Tuesday, January 29, 1929. Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. L. D. Porter of Gardiner.

Journal of previous session read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

By Mr. Noyes of Kennebec: Resolve in favor of the Erskine Academy, in China. (S. P. 83)

Orders

Mr. Murchie of Washington presented the following order:

Ordered, the House concurring, that a special joint committee, consisting of not more than six members on the part of the Senate, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and not more than fifteen members on the part of the House, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House, and so constituted that each and county in the State shall be thereon represented, be appointed to consider, as a question of state policy, the advisability of enacting legislation to permit either the limited or the unlimited export of hydro-electric energy, and further

Ordered, that Senate Document No. 44 and all other bills dealing with the subject matter of the export of hydro-electric energy be referred to said special joint committee.

On motion by Mr. Murchie of Washington, tabled pending passage.
