Mr. BIGELOW of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I hope that the gentlemen of the House realize that they are now considering a souvenir of a \$25,000 tax As far as I have been commission. able to observe, this is the only one of the many measures introduced in this Legislature which have gone to the committee on taxation with the purpose of fixing a uniform and equitable system of taxation which has emerged from that committee with a favorable report. The principle of taxation I do not desire to discuss. have no doub! that later in the session we shall have plenty of discussion on that subject; but upon this particular bill it seems to me that the principle involved in it is radically wrong. This is the only direct tax which is imposed by the State. This is a tax which must be paid, whether or no, by the rich man and by the poor man. It has been suggested in debate upon this matter which has taken place in the upper branch of this Legislature that the idea of many of the towns where the poll tax is fixed at three dollars was that that represented a tax of two mills upon the value of the franchise. Think of it, gentlemen! They attempt to fix a monetary value upon an American citizen. They claim that the franchise value being \$150, it is no more than right that the man who has a uniform tax rate is that some city no other property should pay a tax or town has a poll tax of three dollars upon that valuation.

Mr. WHITNEY: Mr. Speaker, that ure works an injustice to the poor man, to me that it was wrong in principle taxation it is seen at once that it is the tax which is assessed by this State principle which it seems to me is to me that the Legislature is taking upon itself an unwarranted authority when it proceeds to state what these municipalities shall fix as a tax rate. In addition to that, Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that the members of this House when they vote upon this measure should consider that to increase the tax rate, as it will be increased in 85 towns of this State, one dollar, means something to the man who is trying to keep his family together and to support them and send his children to school and give them a proper education. It was said in the Senate that if this amount seemed to be too great the man who was oppressed by it might appeal to the municipal officers and have it rebated. But, gentlemen, there are many poor men in this State, self respecting men, who are making an effort to educate their children and to give to their families those advantages which other people enjoy, who would feel humilitated if they were obliged to go to the municipal officers and ask to have this tax rebated; and many of them would not do it. amount seems small, I know, the increase seems small, and it is only right and just that any man who enjoys the value of a franchise should pay something for it; but the statutes now fix it at anything between one dollar and three dollars.

Now there are many poor people in Portland. We have lots of that kind of people who would not go to the assessors and ask to have their tax rebated, but on the other hand they go on and try to pay it, pay a little at a time, and they have hard work to get the \$2 paid, and if they don't pay it the constable comes round and they find that they get their tax to such a large amount that they cannot pay; and our city sinking fund today is mostly made up of uncollected poll taxes and we haven't got a cent of sinking fund but old tax bills; and I hope the motion of the gentleman from Gorham will prevail.
