HOUSE.

Wednesday, February 12, 1913. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Steele of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate: An Act to amend chapter 219 of the Private and Special Laws of 1903, to establish a salary for the judge of the Eastport municipal court.

In the House this bill was referred to the Washington County Delegation, and came from the Senate referred to the committee on salaries and fees in non-concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Mildon of Eastport the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate in its reference of the bill to the committee on salaries and fees.

From the Senate: An Act to amend section one of chapter 117 of the Public Laws of 1905, relating to compensation of county commissioners of Androseoggin county.

In the House this bill was referred to the Androscoggin County Delegation, and came from the Senate referred to the committee on salaries and fees in non-concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Plummer of Lisbon the bill was laid upon the table.

From the Senate: An Act to amend chapter 118 of the Laws of 1905, relative to clerk hire of the clerk of courts in York county.

In the House this bill was referred to the York County Delegation, and came from the Senate referred to the committee on salaries and fees in non-concurrence.
