The following Joint Resolution:

H.P. 1058

**JOINT RESOLUTION  
MAKING APPLICATION TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES CALLING A CONVENTION UNDER ARTICLE V OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION TO PROPOSE AMENDMENTS TO THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION TO IMPOSE FISCAL RESTRAINTS ON THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, LIMIT THE POWER AND JURISDICTION OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND LIMIT THE TERMS OF OFFICE FOR ITS OFFICIALS AND FOR MEMBERS OF CONGRESS**

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against future abuses of power by the Federal Government; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, most of which are unfunded to a great extent; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has ceased to operate under a proper interpretation of the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, it is the solemn duty of the states to protect the liberty of the American people, particularly for the generations to come, by proposing amendments to the United States Constitution for the purpose of restraining these and related abuses of power; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Legislature of Maine respectfully applies to the Congress of the United States to call a convention for the specific and exclusive purpose of proposing amendments to the United States Constitution that impose fiscal restraints on the Federal Government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the Federal Government and limit the terms of office for Federal Government officials and members of Congress; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this application by this body constitutes a continuing application in accordance with the United States Constitution, Article V until at least two-thirds of the legislatures of the several states have made similar application pursuant to Article V but, if Congress proposes an amendment to the United States Constitution imposing fiscal restraints on the Federal Government, limiting the power and jurisdiction of the Federal Government or limiting the terms of office for Federal Government officials and members of Congress, this application for a constitutional convention is no longer of any force or effect for that subject matter; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this application is void, rescinded and of no effect in the event that such a convention is not limited to such specific and exclusive purposes; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this body proposes that the legislatures of each of the several states comprising the United States apply to the Congress requesting the enactment of appropriate amendments to the United States Constitution or requiring the Congress to call a convention for proposing such amendments to the United States Constitution; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Secretary of the Senate and presiding officers of both houses of the legislatures of each of the several states in the nation, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate and each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

**JOINT RESOLUTION  
RECOGNIZING APRIL 2023  
AS ORGAN DONATION MONTH**

WHEREAS, there are more than 104,200 Americans, and more than 6,300 in New England, currently waiting for a lifesaving organ transplant; and

WHEREAS, there are over 1,000,000 life-enhancing tissue transplants each year that are made possible by the generous donation of corneas, bone or skin or other tissue; and

WHEREAS, residents of this State can help to save lives and benefit up to 50 recipients by signing up to become organ and tissue donors and enrolling in the Maine Organ Donor Registry when applying for or renewing driver's licenses or other state identifications or by registering online at RegisterMe.org; and

WHEREAS, ninety-eight percent of all people in Maine who register to become a donor do so at the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, which is an important part of reaching and surpassing the national goal of signing up 50% of the driving population to become donors; and

WHEREAS, Organ Donation Month pays tribute to organ and tissue donors and their families whose decision to donate enables others to receive lifesaving organs and tissues for transplant; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize April 2023 as Organ Donation Month, and we encourage residents to register as organ and tissue donors; and be it further

RESOLVED: That a suitable copy of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to New England Donor Services of Waltham, Massachusetts.

So, I just want to conclude quickly by saying thank you to all of the organ donors who have given the gift of life and to everyone who supports this important cause, and I hope you'll join me in adding such an endorsement to your driver's license this year, if you haven't already. **JOINT RESOLUTION  
DESIGNATING MAY 7-13, 2023  
AS TARDIVE DYSKINESIA AWARENESS WEEK**

**WHEREAS**, many people with serious, chronic mental health conditions, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder or severe depression, or gastrointestinal disorders, including gastroparesis, nausea and vomiting, require treatment with medications that work as dopamine receptor blocking agents, or DRBAs, including antipsychotic medications; and  
**WHEREAS**, while ongoing treatment with these medications can be very helpful, and even lifesaving, for many people, it can also lead to tardive dyskinesia; and  
**WHEREAS**, tardive dyskinesia is a movement disorder that is characterized by random, involuntary and uncontrolled movements of different muscles in the face, trunk and extremities; and  
**WHEREAS**, tardive dyskinesia can develop months, years or decades after a person starts taking DRBAs and even after they have discontinued use of those medications. Not everyone who takes a DRBA develops tardive dyskinesia, but if it develops it is often permanent; and  
**WHEREAS**, it is estimated that over 600,000 Americans suffer from tardive dyskinesia, and, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, one in every 4 patients receiving long-term treatment with an antipsychotic medication will experience tardive dyskinesia; and  
**WHEREAS**, tardive dyskinesia is often unrecognized and patients suffering from the disorder are commonly misdiagnosed, and regular screening for tardive dyskinesia in patients taking DRBAs is therefore recommended by the American Psychiatric Association; and  
**WHEREAS**, while years of difficult and challenging research have resulted in recent scientific breakthroughs regarding tardive dyskinesia, it is important to continue to raise awareness of tardive dyskinesia in the public and the medical community; now, therefore, be it  
**RESOLVED**: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate May 7-13, 2023 as Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week and respectfully encourage each individual in the State to become aware of and better informed about tardive dyskinesia.

Senator **BALDACCI:** Thank you, Mr. President. I would just - just to give the Senate some background and information about why we voted Ought Not to Pass. Maine people use Electronic Benefit Transfers, or EBT, cards through several programs. These include the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program and other programs intended to support Maine families as they work toward their education goals and self-support. The

bill, as written, is in violation of federal law and requirements. Federal law requires states to ensure recipients have access to cash assistance. Failing to meet that requirement would likely result in the Administration of Children and Families rejecting Maine's required TANF state plan, jeopardizing Maine's eligibility for \$76 million a year in TANF block grant funds. Finally, the bill will contradict one of the primary purposes of TANF, which is to aid families so that children may be cared for in their own home. The proposed change would greatly impact the family's ability to pay rent and utilities, as most landlords and utility companies do not accept EBT card payments. While most of these cash payments issued on EBT cards can be utilized as a point-of-sale transaction at a retailer, direct cash withdrawals are critical to ensure families can access supports quickly and in a flexible manner and allow for efficient and cost-effective options. Many vendors such as electric, water, sewer, oil, and landlords do not accept EBT card payments. I would ask the Senate to join me in voting Ought Not to Pass.

On motion by Senator **BRAKEY** of Androscoggin, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

**THE PRESIDENT:** The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Brakey.

Senator **BRAKEY:** Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to the Ought Not to Pass Report. Some background on this legislation and why I believe some version of it is necessary. In 2015, in the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature, there was a bipartisan recognition that there was need for welfare reform in the State of Maine. After a series of reports that showed EBT card transactions in all variety of places where you wouldn't - you would certainly hope that welfare dollars were not being spent. These are programs that are intended - particularly the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program, these are dollars that are intended for helping needy families in a temporary time of need get back on their feet. Emphasis on families. And yet we saw transactions at liquor stores, we saw problems with lottery tickets and alcohol and cigarettes being purchased. And so, there was a bipartisan legislation. I worked with then-Senator Libby of Androscoggin County - it seems there's a rule, there's always got to be a Senator Libby in this Body, but different Senator Libby, Senator Libby of Androscoggin County - to pass legislation where we prohibited the purchase of alcohol, cigarettes, lottery tickets, and other - other items that were deemed to be outside the purpose of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program from being eligible for the use of those dollars. Now, the loophole, though, is that that EBT card, those TANF dollars, can be withdrawn as cash. And so, while it's prohibited that those dollars can be used for these purchases, if you go to an ATM, withdraw cash, and then go pay for alcohol, cigarettes, lottery tickets, or any of the prohibited items, there's no way of being assured that the dollars are being used properly. So, this bill came forward, and I will note that there were hundreds of items of testimony submitted by members of the public in support of this legislation who submitted testimony online. There were some challenges raised in the public hearing, as Senator Baldacci mentions, around federal requirements for the availability of cash in the TANF program. I will say while I - because the matter before us is the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report, I can't speak to the committee amendment on this bill at this present time. However,

if this - if we did reject the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report, I'd be happy to speak to the details of the committee Ought to Pass Report, which I think represents a very moderate proposal for how we ensure the integrity of the federal requirements and ensure the integrity of tax dollars. Thank you very much.
