SENATE

Tuesday, January 8, 1929.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. H. A. Clark of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

The President laid before the Senate the following bills and resolves which were referred to this Legislature by the last preceding legislature:

Judiciary

An Act to compel legal voters to register and to vote, at primary and other elections. (S. P. 412-1927)

An Act to provide a uniform motor vehicle code. (H. P. 370-1927)

Sent down for concurrence.

Legal Affairs

An Act to adopt the Uniform Criminal Extradition Act. (S. P. 153-1927)

Sent down for concurrence.

Library

Resolve for the purchase of 250 copies of "The Mother Church." (S. P. 304-1927)

Resolve authorizing the State Librarian to purchase for the State one hundred and fifty copies of the History of Oxford County when printed. (H. P. 28-1927)

Sent down for concurrence.

Pensions

Resolve providing a state pension for Joseph A. Trueworthy. (H. P. 909-1927)

An Act relating to pensions for the blind. (H. P. 24-1927)

Sent down for concurrence.

Ways and Bridges

An Act relating to the Hancock Sullivan bridge. (H. P. 903-1927)

Sent down for concurrence.

Judiciary

Mr. SLOCUM of Cumberland: An Act to register and license persons engaged in the practice of barbering and to create a Board of Barber Examiners. (S. P. 1)

Sent down for concurrence.

Orders

On motion by Mr. Minott of Cumberland, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Public Printing be directed to handle all

matters pertaining to advertising, binding and committee binders for records of hearings as required by the Legislature.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Crockett of York, it was

Ordered, that all bills, resolves, orders petitions and memorials for introduction in the Senate be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Senate not later than four o'clock of the day preceding their introduction.

On motion by Mr. Dwinall of Knox, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Public Buildings is hereby given charge of all assignments of rooms for hearings in the Capitol Building, and that all applications for rooms for hearings must be made to him in writing forty-eight hours previous to the time when said rooms are to be used for that purpose.

On motion by Mr. Martin of Kennebec, it was

Ordered, that the Maine State Bar Association shall be allowed the use of the Senate Chamber Wednesday, January 9, 1929, during the afternoon for its public hearing.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that all committees are hereby directed to report to the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, all appropriations of money recommended by them and any acts or resolves recommended by them which amend existing statutes or resolves requiring an appropriation of money.

The Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs is hereby directed to make record of said reports, and forthwith submit the same to the Legislature without changes therein. No act or resolve involving an appropriation of money shall be engrossed without having endorsed thereon, in addition to the usual endorsements of the officers of the Senate and House, the following, viz:

On motion by Mrs. Allen of Penobscot, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Public Printing deliver to the State Library, as soon after printing as possible, twenty-five copies of the bills, legislative proceedings and all other publications printed by order of the Senate and House for exchange with other libraries and institutions.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Bragdon of Aroostook, it was

Ordered, that the Secretary of State be directed to furnish a copy of the Maine State Year Book to each member and officer of the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Bond of Lincoln, it was

Ordered, that the Secretary of the Senate be instructed to purchase, for the use of the Senate, one copy of Reed's Parliamentary Rules and one copy of Hughes' American Parliamentary Guide.

On motion by Mrs. Pinkham of Aroostook, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that three hundred and fifty (350) copies of the Legislative Record for the session of 1929 be printed and bound, one copy each for the members of the Senate and House

of Representatives, and the remainder to be deposited in the State Library for exchange and library use; and be it further

Ordered, that three hundred and fifty (350) copies of the Legislative Record be printed in pamphlet form for distribution from day to day to members of the Legislature and the departments, under the direction of the document clerk, and be it further

Ordered, that a suitable index be prepared for such Legislative Record under the direction of the State Librarian, at an expense not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500).

Sent down for concurrence.

Reports of Committees

Mr. Bragdon, from the Senate Committee on Senatorial Vote, on Order of the Senate calling for report on the vote for Senators for the political years of 1929 and 1930, reported that a complete tabulation of the Senatorial votes is too bulky for the files, and is on file in the office of the Secretary of State for the inspection and examination of the Senators.

The report was read and accepted and ordered placed on file.
