SENATE

Tuesday, Jan. 13, 1923

Senate called to order by the President, 4.30 o'clock.

Prayer by Rev. Ralph F. Lowe of Augusta.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Orders

On motion of Mr. Smith of Somerset it was

Ordered, That all bills, resolves, orders, petitions and memorials for introduction in the Senate be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Senate not later than four o'clock of the day proceeding their introduction.

On motion by Mr. Wadsworth of Kennebec it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Public Buildings, is hereby given charge of all assignments of rooms for hearings in the Capitol building, and that all applications for rooms for hearings must be made to him in writing forty eight hours previous to the time when said rooms are to be used for that purpose.

Sent down for concurrence.

Mr. Maher of Kennebec: Mr. President. I wish to offer the bond of the State treasurer in the sum of \$50,000 and move that it be referred to the appropriate committee.

The PRESIDENT: I will say that we will hold that until the committees have been announced and then refer it to the proper committee.

On motion by Mr. Clark of Hancock, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that all committees are hereby directed to report to the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, all appropriations of money recommended by them and any acts or resolves recommended by them which amend existing statutes or resolves requiring an appropriation of money.

The Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs is hereby directed to make record of said reports, and forthwith submit the same to the Legislature without changes therein. No act or resolve involving an appropriation of money shall be engrossed without having endorsed thereon, in addition to the

usual endorsements of the officers of the Senate and House, the following, viz:

"Examined and recorded by the committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs.

On motion by Mr. Anthoine of Cumberland, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Public Printing deliver to the State Library, as soon after printing as possible, twenty five copies of the bills, legislative proceedings and all other publications printed by order of the Senate for exchange with other libraries and institutions.
