#### SENATE.

Monday, January 25, 1909. Senate called to order by the Secretary.

Prayer by Rev. Fr. LaRivere of Augusta.

The secretary announced that, in the absence of the President, it would be necessary for the Senate to elect a President pro tem.

On motion by Mr. Theriault of Aroostook, it was:

Ordered, That, in the absence of the President of the Senate, the Hon. Henry H. Hastings of Oxford be and hereby is elected President pro tem.

Thereupon, at the request of the secretary, Mr. Theriault of Aroostook conducted Mr. Hastings of Oxford to the Chair.

On motion by Mr. Osgood of Androscoggin, it was:

Ordered, That the Governor and Council be notified of the election of the Hon, Henry H. Hastings of Oxferd, as President pro tem. of the Senate, in the absence of the President. Mr. Osgood of Androscoggin, was requested to convey such message, and subsequently reported that he had attended to the duty, with which he was charged.

On motion by Mr. Macomber of Kennebec it was:

Ordered, That the House of Representatives be notified of the election of Hon. Henry H. Hastings of Oxford as President pro tem. of the Senate in the absence of the President. Mr. Macomber of Kennebec was instructed to convey such message, and subsequently reported that he had attended to the duty with which he was charged.
