#### SENATE

Tuesday, March 6, 1923.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. W. P. Bradford of Hallowell.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

From the House: H. 232: An Act to amend Chapter 197 of the Public Laws of 1921, by adding a new Section 4, and making the present Section 4 into Section 5 unchanged, relating to taxation of savings banks.

In the House referred to the committee on banks and banking.

In the Senate, on motion by Mr. Allen of York, tabled pending reference in concurrence.

#### Orders

Mr. BREWSTER of Cumberland presented the following order and moved its passage:

#### STATE OF MAINE,

In Senate, March 6, 1923.
Whereas under the pressure of litigation in various counties in this State there have been established

from time to time Superior Courts to supplement to some extent the work of the justices of the Supreme Judicial Court, and

Whereas there are, now pending before the Legislature bills requiring the appointment of two additional Superior Court Justices, and

Whereas there exists in other sections of the State a congestion in litigation which makes it possible that the establishment of further Superior Courts may soon be necessary, and

Whereas it is desirable to make the organization of our judicial system responsive to the needs of the various localities and to secure a more equitable distribution of the time and labor of the several justices of our courts;

Now, therefore, be it

Ordered, the House concurring, that a recess committee be constituted to consider the question of reorganization of the judicial system. and to consider any bills which may be referred to it, the said committee to consist of two members from the Senate appointed by the president of the Senate, and two members of the House appointed by the speaker of the House, and two members, one of whom at least shall be a member of the Maine State Bar Association, appointed by the Governor who shall not be members of the Legislature, the said committee to serve without compensation, but its expenses to be paid by the Governor and Council from funds not otherwise appropriated, the said committee to report by bill or otherwise to the next Legislature.

Mr. BREWSTER of Cumberland: Mr. President, in view of what might seem to be the importance of such a recess committee. I wish to move that this lie upon the table in order that the senators may have an opportunity to consider whether or not it is wise to create such a recess committee: but before making that motion I would like to explain briefly the reason for its presentation. The recital of the causes at the beginning of the order perhaps give us some idea of the considerations which enter into it. I would supplement that by saying that there is being introduced in the House today a bill looking along lines which have been under consideration for a great time in this State, I think for some twenty-five or thirty years, con-templating the possible reorganiza-

tion of our judicial system with relation to the duties of the superior court and the supreme court justices, in order to expedite the administration of the court system and to relieve and more equitably distribute the work of the various justices. That bill will be introduced in the House. I think there is existing among many members of the Bar in the State at least a feeling that the time has come to give serious con-sideration to this matter in the interests of securing more efficient administration of justice, and perhaps also more economical administration, which would interest not only the Bar but also the other people who have matters to present. That was the purpose of the order.

And now, in order that the Senate

And now, in order that the Senate may have more time to consider a matter of this importance, I move that it lie upon the table and that 500 copies be printed.

The motion was agreed to, and the

order was tabled.

Mr. Hinckley from the committee on judiciary on An Act relating to indexes in registries of deeds reported that the same ought not to rass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act relating to persons convicted of violating the motor vehicle laws, reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act to amend Paragraph II of Section 1 of Chapter 50, Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 238, Public Laws of 1919, relating to compensation of employees, reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act relating to the operation of motor vehicles by persons whose licenses have been revoked in this State (Senate Doc. No. 123) reported that the same ought to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act relating to passengers in motor vehicles operated by persons under the influence of intoxicating liquors, reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act to amend Section 35 of Chapter 48 of the Revised Statutes relating to meridian lines and standard of lengths, reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act to amend Section 16 of Chapter 12, of the Revised Statutes, relative to the records of the register of deeds, reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act to create a State board of preliminary examination and prescribing its powers and duties (Senate Dec. No. 117), reported that the same ought not to pass.

The same senator from the same committee on An Act giving to attorneys at law all powers of justices of the peace and notaries public (Senate Doc. No. 71), reported that the same ought not to pass.

Mr. Brewster from the committee on legal affairs on An Act to be known as the Children's Act, relating to children who are now or may hereafter become dependent, neglected or delinquent, to establish a special equity juvenile court to provide for the treatment, control, maintenance, adoption and guardianship of the person of said children (Senate Doc. No. 80), reported that the same ought not to pass.

Mr. Cram from the same committee on An Act to amend Chapter 7 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, as amended by the Public Laws of 1917, relating to elections, ballot boxes in particular, by revising Sections 31, 32, 33 and 34 (Senate Dec. No. 47), reported that the same ought not to pass.

The reports were accepted and sent down for concurrence.

Mr. Brewster from the same committee, on An Act relative to the granting of licenses for certain businesses and purposes by the municipal officers of the city of Westbrook (Senate Doc. No. 64), reported that the same ought not to pass.

The report was accepted. Subsequently, on motion by Mr. Speirs of Cumberland, the Senate voted to reconsider its action whereby the report was accepted, and on further motion by the same senator the report was tabled pending acceptance.

Mr. Stevens from the committee on sea and shore fisheries, on An Act to regulate the taking of clams (Senate Doc. No. 63), reported that legislation is not expedient.

The report was accepted and sent down for concurrence.

Mr. Cram from the committee on legal affairs, on An Act to repeal the act incorporating the town of Forest City, reported that the same ought to pass.

The report was accepted and the bill tabled for printing under the joint rules.

An Act to amend Chapter 380 of the Private and Special Laws of 1909, as amended by Chapter 84 of the Private and Special Laws of 1915, relating to a close time on lobsters in the bays of the towns of Gouldsboro, Edcn, Trenton, Lamoine, Hancock, Sullivan and Sorrento.

An Act to unite the Preachers' Aid Society of the Maine Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and the Preachers' Aid Society of the East Maine Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Resolve in favor of Jesse Overlock, secretary of committee on State prison.

#### Orders of the Day

Mr. Buzzell of Waldo, under suspension of the rules presented out of order the following order and moved its passage:

Ordered, that on Wednesday of each week, under orders of the day, all matters placed on the table the week preceding and unassigned shall be taken up without motion and disposed of in the order in which they were placed upon the table.

The motion was agreed to and the order passed.

Mr. Buzzell of Waldo, under suspension of the rules presented out of order the following order and moved its passage

Ordered, that Resolve appropriating money for the purpose of rebuilding the steamship sheds of the State pier at Portland be recalled from the Governor.

Mr. CRAM of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move that this order lie on the table.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President,-

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the motion to lay on the table is not debatable.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I do not wish to debate the motion, but for the information of the senator from Cumberland I wish to say that it is my purpose to leave this matter on the table—and I am doing this at the request of the Chief Executive—to recall it, and then to move reconsideration of the action whereby it was passed to be enacted, and then place it on the table for him.

Mr. Cram withdrew his motion, and the order was given a passage.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the Resolve is in the hands of the Senate.

On further motion by Mr. Buzzell, the Senate under suspension of the rules voted to reconsider its action whereby this resolve was passed to be enacted, and the resolve was then tabled.

Mr. Buzzell of Waldo, under suspension of the rules, presented the following order out of order and moved its passage:

Ordered, that Resolve in favor of the Maine State prison for maintenance and current expenses be recalled from the Governor.

The motion was agreed to, the resolve was recalled, and on further motion by the same senator the vote was reconsidered whereby this resolve was finally passed, and passed to be engrossed.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, accompanying the original paper there is an amendment, and I move the adoption of Senate Amendment A.

#### Senate Amendment A to Senate Document 102

Amend Senate Document 102 by striking out the following words which constitute the last four lines of said resolve:

"Provided that any balances of the foregoing appropriations which remain unexpended at the end of the first fiscal period herein specified shall be available for expenditure during the second fiscal period."

The Amendment was adopted, and on further motion by the same senator the resolve was tabled pending passage to be engrossed as amended.

On motion by Mr. Brewster of Cumberland, S. D. 104, An Act to amend Section 2 of Chapter 55 of the Revised Statutes, relating to Public Utilities Commission, was taken from the table, and on further motion by the same senator was passed to be engrossed and sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Adams of Kennebec.
