#### HOUSE

Wednesday, February 2, 1927 The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Clark of Gardiner.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate: The following order:

Ordered, the Senate concurring. that the committee on Mines and Mining be instructed to investigate the conditions of mines and mining in the State and to report what action the Legislature can take to promote most effectively the development of the mineral resources of Maine; which was read and passed in the House January 25.

In the Senate, indefinitely postponed in non-concurrence.

In the House:

Mr. CHASE of Cape Elizabeth: Mr. Speaker, in introducing this order it was my thought to perhaps direct some of the sentiment in favor of Maine development into other lines which might be beneficial to the State. If the statement which I read in the paper this morning made in the Senate in connection with the indefinite postponement of the order may be considered as a measure of the enthusiasm which might be brought to such an investigation, I think the order ought indefinitely postponed otherwise respectably put out of its misery. I move that the House adhere.

The motion prevailed.

M., and that all such petitions and bills presented after that date be referred to the next Legislature, and that the Secretary of the Senate cause copies of this order to be published in all the daily and weekly papers of the State until and including February 16, 1927.
