Wednesday, January 21, 1925. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Young of

Hallowell.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate:

Ordered, the House concurring, that all bills and resolves shall be printed pending reference to committee and when the same are advertised for hearing the advertisement shall give the number of the bill and state whether it is a Senate or House document, was read and passed in the Senate on January 7,

In the House, indefinitely post-poned in non-concurrence, on Jan-

uary 15.

Comes from the Senate, that body insisting on its former action, whereby the order received passage, and asking for a committee of conference, with the following conferees part Senator appointed on its Hinckley of Cumberland, Maher of Kennebec and Case of Washington.

Paper from the Senate out of order.

The following order: Ordered, the House concurring, that the time for the reception of bills for private and special legislation be limited to Thursday, February 12, 1925 at four o'clock P. M., and that all such petitions and bills presented after that date be referred to the next Legislature; that the Secretary of the Senate cause copies of this order to be published in all the daily and weekly papers of the State until and including Wednesday, February 11, 1925.

In the Senate the order was passed and sent down for concurrence.
In the House, on motion by Mr.

Nichols of Portland, the order was tabled.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will state at this time, informally, that the indications are that the House and Senate will adjourn tomorrow, Thursday, until Tuesday afternoon of next week, unless something arises to make necessary a session on Friday.

The Chair would also urge members to be prompt in the introduction of bills, either of a public or private nature so that we may refer them to the committees and be in a position to act promptly on them.

On motion by Mr. Bishop of Boothbay Harbor

Adjourned until ten o'clock to-morrow morning.
