#### HOUSE.

Monday, February 24, 1913.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Smith of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate: An Act to incorporate the trustees of the John B. Curtis Free Public Library in Bradford.

In the House this resolve was received under a suspension of the of the rules and referred to the committee on legal affairs, and came from the Senate referred to the next Legislature in non-concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Morrison of Corinth the resolve was laid upon the table.

From the Senate: Remonstrance of E. H. Locke and 37 others, citizens of Buxton, against exempting from taxation the Cyrus Woodman Reservation in the town of Buxton and Pieasant Mountain Reservation in the town of Denmark.

In the House this remonstrance was referred to the committee on taxation, and came from the Senate in that branch ordered placed on file in non-concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Irving of Caribou, the House voted to recede and concur with the Senate in ordering the remonstrance placed on file.

From the Senate: An Act to amend the charter of the city of Ellsworth.

This bill came from the Senate recommitted in that branch to the committee on judiciary.

On motion by Mr. Johnson of Brownfield, the House voted to recommit the bill to the committee on judiciary in concurrence.
