## HOUSE

Saturday, Sept. 30, 1916.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Dunnack of Augusta.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Mr. Sanborn of South Portland presented the following order:

Ordered, the Senate concurring, that there be paid out of the treasury of the State the sum of \$50 to C. C. Harvey, clerk of the House, for additional clerical assistance in the preparation of the House journal for the special session and for supervision of the publication of the same; and a like amount to W. E. Lawry, secretary of the Senate, for additional clerical assistance in the preparation of the Senate journal for the special session and for the supervision of the publication of the same.

The order received a passage.

### Passed to be Enacted

An Act to authorize the Board of Harbor Commissioners of the City of Portland to alter and modify the harbor lines.

An Act to provide for payment of the per diem and mileage of members and officers and for other expenditures incident to the special session of the 77th Legislature.

### Finally Passed

Resolve on the payroll of the House of Representatives.

Resolve on the payroll of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Pierce of Houlton, that gentleman was appointed as a messenger to wait upon the Senate and inform that branch that the House has transacted all business before it and is ready to adjourn without day.

Subsequently Mr. Pierce reported that he had performed the duty with which he was charged.

A message was received from the Senate, transmitted through Senator Fulton

of Aroostook, informing the House that the Senate has transacted all business before it and is ready to adjourn without day.

From the Senate: Ordered, the House concurring, that a committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor, and inform him that both branches of the Legislature has acted on all matters before them and are ready to receive any further communications he may be pleased to make.

The order received a passage in concurrence.

Thereupon the Speaker appointed as members of such committee on the part of the House Messrs. Davis of Old Town, Wasgatt of Deer Isle, Jamieson of Friendship, Gerrish of Greenville, Sanborn of South Portland, St. Clair of Calais and Dilling of Easton.

Subsequently Mr. Davis of Old Town reported that the committee had performed the duty with which it was charged.
