MACOMBER: Mr. President: The situation in this bill, as I understand it, is this. The bill provides for the salary of the judge and recorder of the Rockland municipal court; and further provides that this expense shall be berne by the county instead of by the city of Rockland; and in this respect it undertakes to make the payment of the salaries in this court the same as that of other municipal courts in the State. This bill was referred, as I understand it, to the committee on legal affairs; and it came to that committee on a petition signed by practically all the attorneys of Knox county. The committee heard the petition and reported unanimously, including, as I understand, the senator from Knox, in favor of the petition. A few weeks age there was an election in Rockland and it changed somewhat; and it evidently occurred to the county commissioners, al! of whom are residents of towns outside of Rockland, that here was an opportunity to make a little capital one way or the other: so they came over and asked to have this recommitted to the committee for the purpose of having these bills paid by the county instead of the city of Rockland. The Senate voted to recommit, and the bill went over to the House, and the House voted the other way and sent it back here. I now move that we reconsider our action whereby voted to recommit this to the committee on legal affairs; and that it take its usual course.

Mr. STAPLES of Knex: Mr. President: I am somewhat surprised that the senator from Kennebec should drag in any idea of politics in connection with this bill. I am aware of some things in which the gentleman from Kennebec is very much interested in political matters in the future in Knex county, but we have no desire to drag this into politics. This matter came before the legal affairs committee, and by some oversight—it is really a Rock-

land police court-it slipped my mind at the time; and instead of having the salary fixed for a police court Rockland, the matter slipped through so that the county should pay the salary of the officers, and I got word from the county commissioners that wanted to be heard upon that matter and therefore moved to recommit it, and it passed the Senate and was referred to the committee and the House non-concurred with the Senate on that proposition. I have no desire to strangle the bill. I am in favor of it; but I want the county commissioners of the county to come before the committee and give their reasons why it should be paid by the city, as the police court is in the city instead of the county. I am surprised that should be any objection to that action. I haven't any doubt but that, when we get it before the committee, it will be fixed up in 15 minutes so that everybody will be satisfied.

I never objected to a matter of that kind; and I do not think the Senate will say that this matter should not be recommitted to the committee. I want the county commissioners to be perfectly satisfied and I want to do my duty by them. I hope the motion of the senator from Kennebec will not prevail, in which case I shall renew my motion and ask for a committee of conference, as the county commissioners are to be here tomorrow; and we can get together and fix this whole matter in 10 minutes.
