I really wish that there were more folks in the world like Mark. He was full of joy, full of passion, and he contributed mightily to the fabric of our community. WHEREAS, for over a century, Arab Americans have been making valuable contributions to virtually every aspect of American society, including in medicine, law, business, education, technology, government, military service and culture; and

WHEREAS, people of Arab ethnicity and culture who have immigrated to America have shared their rich culture and traditions with neighbors and friends, while also setting fine examples as model citizens and public servants; and

WHEREAS, these immigrants brought with them to America their resilient family values, strong work ethic, dedication to education and diversity in faith and creed, which have added strength to our great democracy; and

WHEREAS, Arab Americans have enriched our society by sharing in the entrepreneurial American spirit that makes our nation free and prosperous; and

WHEREAS, the history of Arab Americans in the United States continues to be characterized by misconceptions, bigotry and anti-Arab hate expressed by crimes and hate speech; and

WHEREAS, the civil rights abuses, harmful stereotyping and bullying suffered by Arab Americans must be combated with education and awareness; and

WHEREAS, Arab Americans join all Americans in the desire to see a peaceful and diverse society where every individual is treated equally and feels safe; and

WHEREAS, the incredible contributions and heritage of Arab Americans have helped us build a better nation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to designate April 2023 as Arab American Heritage Month.

Senator BALDACCI: Thank you, Mr. President, and I just want to first say I appreciate my colleagues' indulgence on this matter. This is the first time I had to ask this Resolution as - since being in the State Senate, to be read. It really exemplifies the lives that my grandmother and her sisters all lived and this - these remarks are really dedicated to those four young women from Lebanon who came to this country in the 1910s and really to all immigrants who come to this country even today. These young women were my grandmother, Rose Saad Karam, and her sisters. They came to America as teenagers who literally had not a penny to their names, but what they did have was a belief in faith, family, and hard work that transcended nationality. Today, the Head of Falls area in Waterville is a very bucolic and nice park. In the 1910s. that area was filled with tenements of poor Lebanese and Syrian immigrants, and that is where my grandmother and great-aunts lived, and that is where my mom was born. Connected to this area today is still what is called the Two-Penny Bridge. The Lebanese had to pay two pennies to walk across the bridge and go to their jobs at the textile mills. My sittoo, which is Arabic for grandmother, and her sisters, Mintaha and Mary, worked at these mills. My aunt Mintaha lived in Waterville all of her life. She married a young Irish orphan who had been adopted and raised

by a Lebanese couple, and his name, that young orphan's name was George Mitchell, Sr. My grandmother Rose married a young Lebanese immigrant from Bangor and started a small grocery store in Bangor. When I think of all the hateful actions and attitudes directed towards today's new Americans, I remember that this has happened many times before and somehow, with faith and freedom, we have overcome before and we will, as Americans, continue to welcome new people to our great democracy, and we will continue to move forward as one nation under God. Thank you.

MAKING SEPARATE APPLICATIONS TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES CALLING CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTIONS TO CONSIDER REPRESENTATIONAL INTEGRITY AND PROPOSE AMENDMENTS ESTABLISHING TERM LIMITS FOR CONGRESS AND ADDRESSING CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution, Article V places substantial authority and responsibility upon the legislatures of the several states to ensure that the Federal Government and each of its branches remain within their enumerated powers and remain protective of the rights of the people; and

WHEREAS, a variety of important movements have arisen within the legislatures of the several states to address a wide variety of concerns that may be appropriately addressed within the context of Article V of the United States Constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, the Legislature of Maine wishes to address these various approaches in a bipartisan manner; and

WHEREAS, an agreement to call for a convention under Article V of the United States Constitution does not commit the Legislature of Maine to approve any proposal that may arise from any subsequent convention; rather, this Legislature is simply exercising its will to engage in a formal process with other states

to give full and authoritative consideration to various proposals consistent with the topics expressed by this joint resolution; and WHEREAS, under the United States Constitution, Article V, the Congress of the United States, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to the United States Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments that, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the United States Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the Congress; now, therefore, be it

Senator CARNEY: Thank you, Mr. President. Colleagues of the Senate, I just wish to speak to you about this important bill. LD 564 is an Act to Improve Access to Civil Legal Services. What this legislation does is it increases funding for civil legal services that are used throughout our state to help Mainers with low or no income in a range of civil matters. From helping veterans access benefits they earned through serving our country in the armed forces - and I would just note that Maine is a leader in the nation in providing civil legal services to both Mainers - and actually our resources are used by veterans across the country - as well as to, for example, protecting older Mainers from financial exploitation and other harm. Funding requested in this bill will be distributed to the seven legal services providers through the Civil Legal Services Fund Commission, which is a commission created by our statutes consisting of three persons knowledgeable about the problems of ensuring access to justice in this state, and they determine how to distribute the funds in a manner that will be most efficiently and effectively maintained and enhance access to justice in Maine. If enacted, LD 564 aims to provide \$3.9 million in the first year of this biennium and \$7.8 million in the second year of this biennium, although in reality it will probably go to the Appropriations Table. Maine's civil legal services agencies, I would like to share with you, provide excellent representation to Mainers throughout our state on critical matters that vulnerable families face; including the custody of a child, the loss of a home, essential services for veterans, financial exploitation, domestic violence, unemployment, and food insecurity. We can and must do everything we can to ensure that Maine provides adequate civil legal aid funding to meet the challenges that Mainers throughout our state with no or low-income face and I urge you all to support the pending motion. Thank you.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Brakey.

Senator BRAKEY: Thank you, Mr. President and colleagues of the Senate. The right to work is as natural and unalienable as any other right that we possess. This legislation before us is the product of collaboration between lawmakers and it would direct the Department of Labor to request a federal waiver to allow presumptive work eligibility for asylum seekers who reside here in the state of Maine. This collaboration between lawmakers has come together despite many disagreements over many of the other questions involved in the immigration debate but, instead of focusing on those questions that divide us, we focused on areas of shared common ground. In the years past, there were fierce arguments in this Chamber over whether asylum seekers should qualify for taxpayer funded welfare programs and that's not the subject of this bill today. I'm sure there're going to be debates in the future around all of that. As far as I can tell, the Speaker of the House, who is the lead co-sponsor on this bill with me, she and I are probably as far apart on that question as any two members of this legislature can be, but that did not stop us from collaborating on this bill. Those disagreements did not stop other members of this Body, including Senator Hickman, Senator Stewart, Senator Keim, and Senator Bennett, from joining on as co-sponsors of this legislation and members of all four caucuses in the legislature from signing on and even received a unanimous report from the Committee on Labor and Housing, a rare moment of agreement between Senator Tipping and myself. However, we got into the situation where we are today. The facts are pretty straight forward. We have a workforce shortage. We also have many asylum seekers residing in Maine who would gladly work available jobs and federal laws standing in the way. For any familiar with the terminology, an asylum seeker is a non-citizen who has requested to remain in America on the grounds that they have been forcibly displaced from their home country due to war or other factors harming them or their family. Evaluating that request can take many years. If granted asylum, they are authorized to work, apply for a social security card, request permission to travel overseas, petition to bring family members, and qualify for federal welfare benefits. If denies, they are not allowed to remain in the country. In the space between applying and receiving a determination, asylum seekers are caught in a legal limbo that can stretch on for years. They're allowed to remain in the country but they are not eligible for federal welfare benefits. They are prohibited from working for the first six months after they file for asylum and they must renew a work permit

annually afterwards. Additionally, even when filing to renew a work permit on time, federal officers are often backed up with renewal requests and delayed renewals regularly require asylum seekers in Maine to leave jobs that they are already well established and creating disfunction for them and for their employer. Here in Maine, we are one of a handful of states that has responded to this situation by making asylum seekers eligible for state taxpayer funded welfare benefits, primarily for the general assistance program. This policy has always been controversial and only stands today due to a botched pocket veto that I won't go into the history of, but there is some interesting history there all the same, and there were many heated debates around that policy. But even as I chaired the Health and Human Services Committee along side Representative Drew Gattine and former-Representative Patty Hymanson, Republican and Democrat caucuses could all agree on one thing, that the federal prohibition of work just makes everything in this entire situation much worse. Whatever your individual view on broader questions of immigration and welfare eligibility, it is clearly better for society, as a whole, when people are allowed to be in - who are allowed to be in this country are collecting paychecks instead of welfare checks and any policy that would prohibit a man from earning an honest days wage to care for his family and reduce him instead to total dependency on taxpayer funded welfare benefits is an insult to the work ethic America was built upon and the dignity of the human spirit. In those years on Health and Human Services, we discussed several potential solutions, including the possibility of state nullification, just as Maine nullified federal cannabis prohibition, by establishing in state statute that asylum seekers can work in the state of Maine. The flaw in that idea, however, was that asylum seekers ultimate immigration status hangs on a determination from the federal government. No matter what state law says, violations of federal work prohibitions can result in the denial of an asylum application. So, we left those conversations with clear resolution other than a unanimous decision to send a letter to our federal delegation asking them to work on the issue. Half a decade later, I appreciate the work that's been done, but they're still working on the issue. Along with the co-sponsors from all four caucuses, I introduced this bill to give Washington D.C. just another push and a suggested pathway for granting presumptive work eligibility for asylum seekers here in Maine. This bill would do exactly what it says. It would just direct the Department of Labor to request a federal waiver to allow presumptive work eligibility for asylum seekers. If that waiver were granted, it would mean asylum seekers in Maine, instead of being sent to the state welfare office the moment they applied, can instead to directed to a job fair to contribute to the community that they are joining and earn an honest living in the American way. Now, some have questioned whether the federal government will even accept requests for waivers on the work prohibition. I say send the request anyway. Conversation on this legislation in Maine has sparked desire for waivers in other states across the union and the more states demonstrate demand for waivers the more it raises the issue in Congress. Further, passing this legislation would present directly to Washington a federalist solution more politically viable than a one-size fits all change effecting all 50 states. As I understand it, the work prohibitions are driven, at least in part, by concerns in southern states about immediate work eligibility incentivizing illegal border crossings and false asylum applications. From up here in New England, I'm not qualified to tell Arizona or Texas what makes sense in their unique position on the Mexican border. At the

same time, this one-size fits all policy based on the situations of southern states is contributing to economic chaos here in Maine. So, a vote for this legislation simply tells Washington D.C. that Maine wants a waiver to let people work. Thank you for your time and consideration. I hope you join me in passing this legislation today and, furthermore, I request a roll call on the pending motion.
