LEGISLATIVE RECORD-HOUSE, FEBRUARY 10.

HOUSE.

Monday, February 10, 1913. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Nichols of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate: An Act to provide for instruction in road building in public schools.

This bill came from the Senate in that branch referred to the committee on education, and was tabled on motion by Mr. Mitchell of Newport.

From the Senate: Resolve in favor of Annie L. Bassett.

In the House this resolve was referred to the committee on claims, and came from the Senate referred to the committee on ways and bridges in non-concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Davis of Old Town, the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate in its reference of the resolve to the committee on ways and bridges.

From the Senate: An Act to increase certain fees of sheriffs and deputies.

In the House this bill was referred to the committee on judiciary, and came from the Senate referred to the committee on salaries and fees in nonconcurre.

On motion by Mr. Metcalf of Greenville, the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate in its reference of the bill to the committee on salaries and fees:

In the House this petition was referred to the committee on judiciary, and came from the Senate referred to the Androscoggin County Delegation in non-concurrence.
