HOUSE

Friday, February 16, 1923. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Lowe of Augusta.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

On motion by Mr. Moody of York, the rules were suspended and that gentleman was permitted to introduce the following order, out of order:

The order received passage.

The following bills and resolve were received and, upon recommendation of . the committee on reference of bills, were referred to the following committees:

By Mr. Wood of Bluehill: An Act to amend Section 84 of Chapter 16 of the Revised Statutes relating to Contracts with Academies.

Inland Fisheries and Game

to repeal Chapter 14 of the Public Laws of 1921, relating to the protection of deer in the town of York.

Mr. Conant from the committee on Agriculture reported ought not to pass on bill An Act to amend Chapter 46 of the Revised Statutes relating to the Measurements of Wood, Bark and Shingles.

Mr. Leland from the same committee reported same on bill An Act to amend Section 4 of Chapter 48 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 6 of the Public Laws of 1919, relating to the Duties of State Sealer of Weights and Measures.

Mr. Hale from the committee on Legal Affairs reported same on bill An Act to amend Section 47 of Chapter 211 of the Public Laws of 1921 relating to Motor Vehicles used for Public hire.

Mr. Bartlett from the committee on Public Utilities reported same on bill An Act to amend Chapter 187 of the Private and Special Laws of 1915, relating to the incorporation of the Oquossoc Light and Power Co. and to enlarge its powers.

Mr. Curtis from the committee on State Lands and Forest Preservation reported same on bill An Act to amend Section 1 of Chapter 164 of the Public Laws of 1921, relating to Portable Sawmills.

Same gentleman from same committee reported same on bill An Act to amend Section 15 of Chapter 30 of the Revised Statutes, relating to kindling fires on Forest land.

Reports read and accepted and sent up for concurrence.

Mr. Weeks from the committee on Judiciary on bill An Act to amend Sections 4 and 5 of Chapter 188 of the Public Laws of 1919, relating to the regulation of the practice of the System Method of Science of healing known as Osteopathy reported same in a new draft under same title, and that it ought to pass.

Mr. Siddall from the committee on legal affairs on bill, An Act to amend the charter of the York Harbor Village Corporation, reported same in a new draft under same title and that it ought to pass.

Reports read and accepted and the new drafts ordered printed under the joint rules.

Mr. Gordon from the committee on agriculture reported ought to pass on resolve in favor of the commissioner of agriculture for carrying out provisions of Chapter 81 of the Public laws of 1921.

Mr. Leland from the same committee reported same on resolve in favor of Highmoor Farm in the town of Monmouth.

The CHAIR: The Chair at this time wishes to call the attention of the members to the order passed early in the session relating to the stamping

of all appropriation bills by the committee on appropriations. This is solely for the purpose of tabulating, so that in the closing days of the session they will be able to draw their tax act properly to cover the appropriations. It is a physical impossibility for any committee to keep run of the finances unless they have this assistance. And the Chair would again ask the members to see to it, those who report bills ought to pass carrying appropriations, that these bills are properly stamped by that committee before they are sent to the clerk to be received into this House

Mr. Gordon from the same committee reported same on resolve in making an appropriation for co-operative agricultural work between the college of agriculture of the University of Maine and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Conant from the same committee reported same on resolve in favor of animal husbandry.

Mr. Leland from the same committee reported same on resolve in favor of scientific investigation in agriculture in Aroostook county.

Mr. Gardiner from the committee on Judiciary reported same on bill An Act to amend Section 52 of Chapter 117 of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 34 of the Public Laws of 1919, relating to the board of Osteopathic examination and registration.

Mr. Jordan from the committee on library reported same on bill An Act authorizing the town of York to raise money to aid the York Public Library Association,

Mr. Bradbury from the committee on public health reported same on bill An Act to amend Chapter 197 of the Public Laws of 1917 as amended by Chapter 172 of the Public Laws of 1919 relating to the State department of health.

Mr. Blaisdell from the committee on public utilities reported same on bill An Act to extend the charter of the Quebec Extension Railway Company.

Mr. Heal from the same committee reported same on bill An Act to extend the charter granted to the Salisbury Cove Water Company for the taking of water from Lake Wood and furnishing water to the village of Salisbury Cove, for two years.

Mr. Beckett from the same committee reported same on bill An Act to extend the charter of the R. & T. Cement Railroad.
