Prayer by Rev. Mr. Harding of Hallewell.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

Bill. An Act in relation to exceptions and appeal in criminal cases, came that from the Senate referred in branch to the committee on legal affairs

On motion of Mr. Marshall of Portland the bill was tabled for printing pending reference to the committee in concurrence.

Bill, An Act to amend Chapter 10 of the Revised Statutes relating to the sale of land for non-payment of taxes, came from the Senate referred in that branch to the committee on taxation.

On motion of Mr. True of Portland the bill was tabled for printing pending reference in concurrence.

Bill, An Act setting apart Lincoln day, Feb. 12, 1909, as a holiday, came from the Senate read twice under a suspension of the rules and passed to be engrossed.

On motion of Mr. Hall of Caribou the rules were suspended, the bill received its three several readings and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Mr. Marshall of Portland: In the absence of the gentleman from Portland (Mr. Bigelow), at his request, I move that this bill be laid on the table for printing, pending reference to the delegation.

The motion was agreed to.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Emery from the committee on appropriations and financial affairs reported "ought to pass" on Resolve in favor of the Eastern Maine General Hospital.

The report was accepted and the Resolve ordered printed under joint rules.

Mr. Hersey from the committee on the judiciary, reported "eught not to pass" on bill, An Act relating to the limitation of the use of the word "prescription."

Mr. Colby from the committee on forestry and water supply, to which was referred an order of the legislature relating to inquiring into the advisability of a law regulating the taking of fire-arms into the woods in close season and to make a uniform open season on big game and birds, and report by bill or otherwise, reported the accompanying bill, An Act to aid in the preservation of the forests by prohibiting the use of fire-arms in close season on the wild lands of the State and maxing a uniform close and open season on birds and wild animals on same, and that the bill be printed and recommitted.

On motion of Mr. Colby 1000 copies ef this bill were ordered printed for the use of the House.

Mr. Bigelow from the committee on inland fisheries and game, to which was referred petition of F. I. Brown and others of Palmyra asking that White's pond By Mr. Stanley of Porter: Petition in said Palmyra be closed to ice fishing, change in the ice fishing laws on White's pond, reported that the same be referred to the commissioners on inland fisheries and game as the subject matter of said petition and remonstrance properly comes under their jurisdiction by the general law.

Mr. Bigelow from the same committee, to which was referred petition of A. J. Blanchard and others residents of Alfred asking that Swan's pond in Lyman be closed to fishing for three years, reported that the same be referred to the commissioners of inland fisheries and game as the subject matter of said petition properly comes under their jurisdiction by the general law.

Mr. Bigelow from the same committee, to which was referred petition of F. Maxim and others of Paris and vicinity praying for a law regulating fishing in Stony brook and tributaries in Paris and Hebron, Oxford county, reported that the same be referred to the commissioners of inland fisheries and game as the subject matter of said petition and bill properly comes under their jurisdiction by the general law.

The reports were accepted and sent to the Senate.
