(S.P. 270) (L.D. 653) (C. "A" S-579)

Was reported by the Committee on **Engrossed Bills** as truly and strictly engrossed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Moonen.

Representative **MOONEN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, Colleagues of the House, I wanted to rise for a moment just to make a few comments about the work that has gotten this bill to this point. Our State is in a constitutional crisis with people who are facing charges and do not have attorneys to represent them. We, on the Judiciary Committee, have been working very hard for a long time. We all acknowledge this crisis. We have done really good work together, almost always unanimously, but certainly always bipartisanly, to address this crisis. We, as a Body, established our first Public Defender Office in Kennebec County last year. It is up and running. We have heard nothing but glowing feedback about how that is working in Kennebec County to get people representation who we are constitutionally obligated to provide.

This bill in front of us again is the work of unanimous, really diligent work on the behalf of our Committee to take the next step and get Public Defender Offices up and running in the counties that are in greatest crisis right now in terms of people facing charges without an attorney to represent them. Those counties are Aroostook, Penobscot and Piscataquis. This bill accomplishes this without new money. It does so by transferring existing funds. We obviously have more work to do ahead of us. There are other counties that aren't in a position to have this yet, but we are hopeful that this will happen.

I just want to take a moment to thank several people who got us to this point, starting with the Representative from Skowhegan, Representative Poirier. We worked this plan out together to get this bill to this point. I want to thank the Senator from Oxford, Senator Keim, for allowing us to use her bill as a vehicle for this important work while also preserving some of the original intent of her bill. Finally, I want to thank the Representative from Rumford, Representative Henderson, for the final amendment that landed the plane.

This is really, really critical that we get this done and that we get these folks attorneys, not only so that they can be represented, but so that those who are victims can also get justice and so that everyone can get their day in court. And I also want to thank the folks on the Appropriations Committee who have been working with us to get this across the finish line. This is an extraordinary step that we should all be proud of. We have a lot more to do, but this is a great start. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Skowhegan, Representative Poirier.

Representative **POIRIER**: Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. I, too, want to rise and say that I completely agree with everything the Good Representative just said. This is a bill that, unlike most others, we were all backing and pushing for this to happen. The Commission has identified these areas as the greatest need and this bill is a step forward to help Maine become closer to our constitutional obligation to provide counsel. So, we're very excited to see this through and I, too, thank everybody for their cooperation and collaboration to get this to happen. It does change the name, which we all know,

through MCILS, to the Maine Commission on Public Defense Services, which we believe more accurately also reflects the services that they provide. So, thank you very much.

Subsequently, this being an emergency measure, a twothirds vote of all the members elected to the House being necessary, a total was taken. 118 voted in favor of the same and 0 against, and accordingly the Bill was **PASSED TO BE ENACTED**, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.
