SENATE.

On motion by Mr. Mills of Hancock: It was ordered that, the House concurring, the time for the reception of petitions and bills for private and special legislation be limited to Tuesday, Feb. 19, 1907, and that all such petitions and bills presented after that date be referred to the next Legislature and that the secretary of the Senate cause copies of this order to be published in all daily papers in this State until Feb. 7, 1907.
