker, meets Maine's waste diversion goals and only impacts large businesses that produce more than two tons of food waste per week. This bill does not impact small businesses and others if that entity who produces less than two tons of food waste per week. And it should be noted, Madam Speaker, that this program has been very successfully implemented in both Massachusetts and Vermont, where they have successful food waste diversion programs. This bill will not, Madam Speaker, adversely impact municipalities due to the fact that less food waste will be going to landfills.

This is a reasonable bill, Madam Speaker, that adheres with Maine's recycling goals and further protects our environment with less waste going to our landfills. I urge my colleagues to support the pending Ought to Pass as Amended motion. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Chelsea, Representative Lemelin.

Representative **LEMELIN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I'm kind of blown away here. I'm shocked that we are even considering a bill like this at this time. The last two days, I sat in Appropriations with the Health and Human Services Committee and I listened to one hundred testimonies. Most of those testimonies were people crying their eyes out because they can't get the psychiatric care and other resources for their family members who are dying. We have so much to spend money on and yet we're considering \$500,000 for a food waste bill. I'm blown away.

What type of message are we really trying to send to the people of Maine? That food waste is more important than the psychological care, the medical care, the elderly that came before our Committee and bawled their eyes out and begged us for money? They begged. But yet we're going to consider \$500,000 for a bill for food waste which the Good Representative from Orrington already told us the Department is against and the resources are against it. So, I ask everybody in this Chamber to please reconsider their vote so that we can spend money on the families who are in dire need in Maine right now. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Montville, Representative Zeigler.

Representative **ZEIGLER**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I rise to support LD 1009. Many years ago, the State developed a hierarchy of dealing with solid waste. The top is reduction, then reuse, recycling, composting, waste incineration and, finally, at the bottom is landfilling. This bill was written to assist with taking solid organic waste, such as food, from the waste stream by composting or using digesters to turn the waste into a gas or a nontoxic liquid. In doing that, the material does not need to be taken to a landfill or burnt in an incinerator. Instead, through these processes, it will also produce a valuable fertilizer that will replenish our soils and help our farmers.

The bill has the ability to help reach the State goal of reducing solid waste below one-half ton per capita because, unfortunately, right now a lot of our waste is food. The bill will only apply to large generators of food waste that are located near composting or anaerobic digesting facilities. If those facilities do not exist at this time, they do not have to comply. This will increase the efficiency of dealing with food waste by reducing the distance the trucking is needed, as opposed to trucking waste, solid waste, all the way to Juniper Ridge at this moment, which wastes a tremendous amount of fuel. Only business and institutions that generate more than two tons of food waste per week, are located within 20 miles of a composting or anaerobic digestion facility are required to comply. DEP can give hardship waivers if they feel they are necessary. Farms that manage their waste are exempt. Because of the amount of generated organic waste, residents will not be included. Individual homes will not be included.

The separation of locations that generate waste would also assist in increasing the amount of food that could be usable to those food banks. As the amount of waste collected increases, the market should grow and the number of facilities dealing with the issue increases. The DEP, through rulemaking, can adjust the distance from the facilities and the amount of waste generated by producers. The DEP has been looking into organic waste since I have been in the Legislature. Some people have pointed to the fact that landfills do generate a gas, both because of impurities of the methane they produce and the inefficiency of generation, the amount that is produced could be better generated as specific digestors.

You only need to read the *Bangor Daily News* the last few weeks to see that people living near Juniper Ridge landfill have protested the need to enlarge the area. Also, a facility has to be built to filter PFAS from the leachate at that landfill. And, lastly, by reducing material going to the landfill, you reduce tipping fees to your community. If we can divert solid waste and make a usable commodity, we will come out ahead. On March 29th, I'm going to Portland to a trade show to see a digestor that can be scaled to work in a restaurant or much larger facility such as a school or supermarket. And the TD Bank is underwriting the ability to rent these to different entities. This would work nicely into the bill's goals.

Finally, as the Representative from Old Orchard Beach said, Maine would not be the first State to pass this type of law. Currently, nine states have enacted similar laws, including every one of the neighbors in New England. In every state, these laws have helped decrease the amount of waste that is landfilled or incinerated, increased the amount of food that is donated to hunger relief organizations and helped attract investment that has helped develop new composting and anaerobic digestion. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Bridgeo.

Representative **BRIDGEO**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the House. Frankly, my Good Friend from Montville has said it all, and I would only reiterate that I think this is a good bill; I think that our Committee worked diligently on this issue, taking into consideration a lot of the concerns that have been expressed by others here today, and I would urge you to support it. Thank you.

Representative **CRAVEN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This bill is designed to reduce the cost of brand-name drugs at the purchase point. There are many people, including seniors, that can't afford their medications that are prescribed for them. Prescription drug prices are the top concerns for folks, according to the Consumers for Affordable Health Care. List prices for brand-name drugs are much higher in the U.S. than they are in other developed countries. Some prices including, you know, coupons, rebates, are still much higher.

Pharmacy Benefit Managers, the PBMs, work with insurers to decide what medications patients; sorry, have to put on my glasses; what medications patients can get and how much people have to pay out of pocket. This bill would require insurers to share their rebates with the consumer at the purchase point, which I think it is intended to do. The PBMs receive and distribute millions of dollars every year to lessen costs for consumers, but they do not benefit from it.

Many, many people who have even very, very good insurances pay a lot out of pocket, for example, for medications for asthma and other brand-name medications that have a very, very high deductible. The pushback from insurers on this bill is that it would increase premiums. A similar bill has passed in a handful of states, including Arkansas, West Virginia and Tennessee. None of them have increased their premiums as a result of this legislation.

PBMs are not without blame in this situation, either, according to NEPA research. Transparency is missing from their business model. The report shows that their business model keeps shifting to maximize profits and hide from policymakers efforts to bring transparency and accountability to the practice. And I would ask that in this case we vote in favor of our constituents and not in favor of pharma or insurance companies. Thank you, Madam Speaker.
