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

ORDERS.

On motion of Mr. Walker of Starks, Ordered, the Senate concurring that the committee on education be granted the sum of \$20 for a stenographer.

On motion of Mr. Putnam of Houlton, Ordered, that the Aroostook county delegation be instructed to inquire into the expediency of placing all county officers in Aroostook county on a salary.

On motion of Mr. Dunn of Orono,

Ordered, the Senate concurring that the secretary of State be and hereby is authorized to furnish each member of the Senate and House of the 70th Legislature a copy of Reed's Rules.

On motion of Mr. Burrill of Ellsworth, Ordered, that J. C. Pike of Lubec, be authorized to change his seat from No. 153 to No. 110.

On motion by Mr. Putnam of Houlton, the rules were suspended and that gentleman presented the following:

Ordered, that the use of the hall of the House of Representatives be granted to the committee on elections for January 17, 1901, at 2.30 P. M.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Bird from the committee on railroads, telegraphs and expresses, to which was referred bill entitled an act to amend section 6 of the Revised Statutes relating to telephone companies, reported that the same be referred to the committee on taxation.

Mr. Spofford from the judiciary committee, to which was referred bill entitled an act to amend the charter of the Livermore Falls Light and Power Company, reported a bill in a new draft under the same title and that it ought to pass.

Mr. Fellows from the committee on legal affairs reported ought to pass on bill entitled an act to revise the organization of the trustees of the parsonage fund of Bucksport.

Mr. Kaler from the committee on railroads, telegraphs and expresses, reported ought to pass on bill an act to amend the charter of the Rockland, Thomaston and Camden Street Railroad.

READ AND ASSIGNED.

An act to abolish the fees and per diem compensation and establish the salary of the stenographer of the superior court for the county of Kennebec.

PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED.

An act to regulate ice fishing in Thompson pond in Oxford, Casco, Poland and Otisfield.

PASSED TO BE ENACTED.

Resolve in favor of the Eastern Maine Hospital for the insane.
