Resolve in reference to rebates of taxes to railroads.

Resolved, That rebates of taxes to railroads are discountenanced and declared inequitable and unjust because:

First-The principle of special favors to railroads or other quasi public corporations is indefensible and to be condemned.

Second-That such rebates or exemptions force upon those less able to support the expenses of the State, burdens which should be borne without complaint or evasion by corporations given privileges which justly impose upon them a duty to meet their part of the State's expenses.

That it is the sense of this Legislature that such rebates should not be extended or newly granted.
