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## HOUSE

Thursday, March 1, 1923.
The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Clark of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and apmoved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

## First Reading of Senate Bills

Senate 149. An Act to establish a game sanctuary in the city of Bangor ind county of Penobscot.

Senate 138. An Act to legalize and make valid the doings of the inhabitants of the town of Brooklin, at the annual town meeting held on the 6th day of March, 1922.

Senate 150. An Act to prohibit the use of beam trawls in the waters of Sedgwick Harbor, known as Benjamin's river.

## Banks and Banking

## Inland Fisheries and Game

By Mr. Crafts of Greenville: An Act te amend section 86 of chapter 219 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by chapter 244 of the Public Laws of 1917 and by chapter 142 of the Public Laws of 1919, and by chapter 93 of the Public Laws of 1921, relating to the disposition of money collected under the provisions of the inland fish and game laws.

By the same gentleman: Resolve appropriating money for the purpose of operating the fish hatcheries and feeding stations for fish, for the protection of fish, game and birds and for printing the report of the commissioner of inland fisheries and game and other expenses incident to the administration of the department of inland fisheries and game.

Same gentleman from same committee reported same on bill "An Act to authorize Greta M. Mendelsohn to construct and maintain a wharf in Long Pond at Naples in Cumberland County."

Mr. Jordan from the committee on library reported same on resolve appointing a committee to procure plans and estimates for a State library building.

Mr. Beckett from the committee on salaries and fees reported same on bill "An Act to increase the salary of the Tudge of Probate for Penobscot County:.

Mr. Hodgkins from same committee reported same on bill "An Act to amend Chapter 508 of the Private and special Latws of 1885 , as amended by Chapters 403 and 443 of the Private and Special Laws of 1907, relating to the Norway Municipal Court and to establish the salary for the Judse of said Court."

Mr. Morrison from the committee on legal affairs on bill "An Act to amend Section 3, and Paragraph 7 of Section 4 of Chapter 100 of the Private and Special Laws of 1921, relating. to Belgrade Lakes Village Corporation" reported same in a new draft under same title and that it ought to pass.

Mr. Moody from the committee on library reported same on resolve providing for the purchase of "History of Aroostook.'

Mr. Beckett from the committee on salaries and fees reported same on bill "An Act to amend Revised Statutes, Chapter 117, Section 45, as amended by Chapter 214, Public Laws 1919, as further amended by Chapter 219 of Public Laws of 1921, restoring the amount for clerk hire in office of Register of Probate in Washington County to same rate as in 1922 and the three years preceding."

Mr. ROUNLs; of Portland: Mr. Speaker, the report of the committee on library on resolve appointing a committee to procure plans and estimates for a State library building, I understood to be ought not to pass.

Mr. JORDAN of Westbrook: Mr. Speaker, I will say that there were two resolves, one passed favorably and one rejected. The subject matter is taken care of in another resolve.

The SPEAKER: Is that satisfactory Mr. Rounds?

Mr. LITTMLEFIELD of Kennchme: Mr. Speaker, I have an amendment that I wish to add to that bill, and move its adoption.

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Be it Resolyor: That whatever exbernser is incurred theroby shatl be dofrasod from tho moneys in the Troasinry not otherwist oxpended and that this work of love and respect shall be dome under the direction of the Governor and Gouncil.

Mr. NADMAL: Mr. Speaker and wentlemen of the House, in introducing this order under suspension of the rules and moving its passage $l$ do not believe that there will be any objection. These flatgs were carried with honot by the rarious regiments representing the State of Maine. I have been looking around lately trying to see where they had been pliterd and yesterday $I$ found them on the first foor in the adjutant gemeval's office; and if they should be Fept there much longer our boys will not have a chance to see them because we know that silk will not keep unless encased in ail-tight cases. We would not like to see the flass that have been carried with honor on the battlefields f france go to fragments and go to rags. Therefore, I have introduced this order under suspension of the rules and $I$ hope that the members will vote favombly upon it. (Applause.)

On further motion by the same gentleman, the rules were suspended, and the resolve received its two sevcral readings and was passed to be engrossed, by a rising vote.

## Orders of the Day

It was voted to receive out of order the following divided House report:
"Majority report of the Committee on Judiciary on a Resolve amending the Constitution of the State of Maine so as to limit appropriations for private institutions and purposes until December 31, 1930, and so as to prohibit such appropriations after December 31, 1930, and that the same ought not to pass."

The majority report was signed by Senators Hinckley of Cumberland, Hussey of Aroostook, Buzzell of Waldo and Representatives Gardiner of Gardiner, Weeks of Fairfield, Archibald of Houlton and Maher of Augusta.

The Minority Report of the same Committee on the same resolve, reporting the same under a new draft under title of, "Resolve amending the Constitution of the State of Maine so as to limit appropriations for Denominational, Sectarian, Parochial, or Religious Institutions and Purposes until December 31, 1930, and so as to prohibit such appropriations after December 31. 1930." and that it ought nor to pass.

The minority report was signed by Messrs. Wing of Auburn, Nichols of Portland and Saunders of Lubec.

Mr. WING of Auburn: Mr Speak. er, I move that the two reports lie on the table and that both be printed.

Mr. BARWISE of Bangor: Mr. Speaker. I would like to move -

The SPEAKER: The gentleman will remember, please, that a motion to table is not debatable. Is it the pleasure of the Irouse that the motion of the gentleman from Auburn, Mr. Wing, prevail?

The motion prevailed.
On motion by Mr. Barwise of Bansor, the majority and minority reports of the Committee on Judiciary were specially assimed to Thursday, March 8, 1923.

On motion by Mr. Founds of Portland. it was voted to take from the table. House Document 170, Resolve appropriating money for Commissioners of Pharmacy, tabled by that sentleman. February 26, pending second readins.

Mr. ROTNDS of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I want to say that I think all these commissions should par their own way. This one I under-
stand has overdrawn thirteen hundred dollars in the last two years. It seems to me that these commissions should be self-supporting, and I do rot think that we should appropriate money for such purposes.

On motion by Mr. Pierce of Sanford, the resolve had its second reading and was passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Hamilton of Caribou, it was voted to take from the table House Document No. 26, Senate Amendment $A$ to bill an act relating to lien on vehicles.

Mr. HAMILTON of Caribou: Mr. Speaker, I have had ample opportunity to look this over, and I have found no fault with it as it has been revised. Therefore, I move that it take its usual course.

The pending question being on the motion of the gentleman from $A u-$ burn, Mr. Wing, on the adoption of the amendment, the amendment having heretofore been read,

It was voted to adopt the amendment: and on further motion by Mr. Hamilton, the bill was passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate amendment $A$.

On motion by Mr. Gardiner of Gardiner it was voted to take from the table, House Document 176, an act to ratify the reorganization of the parish of tio Protesiant Eeiscopal church in bangor, tailed by that zentleman Felmuary 27, perting passage to be engrossed.

House Amendment A to Touse bocument Fo. 176.

Amend the irst line $v_{i}$ Section three by striking out the words "and/ gr" and substituting ilierefor the word "and," so that said section three of House Docurnent 176 as amended shall read as follows:
"Sect. 3. All conveyances, transfers and other documents and instruments in writing heretofore executed
by the rectors, wardens and vestrymen, as a body corporate and politic, for and in the name of the parish in behalf of which this act is passed, are hereby declared to be valid and binding on the body corporate and politics hereafter to be known as 'The rector, wardens and vestrymen of St. John's Episcopal shurch in Bangor.'"

The amendment was adopted and the bill as amended was passca to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Wing of Auburn, it was voted to take from the table Senate Pocument No. 86, "an act relating to authorizing complaint by a utility against itself, tabled by that gentleman February 28, pending passage to be engrossed; and on further motion by the same gentleman, the bill was passed to be engrossed.

The SPEAKER: If there is any other member who can take from the table some of the matters tabled by him, it will serve to kecp the calendar clear.

On motion by Mr. Bartlett of Ilanover, it was voted to take from the table House Document No. 175, "an act relating to registration of veterinary surgeons, tabled by than genticman February 27, pending jüssage to be enrossed; and on urther motion by the same gentleman the bill was passed to be engrossed.

Mr. GRANVILLE of Parsonsfield: Mr. Speaker, I would like to say to the members of the House, and I think it is the wish of the House, that any member having matters on the table unassigned should take them up some day other than Wednesday. On that day the assigned matters cause the calendar to become congested, and theic is not time to properly consider indssigned matters on that day. I think this will be in the interest of all concerned.

On motion by Mr. Weclis of Fairfield,

Adjourned until eight o'clock tomorrow morning.
