SENATE

Tuesday, January 11, 1921

Senate called to order by the President at 4.30 o'clock.

Prayer by Rev. W. J. Layton of Augusta.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Messages from Heads of Departments

Communications were received from the office of the Secretary of State, transmitting:

Report of the State Board of Charities and Correction.

(Placed on file).

County estimates for the years 1921 and 1922.

(On motion of Mr. Tuttle of Aroostook, referred to the committee on counties, and sent down for concurrence).

Certified copy of Act. No. 22 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1920, inviting the Legislatures of the several States of the Union to join in the application to Congress to call a convention for the purpose of amending the Constitution of the United States so as to provide that all amendments to the Constitution of the United States shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the several States for ratification or rejection.

Placed on file and sent down for concurrence.

The following bills, resolves, etc., were received and on recommendation of the committee on reference of bills were referred to the following committees:

By Mr. Emerson of Aroostook: An Act to appropriate moneys for the cost of the Eightieth Legislature, for the payment of all salaries fixed by law, for clerk hire, for general department expenses of the State institutions, required for the period prior to the adjournment of the present Legislature.

(On motion by Mr. Emerson, the rules were suspended and this bill was given its two readings and was

passed to be engrossed, and sent down for concurrence).

Judiciary

By Mr. Garcelon of Androscoggin: Resolve proposing an amendment to Section 5, Article four, Part first of the Constitution, as amended by the twenty-third amendment, relating to absent voting.

(500 copies ordered printed.)

Military Affairs

By Mr. Garcelon of Androscoggin: An Act to amend Section 9 of Chapter 29 of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 202 of the Public Laws of 1917, prohibiting the treatment of army and navy veterans as paupers.

(500 copies ordered printed.)

By the same Senator: An Act to amend Section 10 of Chapter 128 of the Revised Statutes, relating to the unauthorized use of insignia of war veterans.

(500 copies ordered printed.)

State Lands and Forests Preservation

By Mr. Emerson of Aroostook: Resolve presenting a memorial to Congress in favor of a bill now pending therein, entitled "A bill for the establishment and maintenance of a forest experiment station on the White Mountain National forests in the State of New Hampshire."

Orders

On motion by Mr. Garcelon of Androscoggin, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the document clerk prepare each week for the use of the Legislature a cumulative index of all bills and resolves introduced during the session, showing concisely the important steps in the history of each and its final disposition or present status, and that five hundred copies thereof be printed.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Tuttle of Aroostook, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that 675 copies of the Legislative Record for the Session of 1921 be printed and bound, one copy each for the mem-

bers of the Senate and House of Representatives, and the remainder to be deposited in the State Library for exchange and library use; and be it further

Ordered, that 350 copies of the Legislative Record be printed in pamphlet form for distribution from day to day to members of the Legislature and the departments, under the direction of the document clerk; and be it further.

Ordered, that a suitable index be prepared for such Legislative Record at an expense not exceeding four hundred dollars.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Sprague of Piscataquis, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Secretary of State be directed to furnish clerks of committees postage stamps and such other necessities for the transaction of their business as said committee shall order.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Bemis of Somerset, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that all committees are hereby directed to report to the committee on appropriations and financial affairs all appropriations of money recommended by them, and all acts and resolves recommended by them which amend existing statutes or resolves requiring an appropriation of money.

The committee on appropriations and financial affairs is hereby directed to make a record of said reports and forthwith submit the same to the Legislature without changes therein. No act or resolve involving an appropriation of money or amend-

ing a statute, or resolve involving an appropriation of money shall be engrossed without having endorsed thereon, in addition to the usual endorsements of the officers of the Senate and House, the following, viz: "Examined and recorded by the committee on appropriations and financial affairs."

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Spencer of York, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the superintendent of buildings is hereby given charge of all assignments of rooms for hearings in the capitol building, and all applications for rooms must be made to him in writing forty-eight hours previous to the time that such rooms are to be used for that purpose.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Spencer of York, it was

Ordered, that all bills, resolves, orders, petitions and memorials for introduction in the Senate be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Senate not later than four o'clock on the day preceding such introduction.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will announce that Mr. Franklin Fisher of Lewiston, has been appointed an assistant to the attorney general's staff, and will assist members of the Legislature in the drawing of acts and resolves. He will be found in the northeast alcove of the library.

On motion of Mr. Allen of York
