Saturday, April 6, 1912.

House met according to adjournment.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Allen of Jonesboro.

Resolve on the pay roll of the Senate.

On motion the rules were suspended, this resolve received its two several readings without references to a committee, and was passed to be engrossed.

The resolve having been engrossed was then finally passed.

On motion by the Strickland of Bangor unanimous consent was given for the introduction of the following:

Resolve in favor of witnesses, officers and counsel in the matter of hearings upon the Charles O. Emery and Asa A. Richardson resolves.

Resolve on the pay roll of the House.

An Act to provide for the payment of per diem of members and officers and for other expenditures incident to the special session of the 75th Legislature.

Mr. Strickland moved that the rules be suspended and that the resolves introduced by him receive their two several readings at the present time and pass to be engrossed without reference to a committee.

The motion was agreed to.

The resolves then received their two several readings and were passed to be engrossed.

Mr. Strickland further moved that the rules be suspended and that the bill introduced by him receive its two several readings at the present time, without reference to a committee.

The motion was agreed to.

The bill then received its two several readings, and on further motion the bill was read a third time and was passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Strickland a recess was taken subject to the call of the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. Trafton of Fort Fairfield, that gentleman was charged with a message to the Senate informing that body that the House has transacted all

business before it and is ready to adjourn without day.

Mr. Trafton subsequently reported that he had conveyed the message with which he was charged, and that he had been charged by the Senate with the duty of conveying a similar message to the House.

From the Senate: Ordered, that a committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to wait upon the Governor and inform him that both branches of the Legislature have acted upon all matters before them and are now ready to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

The order received a passage in concurrence.

The Speaker appointed as such committee on the part of the House Messrs. Shea of Eden, Active I. Snow of Brunswick, Heffron of Eastport, Connors of Bangor and Dunn of Brewer.

Subsequently Mr. Shea from the committee reported that the committee had

attended to the duty with which it was charged.

The following message was received from the Governor:

“Augusta, April 6, 1912.

“To the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives:

“I herewith transmit a list of Acts and Resolves passed during the present session of the Legislature and approved by me, numbering four Acts and six Resolves.

“I have no further communication to make.

The SPEAKER: Now, gentlemen of the House, this completes the labor of the session, and on motion of the gentleman from Shirley, Mr. Phillips, is it the pleasure of the House that we do now adjourn without day? As many as are in favor thereof will say aye; those opposed, no.
