JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING APRIL 2023 AS CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

WHEREAS, child abuse is a community problem, and finding solutions depends on recognizing that the effects of child abuse and neglect are felt by whole communities and need to be addressed by the entire community; and

WHEREAS, effective child abuse and neglect prevention programs succeed because partnerships are created among government agencies, policymakers, nonprofit organizations, health care providers, schools, faith communities, businesses and law enforcement agencies; and

WHEREAS, when families lack access to adequate financial resources, a stable living situation, nutritious food, affordable health care, quality child care and education, a child's healthy development is at risk; and

WHEREAS, all Maine citizens should become more aware of child abuse and neglect and its prevention and become involved in the raising of children in a safe, secure, nurturing environment; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize April 2023 as Child Abuse Prevention Month, to recognize that we all have a role to play in strengthening families so as to ensure healthy child development and a duty to help others recognize that role and to celebrate the positive community connections available to our families and caregivers to promote the health and well-being of Maine children and help prevent child abuse and neglect.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE WEEK OF APRIL 1, 2023 TO APRIL 7, 2023 AS THE WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD

WHEREAS, the Maine Association for the Education of Young Children and the National Association for the Education of Young Children are celebrating the Week of the Young Child, April 1, 2023 to April 7, 2023; and

WHEREAS, these groups are committed to the healthy development of all young children in Maine through strengthening and building systems of equitable access to high-quality early childhood education; and WHEREAS, children's cognitive, physical, social and emotional development and language and literacy development are built on a foundation of their positive interactions with adults, peers and their environment; and

WHEREAS, Maine's early childhood education workforce is vital to providing a nurturing and educational foundation of early care and learning experiences for young children; and

WHEREAS, seventy percent of children under 6 years of age in Maine have all available parents in the workforce; and

WHEREAS, access to high-quality child care is a necessity for many families in our community to participate in the workforce; and

WHEREAS, high-quality early childhood programs provide important benefits to children, families and state and national economies; and

WHEREAS, celebrating the Week of the Young Child enables the recognition and advancement of the early childhood education profession; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize April 1, 2023 to April 7, 2023 as the Week of the Young Child and encourage all residents to work to support and invest in early childhood in the State.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Sagadahoc, Senator Vitelli.

Senator VITELLI: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I rise to speak very briefly to this occasion. Some of you know this but I started out my career in the State as a Head Start teacher in the classroom and, as I said yesterday, there's nothing as awe inspiring, humbling, and delightful as being in charge of a roomful of four and five year olds. The work of our early childhood professionals is critical to the overall success of our economy and our children's wellbeing for sure. The workforce behind the workforce is something that we need to pay special attention to as our economy gears back up and continues to grow and expand and provide all of us a life that we wish to have for ourselves and our families. It's really critical that Maine families have access to high quality pre-K and early childhood experiences for their children. Maine families are asking for access to these services. In order to make Maine's early childhood programs sustainable, we need to do our part to invest in our children by investing in those who take care of the children while many of us are working in order to take care of our families at large. So, I just want to remind you all of something that I learned in my years as a Head Start teacher, three things that have carried me through all the work that I've done since, which is that it's important to share your toys, take turns, and play well together. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Rafferty.

Senator **RAFFERTY**: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Vitelli. I'll try to add to that but I know I can't improve on those comments, but thank you for them. I witnessed the results of early childhood education recently. My granddaughter had a party, had a facility that included ten 2-year olds, and to watch that group of kids interact and play throughout an afternoon. There was no fighting. You know, everything was pretty much in order and I was just amazed, just though the practice of all their daycare that they go to, that they were able to sit, celebrate a birthday, have cake, ice cream, and all those things in such, what I would say, controlled behaviors. I mean, as educators are people that work with young kids look at people that work at high schools and say 'How can they do it?' People in high school always look at middle school teachers and say 'How can you do it?' But I just want to take a moment to recognize the folks that work with these early childhood educators, thank you for your dedication. The work that you do with our youngest learners, you set the tone for education for these children moving forward. I know that you don't hear it enough but what you do and who you are makes a difference and we greatly appreciate it. Thank you very much.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Waldo, Senator Curry.

Senator CURRY: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to add my voice of appreciation and thanks. I had not planned on speaking and so I will do this off the cuff. I had the great pleasure when I worked on a contract grant for - with MaineWorks. The quality of driving around the state and supporting their quality improvement assessments and part of that gig was going into early childcare facilities and observing based on an instrument - an assessment. Separate from the assessment, I was amazed at the professionalism and quality and compassion of the educators. Not only were the educators amazing with the kids, they were also amazing teaching the new educators of how to do this work. It was just an incredibly powerful experience to go into tens of early child education facilities and programs and watch these professionals at work. I will say last session, during the - in the IDEA Committee, we heard the bill on increasing funding and supports that we passed for early child educators and it was heartbreaking to hear one particular testimony. We had a director of a center who, with 19 years experience, that informed us after this incredibly compelling testimony that she had to leave the field because she no longer felt the salary she could bring in was responsible for her and caring for her own family, and I want to continue to lift up the priority that we have as a duty to stabilize and strengthen this profession of incredible educators. So, I want to thank them and I also want to charge us to continue to do the really important work of supporting them. Thank you very much.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Bailey.

Senator **BAILEY**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I just wanted to rise to express my thanks and gratitude to these early childhood educators and I want them to know, in case they ever wonder if what they do makes a difference, unlike the good Senator from Sagadahoc, who was a Head Start teacher, I am actually a Head Start graduate and so I am proof of the difference that it makes and I went from graduating from Head Start to being the first in my family to go to college, then going on to law school, becoming a probate court judge, serving in the House of Representatives, and now serving here in the Senate. Now I know some of my colleagues may, you know, think that's not necessarily a good thing but I think it is proof of the good work that these early childhood educators do. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Guerin.

Senator **GUERIN**: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I, too, would add my voice to those praising the early childhood education going on in our state, especially the beautiful work being done in homes across the state of Maine in their arena of early childhood education. I have two families from my district here today and I know the education of their children started long before the kindergarten classroom. They were enriching the lives of their children and their friends' children through the home-schooling movement.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Lyford.

Senator **LYFORD**: Thank you, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I also would like to rise. For over 32 years, my mother ran a nursery school, and I know those words aren't used much anymore, but the things that she went through were tremendous to help those children get started good. I can remember her struggling during the winter to put snowsuits on and boots and gloves. I even watched one day when she worked hard to get a young man's boots and shoes and gloves all on and he looks up to her and he said 'Those aren't mine.'

WHEREAS, the Maine Association of REALTORS® has more than 6,200 members actively involved in the business of real estate and it has approximately 400 affiliate members, including lenders, appraisers, title companies, building inspectors, surveyors and insurance providers; and

WHEREAS, the not-for-profit trade association provides each member with an equal voice and representation in the real estate profession, serving members in all 16 Maine counties and in their communities; and

WHEREAS, a healthy supply of affordable, safe, secure and highquality residential and commercial real estate inventory statewide supports the continuing growth of Maine's economy; and

WHEREAS, real estate transactions stimulate Maine's economy and include not only the money spent and reinvested in the sale price of a property but all those services and expenditures that occur in relation to a property transaction, for both a buyer and a seller; and

WHEREAS, according to national statistics, it is estimated that one job is generated for every 2 home sales, each home sale contributes about \$146,000 to the economy and the real estate industry accounts for 18.6% of the gross state product; and WHEREAS, the real estate market in Maine is strong, as evidenced by the number of home sales and the overall impact on Maine's economy in 2022 of 15.7 billion dollars; and WHEREAS, real estate ownership is an investment in the future and one of the best ways to build financial security through equity accumulation, and for many in Maine their real property ownership represents their life savings; and WHEREAS, expanding real property ownership will strengthen our State and its families and communities, enhance our economy and create jobs; now, therefore, be it **RESOLVED:** That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, take this opportunity to recognize the Maine Association of REALTORS® and its members for their positive contributions to and the significant role they play in the lives of Maine citizens and their communities and that their service and dedication to this State are a tribute to those values and principles that we all hold dear; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Maine Association of REALTORS® and Maine's 12 local association boards and councils.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Pouliot.

Senator POULIOT: Thanks, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I appreciate the patience. You caught me off a little guard there. I was actually texting one of my clients to see if they wanted their commercial condo to get on the market in Portland. So, maybe some of the folks in the gallery can help me sell it. You know, gimme gimme shelter, I'm going to fade away, that's a line from Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones. I'm not going to sing it or you'd all leave but, you know, we all want a safe place to call home. How can we expect those who do not have a stable shelter to not just fade away, Mr. President? This is a challenging endeavor because it brings about a close interface with the difficult work that we must do to address the chronic lack of supply of housing in our state and, frankly, in this country. But there is good news, Mr. President, today is Realtor Rally Day. This is my favorite day of the session. These are the men and women on the frontlines every day fighting the good fight to ensure all Maine people have a warm, safe place to call home. In 2022, the state of Maine had a population of 1.382 million, having grown an annualized .7% over the five years to 2022, which ranks it 19th out of all 50 U.S. state by growth rate. Maine's gross state product in 2022 reached 62.7 with a growth of 2% over the five years to 2022. Businesses in Maine employed a total of 672,969 people with an average annual employment growth over the past years of .4%. The top three sectors, Mr. President, by total employment are real estate, rental leasing, health care, social assistance, manufacturing. You know, real estate and rental and leaving accounts for nearly 18,000 jobs in the state with about 6,000 or so of those being real estate agents. While this may seem like a low number relative to our total population, the number of jobs created related to our industry is well over 100,000 when you consider construction jobs created by real estate transactions, the amount of professional services engaged in the industry. I'm encouraged to see so many of my peers in the real estate industry here today and I hope you'll seek out your local realtor and build a relationship with them to have a better understanding of what the challenges they're facing, those trying to access quality housing here in Maine, Mr. President. Thank you and, again, don't miss the lunch down in the Hall of Flags from now until 1 o'clock. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: At this time, the Chair we're going to move into - we're going to pause and move into the Legislative Scholarship portion because the House, obviously, has recognized them and they're down here in this Chamber. Senator BRAKEY: Thank you, Mr. President. The legislation before us, first of all let me say I think it is very well-motivated and well-intended, but for many - for several members of the committee there's simply a bridge too far in terms of the government's reach into the private decision of private businesses in terms of the products that they sell to their customers. The Representative who brought this legislation forward identified a problem, which I do not contest perhaps as a problem. That problem is insurance companies requiring physicians and all sorts of health care providers to continue to meet these standards by certification organizations called Maintenance of Certification. Basically, for those unfamiliar with it, a health care practitioner gets their basic license and then many of these certification boards like the health care practitioners to continue to do continuing training in the years after to maintain their certification and many insurance companies require for reimbursement at full reimbursement - for payment at full rates that those - that maintenance of certification continues to take place. I'm not going to contest the idea that perhaps in some case these requirements are overzealous. I'm not going to contest that perhaps this does contribute to some degree with not having as many health care practitioners in the state as we otherwise would. I just would say that I think that this is a real problem but the wrong angle of attack. Rather than trying to micromanage the individual policies of insurance companies, we

should really be looking at how do we create pathways for patients to not have to go through insurance companies for routine health care so that you don't have these third party middlemen dictating the terms as far as access to health care. That's something I hope that in the Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee we will be exploring more in this session and the session ahead. But, simply, this is a philosophically this is a bridge too far for me, going into these private insurance companies and trying to micromanage their policies. So, for that reason, I am opposed to the motion and I appreciate the time and consideration of this Body.

Albert U. Liberatore, of Bangor, a Doctor of Dental Medicine. Dr. Liberatore moved to Maine and started practicing dentistry in 1973 in a small home office on School Street in Brewer. After moving to Massachusetts and earning a certificate in orthodontics and dentofacial orthopedics, he returned to Maine in 1983 and founded a new practice. His career in dental medical lasted for more than 37 years. Active in his community, he took on many leadership roles, including running the Rotary Club's "Angel Tree Drive." and cofounding the John Bapst hockey program. He also spearheaded the restoration project of John Bapst High School's Steinway grand piano. Piano was one of his greatest passions for 71 years. His love of music took him across the country to learn from some of the greatest Blues musicians of his time. Over the years, he composed and recorded his music and spent many evenings playing the piano for the patrons of Manna Soup Kitchen in Bangor. He became involved with youth hockey in the early 1980s and remained very active in it for more than 30 years. He ran the Learn To Skate program, as making the sport of hockey accessible to children was extremely important to him. Following his retirement, in 2010, his family, friends and colleagues established a scholarship in his honor providing recipients with funding to not only learn to skate but also purchase equipment each year they continue to play. Dr. Liberatore will be long remembered and sadly missed by his family and friends and all those whose lives he touched. HLS 219
