SENATE

Friday, April 6, 1923.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. A. T. McWhorter of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

From the House: An Act to repeal Section 8 of Chapter 522 of the Private and Special Laws of 1885 and to amend Section 1 of Chapter 9 of the Private and Special Laws of 1887, relating to Camden and Rockland Water Company (Senate Doc. No. 318.)

Which came from the House, that branch having reconsidered its action in passing the bill to be engrossed, adopted House Amendment A and passed the bill to be engrossed as amended.

On motion by Mr. Elliot of Knox the Senate voted to indefinitely postpone this bill.

From the House: Joint resolution favoring the acquiring and maintenance by the United States Government of a suitable vessel constructed and equipped especially as an Ice Breaker to be stationed and operated solely on the Maine coast.

In the House this Resolution was adopted.

In the Senate adopted in concurrence.

From the House: An Act to regulate the use of aircraft (Senate Doc. No. 271).

Which came from the House, that branch having recalled the same from the Governor, reconsidered its action in passing the bill to be enacted and in passing the bill to be engrossed, and adopted House Amendment A.

The Senate voted to reconsider the votes whereby this bill was passed to be enacted and passed to be engrossed; then adopted House Amendment A, and passed the bill to be engrossed as so amended, in concurrence.

Passed to be Enacted

An Act to provide for an issue of State aid or second class highway bonds.

Final Report

Mr. Clark from the committee on State prison submitted its final report.

The report was accepted.

The PRESIDENT: This covers all at present before the Senate, and the members will be at ease within call of the bell.

Senate called to order by the President at 10:15 A. M.

From the House: The committee of Conference on the disagreeing action of the two branches of the Legislature, on An Act to provide for the construction of gravel roads in all cases except where a different type of construction is especially authorized (House Doc. No. 491), reported that the committee is unable to agree, and that each branch adhere to its former action.

The Senate accepted the report in concurrence, and then voted to adhere to its former action, in accordance with the recommendation of the committee.

Resolve amending Article IX of the Constitution, as amended by Article XXXV, XLII, XLIII and XLV of the Constitution, increasing the amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose of building State Highways and State Aid Highways and providing for the building of intrastate, interstate and international bridges. (House Doc. No. 459.)

The PRESIDENT: This Resolve was finally passed by the House: In the Senate it failed to receive the required two-thirds vote. It now comes from the House that branch insisting on its former action, and asking for a committee of conference, and appointing as such committee on the part of the House:

In the Senate, on motion by Mr. Bemis of Somerset, the Senate voted to insist and join a committee of conference.

From the House: An Act to repeal

Section Eight of Chapter Five Hundred and Twenty-two of the Private and Special Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Eighty-five, and to amend Section One of Chapter Nine of the Private and Special Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Eighty-seven, relating to the Camden and Rockland Water Company.

Came from the House, that branch insisting upon their former action in asking for a committee of conference, and the Speaker having appointed as the House members of such a committee:

Messrs. ROGERS of Rockland,
HOUGHTON of Fort Fairfield,
CROWLEY of Lewiston.

In the Senate, on motion by Mr. Elliot of Knox, the Senate voted to adhere to its former action in indefinitely postponing the bill.

From the House: The committee of conference on the disagreeing action of the two branches of the Legislature, on An Act providing a tax upon gasoline and other products used in operating internal combustion engines (House Doc. No. 490), reported that the same should be passed under a new title, as follows: An Act providing a charge upon gasoline used in motor vehicles operated upon the highways of the State, and that the same should be amended by adoption of House Amendment A.

Which came from the House, that branch having rejected the report of the committee, suspended the rules, reconsidered their former action in insisting and asking for a committee of conference, rejected Senate Amendments A and C and also House Amendment A, having adopted House Amendment B and passed the bill to be engrossed as amended by House Amendment B.

Mr. HINCKLEY of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move that we accept the report of the committee.

The PRESIDENT: Perhaps it might be well for the Chair to state the situation. The Senate passed this bill to be engrossed as amended by Senate Amendments A and C. The House passed the bill without amendment then later insisted on its former action and asked for a committee of conference. The Senate joined a committee of conference and this is the report of that committee. The House reconsidered the engrossing of the bill, rejected the confer-

ence report, rejected Senate Amendment A and C, adopted House Amendment B and passed the bill to be engrossed as amended.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, I move that we accept the report of the committee.

The PRESIDENT: The report also changes the title. The report is a little blind in this, that it does not say anything about the other amendments, but simply says that the bill 'should be amended by the adoption of House Amendment A'.

Mr. HINCKLEY: My motion is simply to accept the report, not necessarily to adopt the recommendation.

The report was accepted.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Now, Mr. President, I move that we adopt House Amendment A, and for the benefit of the senators I will state that House Amendment A is substantially the Wadsworth bill with the word "two" changed to "one," making it a one cent tax with exemptions, and the words "excise tax" changed to the word "charge"—the reason for the latter change being that many of us are convinced, and especially so after reading the opinion rendered during the present week by the Justices of the Supreme Court of New Hampshire, in answer to a question submitted by the Legislature as to whether or not it would be constitutional to pass a tax on gasoline. We secured a copy of the opinion from the Attorney General of New Hampshire, and I wish to read it to the Legislature. This was taken over the phone and there are a few words which perhaps are not clerically correct, but the substance is here.

"The third question, relating to a tax upon gasoline or motor vehicle fuel of a like nature, sold in this State at the flat rate, for example of two cents on every gallon sold or an excise tax upon the sale of gasoline. A tax levied upon the selling of gasoline is clearly outside the power of the State to levy and is unconstitutional. Assessments, Rates and Taxes. State vs. Express 60 N. H. 219. Curry vs. Spencer 61 N. H. 624. But your inquiry seems to suggest that what is intended is not the levy of a tax, but rather that the purpose in view is to fix a charge or toll for use of the public highways of this State. It is within the legislative power to provide that all highways or any specified highways shall be toll roads and open

to travel only upon the payment of a specified charge, although ordinarily turnpikes are built and owned by corporations created by the State for the purpose of constructing and maintaining them. What the State may do indirectly through such agencies, it may do directly; that is, it may itself lay out and construct such improved roads and charge reasonable tolls to all persons using them. Many instances might be cited where governmental undertakings are supported in whole or in part by charges upon those who avail themselves of the advantages afforded thereby. Water works, sewers, wharves and canals are often maintained in this manner. Charges made in this way are not taxes. There is no analogy between the imposition of taxes and the levy of tolls for improvement of highways, and any attempt to justify or condemn what is forbidden in the one case by reference to those in the other must be misleading. Taxes are levied for the support of government and that amount is regulated by its necessities. Tolls are compensations for the use of another's property or improvements made by him. Tolls that are reasonable in amount are not discriminatory and uniformly upheld. Constitutional limitations upon the taxing power have no applications to such a levy.

It is a matter of common knowledge that since the event of the use of automotive vehicles upon highways vast sums have been expended in making the conditions more favorable for that class of traffic. No reason appears why the Legislature may not impose upon those who accept the benefits of such highway improvement and maintenance a reasonable charge for the use made. It is upon this ground that the State registration system for automobiles can be sustained. The purpose of these laws is to secure some compensation for the use of facilities provided at great cost from the class for whose needs they are essential and whose operations over them are peculiarly injurious. It is apparent that the exacting of a toll as in the case of a bridge could not be put into practical operation in reference to the present day use of highways generally. Some other measure of the use must be found and the determination of what measures must be adopted is within the province of the Legislature. No constitutional ob-

jection lies in the way of a legislative body prescribing any mode or measure to determine the amount it will charge for the privilege it bestows. It is clearly within the discretion of the State to determine what the compensation for the use of its highways by automobiles shall be by way of a fee payable annually or semi-annually, or by a toll based on mileage or otherwise; while the payment proposed will not be an exact measure yet it will so far approximate thereto as to be within the power of the Legislature to adopt. A charge cannot be imposed upon sales of gasoline, etc., generally, but only when the commodity is sold for consumption in the operation of vehicles upon the highways. A charge so limited amounts to the same thing as a toll for the use of the highway and may lawfully be imposed by the Legislature."

Now the amendment proposed makes these exemptions, and it provides a tax of one cent on all gasoline sold and used for the specific and only purpose of automobiles and tractors using the highways; and I say to you, gentlemen, that there can be no question as a matter of law that if this bill is enacted without those provisions the supreme court of the State of Maine will hold that the entire bill is unconstitutional. I am willing to stake whatever little reputation I may have as an attorney on that proposition and make it a part of the record.

Now senators, in face of this proposition, those of you who are interested in passing a bill which will provide a revenue from automobiles using the highway, are you going to blindly pass an act that will be unconstitutional and deprive you and the citizens of the very result which you seek to obtain?

The exemptions under this bill do not require a complicated machinery in the way of collecting. Blank forms are provided, and those who claim exemption must under oath make affidavit showing that it was used for other purposes than highway purposes. Those blanks when they have been filled out and properly made oath to, are sent to the State auditor and the State auditor refunds the money to them, so that the talk about the great cost of collecting is a myth.

The amount that the State would

lose by these exemptions—if you could legally pass a general commodity tax, would be small comparatively. It is safe to say that if this tax bill is passed with exemptions—and one cent is provided by this amendment—that the State of Maine will have for use upon its highways this year and next year at least \$300,000 per year. Now that is worth something, and I cannot conceive of a person who operates an automobile objecting to it, because the very fact of that money being expended upon the highways will mean that the depreciation on his car on account of these improvements made will be much less after the roads are repaired than the amount he is required to pay by this charge will be.

I certainly hope that this Senate will adopt this amendment and pass a law which will give some revenue in a substantial amount to be used on the roads, and pass a law which we know is constitutional.

Mr. EATON: Mr. President, I would like to have House Amendment A read.

House Amendment A was read in part by the Chair.

Mr. EATON: Mr. President, I move the further reading of the amendment be dispensed with.

The motion was agreed to.

Mr. SPEIRS of Cumberland: Mr. Mr. President, I do not see any reason for this being read, so far.

The PRESIDENT: The entire amendment has not been read.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, may I call the attention of the senator from Cumberland to the fact that the exemption is not provided in so many words in the amendment, but everything is exempted by it except gasoline used in motor vehicles, because it provides that gasoline used in motor vehicles is the only thing that can be taxed and that in itself makes the exemption. If the President will read the first part of it—

The PRESIDENT: Motor vehicles shall mean any vehicle propelled or drawn upon the public ways of this State by any other than muscular, except motor boats, tractors used for agricultural purposes not operating on public ways, and such vehicles as run only on rails or tracks, or are owned and operated by the United States or the State.

Mr. HINCKLEY: And the second paragraph specifically refers to—

The PRESIDENT: Does the Senator desire any further reading of the amendment?—The senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley, has moved the adoption of House Amendment A. The Senate had passed the bill to be engrossed as amended by two Senate Amendments A and C.

Is it the pleasure of the Senate that we reconsider the vote whereby we passed the bill to be engrossed.

The motion was agreed to, and the Senate further reconsidered its vote whereby Senate amendments A and C were adopted.

The PRESIDENT: Is it the pleasure of the Senate that we adopt House Amendment A as read.

A viva voce vote being doubted a division was had, and fourteen senators voting in favor of the adoption of the amendment and thirteen against, House Amendment A was adopted, and the bill as thus amended was passed to be engrossed.

Mr. SPEIRS of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move the bill be indefinitely postponed.

Mr. SMITH of Somerset: Mr. President, I think there is some misunderstanding concerning the matter which we just voted on,—at least I did not understand it, and I would like to inquire if the House did not reject the amendment which we have voted on?

The PRESIDENT: The House did, but the Senate is voting on the matter as it stands before it.

Mr. SMITH: I simply inquire to find out the attitude of the House.

Mr. HINCKLEY: On the motion to indefinitely postpone, there is one thing I neglected to explain to the Senate. I want to do it now. The method of distributing this fund is different from the method in the Wadsworth bill so-called. The method of distributing the fund is the method as in the original Leland bill which has been accepted by the House. I want to make that clear so there will be no misunderstanding on that.

The motion to indefinitely postpone was lost, and the bill was sent down to the House.

Passed to be Enacted

An Act to authorize the sale by Sebec Dam Company and Purchase by

Milo Electric Light and Power Company of all the property, rights, privileges, immunities and franchises of Sebec Dam Company.

An Act to Amend Section Eight of Chapter One Hundred and Seventeen of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter Two Hundred and Ten of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Nineteen relating to the Attorney General.

An Act to change the name of Rattlesnake Pond in the town of Brownfield to Lane Pond.

An Act to amend Section Thirty-eight of Chapter Two Hundred and Nineteen, of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Seventeen, as amended by Chapter Thirty-seven of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Nineteen, and as amended by Chapter One Hundred and Seventeen of the Public Laws of Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-one relating to the protection of deer.

An Act relative to the Gould Electric Company.

Finally Passed

Resolve appropriating money for Maternity and Child Welfare Work.

Resolve to retire Maine Forestry District Deficit.

Resolve in aid of navigation on the Lakes of Maine.

Resolve in favor of the State Armory at Lewiston.

Resolve in favor of Ashley A. Smith for Lincoln Day Address.

Mr. BREWSTER of Cumberland: Mr. President, I wish to present the following order:

Ordered, that 3000 copies of the Governor's Message in regard to reading the Bible in the public schools be printed for the use of the Legislature.

The order was given passage.

Mr. BREWSTER of Cumberland: Mr. President, I would say, in view of the bills that have been distributed here, in case the Senate should consider the reservoir privilege, that practically all the details of the bill are exactly the same as in the original bill down to section 13. From there on are the provisions which have been discussed and which present a different form of policy for consideration. I say this for information.

The PRESIDENT: The Senate can be at ease, and at the call of the bell.

After Recess

The Senate was called to order by the President at 12.10 P. M.

From the House: An Act providing for a tax upon gasoline and other products used in operating internal combustion engines (House Doc. No. 490.)

Came from the House, that branch insisting upon its former action in passing the bill to be engrossed as amended by House Amendment B and asking for a committee of conference, the Speaker having appointed as the House members of such a committee:

NICHOLS of Portland,
SANDERS of Portland.

On motion by Mr. Emery of Washington, the Senate voted to insist and join a committee of conference.

The Chair appointed as such committee on the part of the Senate: Messrs. Emery of Washington, Phillips of Hancock, Hussey of Aroostook.

From the House: Ordered, the Senate concurring that a legislative committee consisting of five members on the part of the House, together with the Speaker ex-officio, and such as the Senate may joint, together with the President ex-officio, be appointed to confer with the Governor and Council in regard to, and to make plans in connection with, the dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Memorial Bridge.

Which came from the House read and passed, the Speaker having appointed as the House members of such a committee:

In the Senate the order was passed in concurrence, and the Chair appointed as such committee on the part of the Senate: Messrs. Spencer of York, Cram of Cumberland, Eaton of Oxford, Buzzell of Waldo, Elliot of Knox.

Passed to Be Engrossed

Resolve making appropriation for the expenses of the dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Bridge.

Received out of order and read twice and passed to be engrossed under suspension of the rules, without printing and without reference to a committee.

From the House: Resolve to aid the town of Naples in the construction of a bridge across the Chute river.

In the House received and read twice under suspension of the rules and passed to be engrossed.

Mr. HINCKLEY of Cumberland: Mr. President, I was informed by two members of the House that by an error this was left out of the town road appropriation bill. And instead of having the bill amended the matter was put in this form.

I move that it be received under the suspension of the order limiting the time for reception of bills.

The motion was agreed to, the bill was received and under further suspension of the rules, without printing or reference to a committee was given its two readings and was passed to be engrossed.

Finally Passed

(Emergency Measure)

Resolve for the construction, maintenance and repair of roads, bridges and ferries.

This resolve carrying the emergency clause required on its final passage a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate.

Twenty-five senators voting in the affirmative and none opposed the bill was finally passed.

Passed to Be Enacted

An Act to amend Section 59 of Chapter 19 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 244 of the Public Laws of 1917, and by Chapter 106 of the Public Laws of 1919 and by Chapter 218 of the Public Laws of 1921, relating to non-resident hunters' licenses.

An Act to amend Section 46 of Chapter 219 of the Laws of 1917 as amended by Chapter 123 of the Public Laws of 1919, and as amended by Chapter 218 of the Public Laws of 1921, relating to the protection of fur-bearing animals.

An Act in relation to the board of registration of medicine.

Finally Passed

Resolve in favor of the State Park Commission.

Mr. EATON of Oxford: Mr. President, I desire to have the order suspended in regard to the time limit, and the rules suspended that I may introduce out of order and have passed to be engrossed, An Act to correct an error in an act already passed by this Legislature.

The rules were suspended, and the senator presented An Act requiring the investment in permanent securities of school funds and other trust funds held by cities, towns and quasi municipal corporations and state officers, and amending Section 72, Chapter 2, Section 24 of Chapter 17 and Section 14 of Chapter 1 of the Revised Statutes.

The bill was given its two readings and was passed to be engrossed.

Mr. PHILLIPS of Hancock: Mr. President, it seems that in the new bill relating to the State department of health, the objections of the Governor were eliminated. And now that those objections have been eliminated I move that we reconsider the vote whereby we voted to adhere to our former action.

The motion was agreed to and on motion by the same senator the vote was reconsidered whereby the bill was referred to the next Legislature.

On further motion by the same senator, under suspension of the rules, the bill was given its two readings and passed to be engrossed.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Allen of York, a recess was taken until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

AFTER RECESS

Senate called to order by the Presidenta at 2.18 P. M.

Reports of Committees

Mr Eaton from the committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, on Resolve appropriating money for the maintenance and operation of the State Pier for two fiscal years, reported the same ought not to pass.

The report was accepted and sent down for concurrence.

The same Senator for the same committee, reported ought to pass on Resolve for the pay of the chaplains of the Senate of the 81st Legislature.

On motion by Mr. Eaton of Oxford, the rules were suspended, the resolve read twice and passed to be engrossed.

Send down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Stevens of York, it was

Ordered, that the engrossing department be requested to return to the Senate, Resolve making appropriation for the dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Memorial Bridge, for further consideration.

Mr. ALLEN of York: Mr. President, I wish to introduce An Act out of order, and I move that the rules be suspended and that this Act be received.

The senator presented: An Act to repeal An Act creating the Kennebec Reservoir Company.

A division was ordered.

Mr. EATON of Oxford: Mr. President, I move that this matter lie on the table.

The motion was agreed to and the bill was tabled.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair wishes to make a statement in regard to the conference committee that was appointed this morning in regard to the resolve relating to intra, etc., bridges. The Chair appointed on that committee the senator from Somerset, Mr. Bemis, because of the fact that he supposed the senator voted with the majority vote of the Senate. Upon inquiry he found that he did not vote with the majority and the Chair had to appoint another senator, and appointed the senator from Somerset, Mr. Smith, as the rule requires that the conference shall represent the majority vote of the Senate.

Mr. ALLEN of York: Mr. President, I move that we take from the table an act to repeal An Act creating the Kennebec Reservoir Company.

The motion was agreed to.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, as I came through the door I heard a few words which attracted

my attention. I would like to inquire what they were.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will make the matter clear to the Senate. The senator from York, Mr. Allen, has presented An Act repealing an act creating the Kennebec Reservoir Company.

(The Chair read the bill.)

The PRESIDENT: Senator Allen has moved that the order limiting the time of reception of bills be suspended, and that requires a two-thirds vote.

The Chair will rule that those senators who are in their seats must vote unless excused for reason.

(At the request of Senator Wadsworth, the Chair restated the motion.)

A division was had and twenty-six senators voting in favor of suspension of the time limit order, and three against, the motion was carried.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, I now move that under suspension of the rules this bill be given its two several readings, and I wish to briefly address myself to that matter.

The original bill, under which this Act became a law during this present session, was presented during the early part of the session of this Legislature. It was considered carefully and seriously for many weeks, after full and complete hearing by the committees of judiciary and interior waters. Not a word of evidence was presented to the committees in opposition to this bill. We believed it was a fair bill; we believed it was a just bill; we believed, and the Legislature sustained us in this belief, that the water powers of the State and the reservoirs which are a necessary adjunct in connection with the development of water powers in this State, should be developed by private interests and not by the State itself.

It is a matter of history that this Legislature, both branches, by an overwhelming majority sustained the views of the committee and said by that act that we believe that the State of Maine should continue to exercise its governmental functions, and should continue to stay out of private business enterprises.

After this Legislature by an overwhelming majority took that position, the Governor of the State, under his constitutional right, delivered a message to the Legislature in joint ses-

sion, in which he took issue with the action of the Legislature in this matter, and in the message which he delivered at that joint session he stated:

"The question before this Legislature is, shall a great storage reservoir of inestimable value be deeded to a private corporation to be used for private gain"? and again, "The value of the franchise which the Kennebec Storage Reservoir Company seeks to obtain from the State is enormous". Again quoting from his message: "The passage of this charter by this Legislature would be nothing less than a betrayal of the trust imposed upon this Legislature by the people of Maine. The plea of private corporations that the public will be benefitted by the development of this storage is specious, for their development would be solely for their own private gain. It should be for the public interest. It is interesting to note that the proposed dam in the Dead river system is to be located at one of the few places in the State where the State by owning both sides of the river actually owns the water power privilege. This is an additional reason why this Legislature should not part with the people's rights in this valuable location".

The inference has been clearly made that this Legislature was improperly influenced by the lobby in the passage of this Act.

Now, after the veto message of the Governor was received, the Legislature by an overwhelming majority passed this Act again over the veto of the Governor. At this juncture a proclamation was issued by the Governor of the State of Maine to all the people of the State, calling their attention to the fact that in 1868 the wild lands of the State of Maine were practically given away, and that that year would ever go down in history as the "State Land Steal", the proclamation coupling up the act of this Legislature with the act of the previous Legislature of 1868, and stating that the act of this Legislature if continued and carried out would put it in the same class, and they would betray their trust in the water powers as the Legislature of 1868 betrayed the State in the wild land matters.

Weeks went on and the next chapter written in the history of this water power question of the State was on yesterday, when a joint session was called, and the Legislature had at that time read to them another message

from the Governor. In that message the Governor said this: "As a matter of fact the State will probably acquire the property at a very nominal figure due to the fact that it will be almost completely amortized at the end of that lease". To go back a little: "Should my signature"—quoting now from his former message, he said "Should my signature be affixed to this bill the paper on which it is written immediately would be worth far in excess of a million dollars". And then in his message yesterday he said to the people "I have saved to the people that million dollars if this Legislature will enact the act which will be presented to it, which has been agreed to by me", and by who else? the Legislature, between whom the controversy had been raging for some weeks and the Governor? No. "This has been agreed to by me and by just one member of the Legislature", the one member who was present at that conference named in his message, that member representing simply a handful of the members of this Legislature who voted against this proposition. In other words, the Governor's position was represented by the Legislature in the person of one member. That part of it that overwhelmingly passed this reservoir bill was represented by whom? By the lobby, whom the Governor had intimated at least had improperly controlled and influenced the Legislature and who dominated the Legislature.

And the lobby and the Governor and the one member of the Legislature got together and fixed up this matter. And what did they fix up? The original bill, gentlemen, that was heard by the judiciary and the interior waters committees carefully and seriously, granted rights to this Reservoir Company to erect a dam on State lands and to flow State lands for storage purposes only. And during the hearing before these committees, I specifically asked of the attorney who represented the incorporators of this bill, whether or not there was anything in this bill that would in any wise give them rights to water power privileges, and their reply was "no, we are not asking this. We do not expect to get it".

Now, gentlemen, this bill which has been presented to us by the Governor and by the lobby, on which he says he will get a million dollars for the people, not only grants the right to

flow water up there, but it grants the great water powers and the rights owned by the people of this State, not through some intangible, indefinable right, which has been talked to the people for years, but they own it by virtue of the fact that they own the land itself. And this compromise of the Governor and the lobby is what? Not only to give them the right to build the dam here, but gives them the right to these great water power privileges besides, to develop 14,500 or 15,000 horsepower. That is what it gives them. And the Governor repeating his former message to you yesterday, said if I sign,—or the minute my name, or my signature is placed upon that act creating the Kennebec reservoir, that piece of paper is then worth more than a million dollars to that company.

And the Governor in this compromise of his, after criticising this Legislature, not for a million dollars, as he says to you, but for \$25,000 a year for forty years—that means less than \$300,000 and not a million,—the Governor says that I am ready to give these incorporators, not the land to build a dam for the purpose of flowage, which I said to you and which I believe was worth more than a million,—but I am ready to give them on top of that for less than \$300,000 those water powers which are worth hundreds of thousands if not a million dollars beyond. That is the compromise that is presented here.

Now I want to say to you, Senators, do as you wish in this matter—that is your right, that is your privilege. But the lobby has not in the past improperly influenced me and I say to you today that nobody in this Legislature can in the midnight hours come to the Governor of the State of Maine and make a compromise which I think is wrong, and take away the rights which I believe are yours, and then come and tell me as a member of this Legislature that I shall vote to accept it. And I say to you that this lobby, so far as the incorporators of this bill are concerned, that instead of coming to the Legislature which is the only branch of the Government that can grant a franchise, that can give any rights under a charter, instead of coming to this Legislature and asking for that right, when they come to another branch of the Government that has no power and authority in granting and issuing those charters, and

when they make a bill and turn it over to me and say you must swallow it,—I say, no. And today I said that the lobby at the State House plus the Executive himself has not money enough and influence enough to get me to do something that I believe I should not do.

And this is a matter that I believe I should not do. And now I say to you, Senators, that having gone to the Governor under those circumstances and absolutely ignoring the Legislature, they have repudiated the former act, having admitted that they were willing to pay certain rentals, and all of these things in these late days when we have not time to consider or understand the matter and have a proper hearing on it, I say to you that having taken that position, the only position, for this Legislature is to repeal the act which had been previously passed by this Legislature and say to these men, having repudiated that position, now wait two years until the Legislature can find out the real facts in connection with it, and then come and that Legislature will consider it and do justice to you.

I thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The question before the Senate is on the motion of the senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley, that the rules be suspended and that the bill be given its two readings at this time.

MR. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President and members of the Senate, I crave the opportunity to say just a few words on this subject, but before I do I want to ask a question: Has the substituted bill known as the Dead River Reservoir bill, been offered?

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that it has not. The question before the Senate is on the motion of the senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley, that the rules be suspended and that an Act to repeal an act to create the Kennebec Reservoir Company, be received.

MR. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I heard the last part of this bill read, asking for the repeal of the Kennebec Reservoir Company bill. I heard that just as I was coming through the door at this afternoon's session, and in addition to what has been said by the senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley, I want to say in fairness to this Legislature, and in fairness to all

of the people of the State of Maine, that this bill, this substituted bill should be read into this record, and I offer it and will read it now. If it may be placed in the record later that will suit me.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would be obliged to rule that unless it comes in connection by way of argument with whatever the senator of Waldo has to say, that it really has no connection with the motion or the bill before the Senate.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I will see that it is properly in the record then.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, I think it would be the proper method to suggest unanimous consent to have it go into the record, instead of the senator from Waldo reading it at this time—as part of his argument.

The PRESIDENT: If there is no objection on the part of the Senate and unanimous consent is given, the Chair would cheerfully permit it. If there is no objection by anybody the senator may proceed.

Mr. BUZZELL: I want to say, gentlemen of this Senate, that this bill was very carefully considered the first part of this session, properly advertised, proper notice was given to all the people of the State of Maine, and not a single soul appeared in opposition to this bill. I also understand that the Chief Executive of this State knew the contents of this bill, and surely he made no opposition before the committee at the hearing. Very properly he might have been represented there by the attorney general of the State of Maine. Very properly the Honorable Senator from Cumberland, Senator Brewster, could have appeared if he objected to this bill; and I say again, not one word was raised in opposition to this bill.

It received a unanimous report. It passed both branches of this Legislature: later vetoed and it was passed by two-thirds of both branches. A little later we received the solemn proclamation that you have heard about. A little later we were informed that petitions went into every town in the State of Maine, unbeknown to this Legislature I say, in the proper way, in the regular channels—it was intimated that there were meetings held in this State House, and the message itself discloses the fact that the attorneys for these interests were sent for. Did

the Legislature know about that? I am going to tell you, members of the Senate, if there are rights in the State of Maine that should be preserved, I believe that the 81st Legislature is the real preserver of their rights. I am glad that this bill has been presented here, just as it has been, and I want to tell you now that I endorse it in every respect. I think it is time for this Legislature to assert its rights in the right way. I am thoroughly tired of these political plays. I am thoroughly tired of the subject of wind and water making governors for the State of Maine.

For seven long years I have listened to this subject, and I have said many times that I believed it was socialistic and I hoped I would never live long enough to see the State of Maine go into such business as that, and call upon the people of this State to appropriate millions for the sake of burying it in dams here and there for the sake of political exploitation. As I recall it, we have listened to two messages since this Legislature began; in each of them they talked about this right in particular, and they talked about it being worth millions of dollars. But the compromise says if we can have a million dollars in forty years payable \$25,000 per year, this may go by.

I ask you, my fellow senators, is this fair to the people of the State of Maine—I mean the common people of the whole State,—for the large headlines to come out across the papers and talk about a million dollars! they believe the million dollars is near the treasury of the State of Maine, and they do not know the difference. But what are the facts? The facts are these, that a million dollars paid in the next forty years at \$25,000 per year means nothing more than the present value of that money, which at this time amounts to \$208,000. And they talk about millions of dollars and these rights being worth millions of dollars! I feel that this Legislature has been fooled. I feel that it has been fooled in more ways than one. And we are the real preservers and the real protectors of the people's rights in the State of Maine, and as men, honest men, I say, let us give them back in the same condition they were in when we took them, all others and their interests notwithstanding.

Extension of the remarks of the Senator from Waldo, Senator Buzzell.

Dead River Reservoir Company

An Act to create the Dead River Reservoir Company.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. Philip T. Dodge, H. deForest Lockwood, Rudolph Pagenstecher, Waldo E. Pratt, Garret Schenck, W. E. Winchester and Walter S. Wyman, their associates, successors and assigns are hereby made a body corporate under the name of the Dead River Reservoir Company, with all the rights, powers and privileges hereinafter named.

Sec. 2. Said corporation is authorized and empowered to fix the amount of its capital stock, and the classes thereof and to increase the same from time to time, not exceeding, however, in the aggregate two million dollars.

Sec. 3. Said corporation is hereby authorized and empowered to build dams and other necessary works and structures on Dead river, at or near the head of Long Falls, near the south-easterly corner of township three in range four, in the county of Somerset, for the purposes of creating storage basins and reservoirs to retain and control the waters of Dead river and the tributaries thereof, thereby increasing and making more constant the flow of water in the Kennebec river, for use at all seasons of the year for manufacturing and power purposes on said Kennebec river and for facilitating the driving of logs and lumber on Dead river. And in order to facilitate the driving of logs and lumber down said Dead river without unnecessary waste of water, said corporation is authorized to build and maintain dams, side dams, sheer booms, remove rocks, make embankments and other improvements on said Dead river from the location of its reservoir dams to its union with the Kennebec river.

Sec. 4. Said corporation is authorized by means of its said works to hold, store and retain said waters in any reservoir or storage basin so created, and to discharge and release the same and control the volume and flow thereof for the uses and purposes and subject to the restrictions aforesaid. It may make such reasonable rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary for the most advantageous use thereof, and is authorized to contract with owners and users of water power benefited by said

development for defraying the cost thereof in any manner which may be agreed upon.

Sec. 5. Said corporation is authorized and empowered, when subscriptions to its capital stock at least of three hundred thousand dollars have been made, to acquire by purchase or otherwise, or to take and hold, as for public uses, all, but not less than all, dams, booms, piers, rafts and other property used or useful in the driving or floating of logs or lumber, which may at the time of such purchase or taking, be located in or on any part of said Dead river, between the mouth of Alder stream and the mouth of Dead river, together with the dam at the outlet of Big Spencer pond and such works and improvements in and on the outlet stream from said outlet to Dead river, belonging to the Kennebec Log Driving Company or to any other corporation authorized by law to drive on said section of Dead river or on said outlet stream, including so much of the franchise or franchises as relate to driving on said section or on said outlet stream, and such owner or owners are authorized and empowered to sell the same to it; provided, however, that the acquisition of such franchise or franchises shall not impose any duties or burdens, or create any conditions, limitations or restrictions inconsistent with the franchises, rights and privileges elsewhere in this act conferred upon this corporation. All proceedings in relation to said taking and the assessment of damages therefor shall be as provided in chapter sixty-one, sections twelve to twenty-one, both inclusive, of the revised statutes; provided, that the legality of such taking shall not be affected by any omission of this corporation to include in its notice of taking mention of any specific item or items of property, or of any such log driving corporation owner, unless it be shown that such omission was made with fraudulent intent. Subject to the last preceding exception, any notice of taking filed as provided by law, unless otherwise expressly stated, shall be deemed to be notice of taking all that this corporation is authorized by this section to take, and all persons and corporations affected thereby shall have the same rights and be subject to the same duties as though they and the property so affected were fully described, and may be heard and enforce their rights accordingly.

The dams, booms, piers, rafts and other property, including the dam at the outlet of Big Spencer pond and works and improvements in the outlet thereof, described in this section as the property of the Kennebec Log Driving Company, are meant to include all of the works and facilities within the territory described herein which were formerly owned and used by the Dead River Log Driving Company and are now owned, used or controlled by the Kennebec Log Driving Company with all additions thereto made or acquired by or under the latter company. If the Dead River Reservoir Company shall offer in writing to pay the Kennebec Log Driving Company as full compensation for all of said property, including so much of its franchise as is mentioned in this section, forty thousand dollars, or a sum equal to the amount of the Kennebec Log Driving Company's existing indebtedness on account of said property, if the same be less than forty thousand dollars; and if such offer is not accepted in writing within twenty days after its receipt, said Dead River Reservoir Company may, at its option, take the whole or any part or parts of the same as aforesaid, and may exercise and enjoy the franchises mentioned in the next section hereof to the exclusion of the Dead River Log Driving Company and the Kennebec Log Dog Driving Company, paying them or either of them only for so much of said property as it may elect to take as for public uses as aforesaid, if any, and no more.

Sec. 6. From and after the time when this corporation shall have acquired by purchase or otherwise, as provided in section five of this act, the properties and franchises therein mentioned, or the Kennebec Log Driving Company shall have failed to accept a written offer therefor as provided in section five, as to so much as is described in the last paragraph of said section five, and it has taken by purchase or otherwise that belonging to others than the Kennebec Log Driving Company and the Dead River Log Driving Company, it shall drive all logs and lumber that may be in said Dead river below the mouth of said Alder stream which flows into the North branch and all logs and lumber which may be delivered to it at the dam at the foot of Big Spencer pond, or in said outlet stream below the dam, including all area flowed by its dams as far as the same may ex-

tend up the South branch of Dead river, landing them in Kennebec river, or against any drive that may then be passing through or held in Kennebec river at that point, or behind booms and piers across, and near the mouth of Dead river; at either of which places they are to be taken up by the owners, or others having authority to receive them, without further obligation on the part of said Dead River Reservoir Company; provided, that said logs and lumber shall not be turned over this corporation's reservoir dam against said Kennebec Log Driving Company's written protest that they cannot then be safely discharged.

Sec. 7. This corporation shall be required to make one drive per year. It shall be started from the mouth of Alder stream not later than June first and from all other points seasonably for delivery as a unit; and reasonable effort be made to deliver it at the point where Dead river empties into Kennebec river at The Forks to be taken up by the Kennebec Log Driving Company before or at the time the rear of the Maine Kennebec drive passes said point. It shall not be required to drive from any starting point any logs which shall not be there when the rear of its drive shall be started from that point nor to drive the same season any logs which shall not be delivered to it before the rear of its drive passes the point of attempted delivery.

This corporation shall remove all growth on the area flowed by it seasonably to prevent it from falling and being carried away by the water, said removal to be within two years after the completion of said dam. It shall keep the area at the mouth of all tributaries flowing into its reservoir and Dead river below reasonably clear for the entrance of logs and lumber during the driving seasons, and shall boom logs and lumber driven into it from said tributaries. Owners landing logs or lumber within the flowed area shall deliver them within drivable waters and boom the same. Drivable waters in this section shall be understood to mean water within a contour line representing a twenty-five foot head on the reservoir dam.

One or more persons, firms or corporations desiring to drive not less than five thousand cords of logs or pulpwood after the aforesaid annual drive has been made by this corpora-

tion may give notice thereof to this corporation in writing. This corporation may elect, in writing within twenty days, to make such drive itself, whereupon it shall undertake and complete the same within the limits and subject to the regulations governing said annual drive, as far as the same are applicable, and receive the same tolls therefor, or, if it does not so elect, the owners may make the drive at their own expense. This corporation shall make reasonable effort to land any such extra drive or drives driven by it in the Kennebec river, at The Forks, immediately after, and not before the regular drive of the Kennebec Log Driving Company shall have passed over the dam at Solon; and delivery by it to said Kennebec Log Driving Company at The Forks, or behind booms or piers in the mouth of Dead river shall terminate its responsibility. The Kennebec Log Driving Company is not bound to accept such drive unless delivered at The Forks within such limits as to time.

This corporation shall be responsible for sufficient water to make the regular and one such extra drive annually, if so much shall have flowed into its reservoir during the current year, and shall provide water for such additional drives as may be made as aforesaid if it then has it.

Sec. 8. This corporation is authorized and empowered to collect and receive tolls for driving logs and lumber within the area aforesaid, and parts thereof, at the following rates per thousand board feet, viz:

Between the mouth of Alder stream and the point of flowage caused by this corporation's dam located at Long Falls, twenty-five (25) cents;

From the point of delivery within the flowage area as defined in section seven, to The Forks, seventy-five (75) cents;

From said dam, or any point west of the mouth of Spencer stream, to The Forks, fifty (50) cents;

From the mouth of Spencer stream, or any point west of the mouth of Enchanted stream, to The Forks, forty (40) cents;

From the mouth of Enchanted stream, or any point west of the mouth of Salmon stream, to The Forks, thirty (30) cents;

From the mouth of Salmon stream, or any point east, to The Forks, ten (10) cents;

From the dam at the foot of Big Spencer pond or any point in the outlet stream to Dead river (in addition to the aforesaid tolls for driving on Dead river) thirty (30) cents.

These tolls are to remain in force for a period of ten years, and thereafter until revised in any manner provided by the legislature. The word "west" used in designating direction in this section means the course from the mouth of Dead river toward its sources, notwithstanding the actual direction at any given point.

Sec. 9. Charges for driving logs and lumber, as aforesaid, shall be due and payable when the drive to be made by this corporation is completed; and said corporation shall have a lien on all such logs and lumber which it shall drive for the driving of the same as provided in this act, which lien shall have precedence of all other claims except liens reserved to the State and laborer's liens, shall continue for three months after the logs or lumber shall arrive at the place of destination for manufacture or sale, and may be enforced by attachment.

Sec. 10. The owners of logs or lumber to be driven by this corporation shall, on or before the first day of June in that year, file with the clerk of this corporation a correct statement in writing, signed by a sworn surveyor, of all such logs and lumber intended for the regular annual drive, of the number of feet, full scale, with the mark or marks thereon, together with the place from which the logs are to be driven and their destination. This corporation may adopt such statements as correct for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of tolls to which it is entitled, or cause the same to be scaled. If any owner fails to file such statement, the corporation shall give such owner notice of its intention to estimate in some convenient manner the quantity of his logs or to scale the same and unless such owner files such statement within seven days after receiving such notice, the estimate or scale of the corporation shall be conclusive upon such owner.

Whenever this corporation elects to make any later drive as provided in section seven, the foregoing provisions as to filing statements, and the effect thereof, and of failure to do so, shall be applicable thereto, except that the same be filed on or before the date of starting the drive.

Sec. 11. This corporation is authorized and empowered to acquire by purchase from other corporations and individuals who are authorized to drive logs or lumber on any tributaries or on the Kennebec river, and such corporations are authorized and empowered to sell and convey to it, any part or all of their respective properties and franchises for log-driving purposes; and to contract with such corporations and individuals concerning their respective duties as log-driving companies. Provided, however, that no acquisition of the franchise of another corporation and merger thereof with the franchise of this corporation in any manner under this or any other section of this act, shall be deemed to qualify or restrict any franchise or other right which this corporation otherwise acquires through this charter or from any other source, but shall be deemed to be additional thereto.

Sec. 12. Said corporation is authorized to acquire by purchase, lease or otherwise such lands, properties and rights, as it may require; and when subscriptions to the capital stock thereof to an amount of at least three hundred thousand dollars have been made, it is authorized and empowered to take and hold as for public uses, such lands, properties and rights, as it may require for any of the aforesaid uses and purposes, and such material as may be needed for erecting and maintaining any of its dams and works, and all proceedings in relation to said taking and the assessment of damages therefor shall be as provided in said chapter sixty-one, sections twelve to twenty-one, both inclusive, of the revised statutes. Said corporation is also authorized and empowered, when subscriptions of the aforesaid amount shall have been made to its capital stock, to flow such lands as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act, and the damages therefor and for flowage caused or authorized under any other section of this act not otherwise expressly provided unless arranged by mutual agreement, shall be ascertained and determined in the manner prescribed in chapter ninety-seven of the revised statutes; and said corporation may also have the benefit of chapter one hundred ninety-six of the public laws of nineteen hundred and twenty-one. The provisions of this section shall not be construed to authorize the taking of property or franchises de-

scribed in section eleven otherwise than by purchase.

Provided, however, that this corporation shall not flow out any part of the highway which leads from North New Portland to Dead river and thence to Stratton until it shall have constructed in place thereof, or of such parts as are flowed, highways, or parts of highways connecting the parts of the present highway not so flowed, reasonably safe and convenient as follows: one leading from a point south of the Ledge House, on said road from North New Portland, where the reservoir begins, to Stratton, passing east of Bigelow Mountain; the other from the same point and leading by the east side of the reservoir to a point near the dam and thence on the dam or north thereof to the opposite side of Dead river. This corporation may acquire by purchase, or take as for public uses, lands and materials for the location and construction of such highways, and all proceedings in relation to said taking and the assessment of damages therefor shall be as heretofore provided for the taking of lands and materials for other purposes. Such highways shall be constructed subject to the approval of the county commissioners of the counties in which they, or the respective parts of them, are situated. This corporation shall give written notice to the clerks of the boards of county commissioners of Franklin and Somerset counties before it proceeds to build such roads, and shall locate them as directed by the joint action of said boards if it receives such directions in writing within thirty days after the giving of its notice as aforesaid; otherwise, the corporation shall fix the location. The roads so constructed shall be and become public highways, and all rights therein and duties and obligations in respect thereof shall be the same as though said highways had been located, laid out and constructed in manner provided in the general laws of the State. Such construction shall work a discontinuance of the roads and parts of roads so flowed with the same effect as if discontinued in the manner provided by statute, and shall constitute full settlement for all damages to the state or any sub-division thereof for flowing said existing highway; provided, however, that this shall not be construed to release this corporation from any legal liability to abutters for damages caused by such flowage or changed location.

Sec. 13. The state of Maine does hereby lease, demise and let unto said Reservoir Corporation the state, public or reserved lots in said township three, range four, in which the storage dams are to be located under section three of this act, and also such state, public or reserved lots as are flowed by the development hereinbefore provided for, to have and to hold the same for the term of forty years from the date of filing by this corporation, in the office of the secretary of state, its acceptance of this charter, which filing shall be construed to be an acceptance by the corporation of the terms of this lease, which are as follows:

(a) The lessee shall pay therefor to the treasurer of the state an annual rental of twenty-five thousand dollars, payable on or before the thirtieth day of June of each year. Said rental shall begin to accrue from the first day of July next following the acceptance of this charter, as aforesaid.

(b) The state may retake the demised premises and all of the structures, rights, privileges and other properties of the lessee owned and used by it in the erection and operation of its storage reservoir under this charter, at the termination of this lease, paying therefor the net investment therein, which net investment shall not include any compensation for the value of franchises granted under this act and shall not exceed one-half the cost of dams then in existence plus the cost of other property and rights so taken; or this tenancy shall be renewed for such term and on such conditions as to rental, further options of renewal or retaking, and all other conditions as may then be determined by the Legislature and accepted by the corporation. Provided, however, that if the state shall not have notified the corporation in writing, through any agency designated by the governor and council, of its intention so to take the same, not less than one year before the expiration of the term hereof, and the parties do not agree upon the terms of a renewal of the tenancy at least six months before the expiration hereof, this tenancy shall be deemed to be extended for the additional term of twenty years, in all respects like this lease except as to the amount of the annual rental; provided, however, that if the corporation shall not have notified the governor

not less than five nor more than three years before the expiration of any term of the date of expiration thereof, the state may exercise its option to retake upon one year's notice at any time within the current term. Where the parties are unable to agree upon the compensation to be paid by the state upon taking over the property, or the rental that shall be charged for any further term or terms, either the corporation or the governor may apply by petition to any justice of the supreme judicial court, in equity, for the determination thereof in such manner as the court may deem equitable and just, and said court is given equitable jurisdiction for such purpose. The foregoing provisions as to retaking by the state and renewal of tenancy when the state does not so retake shall apply automatically at the expiration of each succeeding twenty year term.

(c) The lessee shall file annually before the first day of April with the state treasurer, a verified statement showing the true balance sheet of the corporation as of the preceding December thirty-first, and the profit and loss account for the calendar year ending on that date. And the state auditor shall at all reasonable times have access to the books of the corporation for the purpose of investigating its financial affairs, and the accounts shall be kept in manner satisfactory to the state auditor.

(d) The lessee may allow water to be drawn from the dam for the purpose of developing power and may sublet any portion of the premises hereby demised for the construction and maintenance of canals, penstocks, power plants, transmission lines and other structures for the generation and transmission of power, and receive compensation therefor, but no electric current generated on said premises shall be transmitted outside of the state contrary to the provisions of section one, chapter sixty of the revised statutes and acts amendatory thereof and additional thereto.

(e) The state reserves to itself all rights to removal of timber and grass and all other rights to use of the premises hereby demised except in so far as such use will unreasonably interfere with the use of said premises for the purposes of this lease.

(f) The right of the state to take over, maintain, and operate all the property of this corporation at any

time by exercise of the power of eminent domain upon payment of just compensation therefor is hereby expressly reserved.

(g) For purposes of taxation the improvements placed upon the demised property by or under the corporation shall be deemed to be the property of the corporation.

(h) "Net Investment" as used in this act shall mean the actual legitimate original cost thereof plus similar costs of additions thereto and betterments thereof, minus the sum of the following items properly allocated thereto, if and to the extent that such items have been accumulated during the period of this lease from earnings in excess of six per centum per annum on such investment: (1) Unappropriated surplus. (2) Aggregate credit balances of current depreciation accounts. (3) Aggregate appropriations of surplus or income held in amortization, sinking fund, or similar reserves, or expended for additions or used for the purposes for which such reserves were created. (4) The aggregate of dividends or other distribution of surplus in excess of six per centum per annum on such investment. Provided, however, that moneys advanced by the stockholders for the purpose of paying indebtedness incurred for capital purposes, and for which capital stock is issued at once or from time to time, shall not be considered income or treated as deductions in determining net investment, however the amounts of such contributions may be fixed.

(i) The state may enter to remove the tenant for failure to perform any of the terms or conditions of this lease.

Sec. 14. This corporation is empowered to authorize the selectmen of any town, the assessors of any plantation or organized township, and the selectmen of a town or assessors of a plantation or organized township adjoining any unorganized township, to take up from any existing cemetery in such town, plantation or organized township, or unorganized township respectively, which will be flowed by any of its dams, the bodies and remains of all deceased persons buried therein, and all headstones and markers at the graves therein, and remove said bodies and remains to a new cemetery to be selected by said selectmen or assessors and there decently inter the same, and properly reset such headstones and markers

over such dead bodies and remains. Such new cemeteries shall be located with due regard to the convenience of all the inhabitants of the respective communities in which they are located. Said selectmen and assessors are in each case, within thirty days after being so requested by this corporation, to select the place for a new cemetery and fix the bounds thereof, and to proceed with reasonable diligence to cause the removal of the bodies, remains, headstones and markers, as aforesaid. If they fail to do so, this corporation is authorized and empowered to make such selection or selections and cause such removals to be made. All of the expenses incurred in procuring the lands necessary for such cemeteries, in clearing and fitting the ground and fencing the same, and in the taking up and removal of all of the remains of all deceased persons, and in the removal of said headstones and markers, and the interment of said remains and resetting of said headstones and markers shall be paid for by this corporation.

No claim shall be made against this corporation for not complying with the terms herein set out unless the same is made within sixty days after this corporation gives said selectmen or assessors written notice that it has performed its duties under this section. And nothing herein contained shall be construed to limit or qualify the rights of flowage conferred upon this corporation by any provision of this act or which it may possess under any law of the state.

Sec. 15. Said corporation is authorized and empowered to purchase, hold and sell its own stock in accordance with the provisions relating thereto, which shall be provided for in the by-laws, but it shall not purchase or hold said stock except for the purpose of re-sale, or for a longer period of time than one year; provided that said corporation may retire any part or any class of its capital stock or substitute another class therefor in any manner provided in its by-laws and not inconsistent with the laws of the state.

Sec. 16. Said corporation may from time to time borrow money for any lawful purpose and may issue bonds on such terms as the stockholders may determine, secured by pledge or mortgage of all the property, franchises, and income of the corporation or any part thereof for the payment

of the sums so borrowed and interest thereon; provided, that the total amount of bonds outstanding shall at no time exceed twice the amount of capital stock paid in in cash.

Sec. 17. This corporation shall not generate, sell or distribute electricity in any manner, and shall not dispose of its property or franchises to any corporation which has authority to do so; provided that this restriction shall not affect any rights granted in section thirteen, subdivision (d) of this act.

Sec. 18. This act shall become null and void unless it is accepted within five months from the date on which it becomes effective, and said corporation shall commence actual construction of its reservoir dam within eighteen months from said date and prosecute said dam to completion with all reasonable expedition.

Sec. 19. The first meeting of this corporation shall be called at Augusta by a notice signed by any two of the corporators named in section one, setting forth the time, place and purpose of the meeting. Such notice shall be mailed to each of the corporators, postage paid, seven days at least before the day of such meeting. Any corporator may be represented at such meeting by proxy.

Meetings of the board of directors may be held, for any purpose, within or without the state if the by-laws so provide.

Sec. 20. The act entitled "An Act to create the Kennebec Reservoir Company and define the powers thereof" finally passed March twenty-second, nineteen hundred and twenty-three, is hereby repealed.

Mr. WADSWORTH of Kennebec: Mr. President, I may take a little different view on this matter from most of the senators, but it seems to me that we came down here, all of us, with the interests of the State at heart. I certainly did and I believe every one else did.

This measure was introduced, and I believe for the good of the State of Maine, for the good of Kennebec county and the whole of the Kennebec valley. I have been in favor of the measure and I voted for it, both on its enactment and to pass it over the veto of the Governor.

I believe in private ownership. We have passed that measure; there is a referendum clause to it, and I do not know what harm it would do to let

the people vote on this matter at this time. It is a question that they are going to vote on sooner or later. We have an opportunity at this time, —this substituted measure, it was suggested as dead for the reason that the parties named as the incorporators have withdrawn and refuse to have their names used.

Now it seems to me that we do not want to get excited in these closing hours of the Legislature. We have been under considerable strain, and I for one would like to see this thing decided, and there does not seem to be any way to decide it but to let the people decide it, and we have that opportunity. They can vote for it or against it; they can have plenty of time to hear the pros and cons, and be as fairly well educated upon it as they ever will be. I think it is time to come to the point when the water power interests of this State, the development of those powers, shall be decided, whether we shall have public ownership or whether we shall have private ownership.

Why throw away this opportunity just because we are impatient, and just because these unfortunate circumstances have come upon us?

I for one would like to see the thing decided. Let the people vote on it. They are the people who sent us here, and we have tried to represent them the best we could, and we are entitled —and in these strenuous hours it seems to me it would be rather foolish for us to undo all the work we have done.

I hope the motion will not prevail.

Mr. BREWSTER of Cumberland: Mr. President, I do not wish to enter into any discussion except to second the motion of the senator from Cumberland, with whom I am pleased to concur. I do want to read one paragraph which I stated in this Senate on March 7 in discussing this measure, and I think we may very well pause for a minute, and if it does not seem germane I trust the President will permit me to read what I said as to my personal attitude toward this question.

"In discussing this (this was the Kennebec Reservoir bill) I wish first to say that in spite of all the controversy that has raged upon the water power question in this State, I at least have never had any occasion to question the motive of any member of this Legislature in any position which he took in regard to pending legisla-

tion. It seems to me that it is always very unfortunate when we begin to attribute improper motives to those who advocate or oppose such measures. Whatever may be the powerful interests operating for or against these measures, certainly there is no evidence in this Legislature but what every man in it is approaching the question with an eye single to the interests of the State, and the same respect and the same regard which I have for every individual member of this body irrespective of his views upon these questions here, whether or not he shall agree with me, I would simply ask that he view—

(At this point the Senator seemed to be overcome and Senator Hinckley finished the reading).

—I would simply ask that he view my motives with equal charity. While it is often charged that any one who favors water power companies is inspired by selfish motives, I know that is absolutely false; in the same way it is often said that any one who opposes such measures is inspired simply by political motives or by some personal prejudices or interests'.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question?

(The question was called for).

The PRESIDENT: All those in favor of the suspending the rules and giving the bill its two readings at this time will rise and stand until they are counted.

A division was had and twenty senators voting in favor of the motion and two opposed the motion was carried.

The bill was then given its two readings and passed to be engrossed.

Sent down for concurrence.

Passed to be Enacted

An Act to regulate the use of aircraft.

An Act to amend Section 9 of Chapter 45 of the Revised Statutes and Chapter 293 of the Laws of 1917, relating to the settlement of violations of law and repealing Section 87 of Chapter 219 of the Public Laws of 1917, relating to the same subject.

Mr. ALLEN of York: Mr. President, I wish to move that the Senate by a rising vote present to you the gavel that you have used in presiding over the deliberations of this body so faithfully and so well.

The PRESIDENT: I am sure, I

thank you, members of the Senate and I shall prize this as highly as I do another gavel that I hold.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Mr. Stevens, on the Resolve making an appropriation for the dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Memorial bridge, as the papers are before the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Stevens, the Resolve was retabled for a short time.

Passed to be Enacted

An Act to repeal the act creating the Kennebec Reservoir Company.

On motion by Mr. Stevens of York, the Resolve making an appropriation for expenses of dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Memorial bridge, was taken from the table and returned to the engrossing department.

A recess was taken at this time.

After Recess

The Senate was called to order by the President at 4:45 P. M.

Reports of Committees

Mr. Smith for the committee on labor, on Resolve in favor of an amendment to the Constitution of the United States prohibiting the employment of women and children in workshops, factories and mechanical establishments more than forty-eight hours per week, reported that the same be referred to the next Legislature.

The report was accepted and sent down for concurrence.

Final Report

Mr. Smith for the committee on labor, submitted its final reports having acted on all matters referred to them.

The report was accepted.

From the House: The committee of conference on the disagreeing action of the two branches of the Legislature on bill An Act to amend Section 22 of Chapter 51 of the Revised Statutes relating to corporate records and stock lists (House Doc. No. 452) reported that they are unable to agree.

The report was accepted.

From the House: The committee of conference on the disagreeing ac-

tion of the two branches of the Legislature on Resolve amending Article IX of the Constitution, as amended by Articles XXXV, XLII, XLIII and XLV of the Constitution increasing the amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose of building State Highways and State Aid highways and providing for the building of intrastate, interstate and international bridges (House Doc. No. 459) reported that they could not agree.

On motion by Mr. Hinckley of Cumberland, the report was accepted in concurrence.

Veto Message from the Governor

State of Maine, Office of the Governor, Augusta.

April sixth, 1922.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the 81st Legislature:—

I return herewith without my approval:

An Act permitting sterilizing operations in certain cases of mental disease and feeble-mindedness.

This act provides that male and female patients in our insane hospitals, feeble-minded homes, and other State and county institutions, may, under certain conditions, be sterilized in order to prevent the reproduction of feeble-minded persons or in order to treat them for certain mental diseases.

The law provides that "consent" must be given either by the relatives or guardians of the patients or by the patients themselves. No doubt in many cases this consent would be readily given by said relatives or guardians, but, in my opinion, if this law should become effective the door to countless abuses would be opened. When you stop to consider the possibilities of this situation, I feel you will pause before you make this law effective.

The law states that the "consent" of the feeble-minded or insane person may be given, but I cannot understand how actual consent can be given by those who are mentally and physically defective. Picture to yourselves how this "consent" would be given. The poor unfortunate who is to be operated upon would be taken from his associates in the institution and would be brought to the office of the person in charge. There he would be obliged to undergo an examination in the presence of three doctors: he would be friendless and terrified. I

ask you to imagine the ordeal through which he or she would be obliged to pass. The pressure that would be brought to bear upon one whose mental qualifications would not enable him to withstand it no doubt would produce the desired consent. The experiment would be made in the name of science, but I fear it would not be in the name of humanity.

I have visited the feeble-minded home in Pownal and the Bangor and Augusta insane hospitals. Although they are well conducted and are a credit to the State, they are depressing places. I do not believe the time has yet come when our defectives and unfortunates should be subjected to the surgeon's knife in order that they may not propagate their kind. At all events it is well to wait a little before this policy is inaugurated in our State.

The segregation of those afflicted with mental diseases and of the feeble-minded is the safe and humane way of preventing their reproduction. I am not prepared to sanction any other treatment at the present time. This method of treatment may cost the State more, but in these cases the cost should not be considered.

For these reasons I return to you the act in question.

The message was read by the secretary.

THE PRESIDENT: The question before the Senate is, Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor?

MR. SPEIRS of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move the passage of this bill notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

This bill was heard before two committees, the committee on school for feeble-minded and the committee on public health. The superintendent of the school for feeble-minded appeared before the committee, and the State Board of Health recommended it. Representatives of the Skowhegan Institution and the Hallowell School for Girls, appeared before the committee, and several prominent women appeared in favor of this bill.

The Governor is mistaken in what he says about consent being given by the feeble-minded patient. The feeble-minded patients alone cannot give

their consent to the operation. It must be given by some relative.

There are in the State of Maine fifteen hundred feeble-minded children. Of those twelve hundred are the children of feeble-minded parents. Every child born of a feeble-minded parent is a feeble-minded child.

The laws of Nebraska, of the year 1915, briefly summarized, require that no feeble minded or insane inmates physically capable of bearing or begetting offspring shall be paroled or discharged from the Institution unless sterilized. From this very rigid requirement the laws vary in their forcefulness to the mildest legislation. New Hampshire has an act similar to this act introduced for your consideration.

From very careful study of the subject it is believed that this act is very fair, and makes it possible to protect the individual and the State from large numbers of feeble minded children.

It is well known and absolutely proven by those who have made a study of such conditions that fully 80 per cent of the feeble minded have a feeble minded father or mother. It is also well recognized that the subnormal woman, by reason of her lack of control is over four times as prolific as a normal person. In an analysis recently made of 180 cases of feeble-mindedness admitted to the Maine School for Feeble-Minded for heredity tendencies, we find that 59 had feeble-minded fathers; 109 feeble-minded mothers; and 10 feeble-minded paternal grandfathers; 14 feeble-minded paternal grandmothers; 16 feeble-minded maternal grandfathers; and 17 feeble-minded maternal grandmothers, with a scattering of 18 paternal relatives and 48 maternal relatives who were feeble-minded. Of the 180 studied, 131 had feeble-minded brothers or sisters, therefore, totalling these numbers, we find that in the 180 individuals, there were 422 immediate relatives who were feeble-minded.

Also studies have been made of several families well known in certain localities in this State. In one family which we have been able to trace for four generations, we find that 15 had been public charges most of their life. Of these 15 two are deaf and dumb and alcoholic, eight feeble-minded, one criminal, and two minors who are at present public dependants.

The cost of caring for one feeble-minded family alone up to the present time in the Institution at Pownal, covering the years 1912 to 1923, has been \$16,965.08. Estimating at the average length of life, and knowing that this family will be cared for during their life time, the actual total cost of this family to the State of Maine will be \$92,927.20. This does not include the additional expense of caring for the criminal, public dependants, alcoholics, etc. It is very plain to anyone studying this that should the parents of this group of families been taken care of, this great expense to the State would have largely been avoided. The only two methods by which the breeding of such families can be prevented is by segregation in an institution, or by some surgical process, such as this bill recommends, to make it impossible for them to have offspring.

There are many cases in this institution who are well able to support themselves, were it not for this great danger of their becoming the mothers or fathers of feeble-minded children. Should we not protect the individual and the State against such unfortunate outcome. It is a well-known fact that ten per cent of the higher grade cases could be allowed liberty under supervision. Why keep these unfortunates the same as if they were in prison at state expense?

The operation as provided for in the act which is under our consideration, is a simple one. Over 1200 operations of this sort have been performed in Indiana, with no bad results caused by the operation.

This is not a serious operation, and it is performed with the use of cocaine, and if a person has the operation performed at night he would not know it in the morning. If it is done it can be remedied afterwards and the patient's natural function returned.

I think it would be a great saving for the State to have this bill passed. In every locality there are mothers, or those becoming mothers of this kind, and the State Board of Health has within the last week had a girl 21 years of age who has had five feeble-minded children. The father of the last child was willing to marry the girl, but the State Board of Health will not allow it. She could be sterilized and then go to her home and take care of the children for the State.

At the State Institution at Pownal, there is a mother who had ten children. Two are dead. She will be confined there so that it will be impossible for her to have any more offspring.

I move that we pass the bill notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, I feel that this is a very important matter, and so much so that I want to say I heartily agree with the Governor, and hope that this bill will not pass.

The PRESIDENT: The question is, Shall this bill become law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor?

Those who wish to pass the bill notwithstanding the objections of the Governor will vote "yes" when their names are called, and those who wish to sustain the veto of the Governor will vote "no" when their names are called.

The secretary called the roll. Those voting "yes" were Messrs. Cram, Croxford, Emery, Hinckley, Morison, Phillips, Sargent, Speirs, Trefethen. —9. Those voting "no" were Messrs. Adams, Allen, Bemis, Brewster, Buzzell, Carlton, Clark, Eaton, Elliot, Farrington, Hussey, Kirschner, Morneau, Powers, Putnam, Ryder, Smith, Spencer, Stevens, Wadsworth, Wilson —21.

Nine senators voting in the affirmative and 21 in the negative, the Governor's veto was sustained.

On motion by Mr. Wadsworth of Knenebec, it was

Ordered, that the Governor be requested to return Resolve in favor of the State Park Commission to the Senate for further consideration.

The PRESIDENT: The papers are in the possession of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Wadsworth, the Senate voted to reconsider the action whereby this resolve was passed to be engrossed.

The same senator then offered Senate Amendment A to the Resolve in favor of the State Park Commission, and moved its adoption.

"Amend said resolve by striking out the words 'three thousand' in the third line and substituting in place thereof the words 'one thousand'. And by striking out the words 'two thousand' in the fifth line and substituting

in place thereof the words 'one thousand.'"

The amendment was adopted and the resolve as so amended was passed to be engrossed and sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Phillips of Hancock, it was

Ordered, that the Governor be requested to return to the Senate the Act in relation to the board of registration of medicine, for further consideration.

The PRESIDENT: The papers are in the hands of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Phillips, the Senate voted to reconsider the action by which this resolve was passed to be enacted and whereby it was passed to be engrossed.

The same senator then offered Senate Amendment A and moved its adoption.

Senate Amendment A to An Act in relation to the board of registration of medicine.

Amend said Act by striking out the following words in lines three and 18, "If the appropriation is sufficient therefor."

The amendment was adopted and the resolve as so amended was passed to be engrossed and sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Buzzell of Waldo, under suspension of the rules, it was

Ordered, that the Governor be requested to return to the Senate, An Act to amend Chapter 132 of the Public Laws of 1919, as amended by Chapter 203 of the Public Laws of 1921, entitled "An Act to create the Maine Water Power Commission."

The PRESIDENT: The bill is in the hands of the Senate.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, I now have an amendment to offer and move its adoption, Senate Amendment A.

Mr. PUTNAM of Washington: Mr. President, I move that the matter be tabled for a few moments.

Mr. HINCKLEY of Cumberland: Mr. President, I would like to inquire through the Chair if there is any objection to the amendment being read?

Mr. PUTNAM: No.

(The amendment was read by the Chair.)

Mr. PUTNAM: Mr. President, I would like an opportunity to look the amendment over, and that is the only object in asking it to be tabled.

The amendment was tabled by a viva voce vote.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I wish to say that I have no objection to the amendment's being tabled for a short time. I think we can take care of the matter.

The PRESIDENT: The matter of course is in the hands of the Senate, but the Chair would suggest that it should be taken up as soon as possible if you wish to get away tonight.

(A short recess was taken at this time.)

After Recess

The Senate was called to order by the President at 5.35 o'clock.

Mr. PUTNAM of Washington: Mr. President, I move to take from the table An Act to amend Chapter 132 of the Public Laws of 1919, as amended by Chapter 203 of the Public Laws of 1921, entitled "An Act to create the Maine Water Power Commission."

The motion was agreed to and the senator then yielded to the senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, I hope that this amendment will not be adopted. This Water Power Commission bill was considered very carefully by joint committees, and they prepared a bill which was along the same lines as the law at the present time and as it has been for several years, but the committee did feel that in the appointments in the past to more or less of an extent political capital had been made, and they felt that the commission should be appointed under such circumstances that the people would get full information unbiased or prejudiced. And for that reason it is provided that one of the five members should be appointed by the Governor, and the other four appointed by him after the President of the Senate had nominated two, and the Speaker of the House had nominated the other two. We felt that such a commission would be a thoroughly balanced commission and one that should serve the public and give them the information that is necessary to get at the facts in regard to the Water Power matters. This being a unanimous report of these two committees I feel we

should stick to it. If this amendment is defeated I shall offer Senate Amendment B, which is a part of Senate Amendment A, which cuts in two the amount of money provided, namely, cuts it from \$25,000 a year down to \$12,500 a year, and I shall offer that amendment immediately if this amendment is defeated.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, I will say that under an agreement of some days ago the Chief Executive wanted me to return these two to the Senate and offer this amendment, and I have done it.

The PRESIDENT: The amendment is the one read by the Chair a moment ago.

A viva voce vote was had and the Chair being in doubt a division was had. Six senators voting in favor of the adoption of the amendment and 19 opposed, the amendment was lost.

Mr. Hinckley then offered Senate Amendment B and moved its adoption.

The amendment was read by the Chair.

Senate Amendment B was adopted by a viva voce vote and the bill as amended by Senate Amendment B was passed to be engrossed.

Veto Message from the Governor

STATE OF MAINE

Office of the Governor

Augusta, April 6, 1923

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the 81st Legislature:—

I return herewith without my approval:

RESOLVE, Making an appropriation for the construction of a new building at the Northern Maine Sanatorium, Presque Isle, Aroostook county, and for the purchase of equipment therefor, and maintenance.

This Resolve calls for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the erection of a new building at the Presque Isle Sanatorium and it further appropriates \$35,000 to maintain it. If I thought this new building was needed I should not withhold my approval to this Resolve. I have however visited this Sanatorium upon several occasions since I became Governor and have repeatedly been told by those in charge of our tubercular work that the three sanatoriums as now maintained by the State were entirely adequate to cope with the situation. It was however brought to my attention that at one

or more of these institutions the State needed a small school or recreational building for the children. I myself have seen the conditions under which the children are living and should not withhold my approval to a reasonable appropriation for the erection of such buildings. As a matter of fact the new building at Presque Isle, which was built under an appropriation made by the last Legislature, has not yet been completed. This Legislature has appropriated \$10,000 to finish the basement of this building and to provide such equipment as is needed to make it complete. In my opinion it would be good policy to complete the new building before we undertake the construction of others.

The tubercular situation in Maine is hopeful. In 1916 the State spent \$85,000 on its sanatoriums and in 1922 increased this amount 337 per cent, expending the total sum of \$380,000. In ten years the death rate from tuberculosis has dropped from 1054 deaths to 663, a 37 per cent saving. If this saving is continued it will not be long before deaths from tuberculosis will be reduced to a minimum. Our State Department of Health, local health authorities, and the private organizations interested in health work all are cooperating, and the figures that I have given show what is being accomplished. The State has reason to be proud of its three sanatoriums and during the past two years large sums of money have been expended in repairing and refinishing them so they are now in excellent condition.

For the reasons above stated and believing that this additional building is not needed at the present time, I withhold my approval to the aforementioned Resolve.

The message was read by the secretary.

Mr. WILSON of Aroostook: Mr. President, fellow senators, I move that we pass this resolve notwithstanding the objection of the Governor, and I will address myself to the resolve.

It is not a pleasant task to come before this body of men and talk on veto measures. That I will admit. I have done it before.

This happens to be in my home town. I wish it was down in Houlton, or Portland, or York, or somewhere else,

to tell you the truth about it,—really I wish it was, I could talk a great deal better about it.

I visited this sanatorium with the other gentlemen of the committee, as we visited all of them. We found the conditions there and in all of the others practically as the Governor said, doing excellent work, but all asking for money. I will state now that when this Resolve was decided on by the committee, I took myself from the committee and left it with the other gentlemen, I being chairman, not wishing in any way to bear any influence on the committee whatever, and it was solely decided by them unanimously and reported to me.

The institution there has at the present time eighteen children in a small ward, and from the Northern part of the State there are and have been twenty-three others in the other two institutions, down in the Central Maine and the Western Maine Sanatoriums. The doctors and those who are interested in tubercular work are beginning to believe that in order to conquer the disease of tuberculosis they must take the children before they have grown to adult age because they yield to the treatment in a better manner than older persons.

The District nurse, who is employed by the Aroostook Anti-Tuberculosis Association, last year visited 120 families that were infected with tuberculosis, and in the 120 families there were 155 children. In her statement before the committee she said she had no doubt but that 75 of them were infected with tuberculosis. If you should come to one of those institutions and see the condition of a child that had had treatment for six months and one who had recently been admitted to the institution, you would see immediately that the money was well spent, no matter what the price was. This is not for Aroostook county; it is for the whole State. I have the report of March 31st of the three sanatoriums showing 65 patients waiting to be admitted to the three institutions. What does it mean—65 patients? The 65th one will be waiting a year from now before he is admitted unless something is done. During that year what does the disease do? It saps the life and the chances are there is no chance of recovery whatever. Any reputable physician will bear me out in the statement I am making now.

It is necessary that children and

adults if possible be segregated, the children from the others, because we all know a bunch of children, thirty, forty, fifty, make more or less noise, and if they are in a building where in the next ward is a very sick patient, it is very hard on those patients. I would submit to you that building a new building would relieve the pressure on the other buildings, and some of the children who have been taken from their northern county would go back there, to a building in their own county.

The sum asked for, it is true, is \$50,000. I somewhat hesitated in thinking of this resolve, knowing what the session of the Legislature would be here, but the pressure was such that the trustees of the institution insisted that somebody introduce a resolve here for a building at the Northern Maine Sanatorium at Presque Isle—not the Presque Isle Sanatorium but the Northern Maine.

I do not know that there is any necessity at this time of making an extended speech on this matter, but I do hope when you think of this matter, you will think of the children. Possibly it may be mine in a few years from now, going to school and contracting this disease. Possibly you may have one of yours in the public school contract tuberculosis. A child is very easily infected with it. It seems to me if we have raised any money here this winter, this is worthy of great consideration. I want to say to every man who votes for this, don't do it for sympathy for me, or because I voted for you on anything, but because you believe in your own heart it is the right thing to do.

Mr. CROXFORD of Penobscot: Mr. President, gentlemen of the Senate, being one of the members of the Senate who visited Northern Maine Sanatorium, I can heartily agree with Senator Wilson in the statement of facts that he has presented to you here tonight. There is one thing that he omitted, and that was that the children in the sanatorium there who mingle with the older people many times come in contact with people who do not use very good language and do not set a very good example for them, and it has a marked effect on those children. I sincerely hope, gentlemen that you will consider this matter in the same light that the senator has presented it, because it is imperative in my estimation that this building should be built.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, a few weeks ago, at a caucus held in the House of Representatives, a committee was appointed consisting of the committee on appropriations and financial affairs and the several chairmen of seventeen, if I correctly remember the number, committees which had appropriations of money matters coming before them. And it was then pretty well understood that the judgment and recommendation of that committee, representing forty-four members of this Legislature, the House and Senate, chairmen of these several committees and the committee on appropriations headed by the Senator from Oxford, Mr. Eaton, should be accepted. And that committee met the representatives of the several committees which had recommended appropriations—and I want to say to you, Mr. President and Senators, that I never saw members of a Legislature who were so ready and willing to pare and cut and hew down and to try to be economical as the members of this Legislature were—and I want to say to you further that when the appropriation bill comes in, you will find that we have not been extravagant. It will be found that this Legislature has been a most economical Legislature, that has safely guarded the purse strings of the State of Maine.

Two years ago, owing to the change in the fiscal year from January until July, a condition of affairs arose wherein it was necessary to appropriate money to pay the running expenses for two years and a half. Under that condition of affairs the State was fortunate in receiving during the two and one-half year period three years' taxes from railroad, telegraph, telephone and other excise taxes, and although the Legislature passed a tax bill which amounted to 5½ mills for one year and 6 mills for another, that did not correctly represent the true situation. And the auditor's office will show that it did not correctly represent a fair estimate of what was necessary because there was not enough money to pay the bills of the State out of that appropriation and the money received.

As a result of that the State received for the period from January to June, six months, from express companies, pullman and sleeping cars and railroad companies, telegraph companies, telephone companies, \$2,380,744.22. It received during the period

from July to June 1922 the sum of \$2,335,362.97. It was estimated by the last Legislature that we would receive from indirect taxes such as I have mentioned the sum, for this six months' period, of \$3,344,459, but we received \$48,589 less than that amount. It was estimated for the year from July 1921 to June 1922 we would receive \$4,762,059, but we received \$441,232 less than that. The State valuation during that year was \$637,403.43.

The PRESIDENT: May the Chair inquire of the Senator from Cumberland, Mr. Hinckley, if he is speaking to the question of the final passage of this resolve?

Mr. HINCKLEY: I am speaking to that, Mr. President, and trying to show that it is not necessary to oppose this in the interest of economy, because I am trying to show that this Legislature is and has been economical.

The PRESIDENT: You may proceed.

Mr. HINCKLEY:—five and one-half mills on the valuation, amounted to \$3,575,815.55, and I want to explain to the Legislature, although the people understand, and naturally so, from the small tax-rate assessed there that the State was run for a much less sum than it will be run during the next two years. But I want to say to you, in view of the fact that the State received in that six-months' period nearly two million and a half dollars in excess, that they had that extra money—if they hadn't had it, it would have been a large tax rate. In other words, had it been a normal condition and not a change in the fiscal year from January to July, then, senators, the tax rate would have been at least as large as it will be during the next two years.

In order that the people may understand the position of this Legislature—and I am discussing this now with a view of urging upon this Legislature that it is not necessary to cut out this appropriation in order to be economical,—I wish to call the attention of this Senate to the real effect that this State tax has upon the cities and towns in the State. Because, I say to you, senators, if the citizens of the various towns in the State of Maine fully understood just what the relation of the State tax was to the State itself, and what they receive in return for it, there would not be so

much disturbance created and so much unrest by those who are disposed to go out through the State and talk and make a disturbance in regard to the high State tax rate. I have prepared here for the purpose of showing the relation of this State tax to the towns and cities in this state a statement covering every town and city in the State of Maine, which shows first, how much was paid to the State in State taxes during the fiscal year from July 1, 1921 to June 30, 1922, and I have also prepared in connection with this a detailed statement of every dollar received by every town in the State of Maine during that same year to offset what that town paid in State taxes. Just for example, I will call your attention to the first town, Abbot, which is the first alphabetically. The town of Abbot during that year paid a State tax amounting to \$1,388.55. The town of Abbot received from the State of Maine as follows:

A total of \$ 3,092.91 received into that treasury from the State of Maine when their total State tax was only \$1,388.55, or more than double the amount.

The town of Acton, the next town, paid \$1,660.35 under their State tax; they received from the State \$2,304.45.

All of the cities and towns in the State of Maine combined paid in their total State taxes a gross sum of \$2,179,845.57 and received from the State into their local town and city treasuries the sum of \$3,349,763.98, or almost \$200,000 more that they got back from the State, than the entire tax paid by all the cities and towns in the State of Maine. Now I want to say to you, senators, it would take a long time to bankrupt any town with a tax rate if it is a fact that the State returns to that town considerably more than the town pays into the State.

Mr. President, this list of towns is a long one, and I am not going to weary the Senate of course by reading this entire list—

Mr. ALLEN of York: I would like to have them read, Mr. President.

Mr. HINCKLEY: I am going to ask permission of the Senate to have this copy which has been prepared by me printed as extended remarks made by me in the Record.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I am very glad to second the motion.

Mr. BREWSTER: Mr. President, would it equally serve the purpose if it were printed as a document so it would be useful—I should think it would be a very useful document, an interesting one, but I don't know, as a part of the Legislative Record, as it would be available, or would it be possible to have a duplicate—

Mr. HINCKLEY: I would not of course ask the Senate to print it in document form. I ask it as part of my speech. If the Senate thinks it is useful, they may make what use of it they wish.

Mr. ALLEN: I am so interested in this matter I would like to stay until eight or nine o'clock—I would like to have them read.

The PRESIDENT: The question is on the motion of the senator that the papers as presented by him be made a part of the Record and printed as a part thereof. Those in favor say aye (aye)—those opposed no (no).

The Chair would suggest that this is a courtesy which should not be denied any member, and has been granted once during the day. The Chair will put the motion again.

Mr. ALLEN: Do I understand he is entitled to it but once during the day?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the Senator has made a proper motion, that this be made a part of his speech and extended on the record. It is a perfectly proper motion.

Mr. ALLEN: Isn't it proper to vote against it?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will rule it is a very unusual thing to deny any senator on the floor the right to have his remarks printed and made a part of the record.

Mr. ALLEN: Do you rule I have no right to vote against it?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair makes no such ruling. He makes the suggestion. Those who are in favor of spreading these upon the record and making them a part thereof will vote yes, opposed no.

The motion was agreed to.

The PRESIDENT: Now the question before the Senate is on the motion as to whether or not the resolve making an appropriation for the construction of a new building at the Northern Maine Sanatorium, Presque Isle, Aroostook County, shall be passed and become law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

Mr. TREFETHEN of Franklin: Mr. President, as a member of that committee, I wish to say when a child is put in the sanatorium it becomes necessary for the State to furnish food and a suitable place for a school. We found that their school-room was small and very much crowded. If this resolve is passed and the new building is built, there will be in the new building a suitable room for school purposes, and I hope this resolve will be passed regardless of the Governor's veto.

The PRESIDENT: All those in favor of the resolve finally passing and becoming law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor will say "yes," those opposed "no," and the Secretary will call the roll.

Those voting "yes" were Messrs. Adams, Allen, Bemis, Brewster, Buzzell, Clark, Cram, Croxford, Eaton, Elliot, Emery, Farrington, Hinckley, Hussey, Kirschner, Morison, Phillips, Powers, Putnam, Ryder, Sargent, Smith, Speirs, Stevens, Trefethen, Wadsworth, Wilson—27. Those voting "no" were Messrs. Morneau and Spencer—2. Absentee—1.

Twenty-seven senators having voted "yes" and two having voted "no,"

the Resolve became law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

Message from the Governor
STATE OF MAINE
OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Augusta, April 6, 1923.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the 81st Legislature:

Acting in good faith and in behalf of the people of Maine, and animated by a sincere desire to promote water power development and harmonize conflicting views. I suggested and arranged for a conference between the representatives of the parties interested in the Kennebec Reservoir Company, a Senator from Cumberland County who had opposed the granting of the charter, three disinterested and representative citizens, and myself. These representatives consisted of the registered legislative agent of the Reservoir incorporators and one of the incorporators himself. These gentlemen definitely stated that they had authority to speak for their principals in the Reservoir Company. As a result, the terms of the Dead River Reservoir Charter were agreed upon.

The final conference was held late in the evening, Wednesday, April 4th, and the two gentlemen referred to as representing the incorporators assured me that they would have the Dead River Charter presented in the Legislature early in the following morning and that they desired to have the Act passed. I specifically inquired if any of the members of the Legislature had been consulted in connection with this Act, and the answer was in the negative. They also said they would have the charter printed in engrossed form. To this latter suggestion the Senator and myself demurred, and said that perhaps to print the bill without legislative authority could be criticized as proceeding with undue haste, and might be construed as interfering with the prerogatives of the Legislature.

The terms of the Dead River Charter as outlined in my Message to the Legislature were unconditionally agreed upon as acceptable to all the incorporators. Early Thursday morning the charter was printed in engrossed form by the order of the representatives of the Reservoir

Company, as evidence of which it appears that the original engrossed copies bear at the top of the printed page the name of the Treasurer of the local Power Company, himself one of the incorporators of the Reservoir Company.

In accordance with the agreement made, I in person on Thursday morning April 5th presented the result of the conference to a joint session of the Senate and House and expected that the bill immediately would be introduced into the Legislature. In every way I have lived up to my agreement and now am ready to sign the bill if the Legislature in its wisdom enacts it. The arrangement entered into, and definitely agreed upon by all parties is fair to all. It gives to the company storage and water power rights for which they agree to pay an adequate rental. Not a detail of the original plan has been repudiated either by the Senator referred to or by myself, and we both stand behind the position taken, and want the people of Maine to understand it.

At two o'clock this, Friday, afternoon I received a communication from the Treasurer of the Central Maine Power Company, heretofore referred to as an incorporator and one of the conferees, in which he states that he "assented to" the act incorporating the Dead River Reservoir Company. After giving his views on the storage question and on the message that I delivered to the joint convention, he recites that he "must join with the other proposed incorporators in refusing to allow my (his) name to be used in connection with the proposed charter for the Dead River Reservoir Company."

When the Governor of the State of Maine enters into an arrangement it is to be expected that he will hold to it. The same properly can be expected of the others who are parties to it. As the Legislature now is considering the Kennebec and Dead River matters, I desire to give you the information that has just come to me in the letter referred to.

message be accepted, and inasmuch as this refers to a letter being sent to the Governor and received by him, and as he quotes some extracts from the letter, it seems to me only proper and fair that the record should contain the entire contents of the letter. And having here a copy of the letter. I am going to ask the indulgence of the Senate in reading the full text of the letter that caused this message, as I understand it, to be sent.

The Central Maine Power Company has always stood four square for private as against public development of the natural resources of the State, and for the doctrine that neither the State nor any individual has any rights in the water powers or storage basins other than the well recognized riparian rights which go with and are wholly dependent upon the ownership of the land at the site of the dam. This position was fully supported in the answers of the Justices to the questions propounded by the Legislature and published in the 118th Volume of the Maine Reports.

The State of Maine is the owner of two public lots on Long Falls on the Dead River and these lots contain the dam site of the storage reservoir dam proposed in both the Kennebec and the Dead River charters. Because of its ownership of this land, including both banks and the bed of the stream, the State owns all the ordinary rights of any riparian proprietor owning a dam and power site upon any one of our rivers.

The Act incorporating the Dead River Reservoir Company as drawn, and assented to by me, representing our Company, provided for a lease of the dam site, power privilege and lands to be flowed by the dam at a rental that would probably not be excessive as between private parties. The basis of the rental was that the major part should be allocated to the power rights which were leased under this charter but were not granted by the Kennebec Reservoir charter. The balance over and above this power charge was to represent a rental of

the storage dam site and the other State lands flowed by the dam. The valuable power rights which formed the basis of this power lease were not granted under the Kennebec Reservoir charter but were retained by the State.

At the conference when an attempt was made at compromising with the opponents of the former measure I understood that this reason for and the basis of the rental was perfectly plain and understood by all present. Your message, however, conveys to the Legislature and to the public the idea that the Central Maine Power Company and myself assent to the doctrine that there is some right belonging to the State in every storage reservoir, which any developing Company should pay for, even though the State owns no land affected thereby.

With this construction upon the Dead River charter now before the people, its acceptance by me would be considered assent to all this doctrine. Although I believe that the charter does not warrant such a conclusion, I cannot allow myself and the Company which I represent to be placed in the position of apparently subscribing to the views expressed in and the impression conveyed by your message. For this reason I must join with the other proposed incorporators in refusing to allow my name to be used in connection with the proposed charter for the Dead River Reservoir Company.

In order that the views expressed in this letter may be understood by the public I am giving a copy of it to the press.

The Senate was called to order by the President at 9.15 o'clock.

On the motion of Mr. Wadsworth of Kennebec, it was

Ordered, that the engrossing department be requested to return to the Senate, Resolve in favor of the State Park Commission for further consideration.

The motion was agreed to.

Mr. WADSWORTH: Mr. President, I understand the papers are here and I move we reconsider the action by which we passed the bill to be engrossed.

The motion was agreed to and the same senator then offered Senate Amendment A to the bill.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair understands that this is an amendment to an amendment, is that right?

Mr. WADSWORTH: Mr. President, it is an amendment to an amended bill.

The PRESIDENT: The amendment should be "Senate Amendment A to Amendment A, to Resolve in favor of the State Park Commission."

The amendment was read by the Chair.

(This amendment gave the Park Commission \$2,000 for the first fiscal year and \$1,000 for the second fiscal year, to be expended under the direction of the Governor and Council.)

Resolve for the pay of the chaplains of the Senate of the 81st Legislature.

Resolve to aid the town of Naples in the construction of a bridge across the Chute River.

Resolve making an appropriation for expenses of dedication of the Kittery-Portsmouth Memorial bridge.

(A short recess was taken at this time.)

AFTER RECESS

The Senate was called to order by the President at 10.05 o'clock.

The PRESIDENT: We have another conference report on the disagreeing action of the two branches in relation to the Board of Registration of Medicine, that the House recede and concur with the Senate in the adoption of Senate Amendment A. This report is signed by all six members and in the House the report was accepted.

The Senate voted to accept the report in concurrence.

From the House: The report of the committee of conference on the disagreeing action of the two branches, on An Act providing for a tax on gasoline and other products used in the operating internal combustion engines, that the committee are unable to agree.

The report was signed by all six

members of the committee, and in the House was accepted.

On motion by Mr. Allen of York, the report was accepted in concurrence.

Mr. ALLEN: Mr. President, I move that we recede and concur with the House, but there is an amendment on that bill, is there not?

The PRESIDENT: Yes, the bill as amended by House Amendment B was passed to be engrossed by that body.

Mr. ALLEN: Mr. President, I was wondering if there was a Senate amendment on it?

The PRESIDENT: The action this morning on the part of the Senate was to pass the bill to be engrossed by the amendment which was recommended by the committee of conference, House Amendment A.

Mr. ALLEN: Mr. President, I move that the Senate recede and concur with the House.

Mr. SPEIRS of Cumberland: Mr. President, I think this is something we should not do. The fishermen all along the coast use gasoline in their boats. They get up early in the morning, three or four o'clock, go out and fish all day and perhaps come back without a fare. This gasoline tax would be very hard on them. Sometimes even food is scarce, and to put this tax on them I think would be an injustice and I am not in favor of it.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, I wish that this matter might lie on the table a short time until all senators might be informed in relation to the steering committee's attitude, and see whether or not it is possible to come to some reasonable conclusion in regard to the bond issue and the gas tax. If we cannot we will go ahead and do anything that the Senate agrees to.

Mr. ALLEN: Mr. President, it strikes me if we could vote now it would obviate any session of the steering committee. I think we can settle this matter right here and now.

Mr. WILSON of Aroostook: Mr. President, I want to say for the information of the gentleman that the steering committee was called together this evening, and although he was invited Senator Allen did not come into the session. Perhaps after we get through and have a caucus

there are some matters that will be settled.

Mr. BUZZELL: Mr. President, I move that the matter lie on the table.

Mr. ALLEN: Mr. President, I second the motion.

A viva voce vote was had and the Chair being in doubt a division was had.

Twenty senators voted in favor of the motion to table and seven opposed, so the motion was carried and the matter was tabled.

Veto Message from the Governor

STATE OF MAINE OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Augusta, April 6, 1923.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the 81st Legislature:

I return herewith without my approval:

Resolve, appropriating money to pay claims allowed by the Committee on Claims.

This Resolve calls for an appropriation of \$32,975.34. It covers 47 different claims made against the State. These 47 items are as different as they well can be. They cover a wide range of subjects, from the cost of replanking a bridge to the loss of a cow; from a State pension to an undertaker's bill; from a loss caused by fire to interest on money deposited in the State Treasury; from the loss of sheep and turkeys killed by wild animals to a claim for oats eaten by deer.

There is no similarity between these claims and it places a Chief Executive in a difficult, in fact in an impossible position to present 47 separate items to him in one blanket resolve for his approval.

I believe you will appreciate my position. I of course desire to pay all proper claims against the State, but to include with some valid claims others that have little or no merit, hoping that the good ones will carry along the bad, is not a good business proposition.

Every case should stand upon its own merits and if it is not strong enough to do so it should fall.

I have added up the items which I think are not proper claims against the State and they total \$20,219.75.

Several of the large items are to reimburse towns for work which they did on bridges and highways

under the impression that the constitutional amendment submitted to the people two years ago would be passed. These towns took their own chances, and later found that the constitutional amendment was killed and that they would not receive any aid from the State. There is no reason for the State's reimbursing them for their outlay in these cases.

Several of the claims for pauper support are in litigation between towns, and there seems to be no good reason why the State should step in and assume the burden while lawsuits are pending between towns that desire to escape responsibility for pauper support.

One claim is where a certain county has charged the State for physician's and hospital services where an inmate of a county jail attempted suicide just before he was sent to the State Prison. I cannot understand why the State should be obliged to pay this bill of several hundred dollars.

Other items are to cover bills for materials furnished to one of the State institutions where the contracting building company failed. This being the case, those who sold material to the contractors could hardly expect the State to pay the bills for it was a plain business arrangement, and the material men took the ordinary chances of doing business with the contractors.

One large item is to increase the amount paid by the State to the towns for armory rental. The State makes a definite appropriation for armory rental and divides it up among the towns that have military companies. The last Legislature appropriated a certain sum for this purpose and there seems to be no good reason why this Legislature should virtually increase the appropriations made by the 80th Legislature.

Another is for interest on money deposited by a bridge district and county with the State so that it would be used for the construction of a bridge. If this precedent is established it would mean that every town and county that deposits money in the State Treasury, when the State is going to help on bridge or highway work, will claim interest until such time as the money actually is used. It would soon be necessary to open several hundred different accounts with the towns and coun-

ties, and there would be no end to the bookkeeping in the State Auditor's and Treasurer's Offices.

Several items cover damage to domestic animals caused by dogs and wild animals, and these items should be paid for out of the regular receipts from dog licenses. If these claims are meritorious they will be taken care of in the usual manner.

One claim, to pay a town interest on the school fund,* if allowed will open the door for not less than a hundred different claims and I hope the Legislature will proceed cautiously in these matters. Otherwise future legislatures and administrations will be placed under a great burden.

An unusual item is one to cover several hundred dollars worth of oats alleged to have been destroyed by deer in Northern Maine.

This partial list indicates the complicated nature of the Resolve that I am returning and for the reasons stated I cannot give it my approval.

Mr. EMERY of Washington: Mr. President, I do not make any defense of the committee report, only to say that the decisions here given and in the blanket resolve represent the painstaking effort of the Committee on Claims during the last two months.

The decisions were made only after full and complete hearings in which the committee took particular pains to find out all the facts, and we trust that our work will meet with your approval.

I do not intend to make any detailed reply to the various accounts named by the Governor, except that they represent the best judgment of the committee, and the committee is composed of ten men whom you all know, and whom I believe are fair minded and have the State's interest at heart quite as much as does the Governor, and intend quite as completely as he does to do the right thing by the parties appealing for help and for reimbursement, and by the State also.

The claims are difficult matters to handle, and it seems to be essential

to their nature that in each one there shall be a wide margin of doubt and uncertainty as to the facts and as to the State's liability.

If this were not true there would be no claims. They would constitute an obligation which the auditor would pay under due process of law. I do not recall the several claims that the Governor has taken exception to, but if there is any doubt in the minds of any of the senators I should be glad to answer any questions concerning the facts as I remember them.

I want to say, however, that these claims concern every portion of the State. I think every county is represented there, and should this bill fail of passage serious inconvenience would result to a great many worthy and deserving people.

I sincerely hope that the resolve will be passed over the Governor's veto.

Mr. HINCKLEY of Cumberland: Mr. President, I have no doubt that the committee on Claims gave very full and complete hearings on all of these matters, and I have no doubt but what their judgment after hearing the evidence was as good a judgment and as good a decision as we could get on these various matters. But I must say that I believe the position taken by the Governor on this matter is absolutely sound. I do not believe that this Legislature should present to the Governor, who has the veto power under the constitution, forty odd resolves on claims which are of course of a very diversified nature, representing every class of claim that might be imagined to be presented to a Legislature. I believe it is only right and fair that every claim should have been presented in a separate resolve so that it could have been considered by him in that way, because this placed the Governor in the position of vetoing a bill when many of the claims he believed were proper ones, and I am just rising to express my feeling on the matter, that it was hardly the proper thing for the Legislature to do to present it in this way; that it is hardly the proper thing to do to put him in a position where he is obliged to veto many claims that he believed were right, when he had a perfect right of course to have them presented in such a way that he could veto individual ones and then

we could discuss them. I am not saying this, Mr. President, in any way criticising the committee. It has been done in the past. But I must say that I do not think it is a sound way and a fair way to pass legislation.

Mr. EMERY of Washington: Mr. President, I want to say, in deciding to make this report in blanket form, the committee took the matter up with several men of experience, members of the Legislature, and was advised it was a very good plan.

The committee was not animated by any desire to put anything over or by any desire to compel the Governor to approve claims he would otherwise disapprove of. The idea was simply to obviate a great deal of unnecessary printing. When the Governor's objections came to us, it was near the close of the session and it was then too late to put in thirty or sixty different bills, and the committee decided, after discussing the matter fully, to go on with this plan for making a blanket report. In doing this I want to point out that the committee on Claims was not blazing a new trail. You have a blanket report from your committee on Education, on which there can be a great deal of discussion as to amounts paid to the academies or schools. You have a blanket report from your committee with reference to hospital appropriations, and you have a blanket report from your committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. There are other committees that make blanket reports, and I would say also that the auditor whenever there is a session puts a blanket deficiency bill which goes before the committee on Claims and is treated as a claim in itself. Now this auditor's deficiency bill has claims just as diversified as the blanket report of the committee on Claims.

In the auditor's deficiency bills you will find claims of a similar sort to those we have here, precisely the same, ranging from school funds to loss of farm animals killed by wild animals, state paupers, and many other matters. This is not only not a new thing but it is the recognized practice in parliamentary procedure in this Legislature.

Mr. HINCKLEY: Mr. President, I do not wish it understood that I am saying that the committee recommendation to the Legislature is

wrong in this matter. I know it is not so. I simply felt that I must express my feeling in this matter, not only on this—but this is the only matter before us,—but the same objection would apply to the road Resolve and the educational Resolves because I certainly feel that all these resolves should be put in such a way that the Governor could exercise his right without in any way endangering some other resolve that had virtue in it and that he believed in. I, as you all know, believe in fighting hard, but I always believe in fighting fair, and I want the other fellow to have every opportunity to defend himself in every legal and proper manner possible and meet him on that ground.

Now do not feel it is a criticism of these committees. I am stating what I believe is good, sound, fair legislation, and a good, sound, fair way of doing these things, and the situation has arisen now which shows that it has resulted in what I believe to be an awkward situation, an unfair situation, when there are so many of these resolves which if separate the Governor would veto, and many he would approve. But now he must veto all. And we are in a position where we must accept those that some of us might believe were not proper ones in order to save the many that we think are proper.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, in these closing hours of this session, it does not seem to me as if we want to spend the time dissecting and sterilizing, if you please, this blanket resolve. I do not believe that we should make two bites of this cherry, and I hope these claims may be looked after.

Mr. CROXFORD of Penobscot: Mr. President, gentlemen of the Senate: I have every reason to believe that the Committee on Claims did a mighty painstaking job and I have every confidence in the Chairman of that committee, and I believe that his statements are true and I hope the matter will be corrected as it should be.

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question. The question is on the Resolve appropriating money to pay claims allowed by the Committee on Claims, and the question for the Senate is whether this Resolve shall be finally passed and

become a law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. Those who wish to sustain the Governor's veto will vote "no," those who wish to pass the Resolve over the veto will vote "yes." The Secretary will call the roll.

Those voting "yes" were: Adams, Allen, Bemis, Brewster, Buzzell, Carlton, Clark, Cram, Croxford, Eaton, Elliot, Emery, Farrington, Hinckley, Hussey, Kirschner, Morison, Morneau, Phillips, Powers, Putnam, Sargent, Smith, Speirs, Stevens, Trefethen, Wadsworth, Wilson—28.

Voting "no," Spencer—1.

Absentees—2.

Twenty-eight senators having voted "yes" and one having voted "no," the Resolve finally passed and became a law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

From the House: An Act appropriating moneys for the expenditures of the government and for other purposes for the year from July 1st, 1923, to June 30, 1924.

In the House read and passed to be engrossed under suspension of the rules.

In the Senate, on motion by Mr. Eaton of Oxford, under suspension of the rules, read twice and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

From the House: Veto message of the Governor, on Resolve making appropriations for the support and maintenance of the State Experiment Station.

(The message appears in full in the House Report.)

Mr. WILSON: Mr. President and Senators, once more it comes to me that I must arise to defend the action of the agricultural committee. This Resolve came before us in its original draft for \$9,500 and \$17,000 for the next year, 1924 and 1925. To explain the situation and clarify it somewhat to some of the members who are not informed on the work of the Maine State Experiment Station, I will say that in 1907 there was a Hatch Fund so-called, from the Federal Government, of \$15,000 for experimental work to be carried on at the agricultural college in each State, and the State of Maine's share was \$15,000. Later on, I think it was in 1912, the Adams Act was passed by the Federal Government and some more money was given to

the several State Colleges for experimental work. That amount was \$35,000. Now for those of you who do not know how the work is carried on at the Experiment Station, I would go on further to clarify the situation somewhat. In the veto message it is stated that \$10,000 each year was raised for Aroostook farm—it absolutely was not so because the budget report will show it is \$5,000 each year. It also states \$10,000 for Highmoor. The budget report recommends \$5,000, and it is the largest amount ever raised for that particular purpose, and \$5,000 for animal husbandry. That is carried on somewhat in conjunction with the Federal Government. It is said that the State of Maine can render the best report on the breeding and inbreeding of cattle of any State in the Union and have data which is very valuable to the United States Government and they are keeping very close track in the matter. That is so much for these farms. Those were separated and recommended in the budget.

This other \$10,000 each year is not recommended by the budget committee. The experimental work at the Station with the Hatch Fund is very elastic. That can be used for almost any purpose in the experimental work except the repair of buildings and keeping up the experiment station. The work is the work of analyzing fertilizers, analyzing the food that the pure food department here in the State House sends them to analyze. It also does experimental farm work in all lines. You have all heard of the sulphur sprays and the fungicide sprays used in the orchards, which all originated from experimental farms—I do not say all from the Experiment Station at Orono, but from the experimental stations conducted by the different States. All of you who are farmers at least, and probably more of you, know of the Bordeaux mixture which is the saving of the potato crop in years of rust, also used in the strawberry fields, on the cucumber vines, wherever they raise truck all over the United States. They experiment in regard to the diseases of plants and the control of them along the agricultural line. In the beginning of the work, they had a staff that was very efficient, but the prices of labor went up and some of them went to work for the Federal Gov-

ernment and they have never been able to replace them because they had not the money, as the Adams Act, which gives \$35,000 each year, was for State experimental work, and had to be used for that work only.

There came before the Committee on Agriculture, not only the Experiment Station people, Dr. Morse, but also a great many of the representative citizens from all over the State of Maine. I think there were more from the southern and western part of the State than anywhere else, men who pleaded before this committee for this amount of money.

The Committee believed that they ought to have it. This money is not expended by any one man but by a Council—I cannot say at the present time whether the Council is elected by the Governor—but there is a Council who are directors in the expenditure of this money. The committee believed at that time, and still believes, that they should have had the full amount, but in order to compare with the cuts of all the rest of the committees before the committee which assembled here several afternoons, we cut off all that we thought we reasonably could, and leave them what they could get along with, and I do believe and hope that this matter will be passed over the objections of the Governor.

I think I have stated the situation as clearly as I can without making any set form of speech. This is a matter of value to the agricultural people of the State and I sincerely hope that you will do this for them.

The PRESIDENT: The question is on the Resolve making appropriation for the support and maintenance of the State Experiment Station, whether this Resolve shall be finally passed and become a law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. Those who wish to pass the Resolve over the Governor's veto will vote "yes"—those who wish to sustain the veto will vote "no." The Secretary will call the roll.

Those voting "yes" were Messrs. Allen, Bemis, Buzzell, Carlton, Cram, Croxford, Eaton, Elliot, Emery, Farrington, Hinckley, Hussey, Morison, Phillips, Powers, Sargent, Smith, Speirs, Stevens, Trefethen, Wadsworth, Wilson—22.

Those voting "no" were Messrs. Adams, Clark, Kirschner, Morneau, Putnam, Spencer—6.

Absent—3.

Twenty-two Senators having voted "yes," and six Senators having voted "no," the Resolve was finally passed notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

Mr. BUZZELL of Waldo: Mr. President, I rise to a point of personal privilege. I want to say a man's true worth is estimated by the good he does in this world. When he dies, mortals ask "What property has he left behind," but angels will inquire. "What good deeds hast thou sent before thee?"

Gentlemen of this Senate, I hope you will agree with me that it is especially fitting for us at this time to present to one of our Honorable Senators the Bible secured by this Senate in the early part of this Legislature. Therefore, Mr. President and members of this Senate, I move that the Secretary of this Senate present to the Honorable Senator from York, Senator Spencer, the Senate Bible, with our very best wishes.

(Applause, the Senate rising, and the secretary presenting the Bible to Senator Spencer.)

Mr. SPENCER: Mr. President and fellow members, if you had given me the American flag as a token of your esteem, I should have regarded it very highly; but you have given me something that I regard still more highly. You might have given me a check for \$5,000, but I would prefer this. I have made money enough since I have been in the Legislature so that I don't need to work any more. (Applause) All I can say is that I shall always appreciate it as the gift of the 81st Legislature, and that I shall always read it, and that if my prayer for each of you is ever any benefit to you, I shall be pleased to pray for you all.

(Applause.)
