**SENATE.**

Saturday, April 3, 1909.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Knowlton, senator from Piscataquis.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

The Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, submitted bill, "An Act to appropriate moneys for the expenditures of government for the year 1909.

On motion by Mr. Gowell of York, under suspension of the rules, the bill took its several readings and was passed to be engrossed.

The same committee also submitted bill "An Act to appropriate moneys for expenditures of government for the year 1910.

On motion by Mr. GOWELL of York, under suspension of the rules, the bill took its several readings and was passed to be engrossed.

The Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs submitted their final report.

On motion by Mr. Baxter of Cumberland it was—

Ordered, That the gavel that has been wielded so wisely and impartially by President Deasy be presented to him as a token of our admiration and esteem. (This order, upon motion by Mr. Osgood of Androscoggin, was passed unanimously by a rising vote.)

On motion by Mr. Baxter of Cumberland, it was—

Ordered, That the thanks of the Senate be and hereby are tendered to the Secretary of the Senate, the Assistant Secretary, the messenger and the official stenographer, and to the other officials of the Senate for their unflinching courtesy and consideration throughout the session that is just coming to a close.

**Passed to be Enacted.**

An Act to appropriate moneys for expenditures of government for the year 1909.

An Act to appropriate moneys for expenditures of government for the year 1910.

On motion by Mr. Milliken of Aroostook it was—

Ordered, That a message be sent to the House of Representatives informing that body that the Senate has transacted all business before it and is ready to adjourn without day.

The President appointed Senator Milliken of Aroostook to convey the foregoing message, and that senator subsequently reported that he had delivered the message with which he was charged.

A message was received from the House informing the Senate that the House had transacted all business before it, and was ready to adjourn.

On motion by Mr. Hastings of Oxford it was—

Ordered, That a committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to wait upon the Governor and inform him that both branches of the Legislature have acted upon all matters before them, and are now ready to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

The President thereupon appointed as such committee on the part of the Senate, Messrs. Hastings of Oxford, Wheeler of Cumberland and Boynton of Lincoln.

Subsequently the Chair announced that the House had joined the foregoing committee.

Mr. Hastings for the committee subsequently reported that the committee had attended to its duty and that the Governor was pleased to say that he would report forthwith, through the secretary, to the Legislature, a list of the bills and resolves passed at this session of the Legislature; and that he had no further communication to make.

A communication from the Governor transmitted through the Secretary of State, was received giving a list of the acts and resolves approved by him at the present session of the Legislature.

On motion by Mr. HASTINGS of Oxford the Senate adjourned without day.
