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#### HOUSE

Tuesday, February 22, 1927.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Garland of Augusta.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Mr. WING of Auburn: Mr. Speaker and members of the House: This is the birthday of a great man, a great patriot and a great citizen. I have the honor to ask you to permit the introduction of a bill, out of order and under suspension of the rules, having to do with respect to his memory.

Thereupon the rules were suspended, and the following bill was introduced out of order and referred to the committee on Judiciary:

An act to create and to define the powers and duties of a State Commission to represent the State in arranging and carrying out a program for the celebration of the Bi-Centennial of the birth of George Washington.

Mr. EUSTIS of Strong: I move, Mr. Speaker, that this House signify its respect to the memory of a man whose birthday occurred today, as well as the approval of the bill introduced by the gentleman from Auburn, Mr. Wing, by a rising vote.

Mr. HALE of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I think a similar act is pending in this Legislature. May I inquire the disposition of it?

The SPEAKER: The Chair does not recall a similar act. Does the gentleman wish the Clerk to look up the files and ascertain?

Mr. HALE: I don't know, Mr. Speaker. If there is any duplication, we can probably easily take care of it. I had a clear recollection of another bill which was referred from the last Legislature covering this matter, and if I remember correctly it is still pending.

The SPEAKER: The House may be at ease for a minute and the Clerk will look up the records.

Mr. HALE: Mr. Speaker, I am informed by a member of the Library committee that a similar bill is pending before them.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will ask

the gentleman from Auburn, Mr. Wing, if he cares to have the motion put.

Mr. WING: Yes, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The motion before the House is that the bill be referred to the committee on Judiciary and that printing be ordered, and the gentleman from Strong, Mr. Eustis' motion, can be voted on at the same time, that this be a standing vote. Is it the pleasure of the House that this bill be so referred and the printing ordered?

Thereupon the motion was adopted by a unanimous rising vote, and the bill was referred to the committee on Judiciary and 500 copies ordered printed.

Mr. Hughes from the committee on public utilities on bill an act to amend "An act to incorporate the Richardson Wharf Company approved April 2, 1856," as amended by an act approved February 13, 1880 (H. P. 140), reported same in a new draft (H. P. 910) under same title and that it "ought to pass."

Reports read and accepted and the new drafts ordered printed under the joint rules.

favor of Frenchville in the county of Aroostook (H. P. 114) (H. D. 42).

Report read and accepted and the resolve having already been printed was read once under suspension of the rules and tomorrow assigned.

Mr. KITCHEN of Presque Isle: Mr. Speaker, if I am correctly informed, that resolve was reported "ought not to pass," as another bill is in covering the same matter.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will state that this appears as a resolve in favor of Frenchville in the county of Aroostook, and it was referred to the committee on towns and reported by the gentleman from Bridgton, Mr. Stone, The Chair will now state that this was reported incorrectly as a resolve and that it is in reality a bill; and the gentleman from Presque Isle, Mr. Kitchen, moves that the House reconsider its action whereby the second reading was assigned for tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The motion prevailed, the bill had its second reading, and tomorrow assigned for its third reading.

Mr. FOSTER of Ellsworth: Mr. Speaker, I would like to inquire if that bill relating to passes on common carriers for Public Utilities Commission is the one referring to the issuing of passes now to the Public Utilities officials.

The SPEAKER: The Chair believes offhand that it is, but we have the bill here and as it is short the Clerk will read it.

(Clerk reads bill referred to.)

Mr. FOSTER: That is not the bill. I thank you, I have just been informed by the member from Portland, Miss Laughlin, that this bill is the bill; and I move that we reconsider the vote whereby it had its two several readings and tomorrow was assigned for its third reading.

Miss LAUGHLIN of Portland: Mr. Speaker, that bill is the one that was referred to the Legal Affairs committee, and as the clerk read it, it provided that all after the last clause there shall be cut out. That which is cut out is the provision of the Revised Statutes providing that free transportation shall be supplied to the Public Utilities Commission which I understand is the matter to which the member from Ellsworth (Mr. Foster) is referring.

Thereupon the House reconsidered its action whereby House Paper 136 was assigned for its third reading tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock; and on further motion by the same gentleman the bill was tabled.

The SPEAKER: Does the gentleman (Mr. Foster) wish to have this definitely assigned for tomorrow?

Mr. FOSTER: I would rather say Thursday.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Foster of Ellsworth, the bill was definitely assigned for Thursday, February 24.

#### Orders of the Day

On motion by Mr. Patterson of Castine the House voted to reconsider its action whereby the report of the committee on Legal Affairs "Ought not to pass" on H. P. 17, S. D. 17, entitled "An act granting Cumberland County Power and Light Company the right to exercise the power of eminent domain for certain purposes."

Mr. PATTERSON: I yield to the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Chase.

Mr. CHASE of Cape Elizabeth: Mr. Speaker, I was absent from the House on Friday, and thereby deprived of the opportunity of making this motion which Mr. Patterson was courteous enough to make. I did not expect the bill would come in at that time, and I would like to have the reconsideration granted in order that I may make another motion.

Thereupon the House voted to reconsider its action on H. P. 17 whereby the report of the Legal Affairs committee, "Ought not to pass" was accepted.

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, I am not in favor of the bill in its present form. I think there has been an erroneous idea got out about the bill in that it has been stated that the Cumberland and York delegations are opposed to it. I do not want to go into the question whether they are for it or against it, because I myself am opposed to it in its present form. I would like to get the proposition to the point where an amendment can be offered which I think will be more acceptable than this bill; and in order to accomplish that purpose and make it possible to amend the bill, I move that the bill be substituted for the report.

Thereupon the bill was substituted for the report.

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, I now offer House amendment "A" and move its adoption, and I will ask the Clerk to read it.

Mr. WING of Auburn: Will the gentleman yield to me to have the

same tabled for printing?

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, it was my intention to table if the amendment was adopted. I am certainly willing it should be printed.

Mr. WING: I should like to have it printed before we adopt the amendment. We may not want to adopt

the amendment.

Mr. CHASE: It was my intention if the amendment was adopted to make the motion that the bill be re-

committed as amended.

The SPEAKER: Would the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth (Mr. Chase) be willing to present his amendment, and then move that it lie on the table for printing?

Mr. CHASE: Yes, Mr. Speaker.

Thereupon Mr. Chase of Cape Elizabeth withdrew his motion that the amendment be adopted, and the amendment was tabled for printing; and on further motion by the same gentleman it was definitely assigned for Friday next, February 25, and 500 copies ordered printed.

Mr. LITTLEFIELD of Kennebunk: Mr. Speaker, may we have amendment read at this time?

(Amendment "A" read the Clerk)

#### House Amendment "A" to House Paper No. 17

House Paper No. 17 is hereby amended by striking out all of said bill after the enacting clause and substituting in place thereof the following.

Section 1. The Cumberland County Power and Light Company is hereby authorized and empowered to take and hold, by right of eminent domain, such lands and easements as may be necessary for the proper location of its transmission lines which are designed to carry voltages of five thousand volts or more and of necessary appurtenances thereto, located within the territory in which said company is authorized to do a public utility business, in the same manner and under the same conditions as set forth in Chapter sixty-one, Sections eleven to twenty-two, of the Revised Statutes and amendments thereto.

Sect. 2. This right shall not apply to lands or easements located within 300 feet of an inhabited dwelling, nor to lands and easements on or adjacent to any developed or undevel-

oped water power.

Sect. 3. The location of such transmission lines shall be approved by the county commissioners of the county in which the transmission lines are located.

Mr. FOSTER of Ellsworth Speaker, I would like to inquire if there was a minority report on that

The SPEAKER: The Chair will state that there was not. It was a unanimous report "ought not to pass."
