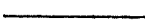

HOUSE.

Monday, Jan. 21.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Hope of Augusta.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

The following petitions, bills, etc., were presented and referred:

JUDICIARY.

By Mr. Hix of Rockland—Bill, an act to amend the charter of the Rockland Trust Co.

By Mr. Carleton of Winthrop—Bill, an act in relation to Section 22, Chapter 122, of the Revised Statutes, relating to falsely assuming to be a justice or officer.

By Mr. Jones of Springfield—Bill, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Springfield Normal school.

LEGAL AFFAIRS.

By Mr. Weymouth of Biddeford—Bill, an act to amend Section 17, Chapter 128, of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1899, relating to tramps.

By Mr. Deering of Saco—Bill, an act in relation to supplying the municipal court of the city of Saco with dockets and blanks.

By Mr. Libby of Poland—Bill, an act to amend Section 2, Chapter 16, of the Revised Statutes, relative to the public drains and sewers.

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS.

By Mr. Sprague of Easton—Bill, an act to regulate the salaries of the sheriffs of the several counties herein mentioned in the State of Maine.

On motion by Mr. Sprague this bill was tabled for printing pending its reference to the committee.

By Mr. Weymouth of Biddeford—Bill, an act for the arrest and punishment of criminals.

EDUCATION.

By Mr. Little of Moultonborough—Petition of the trustees of the Leitchfield Academy for an appropriation in aid of said academy.

By Mr. Sprague of Easton—Bill, an act to establish another normal school at Presque Isle.

By Mr. Thompson of China—Resolve in favor of Erskine Academy with a statement of facts.

AGRICULTURE.

By Mr. Libby of Poland—Petition of J. B. Mason and 36 others for an act for the suppression of fowl brood among bees.

WAYS AND BRIDGES.

By Mr. Gardner of Patten—Petition of L. J. Booker and 23 others asking for an appropriation for a bridge between Chester and Lincoln.

Also petition of J. B. Scott and 31 others of Chester and Lincoln for same.

INLAND FISHERIES AND GAME.

By Mr. Carleton of Winthrop—Petition of V. L. Harriman and 20 others of Lovell relating to fishing in Slab City pond, Lovell.

Also petition of F. W. Sanborn and 39 others, praying for ice fishing in certain lakes and ponds in Oxford county.

By Mr. Libby of Poland—Bill, an act to regulate the taking of white perch from Tripp pond and its tributaries.

TAXATION.

By Mr. Farnsworth of Pembroke—Bill, an act relating to the taxation of telegraph and telephone companies.

ORDERS.

On motion of Mr. Libby of Poland, Ordered, That the committee on agriculture be directed to inquire into the expediency of passing a law for the suppression of fowl brood among bees in Maine, and report by bill or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Bodwell of Hallowell.

Ordered, That the use of this hall, on Tuesday afternoon, Jan. 22, be given to the committee on taxation for the purposes of a hearing.

On motion of Mr. Fuller of Kennebunk,

Ordered, That the officers and members of the Legislature be furnished with express transportation to their homes for all packages of department reports in a sum not exceeding \$5 for such officers and members thereof, and that such transportation be furnished and expended under the direction of the State library department.

READ AND ASSIGNED.

Resolves authorizing a temporary loan for the year 1901.

PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED.

An act to amend the charter of the Reckland, Thomaston & Camden Street Railway.

An act to amend the charter of the Livermore Falls Light & Power Co.

An act to revive the organization of the Parsonage Fund of Bucksport.

On motion of Mr. Thompson of China.
